

WELL DESIGNED CABARET





CHICKS DOUBLE

In weekend action the Chicks came away with two victories in preseason action In Fridays game against Sole City Sports, a major women's league team, the Chicks came on strong at the start of the game and never let up. By the time the first 11 minutes of play was over NAIT was in control of a 21 point lead. They have improved on the mistakes that they were previously making. They were playing a stronger closer defense and capitalizing on their opportunties which led to a 41—18 half time score. The girls came out a little flat in the beginning of the second half but this soon wore off and they continued on the way they finished in the first half. They were in control of the game from start to finish. Turning in good per formances in the game for the Chicks were Robyn Lee 16 points, Janet Weech 13 pts.,Jami Bering 12 pts., Laverne Holt 10 pts., Marcy Hurlburt 10 pts., and Leanne Undershute with some good defensive play. In the end the Chicks were winners with a 68-36 final score. On Saturday after noon they continued their winning ways with a 9 point victory over the Alumni team. The team started off very slowly, they seemed to be tired from the game the night before. They played very poor defensively and allowed the alumni to score almost at will. The offence seemed almost nonexistent with the game in the 6th minute before the Chicks scored their first points, and at the 12 minute mark before they got thier second basket. Once they got rolling they closed the score to a more respectable 22-26 lead for the alumni at half time. The alumni team showed their experience by playing a more controlled game. In the second half the Chicks returned to their form of the previous night. With much tighter man—to—man de— fense and better offensive play inside, the Chicks staged a come back. Good performances came from Leanne Undershute with a game high 20 points, Robyn ee 10 pts., Marcy Hurlburt

On Friday night the Ooks played an exhibition game against a premier mens league team, P & F Optical. The team was not up to full strength for this game with 3 forwards out on the injury list. The game was a close see-sawing affair with both teams taking the lead numerous times. The P & F team had great speed and an abundance of height which was a problem for us since 2 of our 3 big men were on the injured list. The Ooks fell victim to their own mistakes with some poor dribbling and passing. Some great inside work by Scott McLarren kept us in the game. At half time the score was 41-29 for P & F. As the second half started NAIT started to comeback cutting the P & F lead to 7 pts. This was accomplished by some good outside shooting by forwards Pat Gangl and Phil Bartlett. Although NAIT kept equal to the competition in the second half they could not over come the lead established by P & F in the first half. The scoring was pretty well dominated by 3 players, Scott McLarren with 31 pts, Pat Gangl 14 pts and Phil Bartlett 12 pts. NAIT suffered their first defeat in this tough fought game losing 81 to 69 to a very good team.

On Saturday afternoon the Ooks participated in another very close game. This time the competition was supplied by the alumni. The Ooks took an early lead and never gave it up although the two teams were tied a couple of § times. The scoring was spread out over the whole team. After some great plays at both ends by both teams the Ooks emerged with a halftime lead of 40 to 35. In the second half Harry Blacker came out with the hot hand hitting 100 percent on his 8 foul shots and 6 outside shots for a game high of 20 points. Scott McLarren continued to impress people with his play inside by getting 13 points. A strong game was also had by Sean Phelan who played well offensively and defensively and accumulated 8 points. For the alumni the big scorers were Bert Bertolin 12 pts, Roger Poon 10 pts and Len Parsons 10 pts. With the strong play of Harry Blacker and some good defence the Ooks extended their lead to finish the game with a convincing 85-68 victory. 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





Senate Probes **Oldsters**

The U of A senate, the body charged with 'inquiring into any matter that might tend to enhance the usefulness of the University', has

launched a Task Force on Mature Students ('all students who are 25 or over, and non-matriculated adult students who are enrolled in a credit course or program at the University of Alberta') comprised 28% of all applicants to the University in 1981-82, and the Task Force will be attempting:

1) to collect data about the nature of the mature student population at the University of Alberta.

2) to identify major concerns and special needs of the mature student.

3) to decide which issues warrant further investi-

4) to determine to what extent the University of Alberta meets the needs of the mature student with regard these issues

5) to survey the support mechanisms for mature students in the general comm-

6) to make recommendations.

One of the first things the Task Force did was to send out 500 questionaires at the beginning of August to

enrolling mature students. asking opinions and information from them. Over 140 have already been returned. Other persons at all levels of the University, and outside, have been approached for contributions.

The Task Force on Mature Students is comprised of six Senate members, two members of the University of Alberta community at large, and one representative of Athabasca University.

Mary Totman, Executive Officer of the Senate, stresses that 'the success of the task force, like all others (that the Senate has done), depends to a great extent on the input we receive.'

Anyone wishing to contribute information or opinions to the Task Force on Mature Students should submit it, preferably during October and Novermber, to The Senate, 150 Athasbasca Hall, University of Alberta, Edmonton, T6G 2E8. Pas tSenate task forces have tackled subjects such as the status of women at university, native students, and those with learning disabilities; and most recently (April 1982) it released its Report on University Purpose.

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
