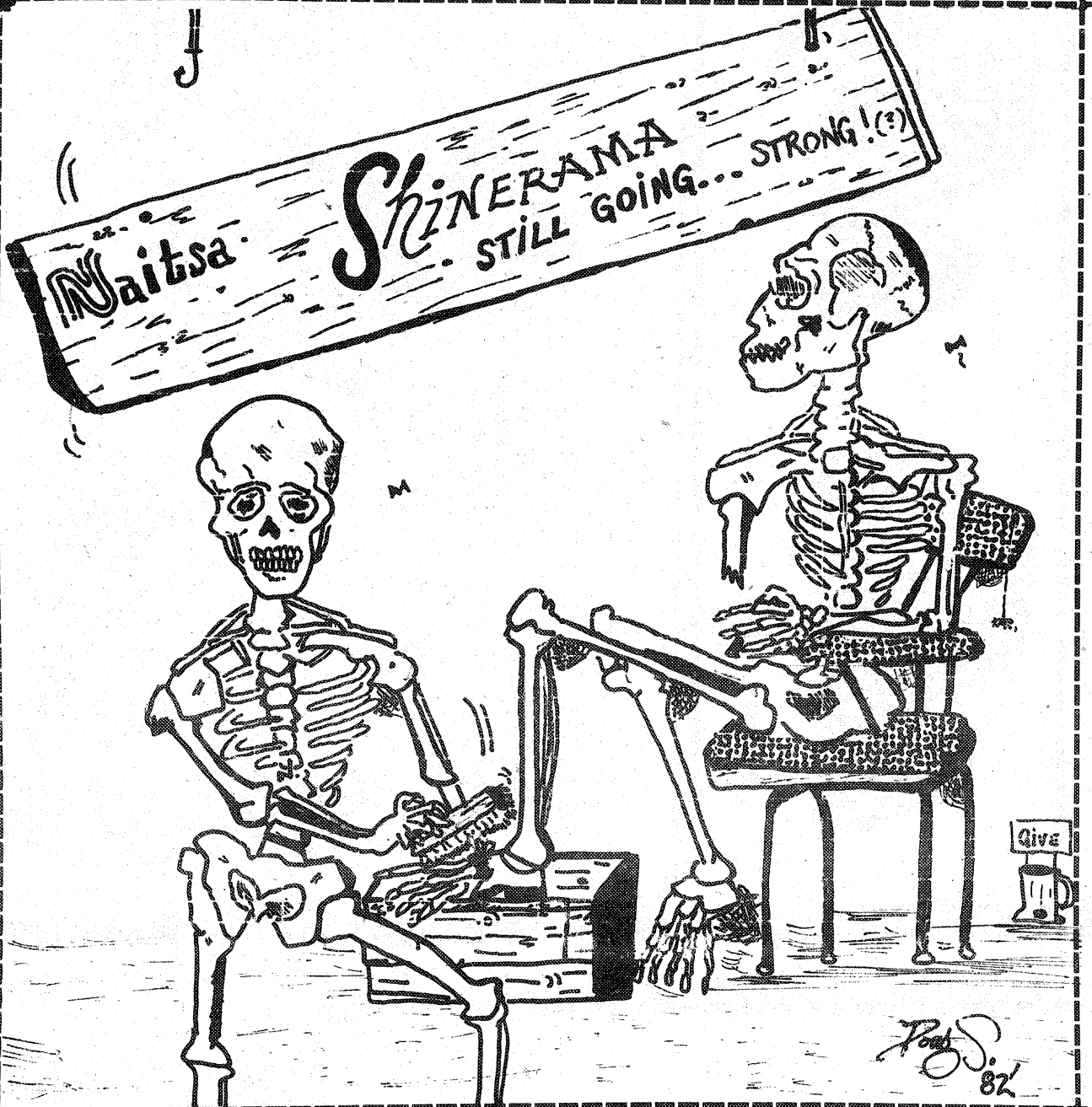

The Theatre Network is a theatre company, situated in a small building behind the coliseum, which presents live drama for the public.

The performances are usually sold out by the day on which they are being presented. But on arriving at the Theatre Network one might find the foyer filled with people (mostly new wave/punk rockers) wishing to buy tickets at the last minute. If they are lucky someone, with a reservation, might not show up and then the policy of "Late seating at discretion of management" is put into effect.

Once inside the theatre you might find yourself a comfortable seat (in a chair), or an uncomfortable seat (on the floor), depending on the play and the arrangement of the set.

At present (Sept 30-Oct 17) the play Wolfboy (Die Lycanthrope) is showing. The play started late due to ticket sales. The introduction was in the form of music; the lights dimmed and the characters placed themselves on stage. The cast performed through 3 scenes, giving everyone 2 ten-minute intermissions.

The play was originally produced at the 25th Street Theatre, Saskatoon.

Wolfboy is about 2 young boys who have been placed in a sanatorium. One, Bernie, for attempted suicide, and the other, David, for believing himself part wolf. It is about Bernie-trying to cope with his life (lifestyle) and father; Bernies father Mr McMillan-trying to cope with Bernie (a son which he cannot talk to) & Bernies attempted suicide; David-trying to cope with his past (his streetlife); and the staff of the sanatorium-trying to straighten out the lives of it's occupants without going crazy themselves. Joy, pain, "great freedom", "great loneliness", learning, compassion, communication, and purity in one play.

The cast was made up of six people:

David (Lawrence King Phillips). His performance was (in one word) exhilarating.

Bernie (Kim Coates). In his acting he revealed quite well all that a "lost" teenager might feel-anger, hatred, loneliness, confusion, embarrassment, compassion, love

Dr Sherrot (Vivien Bosley). Her part called for compassion, intelligence, control, and tolerance. She was very convincing

Mr McMillan (Wendell Smith). His performance as a frustrated and angry

father was not quite believable. He portrayed frustration and bitterness with too much swearing, not enough voice tone-control. (The amount of swearing he did detracted from his character). In his final performance he succeeded in expressing the genuine frustration of a parent (in voice, word, and action) Cherry (Kat Mullaly). She portrayed her character as a zealous, energetic, very sensitive secretary/attendant

Annie (Denise Beamish). As a memory she did well.

Wolfboy is like an ordinary dramatic play with an added "little twist" to it. All in all, it was good, interesting, and different.

If you are not offended by fluent swearing go and see this play. One word of advice: phone ahead for tickets (474-6111), & leave early enough to find the place (It took me half an hour) 11845-77 st.

The NAIT Oookpiks opened exhibition play on Friday, Oct. 2nd, with a 3-1 victory over the Leduc Riggers of the Capital Junior Hockey League at the NAIT Arena.

Dale Kolada opened the scoring with only 25 seconds gone in the first period to give the Ooks a 1-0 advantage on a Garth Hayes setup. The Riggers tied the game at the 11:30 mark on Jeff Kirchner's power play goal.

In the second frame, Randy Repchuk's unassisted marker gave the Ooks a one goal advantage. Then, in the third, Gary Hoekstra and Keith Beyak set up Steve Shuchuk for the insurance tally.

The Oookpiks outshot the Riggers 46-29 and used three netminders in the contest. Brad Breakell, John Gillespie, and Cleo Rowein spent a period between the pipes.

Three second period goals were all the U of A Golden Bears need to defeat the Oookpiks 6-1 on Oct. 3rd. The loss for the Ooks was their first in the 1982-83 exhibition season.

The Bears gained the lead that they never relinquished at 15:19 of the first on a Bernie McNeil marker. The assists went to Tim Krug and Ron Parent.

In the middle period, Rick Swan doubled the Bears advantage at 8:15 on a play with Perry Zapernick and Scott Mackenzie. A short 29 seconds later, Tim Krug capitalized on Ron Parent's set-up. Terry Sydoryk rounded out the second period scoring on a power play tally.

In the final frame, Warren Sanregret brought NAIT on the scoreboard at the 2:43 mark. At 5:03, Colin Chisholm scored on a powerplay

set-up from Jeff Marshall. Bernie McNeil then picked up his second of the game at the 9:05 mark. A former Oook, Dave Souch, had the helper on McNeil's tally.

NAIT was outshot 54-21 by the Bears in the match. John Gillespie and Cleo Rowein shared the goaltending duties and each were beaten three times.

On the weekend split, Oookpik Coach Perry Pearn commented, "We were relatively pleased with the split, but the weekend would have been more satisfying with a sweep." On the play of the positions, Perry added, "There have been some positive signs over the weekend. So far we have looked strong in goal and on defence."

Offensively, the team has appeared a touch weak with only four goals in two games. Last year, the Ooks outscored the Leduc Riggers 12-2 and scored a pair in an 8-2 exhibition loss to the U of A Golden Bears. To win in exhibition or regular season

play, the Ooks will need to improve their present goal output greatly.

On the Bench: 28 players are left in the Ooks training camp with three games left before the ACAC Pre-Season Tournament in Calgary...4 prospects are currently out with injuries. Right Winger Jim Lee is having trouble with his knee. Right Winger Ron Francis and Center Pat Lawson are both out with groin pulls, while winger Kevin Emery is out with a shoulder problem. The next home game for the Ooks is on Friday, Oct. 8th, when they entertain the Sherwood Park Knights of the Capital Junior Hockey League. Game time is 7:30 and admission is FREE with your NAIT ID Card.

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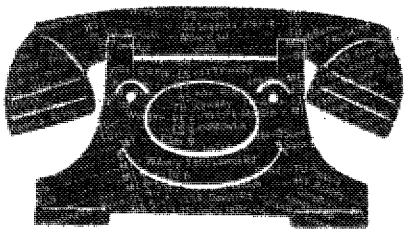
