

Let's start with the usual question, why are the fees so high for a parking stall. Well to start with, be glad that they are only \$72 for 9 months. The original proposal was \$15 per month or \$135 for a year. The Board of Governors took pity on us and dropped them to only \$8 a month. The reason for this increase is the soaring costs of wages and maintenance. Repairs to the plugs was \$80,000.00 alone. By the way if people would quit backing into stalls, this would save alot of bucks. The security staff has been increased including a full time monitor on the parkade. Increased security insures a parking space for all those who paid for it and a parking ticket for those who didn't.



And now to answer Ed Proctor's question, what about the coin operated barriers in the parkade? Well Ed. rest All students, this includes day students, continuing education students, apprentices, and special day students, who have parking passes are allowed to park tree in the lots affected by the evening charge system. These parking lots are as follows: Parkade zone A/B, H zone Plaza 2, G zone Plaza 2. H and G zones are on the honour system, meaning that when you enter the lots you have a choice, you can pay the small fee and take the ticket and place it face up on your dash board, or you can ignore the machines and park your car. Of course when they come around to check the vehicles and you don't have a pass or a ticket, it is only a \$25 ticket! These charges will go into effect at 5:30 every evening.
