

In memory of Terry Fox, who died in June of '81, there will be an annual run. This year the run is to take place on September 19, 1982. It is to be held at Rundle Park and along Ada Boulevard.







CANADIAN YOUNG PEOPLE FIGHTING CYSTIC FIBROSIS

SHINERAMA October 1, 1982

Over 13,000 students will be shining shoes this month and part of October for Cystic Fibrosis research during the biggest annual shoe shine blitz across Canada. Over 40 universities, colleges, and high schools will participate in one of the major fund raising events of the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Shinerama raises funds for Cystic Fibrosis research and as a result, people with cystic fibrosis are living longer, healthier lives. Since 1960 the median age of survival has increased from under four to over 20. Cystic Fibrosis is the most common life—threatening disorder of children and young adults in Canada. It is second only to cancer in taking young lives.

In the 14 years that NAIT has been participating in Shinerama, \$122,885 has been raised

to help fund the CFresearch program. Our goal for Shinerama '82 is \$12,000.






