EDITOR'S NOTE

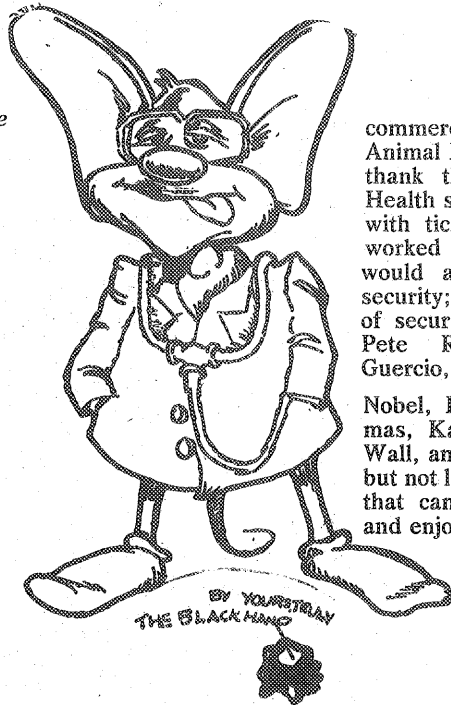

STUDENTS RIGHTS DEFINED

Monday, April 25 was a very important date to the present and future students of NAIT. It was on this date that the declaration of student rights and responsibilities and the proposal to have extracurricular activities listed on student transcripts was passed by the academic council. The declaration and proposal were passed in a unanimous vote. The students of the institute will finally have a clear description of what their actual rights are in certain situations and what responsibilities they have for their actions. The declaration has been under construction by past NAITSA president, David Whalen, for the past school year. as

he commented Monday afternoon, "this should have a profound influence on the lives of students". The proof of how much this will affect the students and how well it will be accepted by the students

will come when we have a chance to review the actual declaration. These mark firsts for the province

as we are the first school in the province to list activities on a students transcript and only the second school in the province to pass a declaration of rights and responsibilities.
