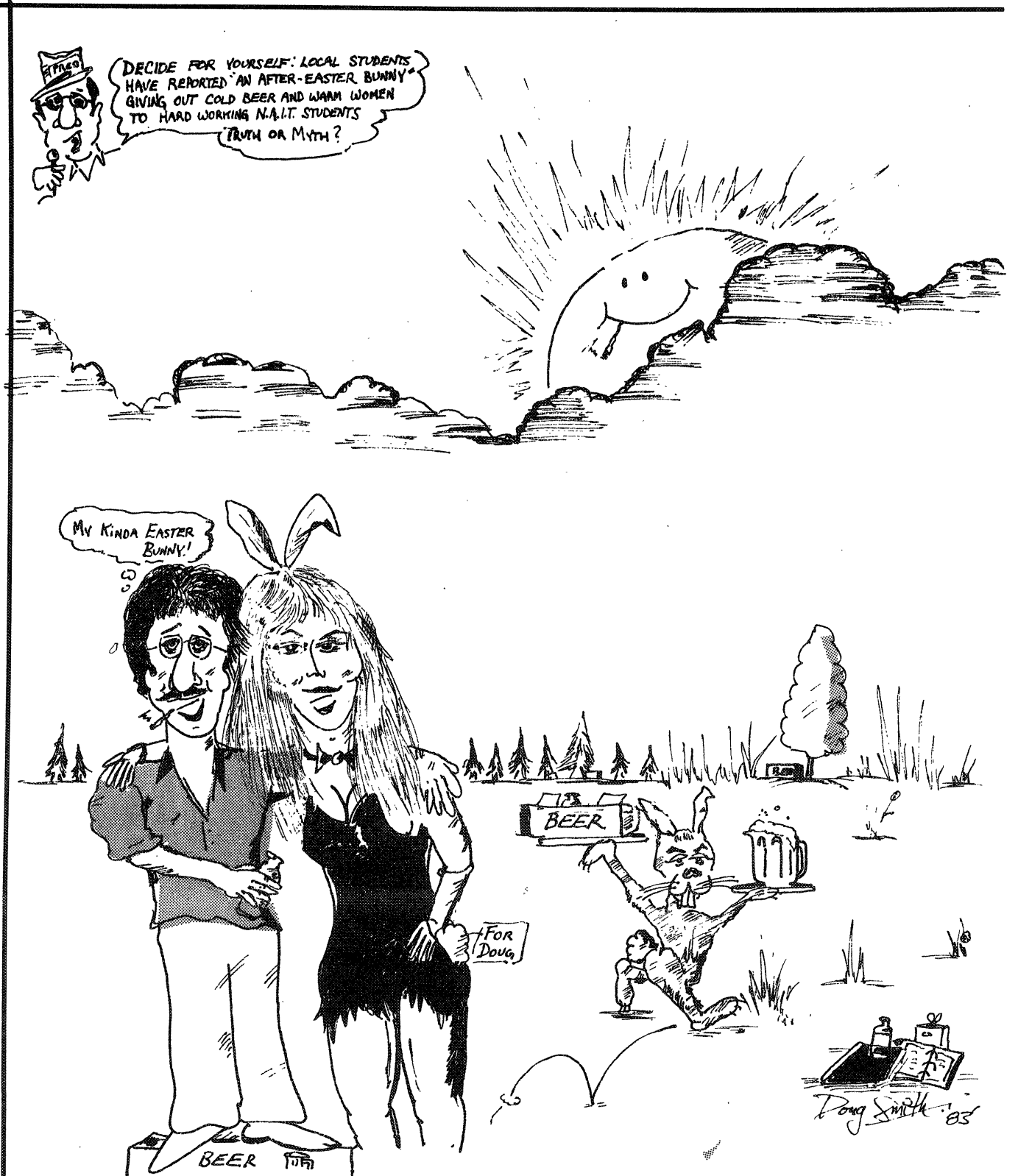
ROUTE TWO

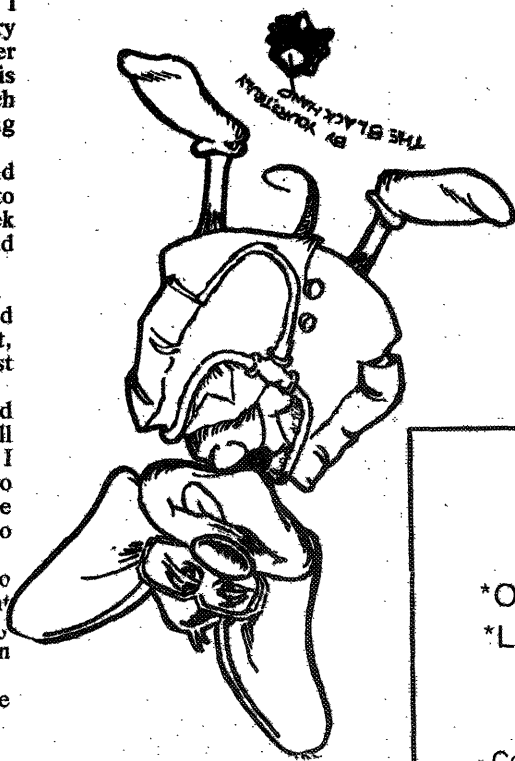

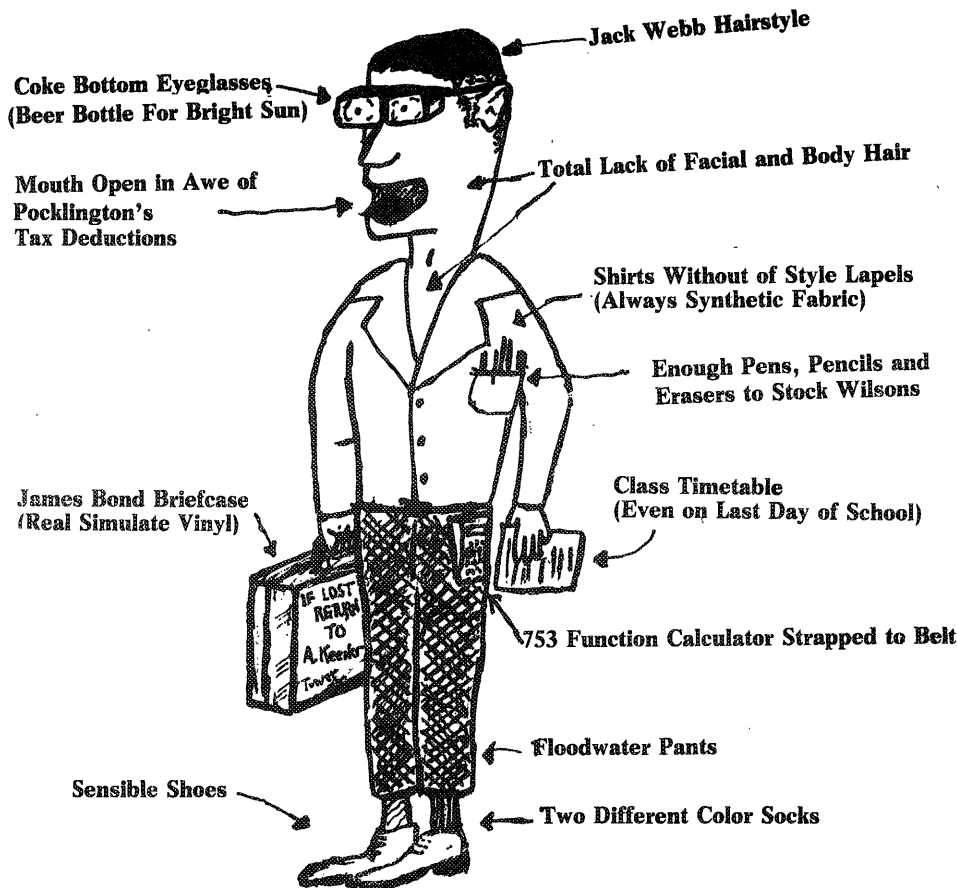

"Billions and Billions"

That's how many of the Earth's people should see the television series "Cosmos". Beginning April 17, "Cosmos" will be broadcast Sunday nights at eight o'clock on KSPS-TV.

"Cosmos" was produced in the late seventies and 1980 by Adrian Malone (who also produced "The Ascent of Man" with Jacob Bronowski, which can be seen Tuesday nights at eight on the EEE channel). The host and guide of "Cosmos" is Dr. Carl Sagan, who is (among other things) a professor at Cornell University and the Director of the Laboratory for Planetary Studies.

During the thirteen, one-hour episodes of "Cosmos", Dr. Sagan takes the viewer on a fascinating voyage through time and space. In the ship of the Imagination we explore the DNA of a red blood cell, and discover a birthplace of stars in a giant nebula in space. The timespan covered in the series is some fifteen billion years - the time covered by the Cosmic Calendar. As for recent history, the roles several scientists have played in our development are discussed. And, for lovers of lost treasure, the great Library of Alexandria is visited.

"Cosmos" is truly excellent. The entire series not only makes you think; it makes you want to think. When you discover how much the ancient Greeks really knew about our planet, or how a little methane and some electric sparks give you "the stuff of life", you cannot help but be inspired to make yourself a contributor to the forward progress of Mankind.

It is very rare that I use these words: "Cosmos" is a MUST SEE. In its objectivity, its scope, and its direct application to our lives, it is one of the few shows that is worthy of making specific plans to watch. Every episode, from "The Shores of the Cosmic Ocean", to the chilling, yet inspiring, "Who Speaks for Earth?", is a legacy for our children and a tribute to those who never stop learning about the universe and themselves.

IMPORTANT NEWS ABOUT THE CANADA STUDENT LOANS PROGRAM

The Government of Canada is proposing changes in the Canada Student Loans (CSL) Act to help provide post-secondary students with financial assistance to pursue their education.

What

We propose to offer:

- **Guaranteed loans to needy part-time students** to help cover the cost of tuition fees, learning materials, transportation and related expenses.
- **An interest relief plan for unemployed graduates** to provide for the payment of interest charges due on student loans. Both full and part-time students would be eligible for assistance.
- **Increased weekly student loan limits** to \$100 from the current level of \$56.25.

When

Our objective: the coming academic year.

We intend to introduce legislation in Parliament shortly to make these changes to the CSL Act.

The implementation of the proposed changes will require the co-operation of participating provinces and lending institutions.

One certain Jake has gotten ahold of a new hockey stick. Since the acquisition of his prized stick he can't let go of the shaft.

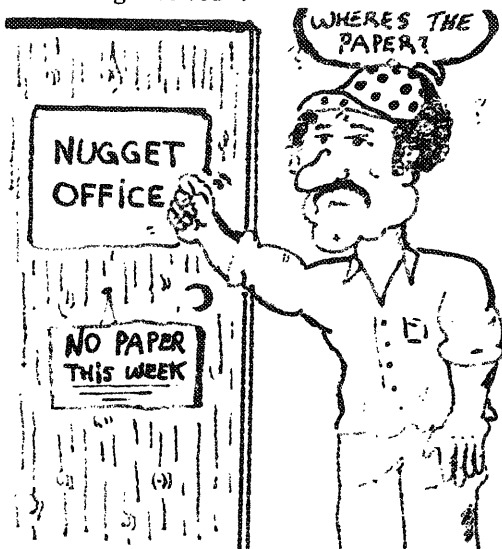

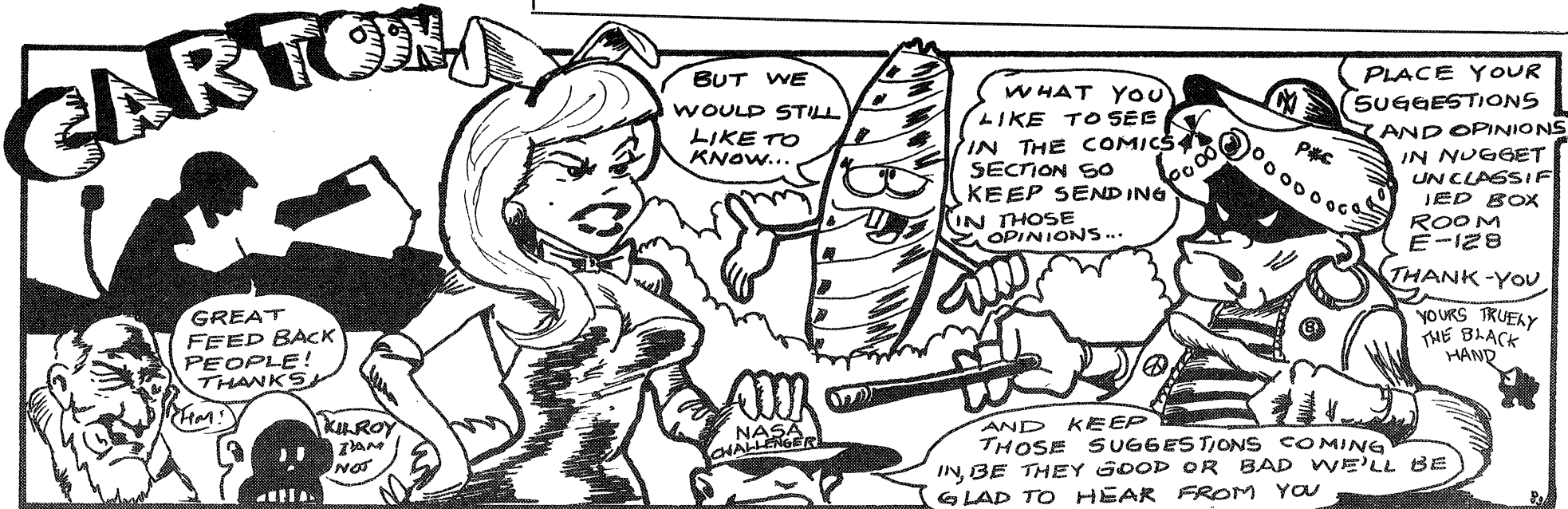

10. Assumes all positions not staffed.

12. Works with the Advertising manager and decides where the advertisements are to be placed.
13. Ensures adequate maintenance of machines.
14. Must abide by sections A 1.3 A 1.6 of the "Declaration of Students Rights and Responsibilities."
15. Provides the Publication Chairman with all necessary information to be used for preparation for "Co-curriculum Transcripts".

YEARBOOK EDITOR

Supervisor: Publications Chairman

Summary Statement

The Yearbook Editor is responsible to the Publications Committee through the Publications Chairman. He/She is also responsible for the production of the current school year Yearbook, and ensuring the Yearbook comes out when scheduled. This is done either by supervising copy and layout personnel or by doing the work by him/herself. The purpose of this work is to ensure the Yearbook is completed for the current school year.

Duties and Responsibilities

3. Supervising Yearbook staff.
4. Work on pages by him/herself(color section with company representative).
5. Ensure that deadlines are met, one way or another. This may require doing pages without help of staff.
6. Attend various NAITSA and related meetings.
7. Member of the Publication Committee.
8. Assists with the preparation of the annual Yearbook budget.
9. Must abide by sections A 1.3 and A 1.6 of the "Declaration of Students Rights and Responsibilities."
10. Provide Publications Chairman with all necessary information to be used for preparation of "Co-curriculum Transcripts".
11. Responsible for distribution of the Yearbook. In carrying out this objective, the following priority should be followed: Yearbooks for the mailing list shall be put aside when they are first received.

Working Conditions

Must spend long hours to ensure that deadlines are met. Currently recommending 50 hours a month minimum.

Specifications

Knowledge of Yearbook layouts and copy. Previous experience or training is necessary. A conference to learn about the above is available when the contract is with I.C.P.

PHOTOGRAPHY CO-ORDINATOR

Supervisor: Publications Chairman

Summary Statement

A photography co-ordinator, in general is to fulfill any photographic needs of NAITSA and NAITSA organizations such as the Nugget and Northern Torch. this position frees the editor of the Nugget and Northern Torch from recruiting their own photography staff and organizing them. 10. Complete photo assignments himself/herself if no other staff is available.
11. Is responsible for NAITSA owned supplies and equipment and administration of the darkroom.
12. Assist with preparation of the annual Photo Directorate budget.

Specifications

A person who is to occupy the position of photography co-ordinator must:

1. Have a working knowledge of cameras and developing procedures.
2. Be able to work well with other people. This person should be able to organize people and delegate work effectively.
