B.A.S. CABARET


Secret Society was playing at the Continental Inn on Friday, a BAS presentation.



BREAKING THE UNION STRANGLEHOLD

Labor is at a turning point in history. Presently, the labor unions has quite a bit of power and doesn't feel any qualms about using it. The problem now is that during our downturn in the economy they seemed to lose more of their power and it only makes sense that they continue to reduce their strong stranglehold over companies.

They have outlived this role, because not only do unions receive equal pay as non-union employees but also surpass the wages of non-union workers. They were supposed to negotiate collective agreements and it would seem that their objective of getting equal pay and normal working hours and decent working conditions have been achieved. Now they are trying to reduce the work week. I think that a 40 hour work week is good for any employee. We must remember that the employer has to make money also and that their shareholders must come before their employees. The reason for shareholders coming before their employees is because if it wasn't for the shareholders, there might not be employees.

There are several reasons why people join unions in the first place. They are as follows:


1. It may be a condition of employment.
2. For security and protection or job security.
3. They can influence the decisions of management.
4. Economic betterment (more money).
5. Improvements on Conditions of the work place.

These are only a few of the reason why people join unions, but you can also use these reasons to try and discourage people from joining unions. If they have to join a union because of employment reasons then the law should be changed or revised so that the employee has that choice. Right now, no one has job security and it isn't fair that some employees should get it over others (especially when one employee may be more valuable than others). I don't think that they should be influencing management decisions in excess of other that what applies to them. They receive parody with most other workers now and are trying to always get more. Conditions of the work place is generally left to the Workers Compensation Board and if they don't think that the work place is safe then they will close down the business right away.

But, not everybody joins unions for several reasons. They are as follows:


1. People disagree with union philosophy in general.
2. People also fear interference with their personal freedoms.
3. There is distrust of unions because of questionable past practices.
4. Workers don't want to pay union dues if they are satisfied with the terms and conditions of employment.
5. Some professions are legally prevented from joining a union such as doctors, lawyers and other professionals.

Personally, I would reject unions nowadays because they have outlived their original objectives. Also, because of their past practices they should discontinue striking but maybe should continue on still being run. Strikes hurt the economy, the employers, the shareholders, the consumers, and if the strike goes on for long it will hurt the employee.

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

OOKS HOCKEY

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 18TH--NAIT OOKS6, RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS 3 at NAIT ARENA

The NAIT Ooks turned in a strong performance as they doubled the Red Deer College Kings 6-3 at the NAIT Arena on Friday, the 18th.

Dwayne Swanson of the Kings opened the scoring at the 3:16 mark. Fifty three seconds followed before Hugh McCaskill of the Ooks scored against his former teammates to tie the contest at 1-1. The NAIT Ooks acquired a 2-1 lead on Jim Lee's powerplay marker at 18:57.

At the two minute mark of the second, RDC's Jeff Young scored to create a 2-2 deadlock. NAIT Captain Brian Hermanutz lifted the Ooks into a 3-2 advantage at 16:18. Fifteen seconds later, Mark Schultz increased NAIT's lead to 4-2.

In the third, John Causgrove's powerplay tally brought the Kings to within one with 3:29 gone in the frame. Brian Keates capitalized with the man advantage to give NAIT a 5-3 lead. Brian Hermanutz capped off the night's scoring with his second of the night with 1:17 left in regulation time.

Neal McPheddran turned away 32 NAIT shots in the RDC nets. Cleo Rowen guarded the pipes for NAIT and blocked 25 Red Deer blasts.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 19TH--NAIT OOKS 6, CLC VIKINGS 4 at CAMROSE REC CENTER

Three goals in the final stanza lifted the NAIT Ooks to a 6-4 come-from-behind victory against the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings on Saturday, the 19TH in Camrose.

Gary Leach turned in a two-goal performance for the Ooks. Mark Schultz, Ken Snider, Brian Keates and Don Simpson of NAIT each found the net once. Bryan Swyston, Ian Hutchison, and Lloyd McKinney scored for Camrose.

Cleo Rowen of the Ooks blocked 26 CLC blasts. Wayne Fischer of CLC turned away 34 NAIT shots.

The CLC Vikings acquired a 3-2 advantage following the first 20 minutes. Camrose held on to a 4-3 lead after the middle frame. NAIT then came back with three goals in a span of one minute and 22 seconds to pick up the win.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 25TH--NAIT OOKS 6, U OF L PRONGHORNS 0 at NAIT ARENA.

The NAIT Ooks opened up a two game homestand with the University of Lethbridge Proghorns on Friday, November 25TH, by blanking the U of L 6-0.

Garth Hayes completed the hat trick for NAIT by picking up a goal in each period. Dave Simmons, Randy Repchuk, and Brian Hermanutz rounded out the scoring for the Ooks.

NAIT goaltender Preston Yachimec recorded the shutout redirecting 25 U of L drives. Neil Pohamec was between the pipes for the Proghorns and stopped the Ooks on 34 occasions.

The Ooks scored once in the first period at the 19:37 mark. NAIT increased their advantage to 4-0 by the end of the second. The Ooks then tallied twice in the final period.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 26TH--U OF L PRONGHORNS 4, NAIT OOKS 3 at NAIT ARENA

Dave Snopek's second goal of the contest with 51 seconds left in regulation time gave the University of Lethbridge Proghorns a 4-3 win over the NAIT Ooks at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, November 26TH.

In addition to Snopek's two goal performance, U of L received single tallies from Chris Korte and Dave Petek. Brian Keates, Franco Disciglio and Gary Leach replied for the Ooks.

University of Lethbridge goalie Neil Pohamec blocked 34 NAIT blasts. In the NAIT nets, Preston Yachimec was tested by the U of L 25 times.

The two clubs were tied at 2-2 following the initial period and deadlocked at 3-3 after two periods. The Proghorns then capitalized on a breakaway with 51 seconds left in the contest.

The NAIT Oookpiks and the Lethbridge Kodiaks treated the fans to an exciting, seesaw game on Friday night. Unfortunately the Kodiaks came out on top by a narrow score of 58-56. Guard Bill Rehlau was hot for the Ooks as he scored 14 points for the cause. Darryl Ziehr and Jim Bornet were not too far behind with 12 and 11 points respectively.

In the first half, Lethbridge applied an effective press. However, once the Ooks got the ball past half was there was usually no problem putting the ball in the net. Although both teams seemed to be a bit unsteady in the first half. The score at the half was 34 to 28 in favour of the Kodiaks.

In the second half the Ooks improved their defence and held the lead most of the time, but neither team lead the other by more than ten points.
