Friday, a BAS presentation.







BREAKING THE UNION STRANGLEHOLD

Labor is at a turning point in history. Presently, the labor unions has quite a bit of power and doesn't feel any qualms about using it. The problem now is that during our downturn in the economy they seemed to lose more of their power and it only makes sense that they continue

to reduce their strong stranglehold over companies. It is not that I am totally against unions but it would seem to me(as a normal consumer), that the role of the unions was orginally to protect their members(the workers) from the evil management. They have outlived this role, because not only do unions receive equal pay as non-union employees but also surpass the wages of non-union workers. They were also to protect members from unfair arbitrary treatment by their employers, it is not usual that a worker will be treated a certain way by an employer without a good reason. They were supposed to negotiate collective agreements and it would seem that their objective of getting equal pay and normal working hours and decent working conditions have been achieved. Now they are trying to reduce the work week. I think that a 40 hour work week is good for any employee. We must remember that the employer has to make money also and that their shareholders must The reason for come before their employees. shareholders coming before their employees is because if it wasn't for the shareholders, there might not be employees.

There are several reasons why people join unions in the first place. They are as follows:

1. It may be a condition of employment. For security and protection or job security.

They can influence the decisions of management.

Economic betterment(more money).

5. Improvements on Conditions of the work place. These are only a few of the reason why people join unions, but you can also use these reasons to try and discourage people from joining unions. If they have to join a union because of employment reasons then the law should be changed or revised so that the employee has that choice. Right now, no one has job security and it isn't fair that some employees should get it over others(especially when one employee may be more valuable that others). I don't think that they should be influencing management decisions in excess of other that what applies to them. They receive parody with most other workers now and are trying to always get more. Conditions of the work place is generally left to the Workers Compensation Board and if they don't think that the work place is safe then they will close down the business right away.

But, not everybody joins unions for several reasons. They are as follows:


 People disagree with union philosphy in general.

3. There is distrust of unions because of questional past practices.

4. Workers don't want to pay union dues if they are satisfied with the terms and conditions of employment. 5. Some professions are legally prevented from joining a union such as doctors, lawyers and other professionals.




ACADEMIC AWARDS

GOOD NEWS!!!! INTEREST RELIEF PLAN CANADA STUDENT LOANS

The Interest Relief Plan for Canada Student Loans Program came into effect on September 1, 1983. The purpose of the plan is to assist those individuals who are experiencing financial difficulties due to temporary

disability or inability to find employment. How to Apply Application for Interest Relief Plan are available from

the local bank branches, Canada Employment Centres, collection agencies that collect Canada Student Loans, and the Student Assistance Directorate of the Department of the Secretary of State, Ottawa. The decision to grant you "interest relief" will be made by the Student Assistance Directorate. Once you have completed the form, the bank should complete the section dealing with information on your loan, and it should mail the form to Ottawa on your behalf. During the special interest free period, you will not be required to make payments on the principal amount of your Canada Student loan. At the present time the Alberta Students Finance Board has not matched the interest free period on Alberta loans.

Assistance Provided

The department of the Secretary of State will inform you of the results of your assessment. If your application is approved, a letter of acceptance will indicate the period for which interest relilef has been granted, normally for three or six months depending on information contained in the application. At the end of each period, if circumstances remain unchanged, a new cation must be submitted, otherwise payment of the outstanding balance will commence. Interest relief is granted to a maximum of 18 months. For additional ilnformation contact:


