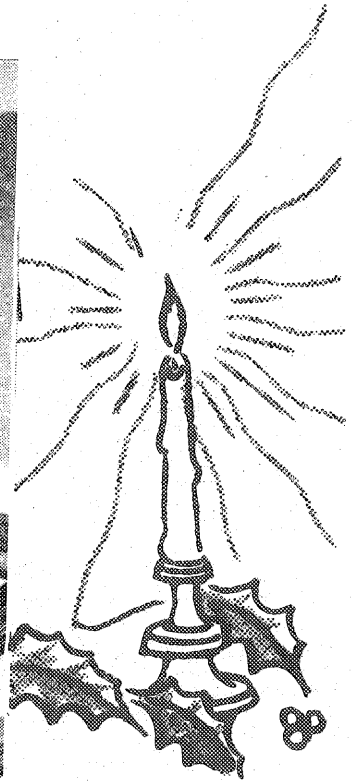
### MERRY CHRISTMAS

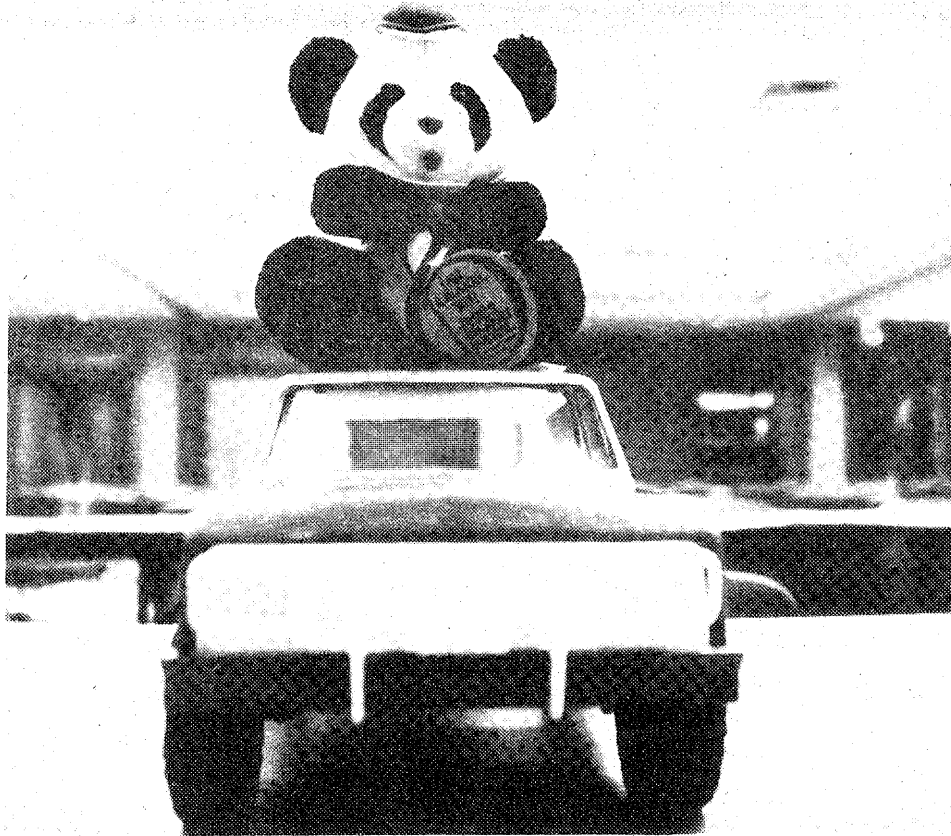
At 9:30, the band started playing on the third song people started to dance in compliance to the assistance of the lead singer. They played till 10:00 with the dance floor always full.

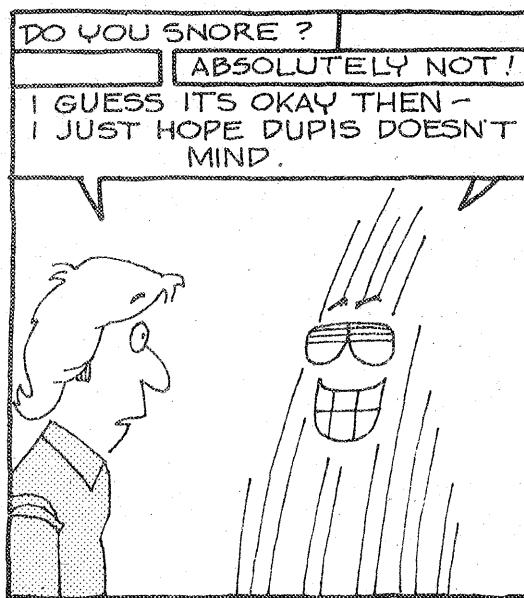
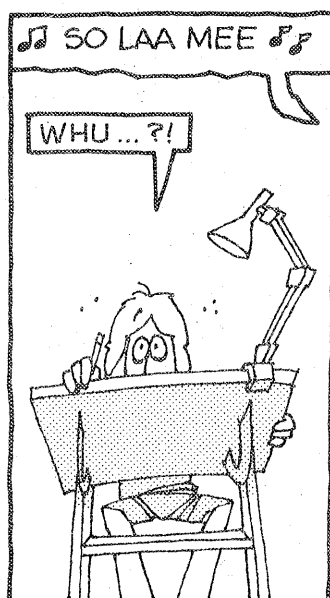
People were generous enough with their gifts for Santa Anonymous, with very few people showing up empty-handed.

I look forward to attending or participating in a number of events in 1984 - besides the Business Conference (always an impressive occasion), there are Queen Week, January 23-28, Open House, March 16 and 17, and of course, numerous athletic contests.

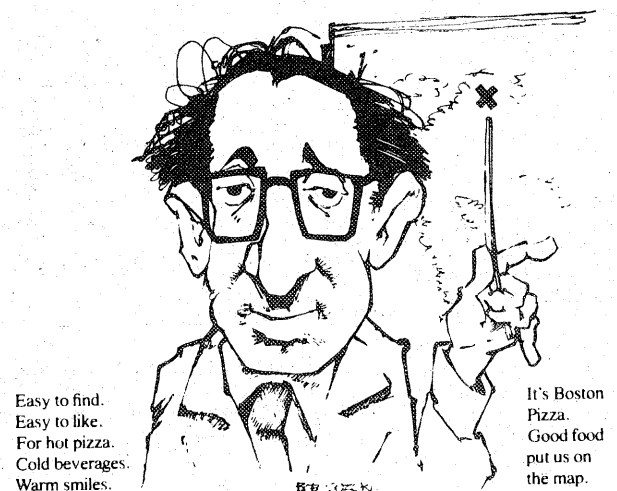

The Ooks visited the Griffins deep freeze gym in Millwoods on Wednesday, Dec. 7, and came away with a 3-2 win which propelled them into first place in the A.C.A.C.

The Ooks lost their first two games 15-9 and 15-11. The first game was slow and although the Ooks spikes were good, the serve reception was not as good as it could have been. The second game was not much better. The Ooks did little digging and as a result fell behind. But in this game they started to turn around their play.

The next three games were won by the Ooks including an exciting 16-14 come from way behind win in the fifth and crucial game.

The third game saw the Ooks continue to solidify their play as they led for most of the game. There was more effort put into their offensive play and serve reception.

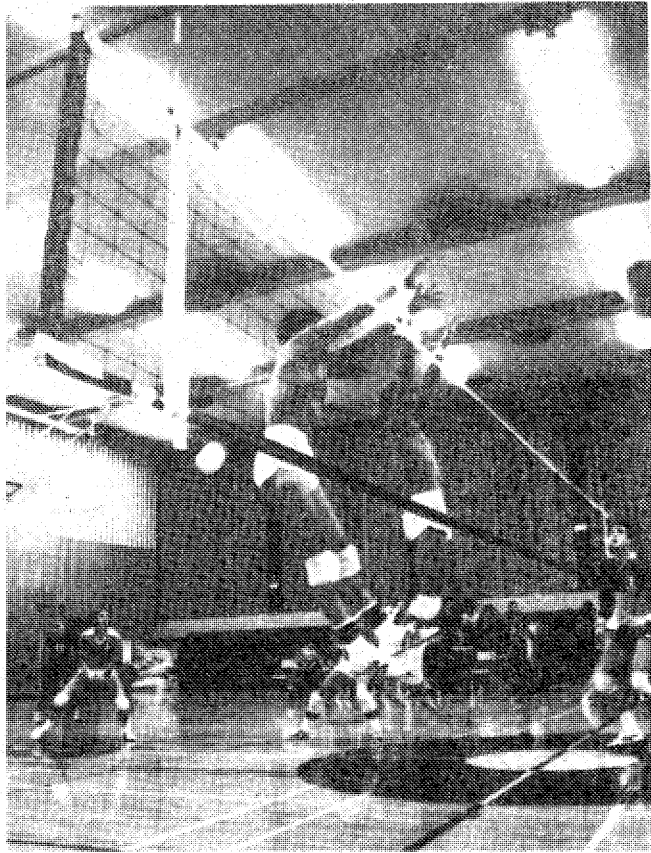
The Ooks won this game 15-9. And in the fourth game the Ooks continued their good overall play to win 15-8. Now the match was tied at two games apiece.

The next game for the Ooks is when they travel to the Grang MacEwan ice box on Wednesday, Jan. 11th.

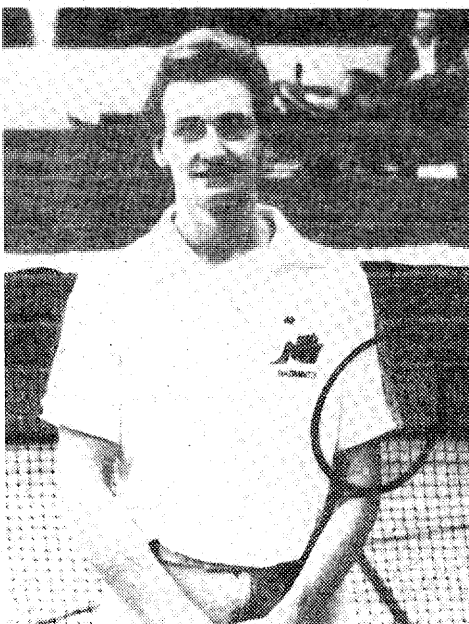
Friday, Dec. 9, the Ooks hosted P.&F. Optical, a men's league team, in an exhibition match.

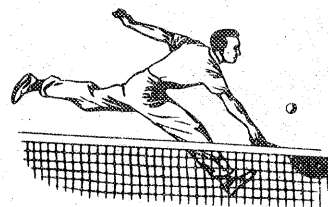
## Athlete Of The Week

On Wednesday, Dec 7, the Chicks travelled to Grant MacEwan's Millwoods Ice Palace, where spectators can freeze even though they are wearing sweaters.

This match went the full five games. In the end the Griffins came out on top three games to two.

In the first game, both teams appeared to be unsteady. Throughout the game, the score was close and neither team seemed to be too motivated to win the game. Final score for the game was 16-14 for the Chicks.

A 7-0 lead was built up by the Chicks in the second game. However they sat back and allowed the Griffins to catch up. From there on the game was up for grabs. The Chicks play was inconsistent and lacked intensity. Eventually, the Griffins won 15-13.

The Griffins won the third game as well, this time with a score of 15-7. Here the Griffins gained some intensity with the help of their fans, whereas the Chicks had yet to find any. The factor which contributed to the Chicks defeat the most was their poor blocking. In the previous games, the Chicks blocking had helped to keep them competitive.

In the fourth, the Chicks tightened up their game and became more consistent and less scambly. They also made a transition from killer spikes which were missing their target to soft tips which

landed in the open spots behind the Griffin blockers. At the end the Chicks had downed the Griffins 15-8. Now the match was tied at two matches apiece.

The fifth and deciding game saw the Chicks fall behind 12-0 as the Griffins took advantage of a lacklustre Chicks defence. Again the Chicks were not consistent in their play; now and then there would be spots of volleyball brilliance, but overall there was no real intensity. The final score was 15-7 for the Griffins as they won the match three games to two.

After the match, I talked to the Griffins coach, Michael Trent. He felt that his team had a lot of depth and was able to pull a poor playing starter with confidence in the reliever. The Griffins captain said that her team had improved since last week and was now hitting smarter.

I also talked to Peter Grundmanis, the Chicks coach, who gave me a brief overview of how he felt the match had gone. Basically, he felt the Chicks had started off strong with good middle hitting, but eased off later on, taking things for granted and not going for the reachable saves. He also mentioned that the Grant MacEwan gym is rather strange and as a result, must teams have problems there. The Chicks players I talked to generally felt that they didn't play well. Amongst

some of the comments were lack of hitting and talking, no co-ordination, and no desire. That probably sums up the match.

The Chicks hosted the Rustlers on Saturday, Dec. 10. The Chicks won the match three games straight.

The first game

The first game was by the Chicks as they won 15-6. The Chicks played a good game at the net, using well-placed spikes and effective blocks. SATURDAY, DECEMBER 10TH--NAIT OOKS 4, SAIT TROJANS 3 at NAIT ARENA

Excellent work by the penalty killing units was the key to NAIT's 4-3 triumphs over the SAIT Trojans at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, December 10th.

Rearguard Jamie Bartman of the Ooks opened up the scoring at the 2:32 mark of the first on a Franco Disciglio set-up. Two minutes and 26 seconds passed before Pete Thrasher of SAIT tied the game at 1-1. Lyle Cook gave the Trojans a one goal lead with 47 second left in the first period.

At 5:42 of the second, Gary Haddon connected with a powerplay tally for the Ooks from Jim Lee and Hugh McCaskill. Garth Hayes and Kevin Hayes then set up Randy Repchuk with 9:02 elapsed in the frame. With the man advantage, SAIT's Pete Thrasher found the net at 12:28. While killing off a five minute penalty, NAIT penalty killers Ken Snider and Jim Lee created a breakaway. Snider capitalized on the opportunity giving NAIT a 4-3 lead with 2:45 left in the second period.

The NAIT Ooks directed 29 shots at SAIT goalie Scott Webster. The SAIT Trojans tested NAIT netminder Cleo Rowen 23 times.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 11TH--NAIT OOKS 10, MRC COUGARS 2 at NAIT ARENA

Five first period goals established a lead the NAIT Ooks never relinquished as they rolled over the Mount Royal College Cougars 10-2 on Sunday, December 11th at the NAIT Arena.

The NAIT Ooks gained a 1-0 lead with 4:08 gone in the first stanza when Kevin Imrie scored on a play with Mark Schultz and Mike Tookey. On the powerplay, Brian Hermanutz and Franco Disciglio set up Hugh McCaskill to increase NAIT's advantage to 2-0 at 6:14. One minute and 36 seconds later, Kevin Imrie took a pass from Ken Snider and found the net to widen NAIT's margin to three goals. NAIT Captain Brian Hermanutz turned on the light at 14:01. Assists went to Kevin Hayes and Franco Disciglio. With 1:07 remaining in the initial period, Randy Repchuk of the Ooks tallied on a Garth Hayes-Kevin Hayes set-up.

Don Simpson notched the lone goal of the 2nd period at 17:53 on the powerplay to up NAIT's advantage to 6-0.

With 4:23 elapsed in the final frame, Rob Richichi of MRC broke Preston Yachimec shutout bid. Two minutes and two seconds followed before Dave Simmons of NAIT reinstated NAIT's six goal cushion. ## MOVIE REVIEW

### AMITYVILLE 3-D

A new dimension has been added to the story of the world's most famous haunted house in Amityville, New York. A third dimension has been added to the latest in the Amityville series with the addition of photography in the newest Arriflex 3-D system so that audiences may not only witness the mystery and suspense of the all-new story but also can become involved in it through the miracle of the added dimension.

Starring in "Amityville 3-D" is Tony Roberts who, as a magazine writer, comes to investigate a seance held at the famed Amityville house. Candy Clark, stars as a photographer assigned to cover the same story. Tess Harper plays Nancy Baxter, Roberts' soon-to-be ex-wife, mother of his 16-year-old daughter, Susan, played by Lori Laughlin, and Meg Ryan portrays Susan's friend.

Elliot West, a psychic researcher is played by Robert Joy while Harold and Emma Caswell, conductors of the seance, are portrayed by John Beal and Leora Dana. John Harkins is Clifford Sanders, a real estate broker and owner of the Amityville house.

When the late Jay Anson collected newspaper clippings and assembled them into his book, *The Amityville Horror*, it became a runaway bestseller and later, one of the top grossing films of all time. It described the experiences of a young couple and their children who fled the Amityville house after experiencing 28 days of terror and supernatural occurrences. The stories were attested to as factual by church authorities who investigated them.

"Amityville II: The Possession," the second film made on the subject, was based on a book, *Murder In Amityville*, by Hans Holtzer and told the story of murders of an entire family living in the house. The eldest son is still in prison for the killings.

"Amityville 3-D," written by William Wales, is the story of a magazine writer's investigation which turns to horror when an abandoned well beneath the basement floor of the Amityville house turns out to be the Gateway to Hell. Note: this picture is not a sequel to the pictures "The Amityville Horror" or "Amityville II: The Possession."

"Mortuary" stars teen-aged Mary McDonough, who grew up in front of our eyes as Erin on "The Waltons." Her father dies and she knows it was murder, but everybody else believes it was an accident.

She keeps having recurring nightmares about his death. Then she discovers that her mother, Lynda Day George, is attending seances conducted by the local mortician, Christopher George.

Meanwhile, the FBI, the CIA, NASA, and the Army Intelligence combine resources to find this band as they race for the empty spaces of the desert.

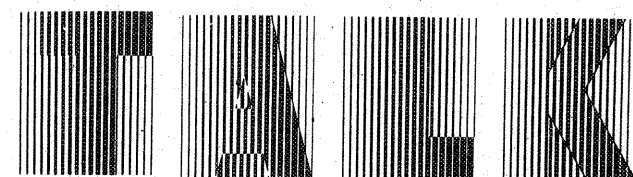
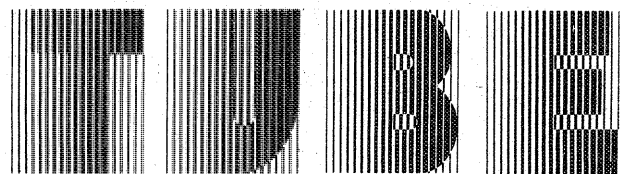

### That Time Of Year

Since Hallowe'en, it has been difficult not to notice that it is "that time of year" again. These weeks of December have different significance for different peoples, and for those who are news-oriented, it is the season for the messages from the leaders of the world's nations.

On December 31, 1982, Charles Kuralt of CBS News spent some time contemplating the year-end statements of presidents, prime ministers, and generals. The address that each head-of-state made may have been meant for his/her fellow citizens, but thanks to satellites the speeches were all heard world-wide. When he anchored the network news broadcast that evening, Kuralt presented his observations along with clips from several of the speeches. I found his conclusion to be the most profound thought of the year, and it still rings oh-so-true today. Here are the words of Kuralt with a clip of President Reagan during the last few minutes of that memorable broadcast:

Kuralt: "...Yuri Andropov also spoke of peace. It is New Year's Eve in Washington."

Reagan: "There's an old English proverb that says 'If it were not for hope, the heart would break.' So, yea, of course, I have hopes for 1983. They're the same hopes that every president since George Washington has had: peace and prosperity for all our people. I hope in the coming year that we'll be able to put every American into a solid and permanent job. That's not only a hope, that's my prayer.

"I hope there will be a larger peace throughout the world, and that we will make progress in our arms control talks with the Soviet Union and finally begin the reduction of the tremendous arsenals of nuclear weapons that threaten all of us. And I hope the peoples of the Middle East will finally find an end to their long heartache. Lastly, I hope that, in 1983, every American, indeed every human being, will fulfill the promise in peace that is in with-within--each one of us."

Kuralt: "They all spoke of peace, every one of them, in every capital of the world."

"After so long a time, journalists, by reflex, become deaf to the statements of statesmen on ceremonial occasions. But this is the night for summoning up all hope. Listening to all the statements of presidents and prime ministers as they came into our newsroom today, we couldn't help thinking: What if they all meant it? Happy New Year then to us all."

Who it is designed for and how is skis? Recommended length and what the ski is made of?

When buying boots a great fit is the number one concern. If a boot doesn't fit, don't buy it. If the boot isn't designed for your style of skiing, don't buy it. Also, if the salesman doesn't take the time to ensure your boots fit great, don't buy from him. Be sure to try on several boots before you buy.

The golden rule when buying ski equipment is to THINK, RE-THINK, and THINK some more.

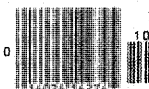


