Ooks-Chicks Win Big Ooks V-ball

The NAIT Men's Volleyball team completed their most successful weekend of the season in posting the only 5 and 0 record in the men's competition of the A.C.A.C. interlocking tournament which was held at Red Deer College.

The weekend began with the most important match of the tournament, that against the top ranked team from the South Division, SAIT. Due to injuries, the Ooks attempted to run a new offensive system in the first game of the match with disasterous results. The 4-15 loss appeared to indicate the match would be ended quickly in SAIT's favor but the return to the offensive system that the team has used for 3 months changed the match to a much more even affair. In game 2 Rookie setter Doug Petzoldt was inserted into the line up and conducted himself like a veteren in directing the offense. Then with Roger "The Machine" Steele killing an amazing 75 per cent(23) of his attacks with only 3 per cent(1) errors and 1983 C.C.A.A. all Canadian Loris Campagnolo contributing 12 stuff blocks the Ooks won a very exciting 2½ hour match 3 games to 2. After winning their first match the team played inconsistently against obviously weaker opposition but still won their next 3 matches with 3-0 scores.

The last match of the weekend was against Lethbridge Community College the number 2 team from the south. After winning the first game very easily it looked like another 3-0 match would result. However, LCC had different ideas and in games two and three they got their low percentage, but very quick, outside offense rolling and won both. In game 4 NAIT was ahead 13-2 and it looked like they would win in a walk but again LCC fought back with great serving and blocking to lose a very close game, the Ooks got rolling and led by the great play of Loris Campagnolo and Glen Vigsbol won easily 15-2.

The team plays two matches before Christmas break, first at Grant MacEwan College on Dec. 7 and then Dec. 10 at home to Lakeland College.

On Wednesday, Nov. 30 the NAIT Ooks lost their game against the Grant MacEwan Griffins three matches to two.

The Griffins managed to score only six more times as the Ooks topped them off 15-11. The game was tied at a match apiece.

In the fifth and deciding







I don't know if the other technologies are having problems such as those that BAS is experiencing, and I sincerely hope not.


I think that the words of our NAITSA President, Debra Nykilchuk are perfect to solve this problem, "LETS COMMUNICATE"

Letters To The Editor

I should like to offer a rebuttal to the garbled editorial diatribe, printed in the Dec 1st issue of "The Nugget"; re. "Breaking the Union Stranglehold".

The whole context of your editorial reflected the misguided, and mostly misinformed attitudes so prevalent in the redder necked right wing in this province.

You implied that union workers receive excessive pay for their skills, indeed, that they even receive pay in "parody" with their non-union counterparts. (It's parity actually) This is true, much to the delight of the non-union workers, who partook of the fruits without contributing anything. As to excessive pay, I dare you to name one Union in Alberta, that has succeeded in securing for it's membership, pay increases



that have at least matched the level of inflation of this province over the last ten years.

You stated that you believed Unions had fulfilled their usefulness, and that decent working conditions had been achieved. This is utter nonsense, the negotiations of 1981(not 1881), for example, brought forth the complaint that installing heated washrooms on jobsites made the Union employers less competitive with the non-union sector. When was the last time you used an outside toilet in the middle of January?

You carried on almost monotonously, stating that if it were not for shareholders of companies, there would be no employees. I'd just like to agree with you and just add the bit you missed....As sure as God made the green apples, without employees there wouldn't be any company, never mind shareholders, unless the share holders happen to be the employees as well.

Strikes were almost predictably attacked by you, irregardless of the fact that more than 95 percent of all Union negotiations are settled without strike. Incidentally, the United Nations labour amendment states that the right to strike, the right to collective bargaining, and lawful assembly are fundamental basic rights. These same basic rights have either been ignored, or are at present, under attack by the present Alberta Government, and you.

"Condition of the workplace in respect to safety" was explained by you has being within the jurisdiction of the Workers Compensation Board "and if they don't think that the work place is safe then they will close down the business right away" This is a complete fallacy and has no bearing on the real function of the Compensation Board.

In fifteen years I have only once seen an Inspector for the Compensation Board show his face on a job site, much less close the job down. The Compensation Board acts more like an Insurance company taking payments from employers, and increasing or decreasing the payments according to the safety record of the Company, at that particular job. What I have seen over the years though, is a lot of dangerous situations where the employee(usually an immigrant with poor English speaking skills), fearful for his job has undertaken unnecessary risks. The unions try in many of these cases to rectify the situation, but unfortunately can only make their weight felt on the Union jobs.

I believe over the next year or two, we can expect more injuries per capita, that has been experienced in the past ten years of good economic growth. Now that the teeth of the Unions are being drawn.

If Unions have outgrown their usefulness, then so has medicare, and so has the right to free education, so also has human rights for these are issues that have always been dear to the Union movement....Personally I think you suffer from too much second hand news, and a possible addiction to the "Edmonton Sun". Please stick to the facts.

I am glad that you rebutted my previous editorial on unions. I don't believe, however, that my opinion is just confined to the right wing of this province. Several people that are Ministers of this Province, some Teachers, and business people agree with my statements.

In fact, I don't believe that I am misinformed either. The instructor of my Personnel course, during our chapters on Unions and Collective Bargaining, gave us notes. It was from these notes that I wrote my editorial. Now, I'm not saying that because of one course I am a Union genius, but rather I prefer to say that I am indeed informed-

In your rebuttal, it came across that employers are cold hearted fiends whose only concern is profit. I'm afraid, Mr. Boyle, that that attitude went out about 30 years ago. Employers are also concerned about employees as well.

I gather from your rebuttal that you are a staunch union supporter. Well sir, I am not. In fact, I have not moved from my original stand which was that unions have outlived their purpose.

I shall be more equipped with the correct fact next week when I have the necessary evidence to show that unions are not the best for our economic situation.

One more fact, name me a non-union shop where the employees enjoy the security that union shops do. It isn't fair that someone is kept on longer just because he belongs to the union and not because he is a better

The Red Deer College Kings moved into a 1-0 lead on Bud Langstrom's power-play effort at 3:52. Nine minutes and 48 seconds followed before the Red Deer powerplay capitalized again. This time Harold Bellerose notched the goal. Randy Repchuk of the Ooks cut the Kings' advantage to 2-1 with 4:17 left in the first period.

With 11:31 elapsed in the second, NAIT's Kevin Imrie tied the game at 2-2. At the 14:35 mark, Rick Hamilton reinstated Red Deer's one goal advantage. John Causgrove increased the Kings lead to 4-2 at 18:04. Hugh McCaskill of NAIT cut Red Deer's lead to one 13 seconds later.

John Causgrove's marker with the man advantage gave RDC a 5-3 lead at the 2:41 mark of the third. Five minutes and 11 seconds Rick Hamilton's second goal of the evening upped the Kings margin to three. Ted.

Kings margin to three. Ted Jardine of RDC then found the net at 12:05. One minute

and 47 seconds elapsed before Tim Gitzel rounded up the nights scoring for Red Deer.

The NAIT Ooks directed 19 shots at RDC netminder Neal McPheddran. At the opposite end, the RDC Kings blasted 34 drives at NAIT's Cleo Rowein.

At 11:19, CLC's Rob Hamm found the net. Gary Leach of the Ooks foiled the shutout bid of Camrose at 11:32. Two minutes and seven seconds followed before Rob Hamm increased Camrose's lead to 4-1. An excellent effort by Kevin Hayes of the Ooks resulted in a shorthanded tally at 15:54.

Coach Perry Pearn was very concerned with the showing of the Ooks in their last three contests and commented, "The most important factor in determining our destiny is intensity. Earlier in the season, when we played with a high level of intesity, we had fewer difficulties. This week, we played with half intensity for the first five periods and the team was having problems."

Coach Pearn added that the team will have to have a more even, higher level of intensity throughout the whole 60 minutes. Coach Pearn also stated the team played with an intensity in the third period of Camrose that might have been a bit too high.




