



nothing to consider.



"Why are you afraid to talk?! You did do it, didn't you? (Rivera is very good at not making clear what his victim(s) were supposed to


"60 Minutes" tends to be between the two, but the more fascinating shows to

The combined totals of the cabaret and button sales was \$1200.00 which was donated to the telerama. Those who missed the cabaret missed a good time. The people that were there had a good time,





SATURDAY, FEBUARY 5TH NAIT ARENA RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS 7 NAIT OOKS 4.

The Red Deer College Kings notched three goals in the final three minutes to overtake the NAIT Ooks 7-4 in ACAC action at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, Febuary

RDC's Brad Moore opened the scoring at 6:18 of the first period. Garth Hayes of the NAIT Ooks tied the game at 1-1 with 13:56 gone in the period from Ken Ludwig and Richard Serniak.

At the 3:08 mark of the second period, Warren Sanregret's point blast lifted NAIT into a 2-1 lead. Assists on Warren's goal went to Dean Burles and Ken Ludwig. Three minutes and 40 seconds later, Brad Moore of the Kings notched his second tally of the game. The Kings jumped into a 3-2 advantage when Perry Wall connected at the 8:53 mark.

The NAIT Ooks pulled even with 10:53 elapsed in the third when Ken Ludwig found the net on a play with linemates Randy Repchuk and Garth Hayes. Three minutes and 59 seconds followed before Derek Cunnigham scored to give RDC a 4-3 advantage. NAIT then displayed excellent puck control on the delayed penalty situation that resulted in Pat Kernaghan's marker on a Randy Repchuk and Warren Sanregret set-up at 16:35. Thirty four seconds later, RDC's Hugh MacCaskill tallied on a breakaway to make the score 5-4. Red Deer widened the advantage to two at the 18:34 mark when Royce Baker turned on the red light. Tony Wozny capped off the scoring with an empty net goal.

In the RDC net, Neal McPheddran blocked 34 NAIT drives. At the other end, NAIT's Brad Breakell stopped 37 Red Deer shots.

The final outcome did not reflect the flow of the game as NAIT appeared to be the better squad. The line juggling of the past few weeks is reaping its dividends as the NAIT attack looked stronger and more balanced. NAIT's forechecking handcuffed RDC in the last half of the contest, and will be one of the factors that will determine the Ooks destiny.

NAIT played two way hockey against RDC and displayed their potential. For the team to do well in post season play, the Ooks must not rely on the goaltender to stop everything in sight, but rather play sound two way hockey, as they did against RDC, to minimize the chances of the opposition.

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks now have a record of 12-8 for 24 points and second place in the ACAC...Pat Lawson and Jeff Hendricks are still out of the Ooks lineup. Both forwards are listed as questionable for this weekend's games...The two most consistent Ooks since Christmas have been Randy Repchuk and Garth Hayes. Rearguard Dean Burles returned to the NAII line-up with a strong performance and helped steady the Ooks defence...This weekend, the Ooks play two games at the NAIT Arena. On Saturday, Febuary 12th, the Ooks entertain the winless Mount Royal College Cougars. Game time is 7:30. On Sunday, the 13th, the SAIT Trojans will be here for an afternoon contest at 2:00.

Ooks **Basketball**

The Ooks split the games last weekend with a win against Medicine Hat and a loss to Lethbridge. This gives them an 8 win 3 loss record in league play. Last weekend also saw the return of our star forward Pat Gangle after suffering a broken leg in the tournament in Vancouver in the first week in January.

In the first game against Lethbridge on Friday night, the Ooks were not playing their usual tight defence but were still playing a fast offence. Murray Proctor played very well in the first half and helped keep the game close. The half time break saw Lethbridge ahead by a 25-24 score. The Ooks had trouble getting going and were not getting in for the rebounds and so allowed Lethbridge to control the boards. Hard work by all the players on the team got them back into the game but failure to convert turnovers and good front court pressure by LCC allowed them to give NAIT its third loss of the season. The final score in the match was 56-47. High scorers were Pat Gangl and Scott McLaren with 8 points each, in a game that kept you on the edge of your seat from the opening tip off.

On Saturday the Ooks played a second tough game, this time against Medicine Hat College. This contest, like the one the night before, was a fast pace close affair. The half time score was 37-33 in favour of MHC. The Ooks continued, in the second half, to stay down by 3-5 points until the 11 minute mark. With the use of an effective half court press and a stronger defence they took the lead. Good rebounding and pass interception by Scott McLaren helped open the NAIT lead and finish the game with a 10 point lead 76-66. 




