Yes the thing that everybody(?) has been waiting for is here. Pay Television has become a reality for Canadians at last. The big question is, do Canadians really need anymore television?

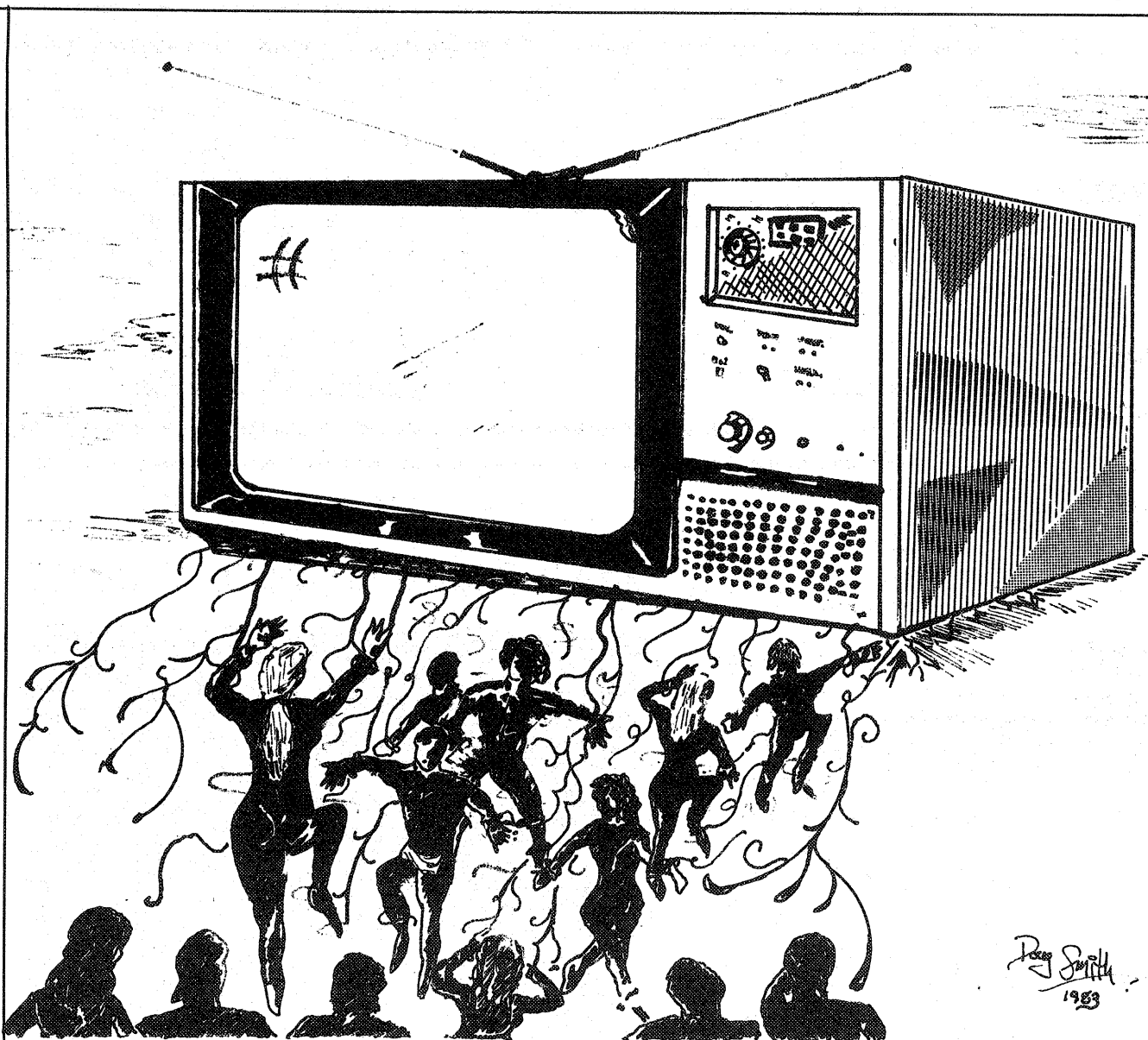

OTTAWA - Employment and Immigration Minister Lloyd Axworthy today announced approval of the federal government's student summer employment initiatives for 1983. Base funding for the 1982 program was set at \$100 million and Mr. Axworthy said that he anticipates an increase in funding for the 1983 initiatives. Program funding will be announced early in the new year.

The government's summer employment development initiatives are designed to provide on-the-job training and work experience so that students will be better prepared for future permanent employment. Funding for the student employment initiatives will be additional to the \$500 million federal job creation program (NEED) announced earlier.

Mr. Axworthy noted that many young people find it difficult to make the transition from school to work.

"Before they enter the permanent work force, students must be given the opportunity to acquire the experience and work habits required by employers," he said. "We are addressing this human resource development concern by creating summer jobs that will provide students with the personal, social and work skills they need to enhance their future labour market participation."

The Minister said he is calling on organizations in both the private and public sectors to participate in Summer Canada, the government's student employment development program, by sponsoring jobs that will give students practical and challenging work experience.

Private sector firms, business organizations, non-profit associations and federal departments will be eligible to sponsor Summer Canada internships in an expansion of the successful internship initiative introduced in 1981. The internships will offer students on-the-job training and progressively more challenging work experience related to their future labour market participation. Summer Canada funding will also be available for summer employment opportunities for students in projects sponsored by community organizations, local and federal governments.

Other federal employment initiatives for students include the Department of National Defence and the RCMP programs and the Canada Employment Centres for Students (CECSs). Besides placing students in jobs in the private sector, the CECSs, which operate in the spring and summer, will refer students to all jobs created under the government's summer initiatives.

January 26th at NAIT Arena Red Deer 5 NAIT Ooks 2

Three first period goals helped the Red Deer College Kings defeat the NAIT Ooks 5-2 on Wednesday, Jan. 26th at the NAIT Arena.

The Kings gained a 3-0 lead in the first frame on markers by Wayne Perkins, Jim McMullen, and Hugh McCaskill. RDC upped the lead to 4-0 with Royce Baker's second period tally.

In the final period, Dennis Connelly increased Red Deer's margin to 5-0 at the 14:33 mark. Brian Hermanutz of NAIT broke Neil McPheddran's shutout bid with a pair of goals at 15:57 and 19:46 respectively.

RDC's Neil McPheddran blocked 31 NAIT blasts. At the other end, NAIT's Cleo Rowein stopped 35 Red Deer drives.

The difference in the contest was the performance of NAIT. The Ooks were committing too many offsides, and making too many bad passes. In addition, RDC showed more hustle beating NAIT to the loose puck time in and time out. NAIT must remember the hockey contest lasts 60 minutes, and every second counts.

January 29th at SAIT Arena, SAIT Trojans 7 NAIT Ooks 3.

A new look SAIT Trojan team surprised the NAIT Ooks with a 7-3 victory. The loss on Saturday, Jan. 29th extended the Ooks winless streak to three games.

The first period was a defensive nightmare as seven goals were notched. SAIT came out of the period leading 4-3 on a pair of goals by John Mercer and singles by Mark Blondin and Duane Potekal. Gary Hoekstra replied with a pair for NAIT. Kevin Hayes added the other Ook single.

At 15:49 of the second, Duane Potekal picked up his second of the night to give SAIT a 5-3 lead following two. Kelly Davis of the Trojans rounded out the scoring connecting with a pair in the third.

NAIT directed 36 shots at Scott Webster in the SAIT nets. The Trojans tested NAIT's Cleo Rowein 35 times.

One of the difficulties encountered by the Ooks was a breakdown of positional play. It appeared on certain occasions that certain members of the NAIT Ooks were not confident in their teammates. As a result, some members of the team were trying to do everything solo or trying to play someone else's position. A team effort is required for victory.

January 30th at SAIT Arena NAIT Ooks 12 Mount Royal College Cougars 4.

The NAIT Ooks snapped out of their three game losing streak with a 12-4 triumph over the Mount Royal College Cougars on Sunday, Jan. 30th in Calgary.

Rick Karst, Jeff Hendricks, Kevin Imrie and Gary Hoekstra paced the NAIT attack with two goal performances. Charlie Stern, Randy Repchuk, and Warren Sanregret added the other NAIT tallies. Geof Cooke, Les Trainer, Hughie Alexander and Rob Richichi answered for the Cougars.

NAIT acquired a 4-1 lead after one, and a 6-2 advantage following the second. In the final frame, NAIT collected six markers to Mount Royal's two.

NAIT's Brad Breakell redirected 35 Mount Royal blasts. The Mount Royal's Brian Boyce was tested 49 times.

The highlight of the contest was NAIT's showing. The Ooks displayed signs of coming out of the slump. However, the Ooks committed a couple of mental errors that could have cost them in a closer contest. NAIT must also be able to capitalize on more of their chances, or else they could be in trouble.

ON THE BENCH: NAIT's record is now 12-7, good for second place in the ACAC four points ahead of SAIT...Two Ooks are currently out of the NAIT lineup. Both rearguard Dean Burles and forward Pat Lawson are listed as questionable for this week's action...On Friday, February 4th, the NAIT Ooks Hockey Team will be holding a cabaret at the Royal Gardens Community Hall. Doors open at 8 p.m. and tickets are still available for \$5 from members of the NAIT Hockey Team...The next game for the Ooks will be on Saturday, February 5th when they play host to the Red Deer College Kings. Game time is 7:30 at the NAIT Arena. Admission is free with your NAIT ID Card. Support the Ooks!

VOLLEYBALL NEWS

On the weekend the teams were at Grant MacEwan. The girls had very little success and lost 3 straight. They seemed to have trouble with the defence of Grant MacEwan and lost 15-9, 15-2 and 15-13. The losses have almost eliminated us from play off contention.

The guys started off well and played some awesome ball for the first game and a half. They won the first game by 15-11 score and were close in the second game but lost by 15-13 score. After the second game they suffered a complete break down and stopped performing the fundamentals. This may be just a case of "trying too hard". Injuries are still plaguing the team as they played this weekend with only 9 players and 4 of them were playing with injuries. They went on to lose the remaining 2 games by 15-9 and 15-8 scores. The next action for the teams is Wed. Feb. 9 in a home match against Red Deer College.

CHICKS BASKETBALL

This past weekend the girls were on the road for games in Camrose and Red Deer. The girls played well but were unable to come up with any points for the standings.

Friday against the Camrose team, the girls started off well and were handling the fullcourt press very effectively. 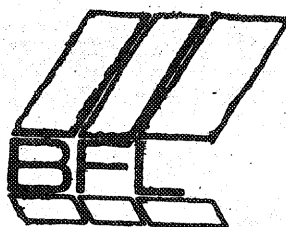

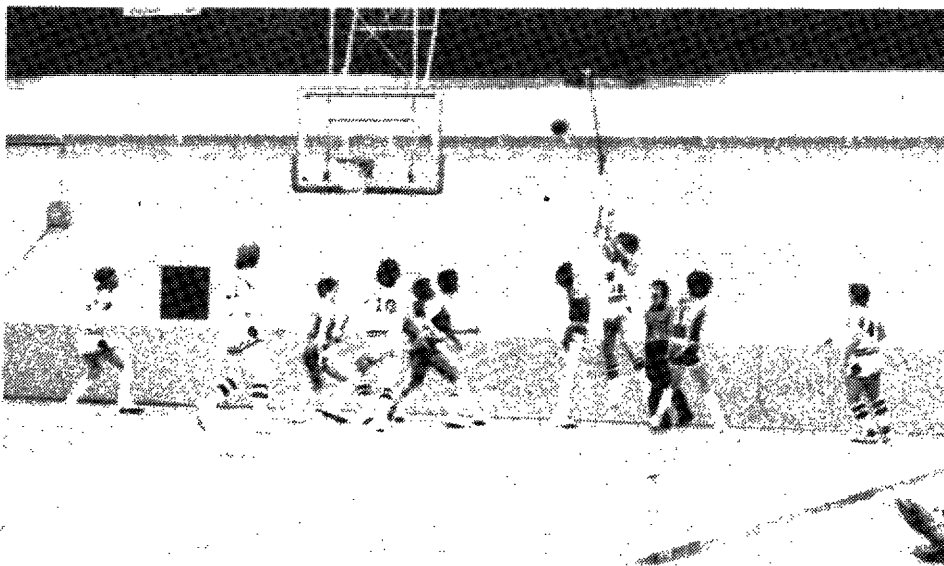
