





# EDITOR'S NOTE

Students and future students of NAIT are faced with yet another problem in a problem filled year. This problem is not a new one however, this problem has been an old one that has been cropping up more frequently in the past few years. This problem is where to park all the cars that instructors and students insist on driving to school.

The first problem started when City Council informed NAIT that the rental on 250 car stalls was going up by 226 percent, not what you call a good example of restraint. The result of this increase is the loss of 250 parking stalls. The instructors that originally parked there will be moved to the parkade. This move will not take place until next year. Unless another solution can be found, student parking in the parkade will be down to 950 stalls from 1200.

The second problem is now our friends(?) at City Hall have decreed that the area inside the boundaries of 101st to 106th and 111 ave to 122 ave is now a restricted parking area. Unless you have a residents parking permit, you will be allowed to park for a maximum 2 hours between 09:00 to 16:00 hours Monday to Friday. This will force students who do not ride the bus and do not have a NAIT parking permit to walk a lot further to their cars at the end of the day.

Dave Whalen has made three attempts in 1982 to make suggestions to City council. These suggestions included the rezoning of the "playgrounds" (actually these "Playgrounds" are fenced off paved lots) so that they can be used for parking. Also, the rezoning of 117-117A ave. between 103 to 106 st. to provide for parking on both sides of the road. The last suggestion was for the city to build another parkade for NAIT students. These were all turned down. His last request was to defer the starting date of the new bylaw until the end of this term, City Hall's reply was not available at press time.

The big question that springs to mind is why is City Hall doing this kind of thing to students? It is not just NAIT. Next month the City plans to go after the U of A with the same kind of parking restrictions that they gave us. My feeling is that Edmonton Transit needs money. Of course they could try improving service to certain areas of the city, lower fares, (the cost of riding the bus is still more expensive than driving my car to and from NAIT). But does City Council think of these things? Of course not! It is much easier for them to make parking space more expensive and harder to find, so that finally more people will ride the bus. Sneaky system, but not one to win them a popularity contest among students and staff. Wake and smell the coffee City Hall. Some of the students here are future taxpayers. Maybe it is time that the city Aldermen realized this and started to treat us with a little more respect, and listen to our ideas and complaints. Students are the future workers and taxpayers of this fair city and it is time that we are given a little respect from those who reside in the hallowed hallways of City Hall.

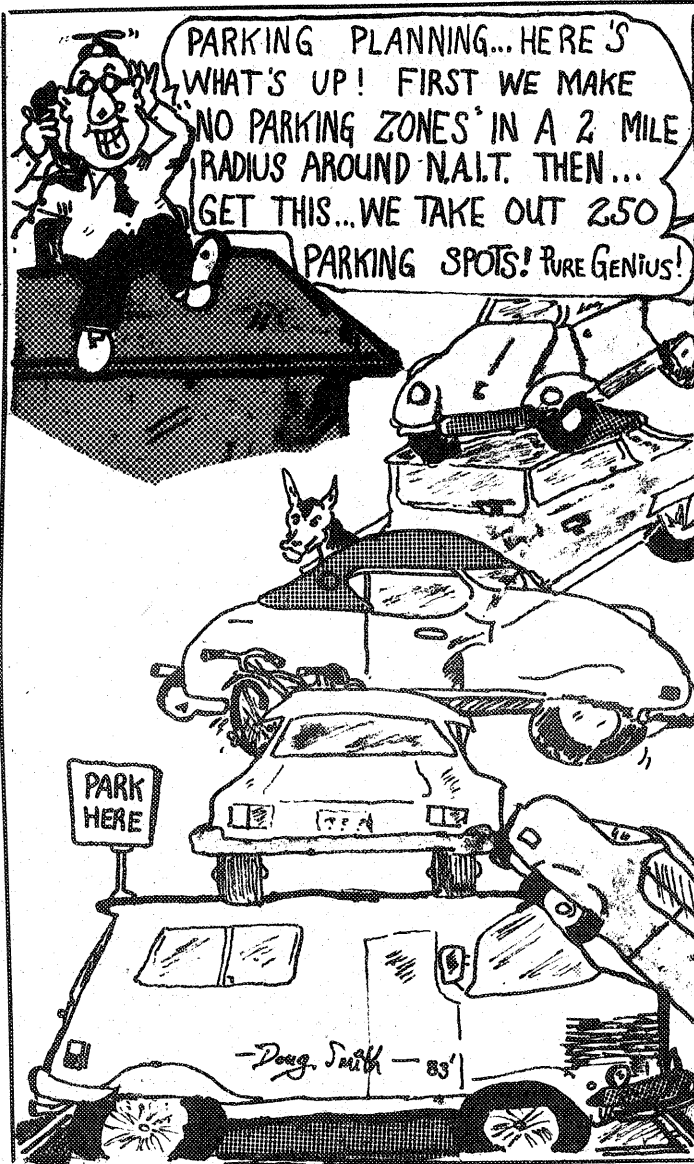

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# MORE LETTERS

My Dearest Lorraine Sale:

Bravo! Your response in last week's Nugget to my article "So Ya Wanna Be Saviour" is EXACTLY what I was expecting from a religious zealot.

It will never cease to amaze me how fanatically religious people can derive so much from what others say. In your case, Lorraine, I am very interested in knowing how, by reading my column, you decided that my attitude on life "seems narrow and cynical" and that all I see in my world is evil and corruption. (For the record, you're wrong, except for my belief that entrusting political and (especially) military leaders with power without a system of immediate accountability to the people is like playing Russian Roulette with a fully loaded shotgun.)

Perhaps what disquiets you is your perception of my religious beliefs. I regard myself as being a Judeo-Christian-Buddhist-Hindu-Islamic-Zoroastrian - Taoist-Confucian-Platonic-Humanist. For example, with regards to the Bible: I consider it to be a magnificent treasury of the fundamental principles of some of history's philosophers, a corpus of wisdom on our lives and our relationships with our fellow human beings. However, so are the Tripitaka, the Veda and Bhagavadgita, the Koran, and even the fairy tales by the Brothers Grimm: all such sacred texts contain splendid and admirable studies of basic truths and encourage one to seek universal laws on how to live life.

However, the events and the dieties recounted in sacred texts should be considered in a different light. Like love and human resources, faith SHOULD NOT be given lightly. For example, with regards to Christian beliefs, I try to remain objective. I, for one, cannot fully accept as true the divine conception and birth of Christ when some scientists feel as many as one in two million births are "virgin births" (conception occurring WITHOUT sexual intercourse). Nor can I have complete confidence in Christ's rising from the dead when there is evidence that suggests Jesus did not die on the cross (read, for example, about the Holy Shroud of Turin in Reader's Digest's "Strange Stories, Amazing Facts"). And, it is difficult to have faith in the visions of the prophets and the disciples when some of my friends in high school had similar visions during their all-too-frequent acid trips. The full, unquestioning acceptance of beliefs handed down by our forefathers is, more than any other reason, the cause for Mankind being so close to utter and complete destruction.

As a next to last point, Lorraine, I enjoyed it when you said that I have created my "own living HELL ON EARTH". In a strict interpretation of the Bible (ignoring the teachings of early Jewish and Christian theologians, whose beliefs originated as much from Greek, Egyptian, and Babylonian thought as from the words of Christ), your statement is a contradiction of terms. Indeed, most Christians have a false concept of Heaven and Hell so far as the Bible is concerned. In fact, any "true" Christian does not believe he/she has an immortal soul (read "What do You Mean 'Immortal Soul'" in the November/December 1982 edition of "The Plain Truth"). To say I have created my own living Hell on Earth, then, is a compliment on abilities I do not have.

What I am attempting to do through my articles in the Nugget was made explicitly clear in my first column back in September. "So Ya Wanna Be Saviour" was a contemplation, albeit satirical, of what Christ would have to do in this day and age to get His message of brotherly love and peace on Earth across during the Second Coming. By saying "I suggest you try writing on a subject you know something about", you tempt me to change my column from a commentary on television to a series of dissertations on religion, which would be the proper thing to do, as I do know more about religion than I do about video. (Don't panic, however. I won't, as I would not want to weekly threaten others' religious beliefs.)

I will accept an invitation from anyone for further discussion on this topic after the midterms. (I'm listed in the student directory and the white pages.) However, before such a discussion would take place, I would beseech you, with an open and an objective mind, to read and research about religions. I strongly recommend as an impartial and unprejudiced source the "Encyclopedia Britannica", which has over two hundred references given in the Micropedia, in addition to the sixty pages in the Macropedia that examine the philosophy, social aspects, and study of religion.

Finally, I perceive from your letter, Lorraine, that you have some concern that I am missing out on the joyful moments of human life. What is the destiny of my soul only Time and those beings that might exist who are concerned with such things will tell. As for my living life to the fullest, there is no need for any anxiety on your part. Day to day, I follow my credo "Live life, love Life, love Love." I'd burn more gasoline.

I'd eat more ice cream and fewer beans. I wouldn't deny myself as I have in the past.

I'd have more actual troubles and fewer imaginary ones. Ninety percent of what I worried about didn't happen anyway.

You see, I was one of those people who lived prophylactically and sanely and sensibly, hour after hour and day after day. Oh, that doesn't mean I didn't have my moments, but if I had it all over to do, I'd have more of those moments. In fact, I'd try to have nothing but wonderful moments, side by side. Life really is a wonderful series of "nows".

I've been one of those people who never went anywhere without a thermometer, a hot water bottle, a gargle, a raincoat and a parachute. If I had it to do all over again, I'd travel lighter next time.

If I had my life to live over again, I'd start barefoot earlier in the spring, and I'd stay that way later in the fall. I'd play hooky a lot more. I'd ride more merry-go-rounds, I'd smell more flowers, I'd hug more children.

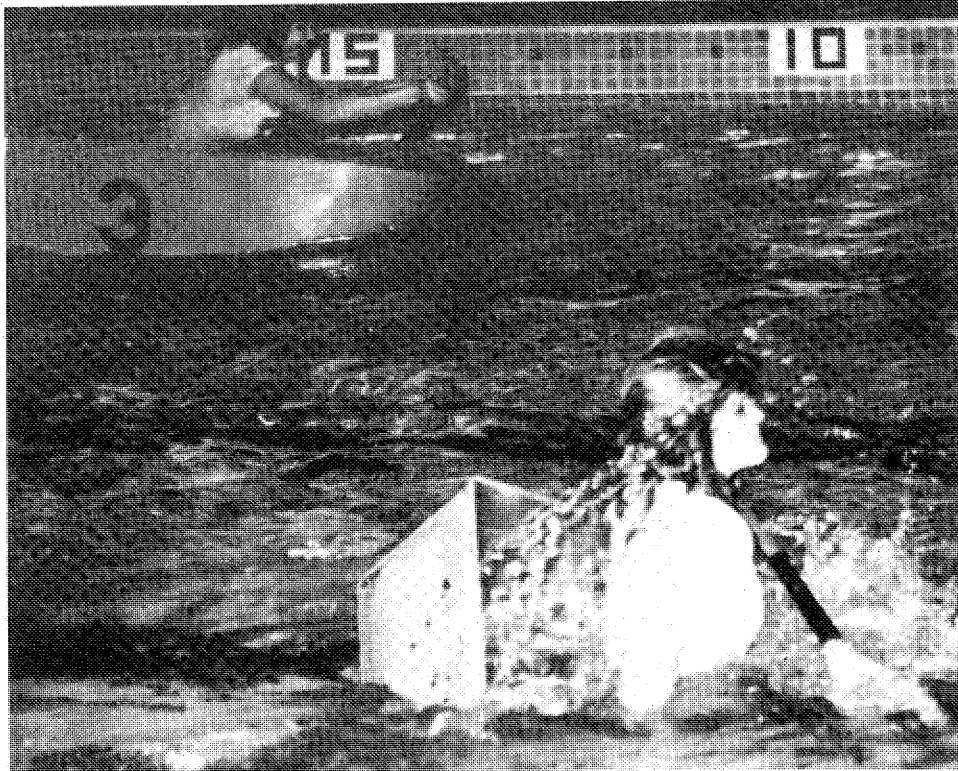

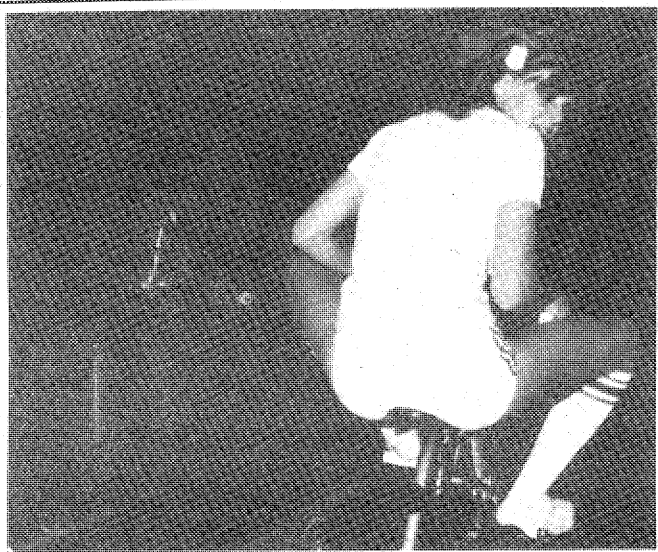

## Student Affairs ADVISORY Committee

On Saturday, Dec. 8, a public meeting was held by the Student Affairs Advisory Committee to the Minister of Advanced Education. The committee is made up of an equal number of student representatives and members of the community at large. The student reps that were present were from U of C, U of A, MRC, SAIT and GMCC. They have been in existence for 9 years and meet 6 times a year at meetings such as this one. The committee was formed as a way for students to express any problems they may encounter with the system, or to propose changes to the system to make it work more efficiently. The complaints or ideas are heard by the committee and are discussed by all the people that are in attendance in a very informal no pressure format. After the meeting the committee will meet privately to review and discuss the proposals and decide if they need more information before they should act. Once they have all the information they want they will make a recommendation to the Honourable Dick Johnston, Minister of Advanced Education. They are pleased to say that some of the past ideas and complaints of persons have resulted in some of the present policies being established. In other words if you have an idea you should come forward with it because these are some people that actually do listen and do something about student problems. If you feel you have a problem that warrants their attention you can forward a written account of the problem to the Committee, to Chairperson, Dr. A. Scott, 11303-100 Avenue, Edmonton.

Some of the ideas that were presented at this meeting were well thought out, well presented and of interest to you as a student. There were six proposals put before the committee that I was allowed to hear and a couple of others that the press were asked to leave for (I figure that we might breach National security if we reported these ideas). The first topic that was presented for discussion was that the people who are involved in taking a leadership role in the school should receive a scholarship. This would be to encourage more students to take a more active role in their school, and try to combat the ever present effects of student apathy. The award would not automatically go to the people on student council but would be available to anyone who is extremely industrious in helping better the school life of all the students of the institute. This could also involve people from a school that are involved in social or community activities. This proposal was well received but further information was requested and some points should be refined. The idea was a good one and may be implemented in the future. Next NAITSA president Dave Whalen brought some of the problems from around the NAIT campus to the attention of the committee. The first of these problems was that of the parking problem. The problem revolves around the fact that there are annually 3000 applications for parking permits while there are only 1200 stalls available for the students. Next year there will be even fewer stalls because the rent on some of the property that NAIT rents for parking has been increased to an unrealistically high figure. He also informed them on the new City bylaw which limits parking around the institute to 2 hours. He then asked for any help that they could give in alleviating these problems. The next 3 problems that were discussed were of a less important nature and so were only discussed briefly. The first was getting the Minister to control the amount of the lab fees instead of the Board of Governors that presently do it. The next point was about getting the required audit of the student association paid for the people who requested it.

The final idea presented by Mr. Whalen was on getting any positions held by the student while in school put onto their mark transcript. This is to make the positions more credible to prospective employers because if the Institute puts these titles on your transcripts they will be more accepted than if you were to tell them of these positions yourself.

The final point that I was allowed to listen to came from a U of A student regarding the library funds were spent on acquisition of new material, and that the level of spending has dropped to 45 percent. It was proposed that some more government money should be made available to keep the libraries at an acceptable level of new information - especially with the changes that are occurring in some fields. Another point that was mentioned was the lack of study space and because of this some students are placed in the precarious situation of trying to study in less than safe & secure areas. There are reports of assaults and sexual attacks on the people trying to study in some of these areas. We here at NAIT can feel lucky that we have not experienced any of these problems. After some concluding discussions and remarks the meeting was adjourned. The only way the meeting could have been a greater success would have been to get a larger response from the troubled students of this Institute.



## Technology Feature

This week our technology feature focuses in on the Building Construction Engineering Technology, or BCET. While BCET, like most technologies here at NAIT, deals with the learning of a practical skill, there are many misconceptions regarding the daily activities of the students.

In their two years in the program, the students see very little academic activity outside of the classroom. While many people may draw conclusions regarding the program's title, the students are called upon to learn a great many aspects of the construction industry,

with the ultimate goal being a supervision or management position.

Class time is spent in the learning of all of the component techniques of construction, so that the graduate student may have a general base of knowledge in dealing with all of the various types of personnel in his/her management role. Knowledge of drafting, Civil Engineering, and administration are but a few of the skills necessary when entering the construction field as a professional manager.

All is not serious study however, as can be proven by the many Cabarets and social functions organized by the students. In addition to the social functions, the students undertake recreat-

ional engineering projects, such as the upcoming concrete toboggan races in Vancouver. These are not only an excellent method of using necessary skills, but an excuse to party in the fashion made legend by their engineering predecessors.

Though the present economic slump has dealt a serious blow to the health of the construction industry in Alberta, the students of BCET look to the future rejuvenation of the economy and the construction boom that always follows. In the meantime, the partying and the learning goes on, another example of a creative and worthwhile learning process here at NAIT.

### Saturday Night Live

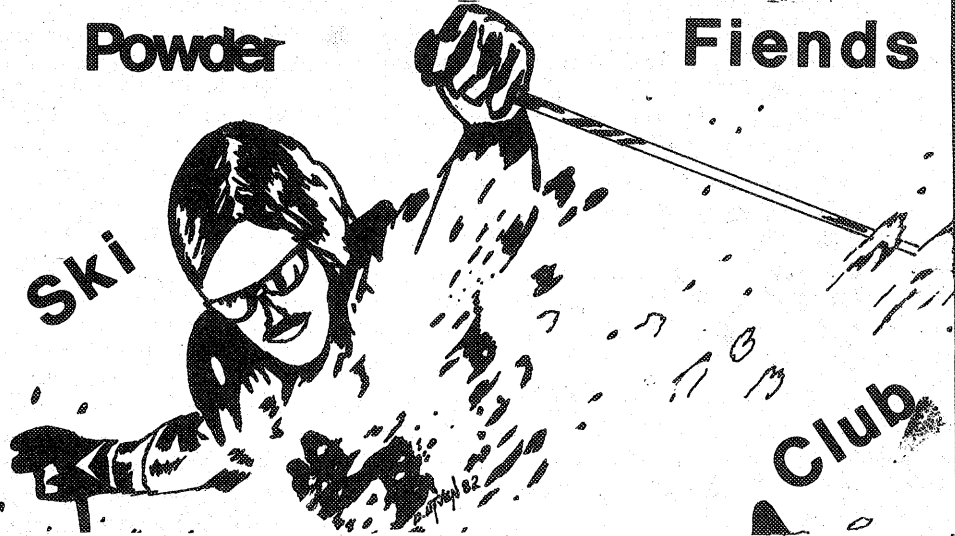

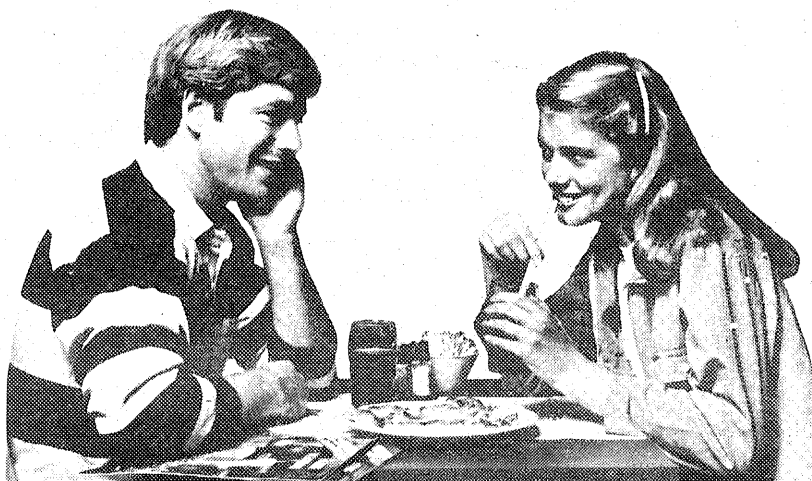

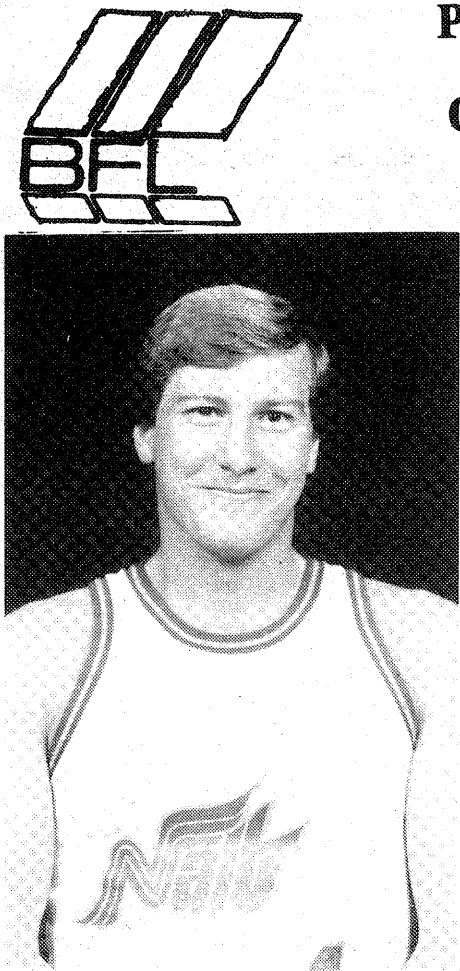
### Volleyball

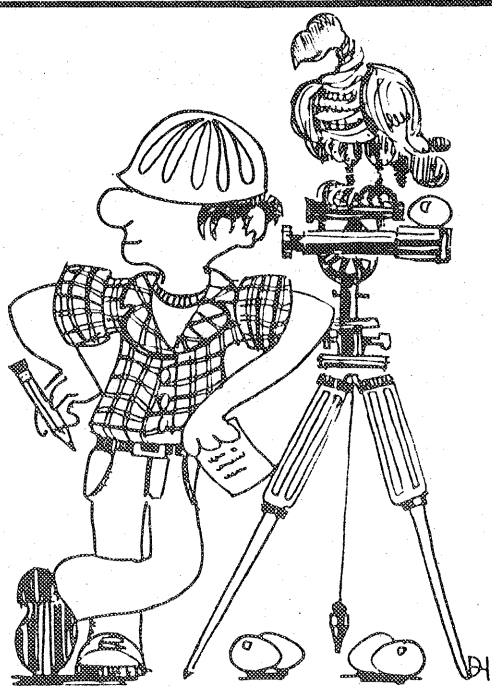


Now by Popular Demand: K Wing Happenings
