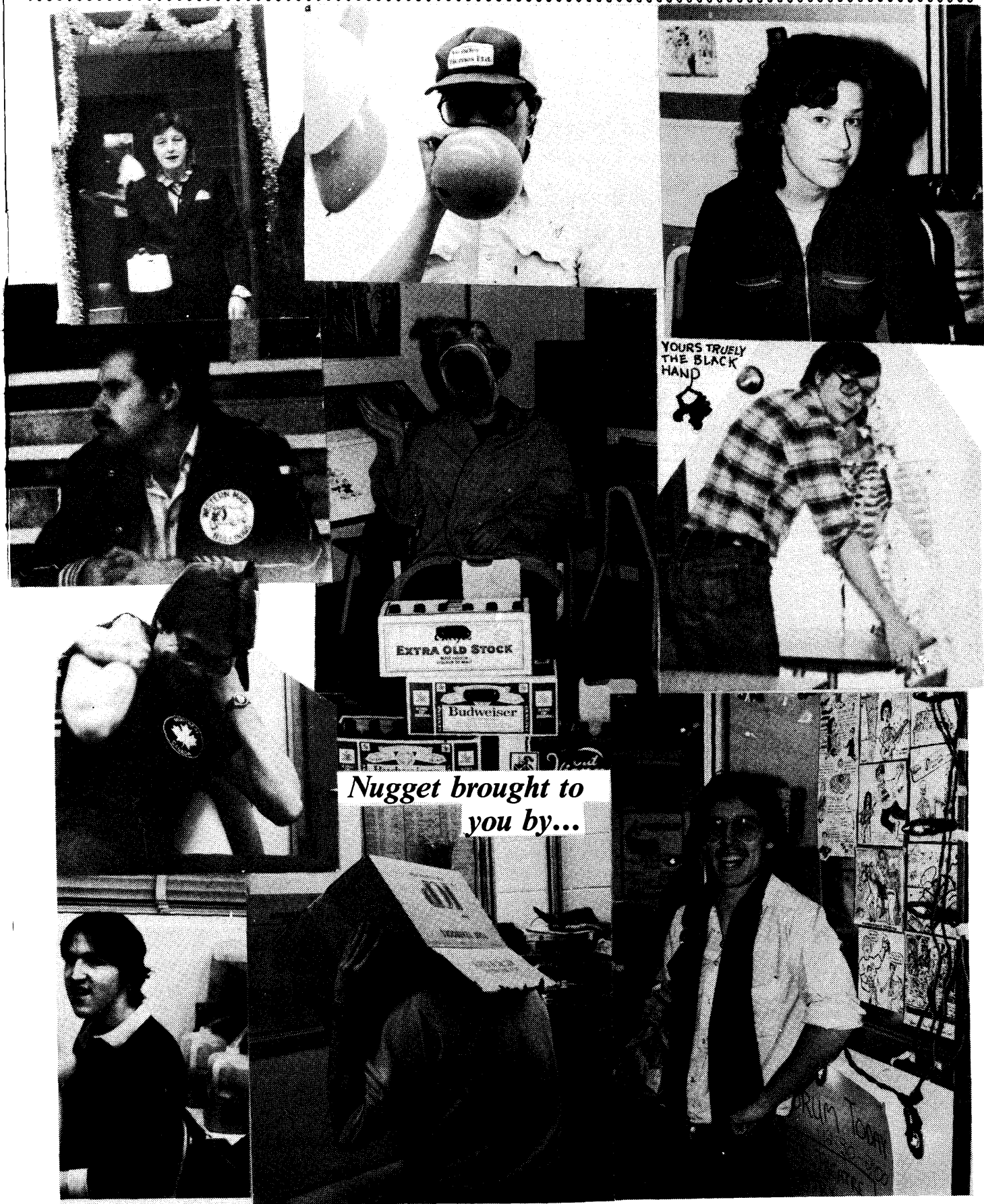

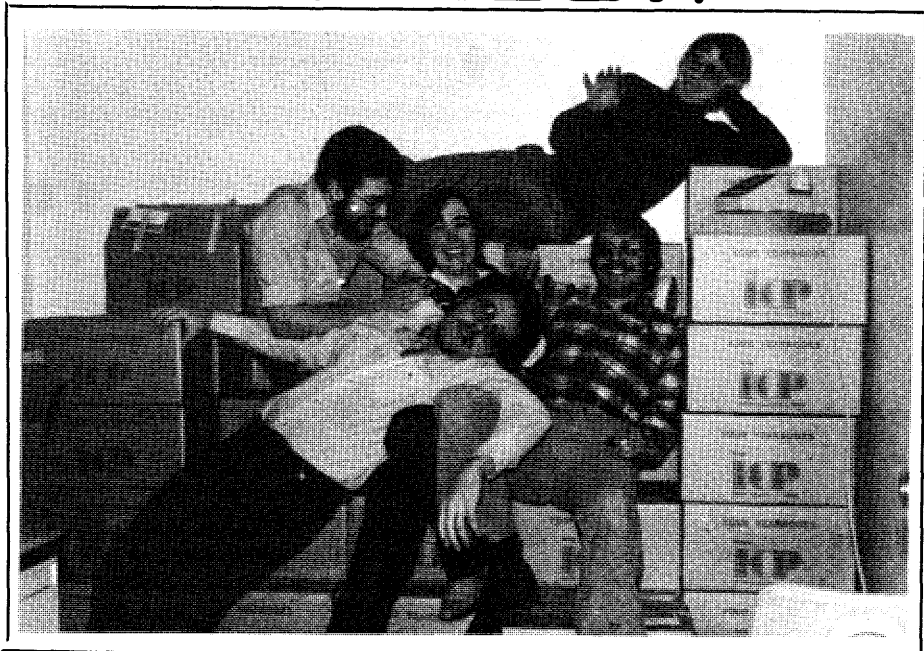

## GRANTS AVAILABLE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL RESEARCH

### Who May Apply?

Any person, institution, corporation or society may request research funds. The Trust endeavours to apportion its funds equally between public institutions such as universities and the private sector such as industries or individuals.

Joint funding with industries or individuals is of considerable interest to the Board of Trustees.

Any logical proposal will receive consideration, such as: • Environmental problems related to human behaviour • Social, Cultural, and Management Issues • Cost/Benefit Analysis of Environmental Impacts • Energy resource development and the environment • Problems of the natural environment • Urban & Rural pollution control and any other related concerns.

Deadline for submission of application for grants is April 30, 1983. Early submission is advised. All applications are reviewed upon receipt by the Grants Advisory Committee. Applicants will be notified as to the Board of Trustees' decision by May 27, 1983. Research projects should be planned to start after this date.

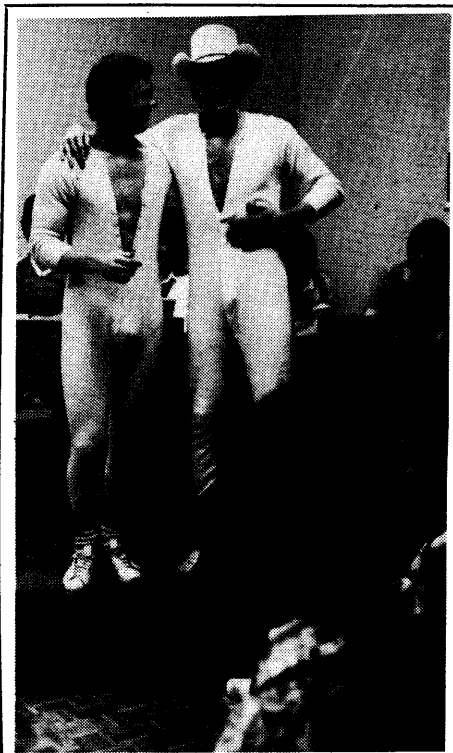

## HOCKEY NEWS

### ACAC FINAL GAME 2 TUESDAY, MARCH 8TH AT RED DEER RDC KINGS 7 NAIT OOKS 4

The Red Deer College Kings scored six consecutive goals in the final 32 minutes on their way to a 7-4 victory over the NAIT Ooks in Game 2 of the ACAC Final on Tuesday, March 8th in Red Deer. With the win, RDC tied the best-of-five series at one game apiece.

NAIT gained a quick 1-0 lead on Randy Repchuk's powerplay marker at 3:25 of the first period from Kevin Hayes and Ken Ludwig. The Kings tied the game with the man advantage on Joey Engert's tally at the 9:45 mark. With one minute and 46 seconds left in the frame, Randy Repchuk of the Ooks connected on a play with Jeff Hendricks. One minute and eight seconds later, Rick Karst increased NAIT's advantage to 3-1 on a Brian Hermanutz-Gary Hoekstra set-up.

NAIT's most consistent player in 1983, Garth Hayes, widened the Ooks advantage to 4-1 when he took a Randy Repchuk pass and beat RDC's Neal McPheddran at 5:59. Joey Engert of the Kings then took a match penalty for butt ending.

This incident signalled the turning point of the series as NAIT failed to capitalize on the five minute powerplay, and allowed the RDC squad one more chance. While NAIT had the man advantage, RDC's Dwayne Swanson notched a shorthanded tally against NAIT at 8:28. Wayne Perkins of the Kings narrowed NAIT's lead to 4-3 at the 12:50 mark. One minute and 33 seconds later, Perry Wall brought the Kings even.

With 47 seconds elapsed in the third, Tim Gitzel found the net on the powerplay to give the Kings a 5-4 advantage. At 15:20, Terry Wheele upped Red Deer's lead to two. Dennis Connelly of RDC rounded out the night's scoring at 17:07.

NAIT's Cleo Rowein turned away 31 Red Deer shots. Cleo was brilliant in the first 25 minutes, and could not stop the Red Deer attack alone. At the other end, RDC's Neal McPheddran was also tested 31 times.

### GAME 3 FRIDAY, MARCH 11TH AT NAIT ARENA RDC KINGS 6 NAIT OOKS 3

The Red Deer College Kings tallied three times in both the opening and closing frames en route to a 6-3 triumph over the NAIT Ooks at the NAIT Arena on Friday, March 11th. With the victory, Red Deer gained a 2-1 lead in the best-of-five ACAC Final.

The Kings came out fast acquiring a 1-0 lead on Terry Wheele's red lighter at 21 seconds. Fifty seconds later, Garth Hayes of NAIT tied the game at 1-1 on a Randy Repchuk-Dean Burles set-up. The Red Deer powerplay lifted the Kings into a 2-1 lead when Tom Adams tallied at 10:06. Former Ook Wayne Perkins gave Red Deer a two goal margin at 16:09.

The lone goal of the second came at 8:39 when hard work by the NAIT penalty killing unit paid off. Terry Bakken's outstanding effort set-up Randy Repchuk who made no mistake.

NAIT had thier opportunities but could not capitalize. At 7:59, Jim McMullen made the score 4-2 in favor of Red Deer. One minute and 35 seconds later, Royce Baker netted RDC's fifth marker. The NAIT penalty killing combination came through at the 17:50 marker with Dale Kolada picking up the goal from Warren Sanregret. NAIT's comeback was foiled by Terry Wheele's second goal of the evening for RDC with nine seconds left.

The NAIT Ooks were not playing their best two way hockey and were outshot by the Kings 31-25.

### Game 4 Sunday, March 13th at NAIT Arena RDC Kings 4 NAIT Ooks 3

The Red Deer College Kings netted a pair of goals in the first period to acquire a lead they never relinquished as they downed NAIT Ooks 4-3 on Sunday, March 13th at the NAIT Arena. With the triumph, the RDC Kings capture the ACAC League Championship three games to one.

Tom Adams of the Kings opened the scoring at 3:48 of the first beating NAIT's Cleo Rowein low on the glove side. The Red Deer powerplay capitalized at the 14:50 mark of the frame when Dennis Connelly's point shot went in.

In the second, Dwayne Swanson widened Red Deer's lead to 3-0 with 48 seconds elapsed in the frame. The NAIT powerplay brought the Ooks to within two at 12:17 with Gary Hoekstra netting the goal on a play with Warren Sanregret and Brian Hermanutz. Red Deer regained their three goal margin at the 18:18 mark. Jeff Hendricks narrowed the Kings advantage to a pair when he made no mistake on a breakaway set-up from Dale Kolada and Kevin Hayes.

The third period saw NAIT take too many penalties and play shorthanded for a good portion of the period. The Ooks never gave up and had numerous good scoring chances. NAIT's persistence paid off at 15:39 when Ken Ludwig cut Red Deer's lead to one on a Terry Bakken-Warren Sanregret set-up.

The Ooks directed 37 shots at the Kings Neal McPheddran, while RDC tested NAIT's Cleo Rowein on 30 occasions.

Taking the best-of-series, 3-1 the Red Deer College Kings advance to the CCAA (National) Championships in Willowdale, Ontario from March 23rd through the 26th.

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## Ooks Basketball

On the March 11 weekend the NAIT Ooks travelled to Lethbridge for the ACAC Basketball semi-finals. This marks the first time the men's basketball team has made it to the playoffs in 9 years. The team played extremely well but fell just short of gaining a bid to the ACAC finals.

The first game of the best of three series was played Friday night. The guys came out flying and played well both on offence and defence to open a 19 point lead to go into the half on the high side of a 42-23 score. In the second half the Ooks played similar to the way they did in the first half and finished the game with a 77-58 victory. The high scorers for the Ooks were Harry Blacker 17, Scott McLaren 14, Murray Proctor and Phil Bartlett each with 12. In the second game the competition was much closer and after an up and down first half the score was 45-44 in favour of Lethbridge. In the second half the Ooks came out slowly and soon found themselves down by 10 points. They fought hard to close the score but the closest they came was a 6 point margin. The final score in the match was 82-76 for the LCC team. This tied the series at 1 game each and brought on the need for a third game on Sunday. The high scorers in the game were Harry Blacker 18, Scott McLaren 10, Phil Bartlett 10, and Pat Gangl 10. In the second game the intensity level was again high. After a very competitive half the score was 37-32. In the second half the game continued to be close and with 8 minutes left the score was tied. The Ooks missed on some key lay ups, fell behind and couldn't come back. The final score in the game was 81-70 with Lethbridge winning both the game and the series. High scorers in the game for the Ooks were Murray Proctor 14, Harry Blacker 12, and Scott McLaren and Pat Gangl each with 10 more. Lethbridge now goes on to play SALT for the ACAC championship next weekend in Calgary.

This was the last game of the year for the Ooks and they capped off a great year with three of the best performances that they have turned in. They finished the regular season with a 10-6 record and the year was finished with a 21-15 win-loss record. The highlights of the year came when they defeated Lethbridge for the first time ever in Lethbridge. The Ooks placed 2 players on the All Star team, Murray Proctor and Phil Bartlett, and should expect more honours from the conference voting. The Ooks finished 3rd in one of the best conferences in the country and with 8 players returning next year they should have a chance to take everything next year with some help from the new players that will be picked up next fall. Coach Dave Hoy commented "Great dedication and effort from all members of the team which is the best team NAIT has had in the last 8 or 9 years. Thanks to all six of the second year players for the time and effort they put forth in helping the first years develop and thanks to the first year for all the hard work". The team played very well this year and with the present first years that are coming back they should have another exciting season. Congratulations on a year of great accomplishments.

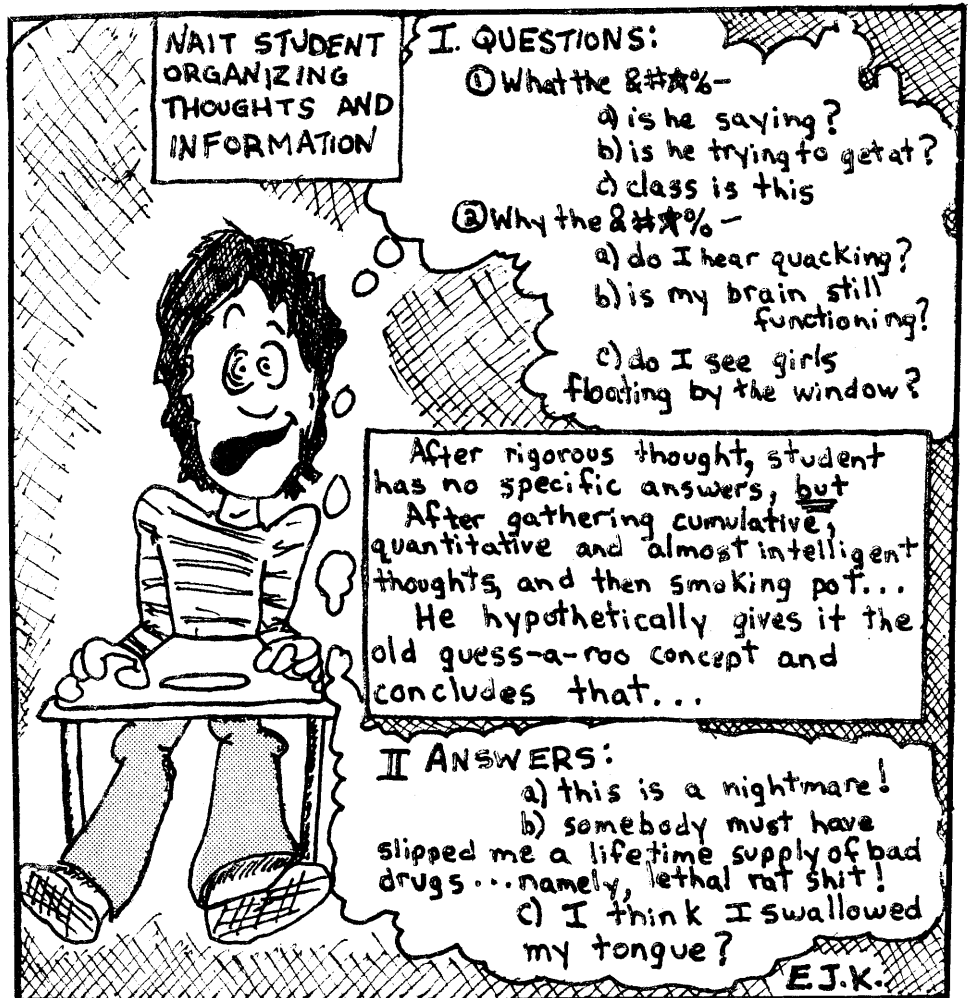

# SERVICES

## Registration Information

Making a decision about your career? Deciding whether NAIT is an appropriate place for you involves an evaluation of yourself as to interests, abilities, and aspirations as well as an investigation of programs offered and the employment opportunities available to graduates. The Registrar and/or Counselling staff is available to help you make a wise decision!

### REGISTRAR'S DEPARTMENT IS INVOLVED IN:

1. Program and Institute information - Distribution of information booklets, calendars, applications, basic counselling, etc.
2. Applications - Receipt
  - a) January 1st and thereafter for all programs starting in September.
  - b) Apply anytime throughout the year for multiple-intake programs.
3. Selection for Admission
  - a) All programs have a quota
  - b) Selection is based on academic achievement in the required subjects and a written summary of your career investigations demonstrating that you have given considerable thought to your program selection
  - c) Initial selection, by this department, is based on superior academic achievement and familiarity with the chosen career field and/or related work experience.
  - d) The first two weeks of April (or three months prior to registration date for multiple intake programs) we present the information to the Selection Committee on numbers of applications accepted to date, positions available at this time, and the number of applications being held to fill these positions.
  - e) The final decision of the Selection Committee, on the admission status of each applicant, is sent in written form to the applicant.
4. Tuition Fees
  - a) In June, a fee form is sent to all accepted applicants for payment of full fees by August 1st.
  - b) Non-receipt by August 1st, results in cancellation of the acceptance. The vacant position is assigned to another applicant.
5. Final Marks (if taking high school upgrading at the time of application)
  - a) Conditional acceptance may be granted to an applicant provided he/she is taking the necessary subjects or grade at the time of application. These final marks must be received by the Registrar's Office by August 1st. Summer school subjects are not acceptable for first consideration - replacement only after completion of the subject.
  - b) Non-receipt by August 1st will result in cancellation of the acceptance. The vacant position will be assigned to another applicant.
6. Registration and Student Records
  - a) All accepted applicants are notified of the date and time to appear for registration as an official student.
  - b) The Registrar's Department maintains all records for students while in attendance for the full-time day programs. Detailed information is provided on academic regulations, rights and responsibilities.

Our purpose is to help students select the right program and succeed while in attendance at NAIT. Can we be of further assistance? Please do not hesitate to contact us for more detailed information.

## Career Opportunities For Disabled Students

During the past two years, NAIT has seen a growth in the number of students with physical disabilities. Through the "Special Career Training and Services Project" we have been able to acquire specialized equipment, to improve physical accessibility, and to provide support services where required. In addition, many instructors have become involved in recognizing the needs of students facing particular handicaps.

Students who attend must meet the normal academic requirements and attend regular classes. A visually impaired student might use equipment such as one of our talking terminals, modified tape recorders, close circuit T.V. readers, or a talking calculator. A deaf student could be provided with an interpreter and notetaking help. Students with mobility limitations may find access to the keyed elevators, the handicapped parking zone, or use of adjustable tables vital to taking advantage of the programs at NAIT. A recently published handbook offers a helpful guide to the services available at NAIT.

Students with physical disabilities can take advantage of daytime, apprenticeship and continuing education programs (part time credit and non credit courses).

## Health Service

The Health Service at NAIT is staffed by Registered Nurses. A varied program of health care is available to all and we encourage students to make full use of the facilities provided. In the event of illness or injury, however minor, nurses are available to provide treatment and care. Referrals are made to Doctors, Dentists or other community Agencies when necessary. Immunizations, vision, color vision and hearing tests are available by appointment. "Please note", there is no student accident insurance at NAIT. However, voluntary accident insurance coverage is offered by Seaboard Life Insurance Company's student accident insurance plan. Forms are available on registration day or from student services and health services.

## Counselling Services

The Student Counselling Centre at NAIT provides a variety of services for both the students who are studying at NAIT, and those who are beginning to plan a program of study leading toward a career.

For those beginning the search for a path leading to a possible career, the counsellors provide the following services:

- I. Personal interviews can be arranged between the interested student and a counsellor, where assessment of vocational interests, abilities and aptitudes can be taken.
- II. Information can be secured at the Centre in a variety of forms, such as:
  - a) Calendar, course pre-requisite lists.
  - b) Career information audio tapes on the courses, consisting of interviews with program heads.
  - c) General orientation seminars on programs, where general information on the courses and application procedures can be secured.
  - d) Some video tapes on certain programs are also available.
- III. For some students who have physical handicaps, the Counselling Centre provides some special services as

required. If you feel you need some special services, you can call the Counselling Centre for more information. IV. The Counselling Centre also provides many services for you when you become a student. These are some of the services:

a) Groups for:

- i) How to Study and Prepare for Exams
- ii) Finding a Job
- iii) Reducing Stress Levels
- iv) Marriage Planning.

b) Personal Counselling for a variety of reasons is also available by appointment.

c) Career Development interviews for students who want to make changes in their career paths can also be arranged.

v. Financing your education is costly. So, the Counselling Centre provides a Financial Officer to help with loans, to help plan budgets and to administer the Awards Programs.

VI. If you feel you have a problem with your Reading Skills, the Counselling Centre provides a Reading Lab. Here you can receive an assessment of your problem and a program which may help improve your reading level and the amount of information remembered.

The Student Counselling Centre is located in Room 117 off the South Lobby. It operates from September to June, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday. Appointments are recommended, though not always required. If we can help you in any way, call us at 427-9183.

## Financing Your Education

### What Is Available...

#### - Guaranteed Loans -

Financial assistance is available in the form of loans and grants to students whose resources are insufficient to provide for the cost of full-time studies at the post-secondary level. The financial assistance programs are administered by the Students Finance Board and are intended to supplement, rather than replace a student's own financial resources, e.g. savings, summer earnings, parental or spousal contribution, if applicable, and part-time earnings.

Under the provisions of the Canada Student Loans Plan and the Alberta Student Loan Act, guaranteed loans are made available to students by the federal and provincial governments. The maximum loan that may be awarded to a full-time student during an academic year - based on a 9 month program - is \$4,700 i.e. \$2,200 for Canada Student Loan and \$2,500 for an Alberta Student Loan.

#### - Grants -

If a student's financial need exceeds the maximum loan, additional funds may be available to him in the form of grants:

- i) Special needs groups such as single parents, and the disabled may be eligible to receive a Maintenance Grant to a maximum of \$6,000;
- ii) Students who have exceeded the loan maximum and have a demonstrated financial need may be eligible to receive a Supplemental Assistance Grant to a maximum of \$2,500;
- iii) Dependent students in need of financial assistance and whose program of study is not available within commuting distance of his parents' home and consequently must leave the parental home to attend a post-secondary institution may be eligible for an Educational Opportunity Equalization Grant to a maximum of \$1,800;
- iv) Students who require special assistance due to a physical or mental disability may receive a grant to a maximum of \$1,000.

### When Do I Repay My Loans...

While you are a full-time student, the government subsidizes you by paying the interest on your loans. Six months after graduation or withdrawal, you are required to consolidate your loans with the bank and begin repayment. Grants, on the other hand, are gifts from the province and are not repaid.

In order to reduce your financial debt, the Students Finance Board may repay on your behalf a portion of the funds that you are required to borrow for each year of full-time studies. These payments are called remission and under this program the Province may repay a maximum of 50 percent of loans issued in the first year of studies, 40 percent of loans issued in the second year, and 25 percent of loans issued in the third and subsequent years. Remission is contingent upon the Board being satisfied that you, and where applicable, your parents or spouse, have made a reasonable contribution towards your educational costs. Also, the Students Finance Board must be satisfied that you have demonstrated a serious effort in your academic pursuit. If these conditions have been met, the remission payment will be made after the loans are consolidated and will be applied against your outstanding debt.

### How Do I Qualify...

The financial assistance programs are based on your financial need. Their aim is to assist you with your living costs while you are a student. Generally, financial assistance covers your accommodation, food and

personal care, clothing, transportation, personal expenses, tuition and fees, books, supplies, instruments, and other costs relating to your program. In order to maintain a certain degree of equity in the administration of the program, the Students Finance Board has established an average monthly budget. For example, if you are single

and are living at home, you can expect your academic year to cost you approximately \$2,250 and \$5,355 if you are planning to live away from home. Remember, these figures represent your living costs only. You must also include your tuition and fees - \$445, plus the cost of books and supplies which varies with the program and may range from as low as \$50 to as high as \$2000 with the average cost ranging between \$250 to \$500. If government assistance is your only source of financial aid you are expected to keep your expenses within these budgets. For example, if you are living at home and have expenses of \$400/month, you must justify these expenses to the Students Finance Board if you wish to receive more than the maximum of \$250/month. The married student budget, without children, is approximately \$1,000/month, married student with one child, the budget is approximately \$1,255 and the single parent with one child, the budget is approximately \$1,025 (funds for daycare and/or babysitting are provided over and above the living allowance). Before applying for a student, the married student and the single parent are encouraged to discuss their financial need with a counsellor at the Students Finance Board or contact the Financial Aid and Awards Officer at NAIT.

### Points To Remember..

When applying for financial assistance do not request more than you need. Remember, a substantial portion of the assistance received must be repaid. Requests for extraordinarily large sums of money may simply delay your applications as the staff at the Students Finance Board will, in all probability, require additional detailed information from you as to why the funds are needed.

### Scholarships and Awards...

To encourage achievement and to provide financial assistance to students who are in need, a number of scholarships and awards are available to eligible students. The value of awards and scholarships vary between \$100 and \$3,000. Each program at NAIT has a certain number of awards assigned to it and the selection of the candidates is done by the Program Head. In addition, there are other awards and scholarships for which a student must apply and selection is done by a committee. One scholarship to keep in mind is the Louise McKinney Scholarship which has a value of \$3,000. The scholarship is based on academic excellence and to qualify you must be enrolled in a two year program.

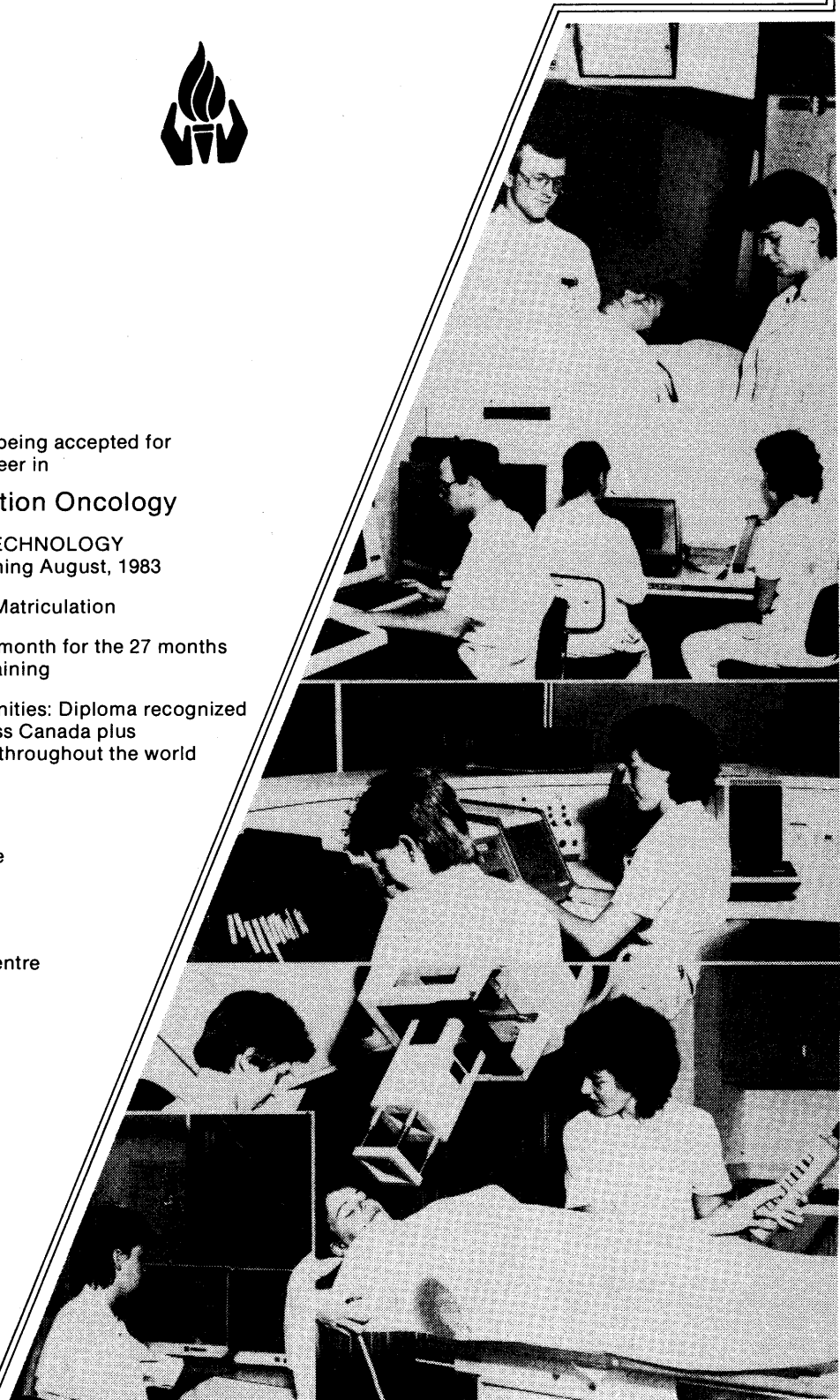

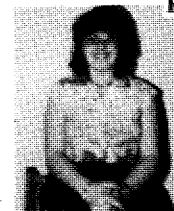

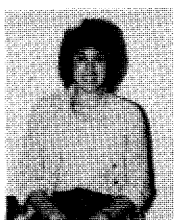


**MELIŠSA SÁNDULAK**

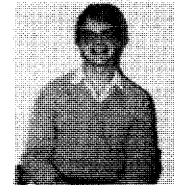
**CYRIL KARVONEN**

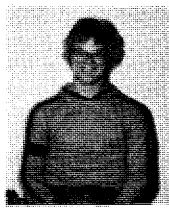


**ROBYN LEE**

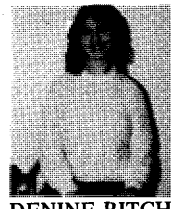


**KENNY BIERKOS**

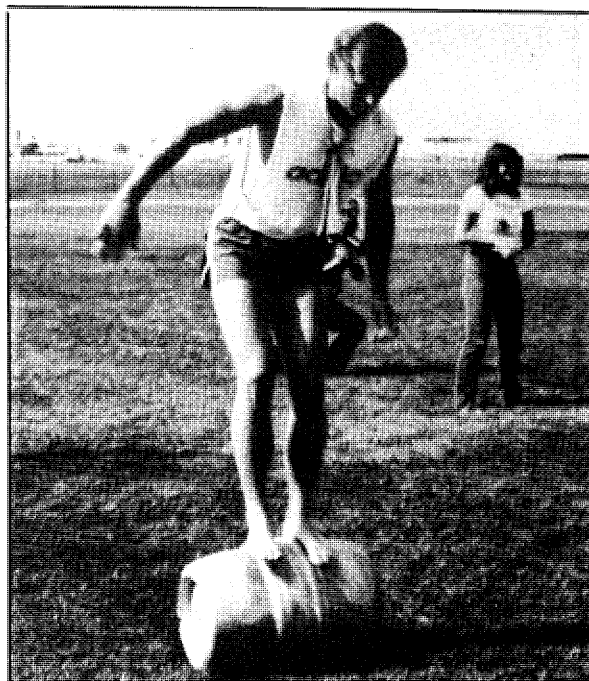

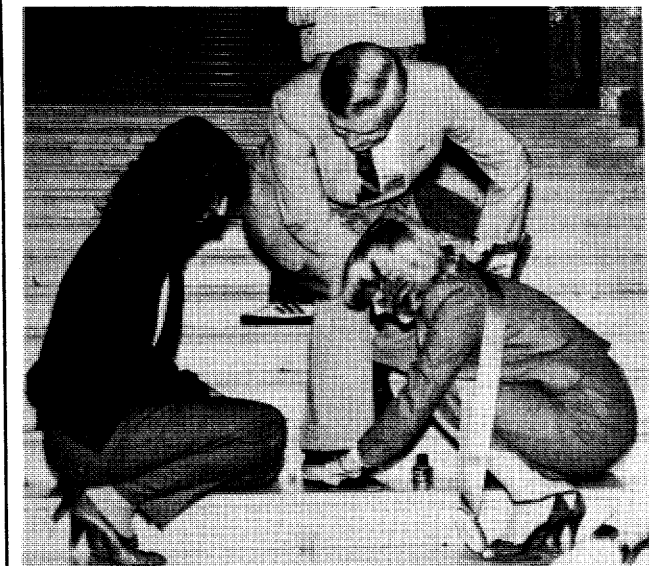

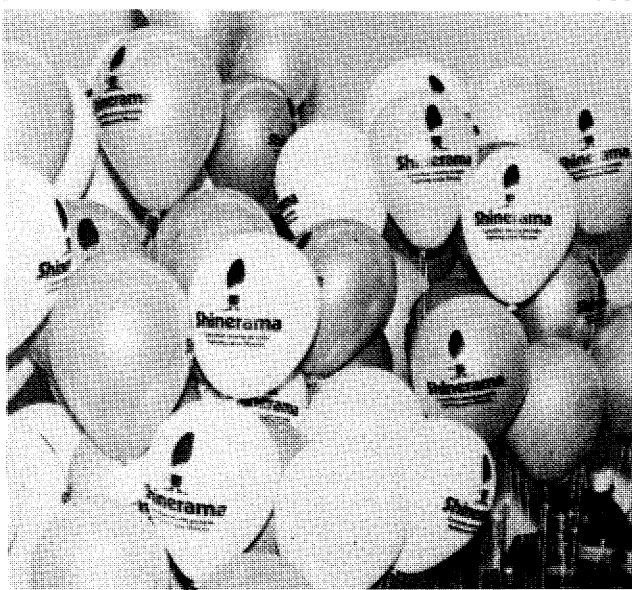


# SHINERAMA

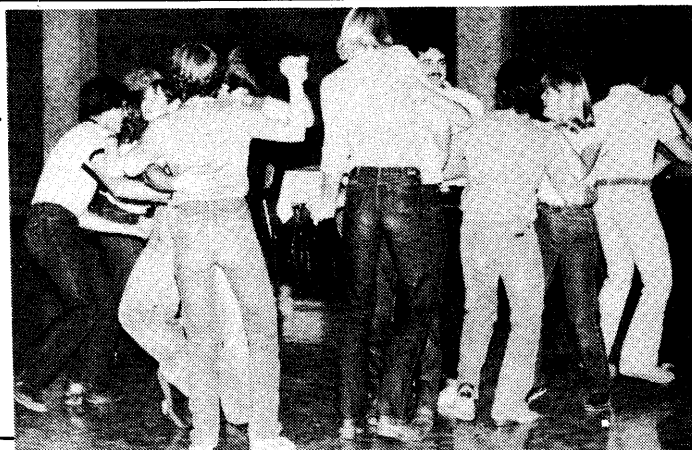

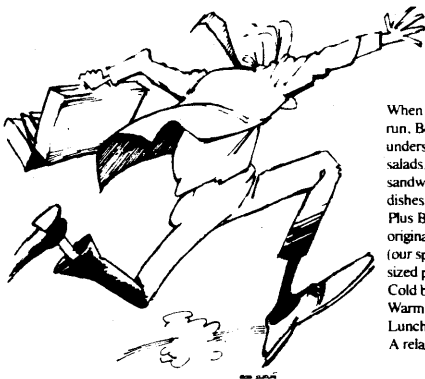


QUEENS

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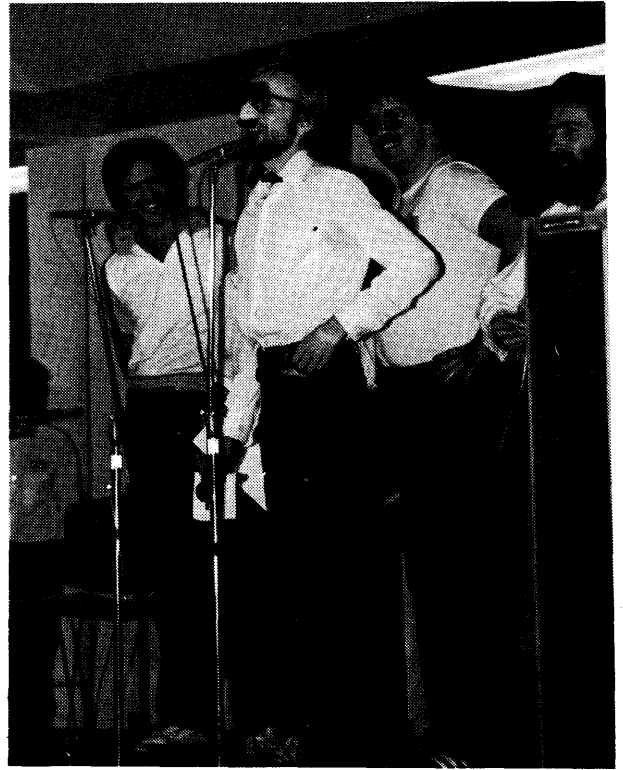

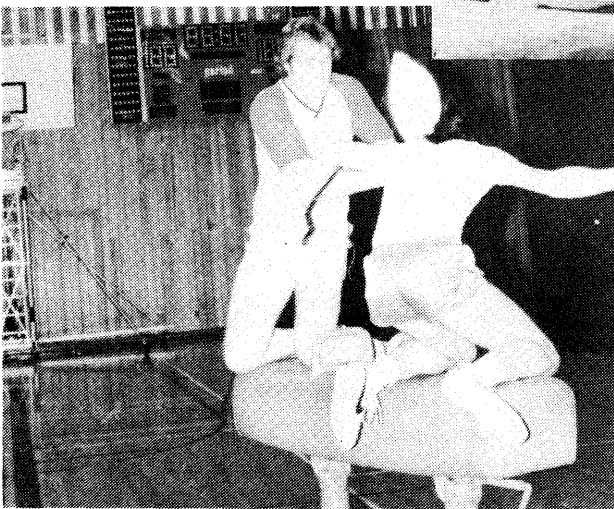


# TALENT SHOW

## SHEE MOOSE WEEK



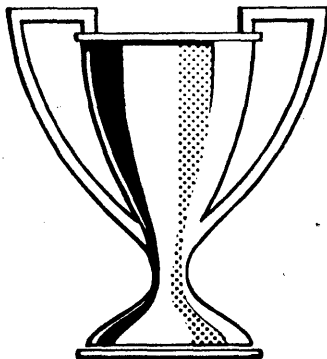

Animal Health Technology is a two year full-time program. Sixteen months of the course are spent at NAIT working in a small animal clinic atmosphere, while the final two months is spent at Fairview College working primarily with large animals.

Animal Health Technology is aimed at teaching the student such things as animal anatomy and physiology, instrumentation and terminology and anesthesiology. The course load is very heavy and anyone interested in becoming an Animal Health Technician student should have, at the very least a minimal background in biology and chemistry.

One of the prime concerns of the program is to actually experience working in a clinical situation. Here at NAIT we have our own clinic with three qualified veterinarians and two registered Animal Health Technicians to teach us. NAIT students and Instructors can bring their animals to us for treatment at a minimal charge.

The first year students have to take more theory than the second years but once a week some time is spent in the clinic doing physical examinations, vaccinations, and various other laboratory tests. As well, approximately three months is spent dissecting cats in the anatomy and physiology class. The second year students have the opportunity to study radiology, urinology and parasitology. They must also present a final report that they have worked on for almost two quarters. Surgery starts in the third quarter and continues until the two years are completed.

An Animal Health Technology graduate could find a very rewarding career working with animals in veterinarian clinics, animal hospitals or shelters, research institutes, laboratories or in government meat inspection plants. The course is interesting and exciting and although it requires a lot of hard work, going to NAIT can be very enjoyable. There are Rock and Talks, parties, Queen Week, cabarets and many other events that are all a lot of fun.

Biological Sciences involves a broad spectrum of courses in the first year of study. Courses such as statistics, zoology, botany, microbiology, and many more too numerous to be listed here, are offered. Chemistry goes hand in hand with Biology and thus plays an important part of the course.

Near the end of the first year, students are given the choice of three second year options. They are as follows:

Pollution and Environmental Sciences Option, Laboratory Option, and Ecology Option. Many field trips are arranged to familiarize the students with their chosen option in the second year and various guest speakers give lectures in areas of study not offered by the technology.

The graduate technologist may expect to find employment in a wide variety of fields. These include federal and provincial research and experimental stations, university departments, oil and chemical industries, veterinary clinics and laboratories,

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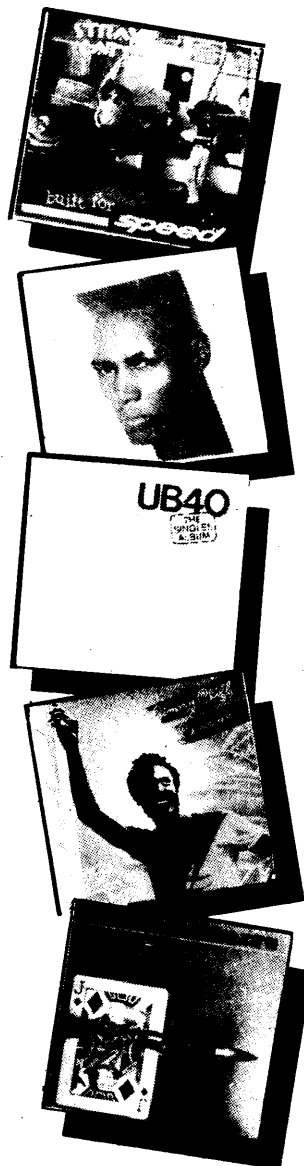
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agriculture, biological concerns, fisheries and wildlife, parks and recreation and many other areas. Prospective applicants are urged to communicate and make personal contacts with various biological agencies to familiarize himself with the potential of the market.

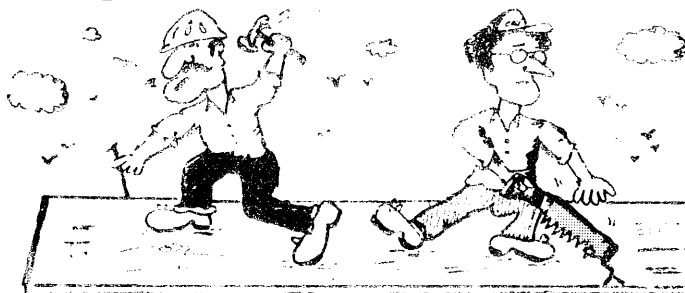
Graduates also have the opportunity to join the NAIT Biological Sciences Technologists Alumni Association.

## Civil Engineering

The objective of the Civil Engineering Technology program is to provide education to the level of Engineering Technologist to assist Engineers in various phases of engineering endeavour. A technologist functions at this level, as a member of the "Engineering Team" with a variety of duties. Graduates find employment in planning, estimating, design, construction, supervision and inspection in numerous areas such as land development, structural and residential construction and other activities involving engineering.

Although the course is very tough and time consuming, many leisure activities are put on by the Civil Engineering club. The club is voted in every year and are directly responsible for the clubs major activities which include:

Major cabarets - usually four a year with big name bands and generally an all round good time.

Horizontal Folk Dances - alias beer for members and escorts until everyone is horizontal.

## Commercial Baking

Do not get me wrong, you are doing different products so it is not repititious, it is just the skill that is used again.

The first 8 weeks is cake and decoration. The best part of this course is that it is very rewarding. our eyes, is what education is all about. Surprisingly, by the end of the eight weeks we were all proficient in producing attractive cakes.

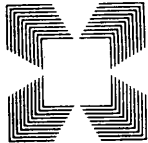

You get a midterm and final exam based on the theory of the course in each block.

Now where were we, oh yes, following pastry is eight "dough raising" weeks of breadmaking, following by 8 weeks of practical training in a local bakery and then completing this glorious one year course with advanced baking - I think this is where the teachers show off their fancier skills and hopefully some of their talents rub onto us.

Also included in this course is a NAIT Baker's Club membership. This entitles you to organize some fund raising ventures to enable the class, if interest is around, to go on a field trip to southern Alberta to visit course related factories, mills and bakeries.

The best way to find out more about this course is listen to our English accented department head and instructor on the career tape in NAIT's counselling office and/or coming to visit us for a day in the dungeon (oops, I mean bakery) and see for yourself how much hard work, fun, and excitement there is. We are a great class (so our teacher's tell us) and are willing to answer any questions or queries you have. We'll even get you to do some of our work for us.

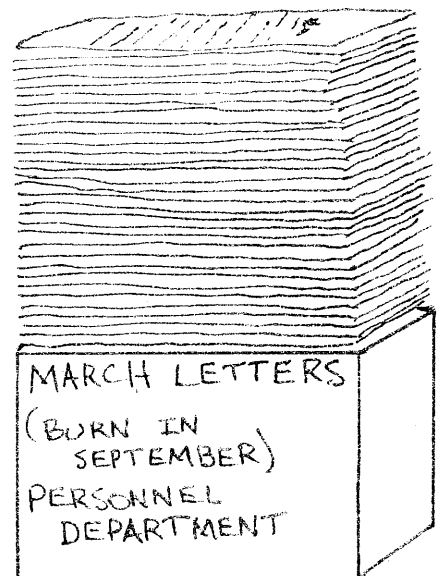
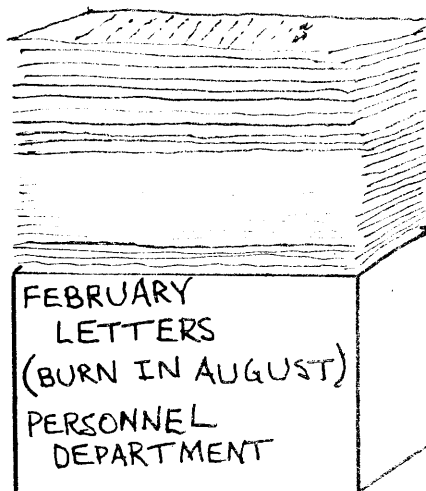

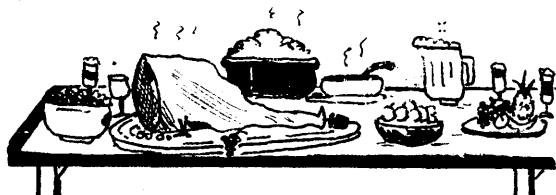

Petroleum Resources - study of petroleum exploration techniques.

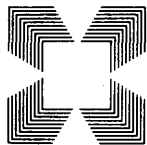

## **Electrical Engineering Technology**

## **Electronic Service Technician EDDT**

The two year Engineering Design and Drafting program is designed to prepare young men and women as engineering assistants, not only to produce drawings of other people's designs, but also to assist in the design process. The entering student need not be artistic. However, neatness and accuracy in drawing, calculating, and reporting are important skills. The graduates of the program are eligible for certification as Technologists with the Alberta Society of Engineering Technologists, after two years of suitable experience.

## **The Forest Technology Program**

Welcome to the world of Forest Technology. Generally speaking, forestry people manage two-thirds of Canada's land mass. Forest Technologists themselves contribute to the continuum of our most precious renewable resource, be it through employment in Forest Industry or Government . . . .

The Forest Technology program is a two-year course. The first year is at NAIT and the second year at the Forest Technology school at Hinton. A Forest Technologist Diploma is awarded to successful graduates.

It is a unique course in that it differs in the following respects from the other facilities at NAIT:

- Forest Technology operates on a semester system rather than the quarterly system.

- The "block" format of instruction means that an entire day is devoted to one course subject (allowing more time for field trips and labs).

- Field trips integrated into the course outline provide hands-on learning experience in such areas as timber measurements, aerial photo interpretation, basic surveying and more . . . .

- A four-week camp in the Swan Hills country during September of the first year is a requirement. At the camp students live in tent-frames, provide for and cook their own meals and learn basic forestry skills. The first year culminates in a 10 day spring camp, also in the Swan Hills country.

Prerequisites for enrollment consist of a Grade XII Diploma with pass marks in Math 30 or 33, English 30 or 33 and a Grade XII science, (i.e. Biology 30). Although 75 students are accepted into the program, traditionally there has always been more applicants than positions.

Fish and Wildlife is a second year option of the Forest Technology program and is currently under review by a sub-committee to the advisory council as to whether it will continue to be a part of the program. A decision is expected sometime this spring. It should be stressed here that the Technology is forest or "tree" oriented and not primarily Fish and Wildlife. Graduates of the Fish and Wildlife option have had weak to poor success with post-college employment, however Forest Tech graduates have had a 99.9 percent success ratio for seasonal and permanent employment, especially in the field of Timber Management.

Not only does this program offer a fulfilling and rewarding career in the medical field, it also provides a tremendous opportunity to become part of a dynamic group of people. Here you will make new friends, become involved in NAIT activities and really get to know yourself, as well.

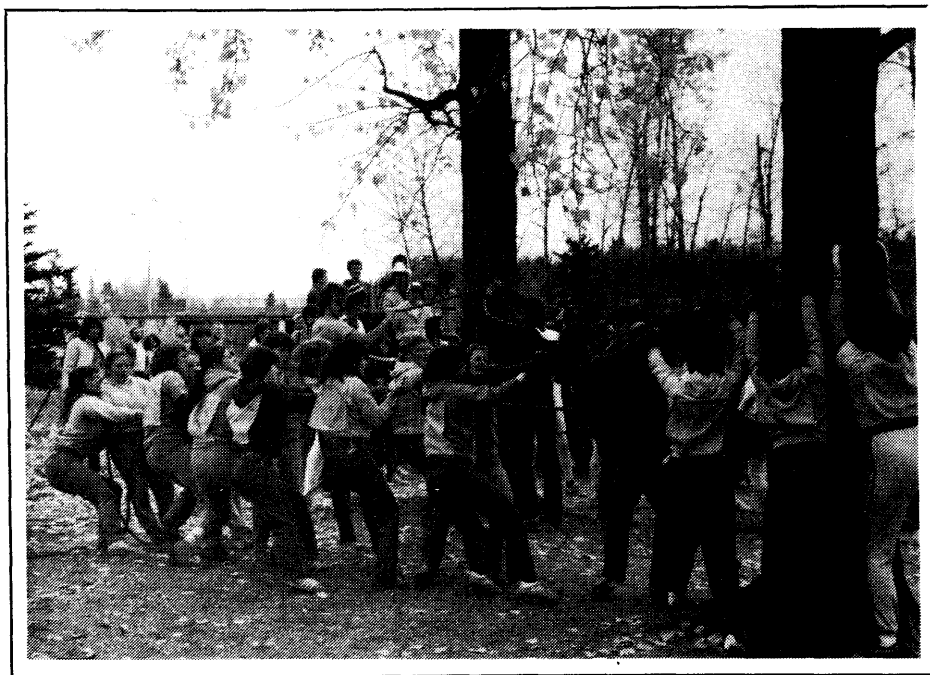
Besides attending classes, and keeping up with homework, you have the opportunity to become involved in Intramural Sports and a wide variety of extra-curricular events.

## Medical Laboratory Technology

NAIT is among a minority when compared to other western educational institutes. Most similar colleges and trade schools offer the Medical Laboratory Technology course as a three-year program whereas NAIT offers the same course on a two year basis.

The objective of the course is to prepare students to write a certification exam set up by a National Society of Laboratory Technologists. This certification then qualifies and registers the student to work in hospitals and clinics in any part of Canada. At NAIT, practical and theoretical education are combined.

The first year of the course is spent at NAIT. Here, the major disciplines of the medical laboratory are introduced: Microbiology, Histology, Blood Banking, Hematology and Clinical Chemistry. Along with these courses are nine others that provide information and understanding of all facets and procedures of the laboratory. Physical and Leisure Education is included in the curriculum to allow the students to become acquainted with the recreational facilities available.

The second year of the program is spent at an affiliated hospital. Practical and technical knowledge is applied as the training student learns routine and special tests. During this time, a monthly living allowance is provided. Upon successful completion of the second year, the student may write the national exam.

Job opportunities are good in the field of Medical Laboratory Technology as the medical profession and the need for people trained in health services is increasing. NAIT is an accredited institution that offers both top quality education and the chance to expand knowledge, and the opportunity to meet and make new friends.

## Paramedics

The Emergency Paramedic program is the newest program on the NAIT Campus. Thirty students were accepted in August 1981, into the two year program and will be the first graduating class in the spring of 1983.

The Emergency-Paramedic program is housed in NAIT Plaza Four. The students of this program are easily identified by their crisp white shirts, dark blue pants and ties.

The courses offered in the program are varied in content; anatomy and physiology, cardio vascular and neonatal emergencies, pharmlology, respiratory, micro biology, extrication and rescue just to name a few. Formal laboratory periods in different subjects compliment the lectures. Outside of the NAIT Campus the paramedic students have ambulance - field and hospital - based internship periods. Field trips to numerous outside agencies are also included.

No where in medicine is the element of adventure and challenge as powerful as in the sphere of pre hospital emergency care. The paramedic who ventures out into the field to render initial treatment at the scene of emergencies has tolike surprises, for no one knows what the next call will bring. This kind of work requires a special sort of temperament. Hours may pass without a call and then, right at the end of the shift, there are three cardiac arrests in a row, followed by an emergency child birth. The EMT - Paramedic must be able to perform effectively under the most difficult possible conditions; to improvise, to learn to laugh, and above all care.

It takes a great deal of study to become an emergency paramedic. in no other branch of medicine can one gain so much insight into the patient as a unique individual. One encounters the patient in his own setting, among his family, friends, or business associates, and one sees him in a way that is not possible in the hospital setting.

In order to gain an insight of what the emergency paramedic program has to offer, visit the display booth during NAIT open house. Students will be on hand to answer questions and demonstrate various paramedic skills.

## Radio and Television Arts

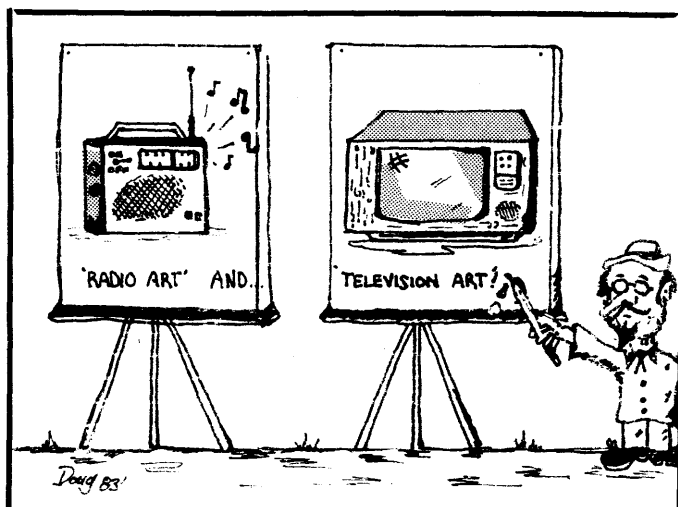
The Radio and Television Arts faculty is a small technology with a total enrolment of approximately 80 students. It is this smallness which lends a spirit of camaraderie and cooperation which is not found in many of the larger technologies. RTA students are engaged in a variety of activities throughout the day, and many of these depend on the students helping one another.

The first area of the course is mostly classroom training where students are expected to learn theory, history, and basic skills required later in the program. These courses also provide the student with a sound background knowledge that will be useful later in his/her career.

One of the many tasks that the students are expected to undertake, is the running of the NAIT radio station that will soon be broadcasting throughout NAIT. CHNR radio can be received on 101.7 Capital Cable and 99.5 Quality Cable every week day from eight in the morning until ten at night. The students are also expected to become adept in the areas of RADIO NEWS (instruction and practice in radio news reporting, writing, and presentation), RADIO CONTINUITY (spot announcements, music variety, documentary, dramatic programming, and client service), ANNOUNCING, RADIO PRODUCTION (logs, studio techniques, production of public service and commercial accounts).

There is also a daily news, sports, and weather show which is produced in the RTA television studios. The show is called 28:55, is aired on the cable network, and is well worth taking in, as it deals with many items of interest and concern to NAIT students. The studio facilities are also being used for other productions such as the Ukranian Children's Series which was recently taped here by ACCESS. The television Lab, which lasts 24 weeks consists of NEWS AND SPORTS (research, reporting and writing for daily news and weather features), WRITING (servicing accounts, writing commercials and public service sports, use of visuals, preparing scripts), GRAPHICS AND STAGING (lighting and set design, studio design), OPERATION (use of the studio equipment, production crews, switching), and finally PRACTICUM where students will be placed, where possible in the industry in the area of their choice.

If you have questions or would simply like to take a look around, feel free to come and visit us in the Industrial Technical Building at the North end of the main campus, first door at the end of the pedway.





## Surveying Technology

An applicant to NAIT's Survey Technology program can expect to gain a broad understanding of, and proficiency in applied survey science and its related disciplines. The course is a 2 1/2 year co-op program consisting of three 6-month terms of intensive study at NAIT alternating with two 6-month terms of employment in surveying or survey related fields. The Survey Technology program is unique in this respect, and this course format offers several distinct advantages.

The eighteen months of classroom study are broken down into three separate terms, so a student gets a "breather" and a chance to let the learning sink in, as well as a chance to apply what he/she has learned to a job situation. The money earned during the summer work term significantly helps to pay a student's room and board during the winter, so Survey Technology is a financially viable program, too. The work terms allow the student to become familiar with the job market before graduation, and prospective employers know that a graduate from this program has at least one year of job experience, making him/her a very hireable individual.

Areas of study include mathematics, physics, photogrammetry, cartography, computer programming, and technical communications in addition to survey theory and calculations, cadastral and engineering surveys, geodesy, drafting, and subdivision design. Each class spends one day each week outdoors practising field methods.

The directions a graduate may take are many and varied. Some of the more common areas are: engineering surveys, cadastral (legal property boundaries) surveys, topographic (mapping) surveys, hydrographic (Bodies of water) surveys, exploration surveys, and geodetic surveys.

Any young man or woman with an affinity for applied mathematics, precise, methodical work, and the great outdoors is likely to find a career in surveying to be rewarding.

The theme of our open house display this year is "Surveying: Past and Present". Surveying is an old science, and surveyors were at the forefront of the exploration and settlement of this country. Today surveying and related professions are at the forefront of technological change utilizing lasers, radio and microwave transmission, remote satellite sensing and computers.

## Respiratory Technology

To prospective students attending NAIT Open House.

Respiratory Technology is one of the fastest expanding professions in the medical field. There is a growing demand for qualified techs, and the job opportunities all over the country, and if you so desire all over the world are virtually unlimited.

The course which NAIT presently offers is a two year program which consists of: One year at NAIT for the theory side of the profession. The second year is a type of internship at a predetermined hospital where you put the theory you have learned in the first year into practical application towards patients in the hospital that have some type of respiratory disorders.

Requirements for this program are a grade 12 High School Diploma with at least two 2 sciences. Preferably Physics 30 and Chemistry 30 as this course requires a sound basic understanding of concepts in physics.

A career in this vastly expanding field can be very rewarding to the individual who enjoys working with and helping people.
