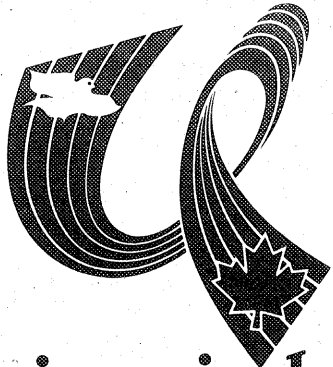
Dear Chem-Tech:

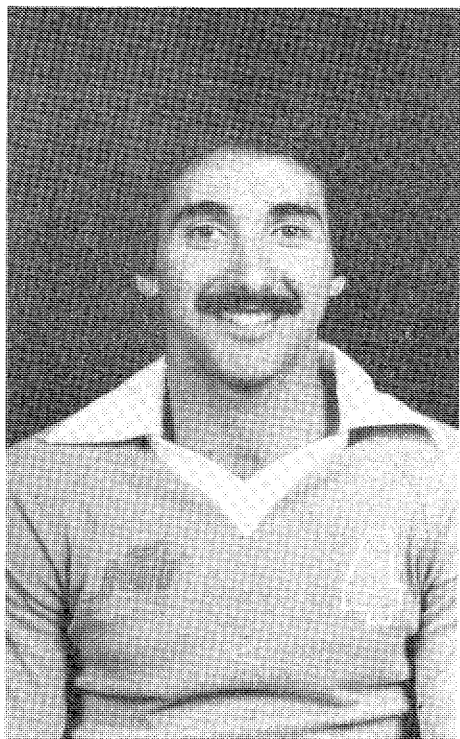
NAIT Has 3 Students Named To The All Canadian Teams

When the name NAIT is mentioned everyone thinks of a place which is noted for its great academic achievements. This past week we also proved what great athletes and athletic programs are at this institute of higher knowledge. We placed three players on the ALL CANADIAN teams. These people are deemed the best in their sport in the province and the team represents the best athletes in the country. These outstanding individuals are: Diane Proctor in womens volleyball, Loris Campagnolo in mens volleyball, and Cleo Rowein in hockey. The coaches of each team nominate the player that they feel has been the most valuable to the team for

the season. The coaches from all the colleges vote in their own sports and are not allowed to vote for their own player. These votes are sent to the CCAA, Canadian Colleges Athletics Association, head office in Ottawa. They tally the votes and select the All Canadian team with one athlete coming from each of the conferences in each sport. The honored athletes are invited to Toronto from March 23 to March 27. During this time the athletes will attend the opening ceremonies banquet at Humber College. The athletes are honored at the banquet and given an award for their outstanding achievements. For the rest of trip the athletes attend

the CCAA championships which are taking place at various locations in Toronto. As Irwin Strifler, NAIT co-ordinator of intercollegiate athletics, put it, "These three individuals are great athletes, great students academically and are a credit to themselves, NAIT, the ACAC and the sport they represent. They will be tremendous ambassadors in Toronto". The only thing that can be added to this is "Congratulations on a great individual effort", enjoy the trip you have earned it.

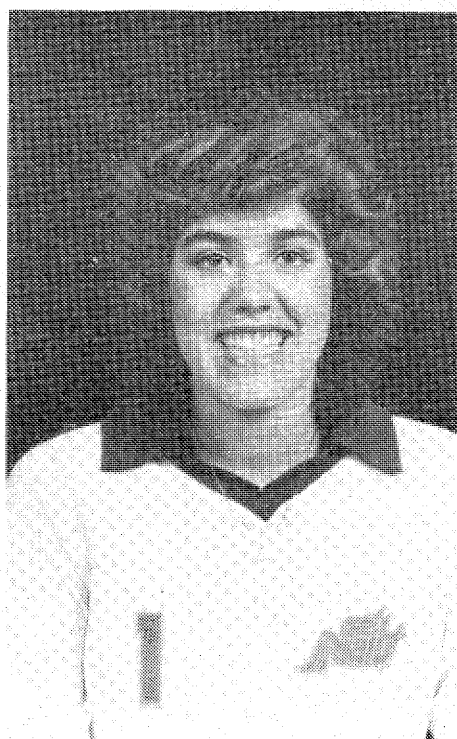

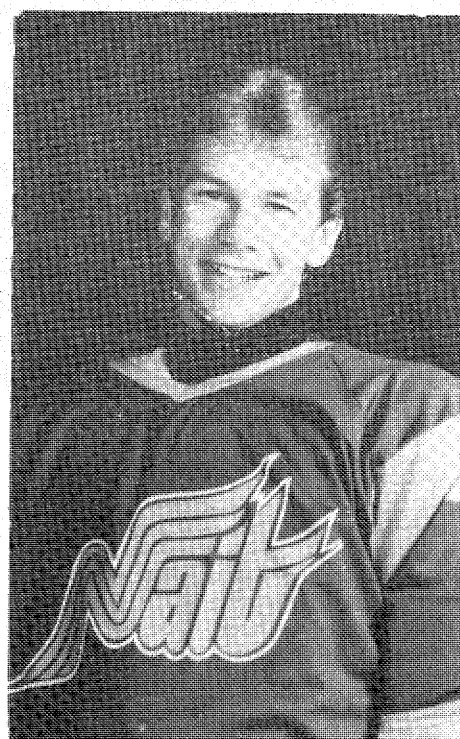
Although we are forced to give up the trophies the team captured last year the trip to Calgary was not a complete failure. A few team members were happy with the outcome, knowing they did their best.

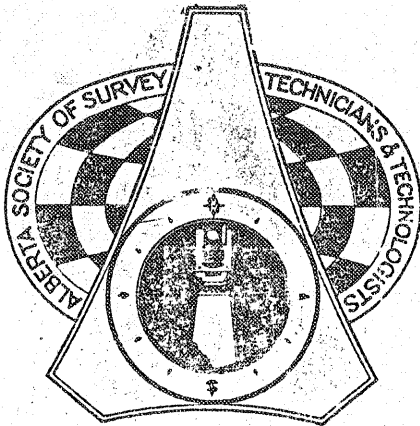

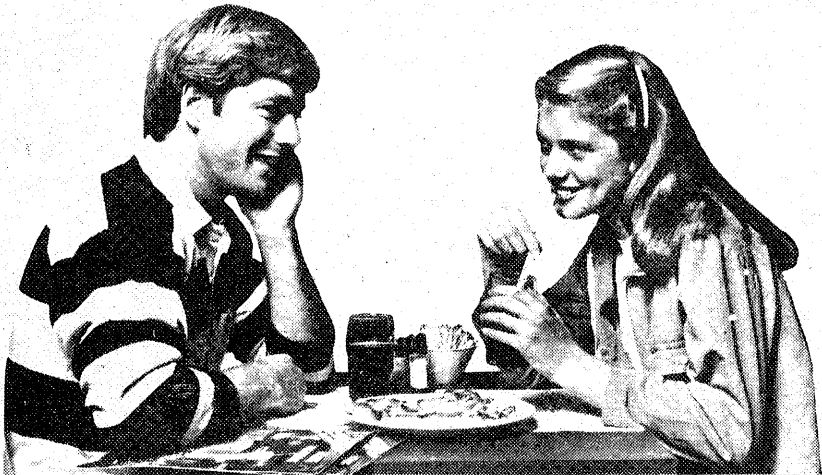

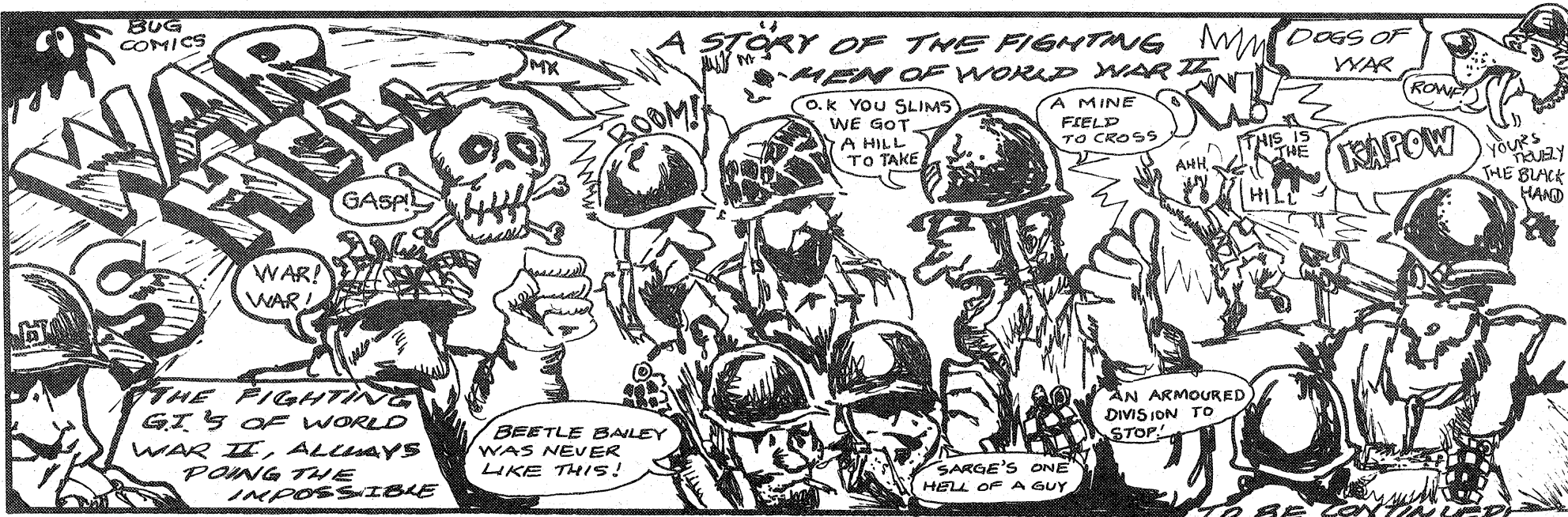

Those responsible for placing the Architectural Technology sign from Open House on the lawn of city hall were working under direct orders from a technology president. Now who do you think that could be?

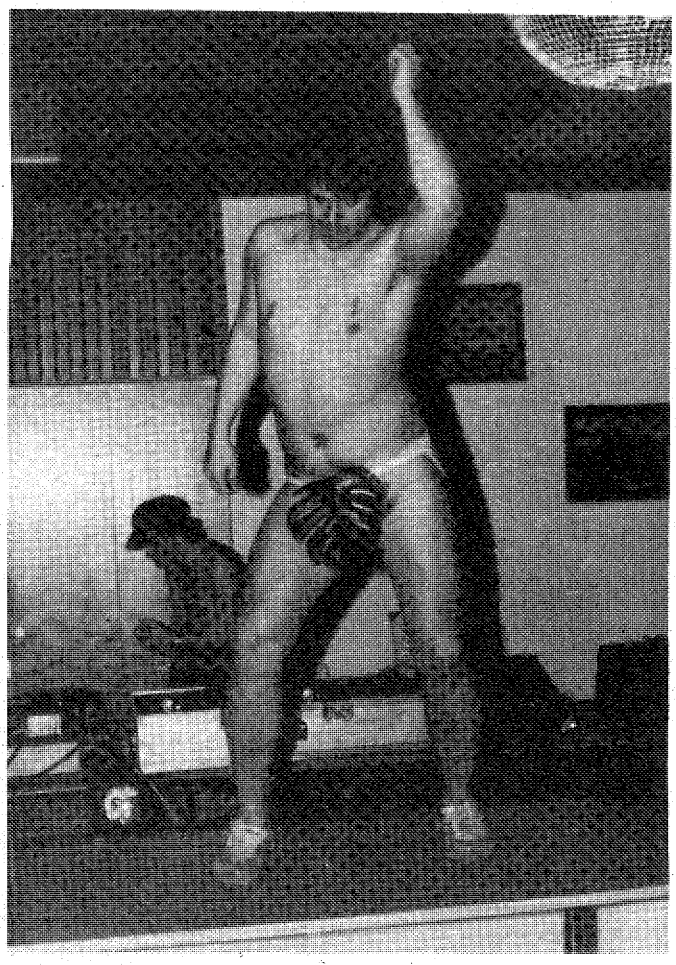
Rumor Has It...
