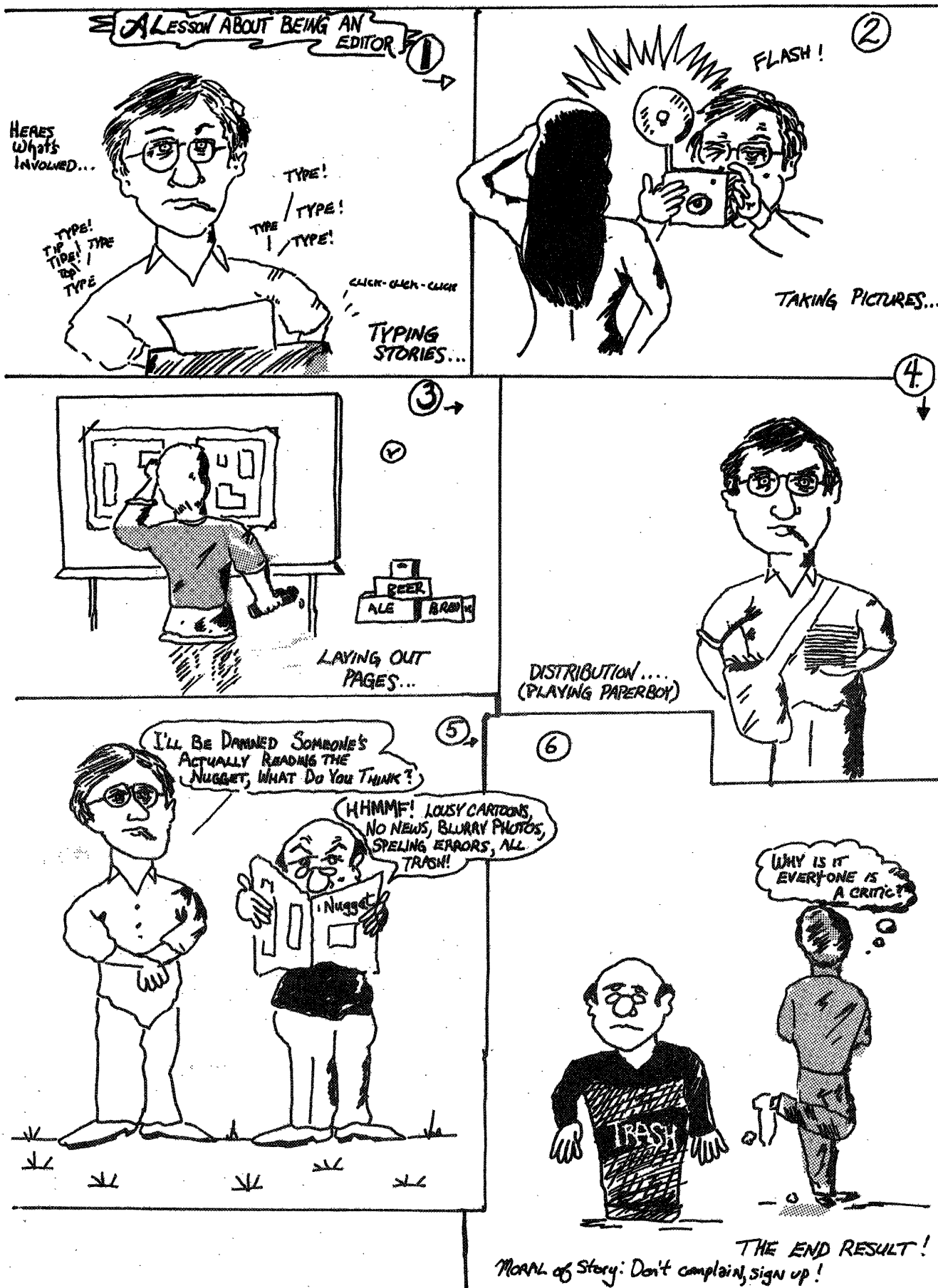

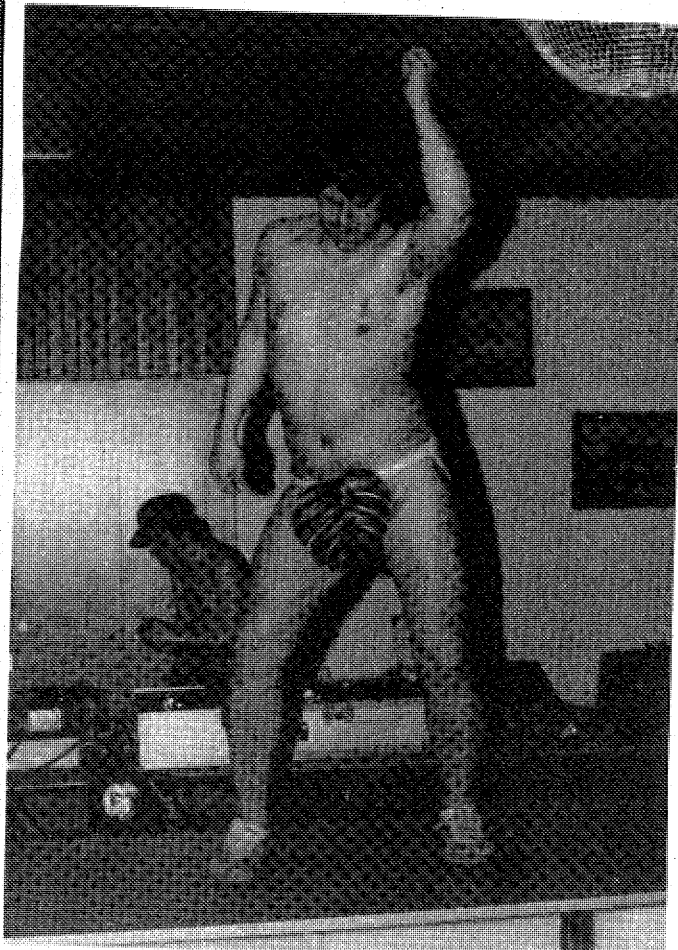

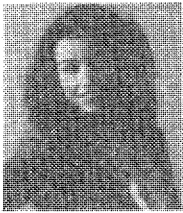
ELECTION RESULTS

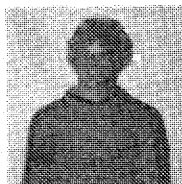

IABC Hosts Seminar on Job Searching

On Thursday March 24, there was a seminar held in the north conference room on How To Find A Job In A Tight Economy. The conference was hosted by a new group to the school, The International Association of Business Communicators. The group is a joint chapter with Grant MacEwan and is the first student chapter in Canada. The IABC is an international group that is growing quickly and gaining recognition in the fields of advertising, public relations and generally all business people. The head office is in San Francisco and in Edmonton the group meets in the City of Edmonton Building. The vice president of the students branch is from NAIT. According to her the first year has been very successful and they are hoping for continued success next year. They are looking for more members and will be having a recruitment drive in the fall hoping for more student participation.

The seminar was held in the conference room just behind the north cafeteria. There was a charge of \$3 for members and \$5 for non-members. There were over forty people in attendance to hear the three speakers ideas on how to find employment in a tight economy. The speakers were Marlene Emerson, a student councillor here at NAIT, Marg Pullishy, a communications consultant and freelance reporter, and Don Savaria, a consultant for the regional task force of the federal government. Each of the speakers spoke for about twenty minutes and covered a number of areas. The overall atmosphere was positive and encouraging. Some of the points that were brought out were; look beyond your school achievements to your personal strong points, be positive, be persistent, don't take any position that you are not qualified for, and don't forget that 80 percent of the jobs that are out there are not being advertised. The crowd listened very attentively to all three speakers and after the speeches they got involved in a question session. The evening was both informative and entertaining and the free refreshments that were available afterwards were well received by the audience. On the whole the message for the evening was don't give up hope. The job market will pick up but it may take some time. If the IABC sounds like your type of group I am sure that with a little looking you can find a person to enroll you.

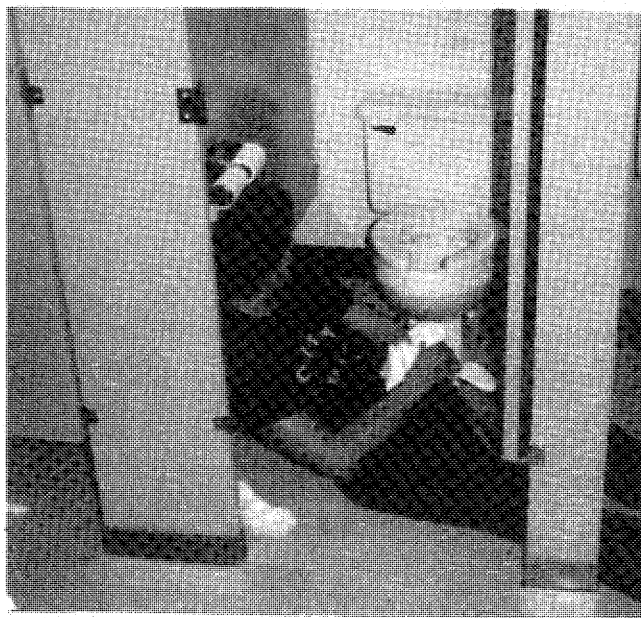

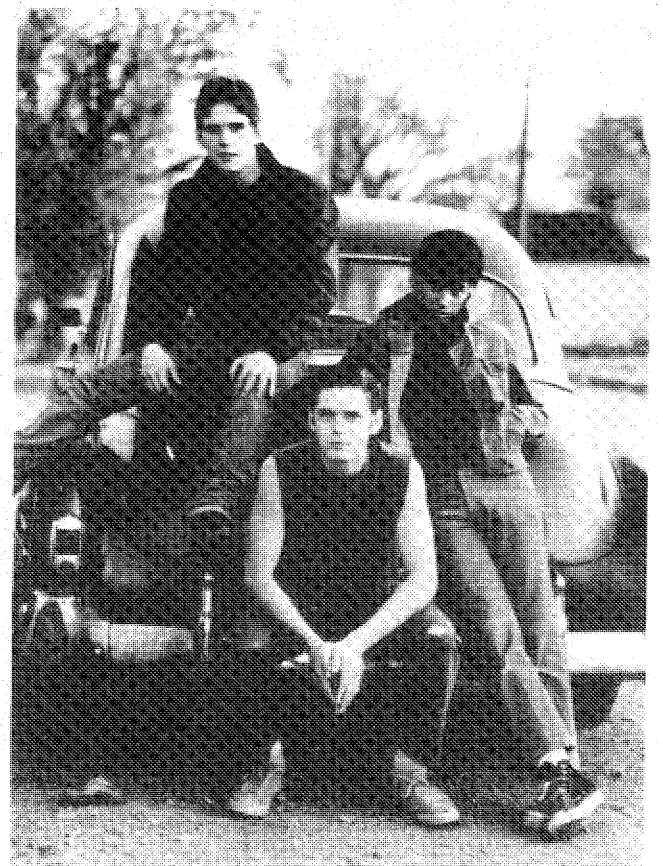

S.E. Hinton's classic novel about youth and belonging to a group is now a full length movie. The director, Francis Ford Coppola of Apocalypse Now fame, does a good job of moving quickly through the story but still goes into enough detail for you to develop feelings for the characters portrayed in the show. They are pulled out but two of them are sent to hospital in critical condition. The local papers call them heroes but the rival gang doesn't and set up a retaliatory rumble. The movie stays very close to the book and if you liked the book you should enjoy the film. It is one of the few films out there that makes you sit down and think after you leave the theatre.

So he could play my part

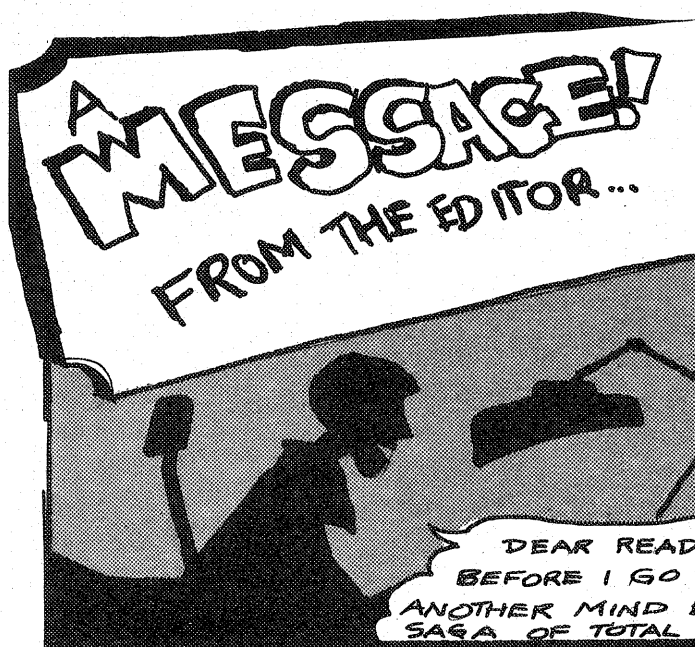

IN RETROSPECTIVE

The NAIT Ooks 1982-83 Hockey Season ended two weeks ago as the Ooks dropped the ACAC Final to the Red Deer College Kings, three games to one.

The year was one of mixed feelings. During training camp, the Ooks were hopeful and optimistic about the season. For most of the season, the Ooks were almost invincible and acquired confidence. The Ooks became frustrated after a defeat, and the team became more determined to win the next time.

Although the Ooks did not appear to be as strong a the 1981-82 edition in training camp, certain characteristics, like persistence, talent, and teamwork helped bring NAIT Ooks respect from the other franchises in the ACAC.

Reflecting on the 1982-83 edition of the Ooks, Coach Perry Pearn stated, "I was relatively pleased with the team's performance this season. Naturally, I was disappointed in our showing against Red Deer. We had the potential to beat the Kings, but the breaks did not come our way. This fact was evident in the last game, where we outplayed Red Deer and dropped a 4-3 decision. The Kings are a good club who won the series by capitalizing on their chances."

Going into the season, the NAIT Ooks were comprised of 8 veterans and 12 rookies. Questions were raised as to how the rookies would do in ACAC play. Following the season, Coach Pearn commented, "I was extremely pleased with the performance of the rookies."

The improvement of rookie Garth Hayes during the year was exceptional. In the last half of the season, Garth played an integral role in the Ooks checking game. One of the most consistent NAIT players this season, center Randy Repchuk exemplified great two way play throughout the year. On the blue line, rearguard Warren Sanregret experienced his best season as an Ook leading all defencemen with 34 points. Three Ooks were honoured with all-star selections in 1982-83. Former Lethbridge Bronco, Cleo Rowein turned in steady performances in the NAIT goal and was named the All-Canadian netminder. Cleo also occupied the goal-tending position on the first team of the ACAC All Stars with a 3.57 avg. A pair of NAIT Ooks were named to second team of the ACAC All Stars. Blueliner Dean Burles made an impressive showing in his rookie ACAC season with his all-round ability. Captain Gary Hoekstra joined Dean on the second team. Gary notched 23 goals on the season, tops on NAIT.

There is no doubt the Ooks will have a strong base to build from next year. With a good turnout of quality players at training camp in fall, the Ooks should once again be challengers for the ACAC title.

Overall, the Ooks were 28-15-2 this year compared with a 29-16-2 record in 1981-82. In exhibition play during 1982-83, NAIT compiled 9 wins, 4 losses and 2 ties, while they had 10 wins, 4 losses, and 0 ties in the season previous. In 1981-82, NAIT accumulated a 14-8-2 mark in regular season play picking up 18 points in their last 12 matches. This season the Ooks finished in second with a 16-8-0 record, and brought home 14 points in the last half. The Ooks 1981-82 playoff record was 5-3. In 1982-83, the Ooks were 3-3 in post season play.

High points of the 1982-83 season included an exhibition win over the Bonnyville Pontiacs (4-3) and a 2-2 overtime tie with the University of Alberta Golden Bears. NAIT had the lowest goals against average in the ACAC at 4.00. NAIT completely dominated three clubs, MRC, SAIT, and CLC racking up a 17-3 record against the trio in regular season and playoff action. In the first round of post season play, NAIT scored two come-from-behind wins over CLC 3-2 and 6-4 to advance into the ACAC Final.

1982-83 was also an exciting year for the ACAC Hockey League as a whole. The Mount Royal College Cougars rejoined the league and showed signs of becoming a competitive squad although they finished with an 0-24 mark. The Sait Trojans came in a disappointing fourth in what might be the swan song for Coach Bob Moore. Sait made the headlines this year when they travelled to China to meet the stones. The Camrose Lutheran College Vikings under rookie Coach Mike Johnston were the most improved club in the league from the 1981-82 season and could be a power to reckon with next season. The Red Deer College Kings were on a roll all season having luck as their seventh player on the ice. In addition to their trip to the USSR, RDC had the longest winning streak of the ACAC season-17 games.

ON THE BENCH: The Red Deer College Kings could not keep the Canadian title in Alberta as they were defeated by St. Hyacinthe 4-1 in the National Championship game last Saturday in Willowdale, Ontario...The great spectator turnout the NAIT Ooks received during the playoffs was especially satisfying. At this time, the NAIT Ooks would like to thank the fans, the media, the NAIT administration and all those associated with NAIT Hockey for the support during the 1982-83 season and look forward to seeing you this fall.

RECORD REVIEW

One of Canada's premier solo folk-pop, singer song-writers has come out with his 14th album. The title of the album is "The Trouble With Normal", and the artist is Bruce Cockburn. The album does not contain any giant hits like "tokyo" but it is another solid effort by a very consistent musician. He has again displayed his great lyrical talents and is at his creative best in the songs, "Hope Dancer, Going Up Against Chaos", and "Waiting For The Moon". His lyrics are so efficient that they bring to mind images of past experiences so clearly that you

feel you could reach out and grab them. The music is not up to the usual Cockburn level. There are a lot of repeated riffs and an overkill of the catchy phrases. This album seems like a more experimental effort which may result in permanent changes in Cockburn's style. I would classify the music as couch music. It's the kind of soft melodic tunes you like to hear at 2am when you are on the couch with the lights down low and talking to that special someone. If you are not into head banger rock this may be an album that you might like to pick up. There is already a single off

the album, The Trouble With Normal, climbing the charts on the local radio stations. This song will give you a good idea of the type of music that the rest of the album contains.

This album will be supported by a Canadian tour which will bring Cockburn to Edmonton to play the Jubilee on May 20. I would not be surprised to see Cockburn collect another award at the Juno's this year. In his career so far he has already collected 25 major music awards and surely will add to this total in the future.

The little tuddy bear is out to get all those skate-a-thoners who have yet to come through with the loot. Word to the wise-get the money in before she blackens your eyes.

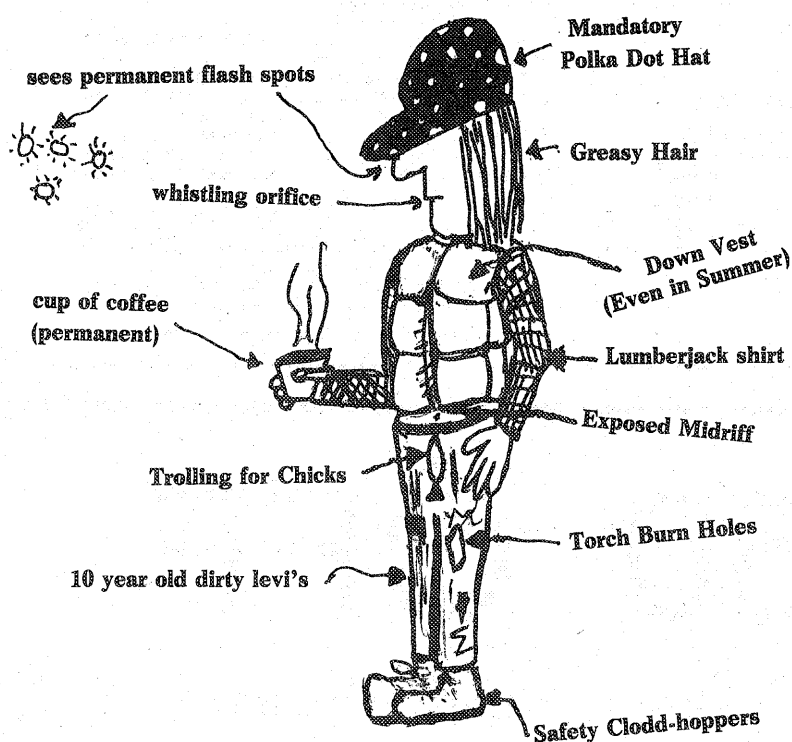
