SENATE REFORM

2. Speaking of reporting directly back to the people, the representative would of course be directly responsible to the people. If he doesn't do his job, then he can be voted out by the people.



5. Changes could occur more readily.

Under this system, with the Senate having more power than the House of Commons. There would probably be a power struggle between the Senate and House constantly. What system would be used in electing the representatives into the Senate? There would be the party system probably which if there was a different party in the House of Commons, there would be a clash of ideology. But, there there is no way of getting around this because of the enormous amount of money in the various political parties. They wouls run their own candidate and so would other parties. Again, once they were in there if they didn't follow the ideology, in the next election they wouldn't be re-elected by the party that finaced there election. Although, the Senate needs definite reforming, the problem is how to get a new Senate in there and by whom.





LETTERS To The EDITOR:

In response to last weeks comments in the nuclear arms race, I would like to clarify and elaborate on some points. The concept of Mutually Assured Destruction has evolved into a situation where the defender is responsible for large losses of life. With the increased accuracy of Multiple Independently-targeted Re-entry Vehicles (MIRVs) it is possible for an attacker to select specific targets, like missile silos, and destroy a defender's Intercontinental Ballistic Missile(ICBM) force with only a portion of his ICBM's,. The options left to the defender are surrender or respond with Sea-Launched Ballistic Missiles(SLBMs). But the SLBMs are not accurate enough to hit specific targets like ICBM silos and are targeted on the attacker's cities. If the SLBM are launched, then the attaker will launch his remaining ICBMs and his SLBM on the defender's cities. This is the situation we face now. With the level of technology we have now it is possible to destroy about 702 of a nation's ICBMs and about 252 of a nation's SLBMs but with the systems being developed this level will change drastically.

The missiles deployed in Europe, by the United States, are there by request of the European governments. European nations, except for Britian and France, have no means of nuclear deterrent to Soviet nuclear and conventional forces. The tactical missile, Pershing II, being deployed in Europe, by the United States, is actually replacing existing obsolete systems on a one-to-one bases. I personally think that the replacement of 400 kiloton warheads with 20 kiloton warheads is a postive step towards limiting civilian casualties and increased arms reduction. It should be pointed out that the Pershing II missile could reach Moscow only if the Soviets move Moscow 1000 kilometres west.

In the past few years I have heard many things said of the cruise missile. In my opinion the cruise missile is the device capable of breaking the Mutually Assured Destruction stalemate. The cruise missile gives a nation the option of a very accurate second-strike capability. This leads to the possibility of a limited nuclear exchange with only military targets engaged. I am sure that everyone would prefer a limited nuclear exchange to a total nuclear war. The cruise missile is not a first-strike system because it flies too slow and is easily destroyed when detached. There is one important fact that everyone overlooks about the cruise missile which is that it is only a delivery system. It is no different than an aircraft or a gun. It just has specialized characteristics. Being a delivery system, the cruise missile can be used for tasks other than strategical nuclear bombing. The cruise missile can be armed with a conventional warhead and used against airfields, communication centres, industrial centres, and ships.

In my opinion, trying to blame the cruise missile for starting a nuclear war is like blaming aircrashes on dirty windshields. It is just a very small part of a very large picture. The nuclear weapons will not destroy us on their own. No, it is people who are responsible for wars. I suggest that if you want world peace that is everlasting, then one must change the people's view about each other. If people are not big enough to look past petty needs, wants, desires, and prejudices then there really is no hope.



Specifically, I hate "The Brick" commercials. I also despise the commercials for "California Waterbeds" (I wish someone would shoot their spokesman for ninety-nine dollars, or 199, or 299, or 399...). In fact, there are very few commercials that are worth sticking around in the same room for when watching any show on commercial television. So, one usually has two options--change the channel, or go to the refrigerator for something to replace what you lost the last time Mike Bell was on.

Fortunately, for those who do not have a full icebox and for those who hate wasting their time on commercials, someone came out with a bright idea a few years ago: sell video recorders to the public. Since then, VCRs have been used for everything from taping a Grey Cup game to beginning a library of the Jacques Cousteau specials. But the best use for video recorders is for watching commercial television.

Consider this for a moment: Each one hour you watch oncbc, CTV, or the three American commercial networks has about eight minutes of commercials. If you're an average North American, this means you waste more that an hour of the six hours per day you watch of television. There ought to be a better way to spend your time(especially if you have classes, assignments, and finals to work for). If you're an addicted videoit, then a video recorder just might help you get that extra time you need to study for.

VCRs are time-savers especially in that you can fast-forward through the commercials and (if necessary) the opening and closing credits. You can also skim through a show to get to the part(s) that you are interested in (such as watching only the goals scored in the Oiler hockey games). Better yet is when there are transmission problems--instead of sitting there waiting for the technician to push the right button, do a fast forward on a video tape recording to the point where the picture comes back.


Indeed, the time-saving possibilities do not end there. Sony has just released a new model that has two forms of fast search. One is the normal form that those of us with Betas are used to: 20-or-so times normal speed. The other form is 2 times normal speed, WITH sound. Although I haven't been able to see the machine, I suspect that the worst effect would be to hear everyone sound more like Alvin and the Chipmunks than their usual tone of voice. Thus, if you feel you need to be able to watch an entire one-hour show in thirty minutes, this new machine would be for you.

Finally, there's another advantage to having a video recorder. During those weeks when you simply cannot afford to watch any television(final exams arae coming up, remember?), a video recorder allows you to tape the shows that you should watch (like "Nova", "60 Minutes", and "Hill Street Blues") so that you can view them later at your convenience. The only problem you should try to avoid, however, is needing to spend a significant portion of your lunch money on more videotapes-only a true videoit follows the advice of one of SCTV's characters and tapes everything.
