



EDITOR'S NOTE

Albert's third institute of technology, Westerra Institute of Technology, will be officially opened at a ceremony in Stony Plain on Wednesday, November 9,1983, at 7:00p.m. The Minister of Advanced Education, Dick Johnston, and the M.L.A. for Stony Plain, Bill Purdy, will attend the inaugural celebration to be held in Westerra's General Services Building.

Westerra's 157 acre campus is located approximately six kilometres southeast of the Stony Plain overpass on Highway 16. Construction of the 10,100 square metres General Services Building commenced in November, 1982. The total cost was \$12,163,000 and the facility was completed on schedule and within budget in September, 1983.

During the first academic year Westerra Institute of Technology is expected to accommodate approximately 1,300 apprentices. Currently 150 students are participating in the Institute's Boilermaker, Steel Fabricator, Printing and Graphic Arts, Insulator, Electrician and Steamfitter-Pipefitter programs. An additional 20 students are enrolled at Westerra's Edmonton campus where Roofer and Floorcovering apprenticeship programs are taught. The Institute is expected to employ a total of about 100 staff by June, 1984.

It was in April, 1980, that the Alberta Government first announced its decision to establish a major technical and trades institute in the Edmonton region and to expand apprenticeship facilities within existing colleges throughout the Province. Seventeen communities submitted proposals, and Stony Plalin was selected as the site for the new technical and trades institute.

Four major factors were identified as having a bearing upon the successful establishment and operation of the proposed institute. The structure must be located in reasonable proximity to the student population; students must be able to travel easily between their places of residence and the institution; the institute must be located close to industrial activity; and the community must be large enough to accommodate the institution without loss of its own identity. The decision to place the institute outside Edmonton was consistent with in Government's policy to decentralize major provincial facilities. In July, 1982, Westerra Institute of Technology became a board-governed institution.



It is a gruesome

Imagine, if you will, Barbara Frum interviewing whoever was involved in the developing slituation. "Tonight on 'The Journal', we'll talk with this high-level government figure in Moscow, and to this member of the United States' Chiefs of Staff. Mr. Vladimir, is that a bomb shelter you're in?..." Or, if the situation became terribly serious, imagine Barabara Walters having a last "up close and personal" interview with Carl "I hope the insects will do better" Sagan and Jerry "at least we'll be rid of the Commies" Falwell. One can imagine Sam Donaldson getting a last few words about the American way of life, or Walter Cronkite muttering, for the last time, "that's the way it is...."

Hopefully, the closest we will ever come to nuclear war being on television will be this Sunday night, when ABC will broadcast "The Day After". There has been some controversy about this film, which will be broadcast at nine on Sunday night, and there will be more controversy in the weeks ahead. However, I think it will be well worth taking some time out from studying for your finals to see what the headlines and announcements might be like in the days leading up to the Big Blast. (And don't forget to run for the river valley if a real "Special News Report" comes on the air.)

"Silkwood" stars Meryl Streep and Kurt Russel in a story based on the personal and professional struggles of Karen Silkwood, who died in a mysterious car crash in 1974 while she was attempting to expose the dangers in the plutonium plant in which she worked.

DEAL OF THE CENTURY

"Deal of the Century"--written by Paul Brickman and starring Chevy Chase, Sigourney Weaver, and Gregory Hines. Director William Friedkin sharply focuses his cameras on a subject yet to be dealt with on the big screen: the strange, complex world of the international

Later, in his rundown room overlooking the town square, Muntz pitches with the panache of a hardcore hockster. Out of his sample bag come the wares of warfare: German-made HK-91 assault rifles--used only once during the misguided Yemen revolt; nastly little Dragon Teeth Mines; assorted pistols; and his piece de resistance, The Tankbuster, complete with ammunition. Muntz enumerates the Tankbuster's fine points. The heat-sensing scope through which he peers reveals a military jeep parked across the square. Like a vacuum cleaner salesman who sprinkles dirt on a carpet, Muntz learned early never to underestimate the power of a demonstration.

He pulls the trigger and disintegrates the vehicle. The

"Deal of the Century" tells the story of Luckup Industries all-out effort to sell The Peacemaker, a state-of-the-art high-tech, multi-million dollar "ultra" weapon that flies without a pilot and kills without a

When The Peacemaker begins to act like a lemon, Luckup marketing V.P. Frank Stryker(Vince Edwards) recruits small-time arms hustler Eddie Muntz(Chevy Chase) to unload the drone on a Latin American dictator(William Marquez). Muntz is aided by his reborn, bible-quoting partner, Ray Pasternak(Gregory Hines), an ex-air-force pilot, and by Mrs. Catherine DeVoto(Sigourney Weaver), the ambitious widow of a previous Peacemaker sales rep. A combined team effort trying to make the "Deal of the Century", making this movie cautionary as well as entertaining.






