In 1979, Canadian John Barbour went to the programming executives of NBC with a new idea for a series. He proposed that a show be made around all the various "human clips" that local stations play at the end of their news broadcasts. Since there was a backlog of some five years' worth of these clips, there was plenty of material to be used. Someone obviously thought the idea was a good one, because that's how "Real People" was born.

In its first year, "Real People" was definitely unique. It was an hour of fun that showed how "different" people can be. And its popularity grew to the point where, at one time, there were five other clones on the American networks. However, times have changed, and one finds oneself longing for "Real People" to go the way of the other clones: cancelled limbo.

Why most of the other clones died (the only survivors are "Ripley's Believe It or Not", believe it or not, and, incredibly, "That's Incredible") can be found in how "Real People" has changed in the last three years. Somebody in the "Real People" cast and company decided to take the show seriously. The result was a cancerous growth on a show that might have to be killed to save it.

Although it could be said that the insane people are the ones who have completely sane minds, it would be a debatable question as to whether some of the folks on "Real People" had minds at all. Worse yet is the thought that we, as an audience, watch and laugh at a town drunk or at a woman who needs psychiatric help; instead, we should be trying to help these people in some way.

However, if/when "Real People" becomes a spirit in Rerun Heaven, it will most likely be due to the increase of the jingoism and the sexism on the show. The show has always been a favorite of Americans who feel their

MOVIE UPDATE

I hope you enjoyed my first article and will continue to read as I update some of the movies around town for you. This week I've got a great movie for you to 'check out', 'Rumble Fish' that will start Friday, October 28th.

RUMBLE FISH

A Universal Release

Francis Ford Coppola presents 'Rumble Fish,' starring Matt Dillon, Mickey Rourke, Vincent Spano, Diane Lane, Diana Scarwid, Nicolas Cage and Dennis Hopper. Directed by Francis Ford Coppola from a screenplay by S.E. Hinton and Francis Coppola, based upon the novel by S.E. Hinton 'Rumble Fish'. Music by Stewart Copeland, drummer for the hugely successful rock group 'The Police'.

This is the eleventh film directed by Coppola and his second based upon a book by S.E. Hinton, who also co-wrote the screenplay with him.

Set in the urban city some time in the future, 'Rumble Fish' is the story of a complex relationship between two brothers, played by Matt Dillon and Mickey Rourke. It was filmed in Tulsa, Oklahoma in the late summer and fall of 1982. Rusty James (Matt Dillon) worships his brother and strives to be like him in every way. But the Motorcycle Boy (Mickey Rourke) is no longer the great gang leader of his teenage years. Color-blind and partially deaf from many fights, he walks through life in a state of profound confusion. Rusty-James cannot comprehend that his brother is pretty much alienated by the rest of the world and by anyone's standards, crazy. Only at the finale when he loses his beloved brother to a policeman's bullet is he free to create his own identity.

In counterpoint to the anachronistically-inclined brothers are Steve and Patty, friends of Rusty-James. Both are good kids—concerned about their families, doing their homework, living by society's rules. These characters are the opposite end of the spectrum and underline the story's theme of order versus chaos.

Rumble fish are a type of tiny Siamese fighting fish which, if put together, try to annihilate each other. Further, if a single fish sees itself in a glass or mirror, it will attack the image repeatedly. The title is therefore a metaphor for the kids in the neighborhood who are destroying each other as well as themselves. Any excuse for a fight when engaged in battle that they feel fully alive; discussions of common denominators and quotients are dull, irrelevant to their lives. The only grown-ups on the side of the angles are two scarred, fragile creatures eloquently interpreted by Diana Scarwid and Dennis Hopper. Their shattered presences testify that adulthood does not offer redemption from the mysteries of life experienced by the adolescents.

'Rumble Fish' is an evocative, non-linear piece which unfolds rather than marches straight ahead, a strong, definite setting and visual style is exemplified. Since the characters feel trapped like rats in a maze, the world beyond their neighborhood seems very far away. The immediate environment is oppressive and inexplicable, not always making sense. Smoke curls and billows throughout from unseen conflagrations; painted shadows create a subtle sense of disorientation as do fleeting images of racing clouds reflected in windows. A clock without hands, stuffed animals alongside live ones in a pet store are almost Dadaesque images. All beautifully done to abstract and heighten reality, to freeze moments in time.

All this chaos contains a paradox, however-- a ray of hope. Although the character feel trapped, there do exist modes by which they may, literally, get out of there and there by free themselves. To emphasize this possibility, many scenes are set along the river, in the middle of roads, against railroad tracks and in shadowy bridge underpasses. To impress these configurations the director decided to shoot the film in black and white with touches of colour to allow for greater poetic freedom. With the mixture of the new-rhythmist Stewart Copeland of 'The Police' the style, structure are inextricably linked, making this movie an unusual vehicle for story telling.

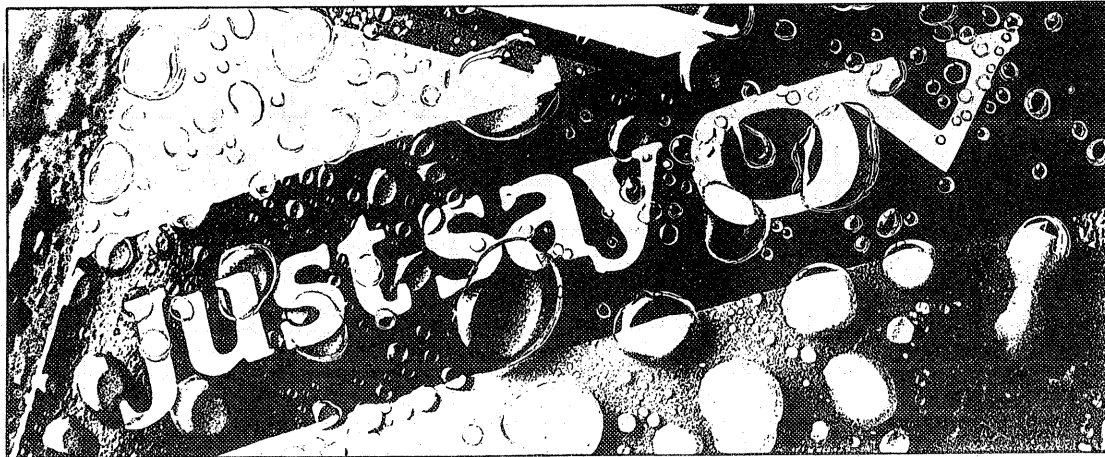
