BACKGROUND:

DUTIES:

Kerry's duties in regards to Naitsa are many; for one, he is in charge of "instructing" the various techs, representatives of the rules and regulations regarding the running of all liquor events, for he is responsible for the coordination of all social activities of Naitsa, and seeing to the fact that the techs abide by the rules set out, is part of this.

For another, he is responsible to the Treasurer for all the financial records, of NAIT's activities.

Needless to say, Kerry is very active in the day-to-day "life" of this school. He is a member of the Athletics Committee. On the Activities Committee, which he is responsible for the running of all activities that are not related to athletics (and needs more volunteers in order to make them a success).

Not all of his job is very strenuous though. For he is the one who goes to see local bands play, and talk with their managers, in order to get ideas on whom to suggest to the techs, for their cabarets. He is also responsible for upholding of NAIT's poster policy, which basically says that: no outside activities, unless they are charities, can be advertised. Posters are to be placed anywhere but on painted surfaces and glass, authorized with a date stamp (an expiry date), and taken down by the party posting the ad on or before the expiry date. Ticket selling policies, Rock & Talk, Queen Week, etc., are all under Kerry's jurisdiction. As well as the running of shinerama, which has raised over \$2000.00 for C.F., Santa's Anonymous at Christmas, and Common Hour which is held every Wednesday from 1:10 to 2:25 pm; this is the time when most club meetings are held. There are also Talent Shows, novelty events, and various other activities during this hour.

These are most, if not all of the many activities that Kerry does with which you can perhaps help with (one way is by participating in these events), or by joining the Activities Committee, all you have to do is see Kerry in his office in Room E133, where he is also available for questioning regarding the above mentionables. Many thanks for lending me your apathetic ear.



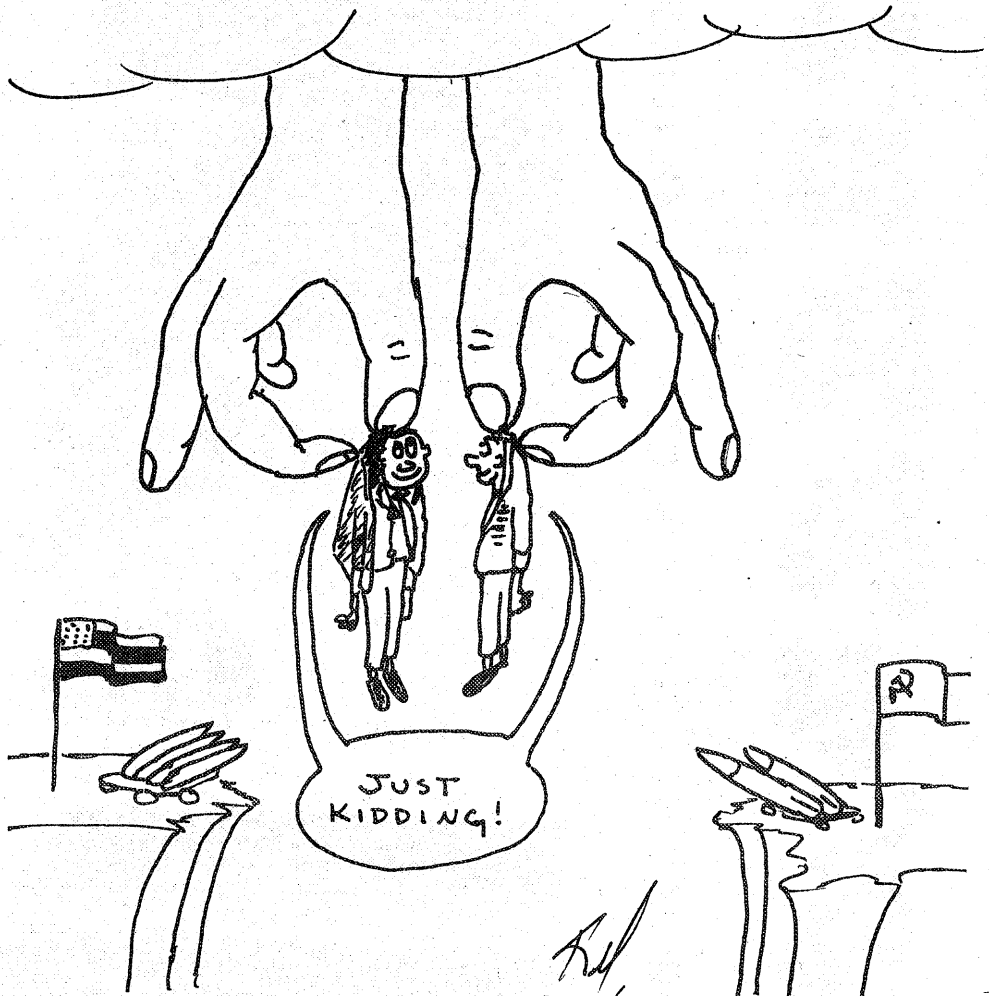

C-Channel the Christian Channel

Last week I related the reasons that led to the downfall of C-Channel, one of the first pay-tv stations in Canada. But if you're worried that the five million dollars' worth of electronic equipment will just sit and gather dust, do not despair: the broadcast facilities of C-Channel have been bought for a cool one million bucks.

The people who bought the assets of C-Channel are David Mainse and his friends at "100 Huntley Street". Mainse and company can be seen on their religious broadcasts weekday mornings on CKRD and CITY. Their goal, so far as their new purchase is concerned, is to obtain a CRTC license to start a satellite from of their Christian broadcasts. If they are successful in achieving their goal, it would be both a boon and a bane to the people of Canada.

To have a satellite station that dedicated itself to Christian broadcasts would be a step forward in the eyes of some Canadians. More pressure has been brought upon the CRTC lately to allow religious radio stations and the like, and a religious television station would satisfy some of the need that exists nation-wide for hearing masses electromagnetically. In addition, satellite religion would help those who want the

satisfaction of a minister's service, but who cannot attend a church regularly because they live in remote areas.

However, there are some aspects of a religious satellite network that should be taken care of before a license is granted. The primary problem is who gets broadcast time? Is it okay to state that only those with the bucks be allowed to expand their viewing audience (and, therefore, get more bucks), or should all of the different sects within Christianity be allowed equal time? Moreover, should the broadcasts be limited to strictly Christian broadcasts? Should not the Jewish, Hindu, Buddhist, and Islamic religions be allowed air time in proportion to their percentage of either Canada's population or the world's population? What about Shinto, Taoist, and Zoroastrian services?

Similar in nature is the feeling that would be perceived by some children that "if that's on, then it's right". Translated, it means that anyone who only had the religious station to watch may be exposed only to the words from the Bible. So far, as the objective upbringing of the next generation is concerned, it would be wise to include readings from the other holy books, such as the Veda, the Koran, and the Tripitaka. Indeed, it would be quite necessary to include "non-religious" programming, such as a series of shows on Darwin's "The Origin of the Species". After thousands of years of "wars in the name of religion", it is time that we learn all sides of all beliefs.

Another problem with religious broadcasts is their

hypnotic affect on some groups of people, particularly the lonely or the old, who then "joyously" donate their life savings, and then keep donating, to some slickhaired minister whose main worry in life is not the starving in Africa but the operating costs of his religious network. This problem is bad enough right now without introducing something that will be broadcasting 24 hours a day. Some form of government control would be needed in this area to prevent some poor soul from becoming a poorer soul.

Thus, may the dieties help and hinder David Mainse and company. May he be aided in starting something that a fair number of Canadians wish existed right now. However, may the folks at "100 Huntley Street" be given enough obstacles to keep their act balanced and fair to all of the religious and non-religious groups of Canada.

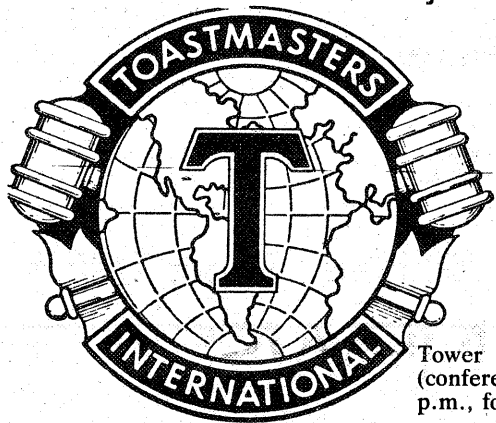

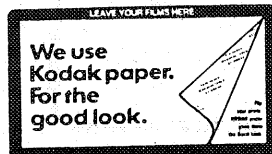

UNIVERSITY OF ALBERTA GOLDEN BEARS 3 AT NAIT ARENA

The NAIT OOKS transformed this past week into a page of history with a monumental 4-3 triumph over the University of Alberta Golden Bears of the CIAU on Friday, September 30th at the NAIT Arena. The NAIT victory was the first ever against the Bears.

Denis Leclair of the Bears opened the scoring at the 13:27 mark of the first. NAIT'S Kevin Imrie tied the contest on a Jim Lee set-up at 15:55. Two minutes and 39 seconds later, Gerry Foley connected on a play with Gary Leach and Brain Oswald to give NAIT a 2-1 advantage.

In the middle frame, Foley tallied his second of the night at 11:48. Gary Leach and Brain Hermanutz were credited with assists on Gerry's marker.

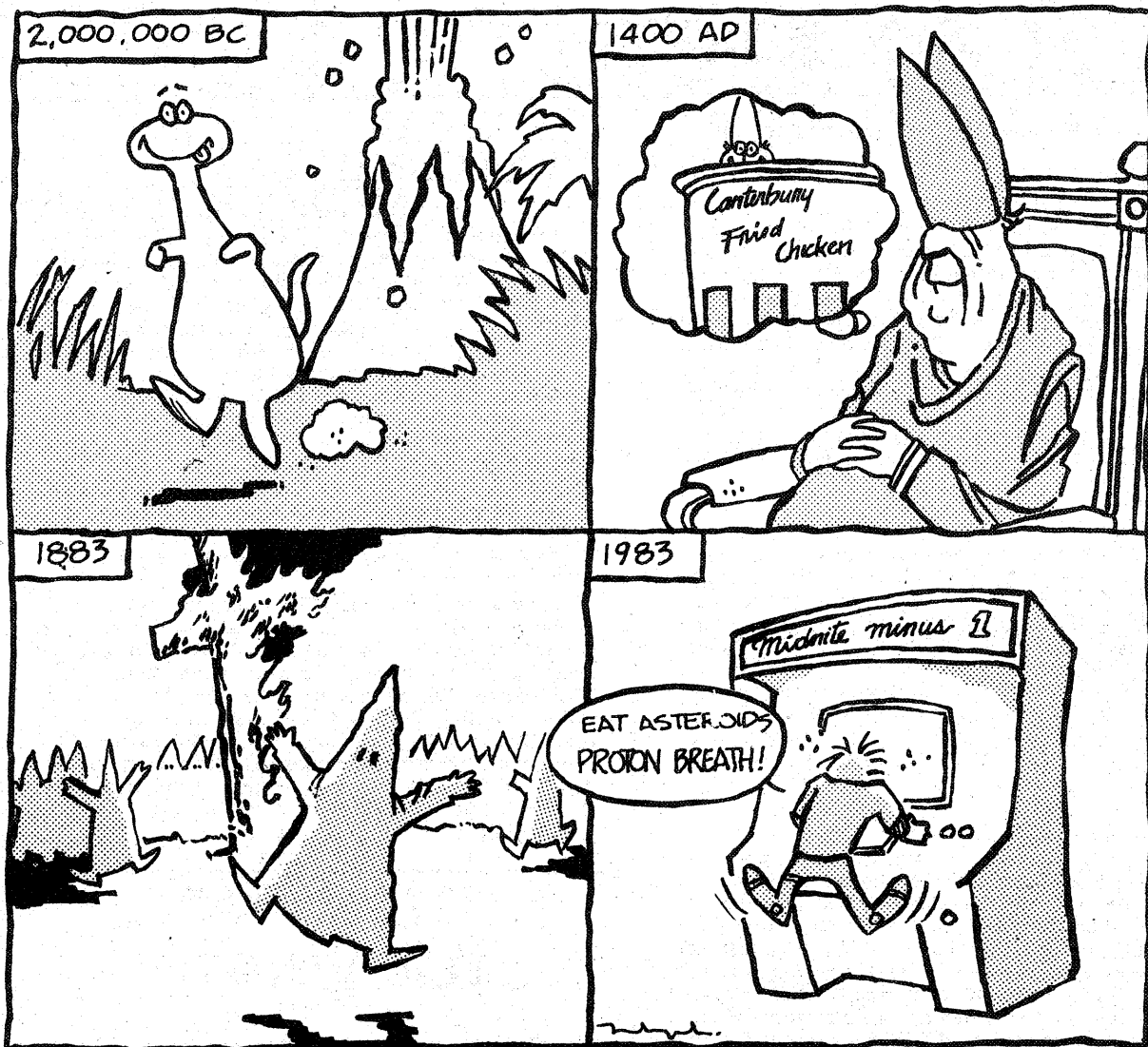
Jeff Marshall brought the U of A squad to within one with 2:17 elapsed in the third. At 9:54, an end-to-end unassisted effort by Jim Lee increased NAIT's lead to 4-2. The Bears then pressed NAIT in the last few minutes of the contest trying to score a goal by kicking the puck in the net. The goal was disallowed. With 22 seconds left in the game, U of A's Denis Leclair found the net for the second time to make the final 4-3 in favor of NAIT.

The NAIT netminding duo of Cleo Rowein and Scott Sabo turned away 42 U of A drives. At the other end, Ken Hodge and Kelly Brooks of the Bears blocked out 46 OOKS shots.

Coach Perry Pearn was satisfied with NAIT's performance commenting, "I was very pleased with the intensity and the effort of the players dressed." Coach Pearn added that the contest showed that NAIT has four strong lines and a solid defensive core.

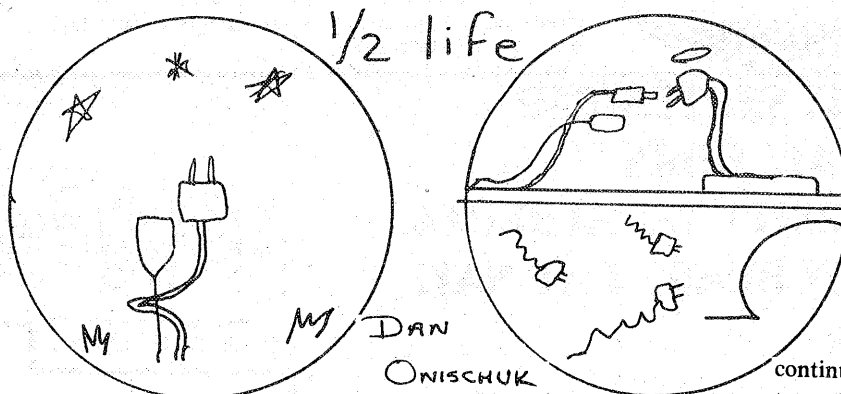

"One of these days that little fa**#! is going to push me too far," said Gerry angrily.

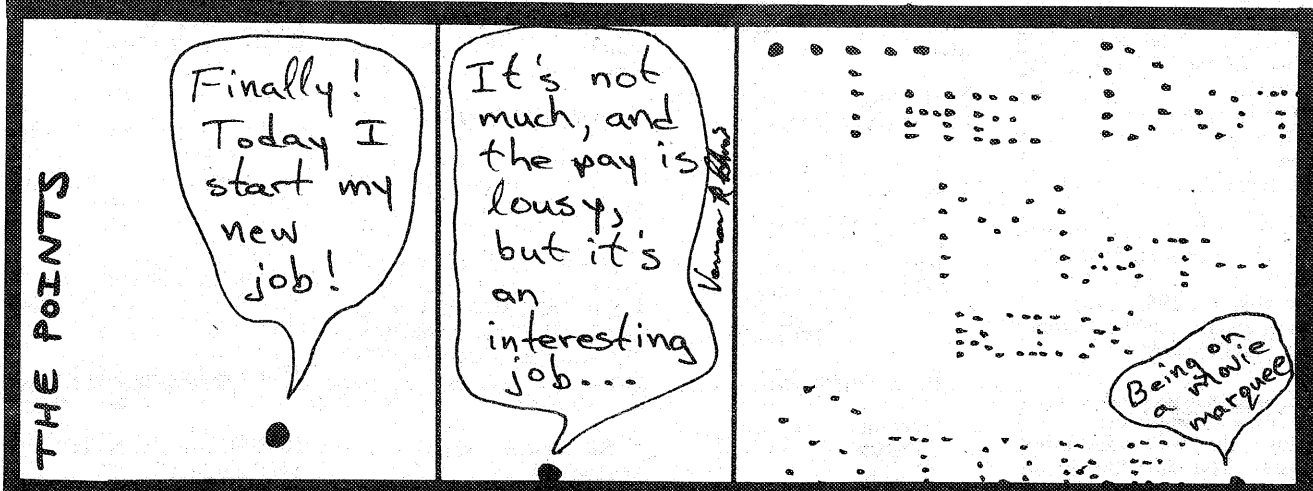
