


"GATEWAY'S" FALL FROM GRACE

I've always been impressed with the University of Alberta's newspaper, "The Gateway". I've enjoyed the editorials, the content, and especially the correspondence they receive. "The Gateway" has always been the ideal periodical that we someday hoped to emulate. When "The Nugget" was under the strain of forced reformation last year, it was always asked "Why can't you be more like the University paper?" (even though some may now say Sait's "Emery Weal" is a better publication.) Recently, though, there have been developments that have tarnished my silvery images of the U of A's tabloid. Being in the student newspaper biz, I think they're worth commenting on.

To bring everybody up to date: Two years ago, several thousand issues of "The Gateway" were seized by Edmonton City Police. The newspaper contained a story which police thought could possibly jeopardize an arson investigation. The staff at the time took legal action against the city. About two weeks ago, the City proposed an out of court settlement: they would pay "The Gateway" \$3,000, but only under the condition that city lawyers be allowed to peruse any articles about the settlement before they went to print. The fighting editors dropped their gloves and Last week, the students must have finally accepted. realized how complacent they made themselves look by so meekly surrendering. Once again, they have picked up the torch and decided to revoke their acceptance. Unfortunately, they've done this at the expense of the lawyer who has represented them up to now.

Perhaps it's a good sign that "The Gateway" is once again at the negotiation table. It means they have not really sold their freedom of speech. But, their vacillating behaviour has taken away the potency of their attack. Perhaps the City will not be so quick to attempt another settlement because of the reneged bargain. In this case, U of A students will find their student fees being eaten up in a drawn out legal battle that the City is better equipped to fight. Regardless of the outcome, I have lost a great deal of respect for the paper, mainly for nearly selling out their prerogative to address the public. At any newspaper, and especially at one belonging to an idealistic institute of higher learning, this privilege should not be held in so little esteem. It would be a sad day for journalism if freedom of speech was betrayed for thirty pieces of silver. I sincerely wish the best of luck to "The Gateway" in their struggle for justice, but I hope no one ever asks me again "Why can't you be more like the University paper?"

ALBERTA AND CURRENT FEDERAL-NICK'S PICKS

PROVINCIAL ISSUES

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor today stated he was "extremely suspicious about the air of complacency at the 'first ministers' lunch. He warned that the continuing emphasis on total agreement between the provincial and federal leaders was detrimental to Alberta's interest and to healthy national politics."

"There are at least half a dozen issues extremely important to Albertans, said Mr. Taylor, "and these are being ignored by our Premier in this new love and kisses atmosphere." "I belong to the school that believes that where politicians are quiet the voter is getting shafted."

"Energy pricing, for instance, has only vaguely been addressed by the federal Finance Minister," he noted. "Yet, while Mr. Lougheed thinks the battle for market pricing has been won, already Ontario has mounted study papers and political campaigns opposed to a fair deal for Alberta. Concerning taxation of energy, the federal Minister has raised the Petroleum Compensation Charge, maintained the P.G.R.T. and vaguely threatened to dismantle the Petroleum Incentive Program - all without substantial comment from the Alberta Premier or Energy Minister."

"Transportation policy, specifically rail expansion and freight rates, have received no public discussion and no commitment for further airing by our first ministers. Are expansion and rate increases to follow the policy laid out by the 1982 agreement and will western grain, coal and potash be competitively transported in 1985 and beyond?" Taylor asked.

"Medical and hospital insurance costs have not even been mentioned since the federal election. Will Alberta's health minister get his wish of instituting heavy extra billing, or will the promise of Canada's health minister to abolish it prevail? Again, the issue isn't even on the agenda for the first ministers," noted Mr. Taylor.

Mr. Taylor stated that three other matters, including the broad question of federal transfer payments and the complex subject of federal grants for joint social programs in health care, education and social services, are similarly ignored." Tax reform and credit policy have not even been raised, in spite of the joint responsibility of the two levels of government to supervise the area."

"It is evident," he concluded, "the 'first ministers' are too interested in socializing and comradery. Mr. Lougheed, who was out-witted and out-bargained over energy pricing and taxation, once again falls for the unimportant factor whether he is friendly or not with the feds - and ignores the vital questions. I seriously question whether Alberta's interest will be defended if Alberta won't even raise the tough issues - economic and social - that Albertans know must be resolved."

JANUARY DEADLINE FOR **HERITAGE '85** POSTER CONTEST

The deadline for entries in the nation-wide Heritage '85 Poster Design Competition is January 18th. competition, sponsored by the National Parks Centennial Citizens' Committee, is open to all students enrolled in graphic or visual art courses in Community Colleges.

1985 has been declared Canada's National Parks Centennial acknowledging the first designation of national parkland by Sir John A. Macdonald in 1885. From that first 26 square kilometer site near Banff, Alberta, the national parks system now includes 31 extensive wildlife parks, 69 national historic sites, 10 heritage canals and hundreds of other historic sites and protected rivers throughout Canada.

^oThe Heritage '85 poster competitiion has been organized by the NPCCC, which is a non-profit organization with representation from all provinces and territories. It was established by the federal Minister of the Environment to encourage broad public participation in heritage related activities and to promote increased interest in the preservation of Canada's rich natural environment and historic sites.

Entries in the competition may reflect the natural beauty of parks, wildlife, natural landmarks, or Canada's historic heritage through sites, buildings or artifacts. Cash awards of \$500.00 for the winning design, \$300.00 for second prize and \$200.00 for third prize are being offered. In addition, any entry may be selected for publication by Parks Canada or the NPCCC to further promote public awareness of Heritage '85. WORK FOR STUDENTS

Flora MacDonald, Minister of Employment and Immigration, today announced that Youth Training Option (YTO), a pilot program to provide training and work experience for young people, has been approved for immediate implementation. The approval follows a recent review of government spending programs.

"A total of \$27 million will be released immediately to cover the costs of training 3,000 to 4,000 young women and men." said Miss MacDonald.

Miss MacDonald noted that any major training program involves collaboration with the provinces and the private sector. She indicated that she expects to meet with provincial and private sector representatives for discussions during the next few months. "I'm confident these discussions will soon lead to expanded youth training schemes leading to permanent employment," she said.

The Illegal Migrant Review Committee was established on August 4, 1983 to consider applications for permanent residence from illegal migrants who have been in Canada undetected for a period of five years or longer. Other program criteria, such as absence of convictions for criminal offenses, family and work ties in Canada, and humanitarian considerations, are applied by the Committee in its case-by-case review. Applications will be accepted by the Committee until January 3, 1985.

To date, the Committee has reviewed 2,580 applications. 2,251 requests for permanent residence have been approved; 216 have been deferred for more information; and 113 requests have been denied.



SPECIAL FUND FOR AFRICA

The establishment of a \$50 million Special Fund for Africa, along with specific initiatives to help Ethiopia, were announced today by the Secretary of State for External Affairs, the Right Honourable Joe Clark.

Canadian concern for Ethiopia has been overwhelming, said Mr. Clark. The recently-appointed Co-ordinator for the African Famine, Mr. David MacDonald, has been deluges with calls from across Cana with offers of assistance for the people of Ethiopia. Non-governmental organizations (NGOs) have been vital in mobilizing Canadian support, and the Secretary of State for External Affairs reiterated the list of NGOs who are accepting contributions for the African famine (attached). He also indicated that parts of the Special Fund for Africa will be used to match funds raised by Canadians, with formulas being developed following consultations between the voluntary sector and Mr. MacDonald.

Mr. Clark also announced that the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) will be contributing an additional \$3,525,000 in humanitarian relief assistance to Ethiopia through such organizations as the International Committee of the Red Cross, Development and Peace and Oxfam Canada. Furthermore, CIDA will be providing \$4 million to send 10,000 - 15,000 more tons of cereal to Ethiopia.

Apart from these immediate efforts, the government is working to promote long-term development. The Rural Water Resources Development Project, which has already provided safe water for 200,000 people in Southern Ethiopia, is being extended at a cost of \$800,000. For Africa as a whole, CIDA, in conjunction with international agricultural research institutes, has approved two projects to improve wheat and bean production, at a total cost of \$6.9 million over five years.

Food assistance from Canadians has been a critical factor in sustaining life among Ethiopians, said the Minister. As the drought intensified over the last three years, Canadian food aid accounted for almost a third of all food received by Ethiopia; in the past year it has accounted for more than half of all food aid delivered to date. In Africa at large, Canadian food assistance this year will be \$150 million, reaching more than 30 countries; only the United States provides more, and even then on a per capita basis Canadians are the largest donors of food aid in the world.

Canada will be redoubling its efforts to stimulate further coordination by the various donors in tackling the African crisis. The government has already taken the lead in organizing co-ordination meetings on the ground in Ethiopia - an initiative which has been much appreciated by the other donors there; and Canada, in concert with other donors, has urged upon the UN greater coordination of the food aid emergency programs in Ethiopia, which has resulted in the appointment of a special UN respresentative.

Last Tuesday Mr. Clark sent a letter to each of the Foreign Ministers of the seven Western Summit nations. The Secretary of State for External Affairs stressed that many more Ethiopians will die of starvation and disease unless massive amounts of food, and humanitatian assistance and logistical support are provided. Mr. Clark also reported to his counterparts his impression that the Ethiopian Government was making a serious and sustained effort to respond to the crisis.

The Government will be reviewing the African situtation consstantly, said Mr. Clark, to determine what further initiatives and extra funds might be necessary to alleviate the situation. He urged Canadians to continue their overwhelming generosity, either through the NGO community or by contacting the office of David MacDonald at (819) 994-6138.





HOW DID YOU DO?

Now that everyone has their first quarter marks back and has calculated their final exam marks, the big question is "how did you do?" If you did not do as good as you expected, then read on, I have some advice for you.

Although the Declaration of Student Rights and Responsibilities states:

"A.2.5 Students shall have the right to obtain their completed and graded assignments and examinations (except where advised in advance of departures from this practice."

Students still have the right to review their work with the instructor. The Declaration states "... the right to obtain...", and does not put any restrictions upon the right to review. To back up my statement, I will quote Fred

Williamson, Vice President of Instruction from a March 14, 1983 memorandum to the Instructional Directors:

"Our position on disposition of assignments and examinations must remark as follows:

- 1) Graded assignments and examinations shall generally be returned to students as promptly as practicable.
- 2) Departures from this practice shall be noted in advance to the students.
- 3) Even in those instances where assignments are not to be returned to students (and where students have been advised as noted in (½)), the student shall have the opportunity to review with the instructor the graded work."

This position was later endorsed by the Instructional

Directors on May 6, 1983.

It should be noted that if assignments and exams are removed from the instructor's office then they are not eligible for a reread. A reread, for those who are unaware, is a process in which the student can appeal his/her final exam mark. Final exams are to be held for 90 days. After that period they are thrown away. In that 90 day period a student can appeal his/her exam mark. This process costs \$5 per course.

A word of caution though, do not abuse this right you have; do not brown-nose to see if you can get your mark raised. If you have a legitimate concern about your final mark or if you have a question on a part of your exam, then do use this procedure.

"The Tech Page"

COURT REPORTING

Court reporters are responsible for writing verbatim (word-for-word) shorthand of court proceedings, hearings, commissions, conventions, and conferences. A reporter is also responsible for the transcription of his/her shorthand notes into typed legal format. The NAIT Court Reporting Program is the only program in Canada approved by the National Shorthand Reporters Association. This technology is relatively small in numbers having an average intake of twenty students per year.

As part of their training, students are given an in-depth study of the Canadian Judicial System. This included the judicial structure encompassing all divisions of the courts as well as their respective trial procedures. Students also gain insight into the many and often complex laws governing our nation. As an aid to a better understanding of the law, the students attend at the Federal and Provincial Law Courts to view trial proceedings first hand.


Good English skills are a necessity to a court reporter in the production of professional transcripts. The English course in this program provides for a detailed working knowledge of English grammar, vocabulary development and a wide range of area-specific terminologies.

With the advent of computers into almost all facets of employment, NAIT Court Reporting students learn computer-compatible shorthand for expedient transcription. Graduates of this program are capable of writing machine shorthand at a speed in excess of 200 wpm, which is the approximate speed many persons speak.

Proficiency in these skills requires a great deal of motivation and dedication by the students in this program. The level of excellence achieved by graduates of this 2-year program results in a career that is highly respectable and very rewardin. energy related industries as petrochemical, coal, oil and gas, or in such areas as avionics.




