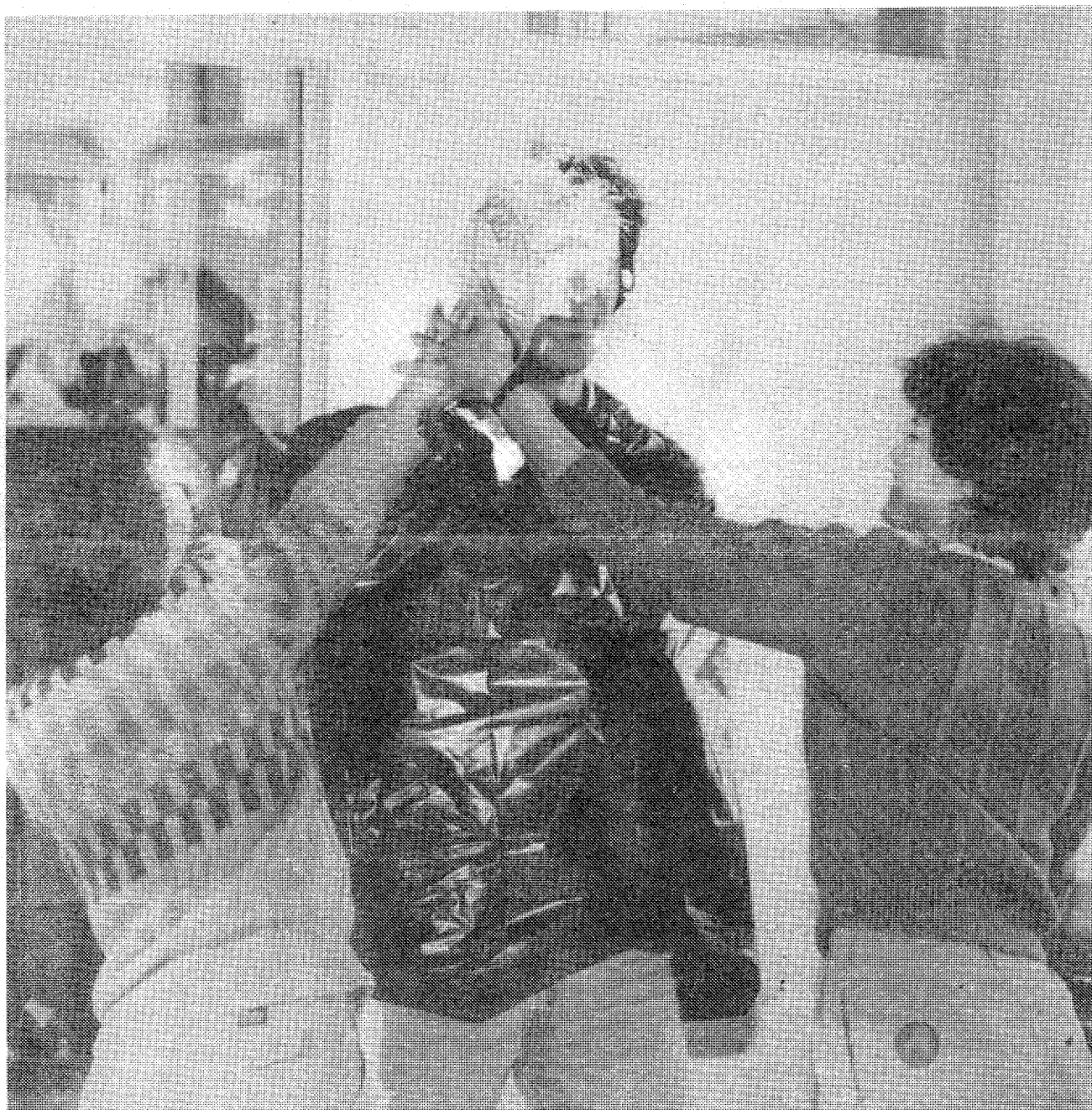

It amazes me that a man who is prevented from pushing his refuse inside our country can have the audacity to stand up and insinuate that our Canadian Government is fascist. Certainly, he is an outstanding member of society who has every right to pass judgement on our highest institutes.

Just to quickly summarize this weeks editorial:

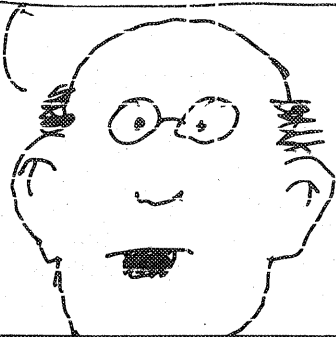

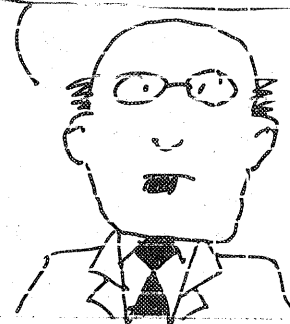

WHY NOT LET SOMEBODY ELSE THINK FOR YOU?

In response to the full page message sponsored by Penthouse Magazine in the Nov. 23rd Journal regarding the threat of censorship in Canada. For those of you who didn't have the opportunity to see this piece of propaganda, let me describe it. More than half the page displayed the well-known symbol of the swastika, while the other half went on to tell us implicitly why we should worry about the recent move to ban Penthouse Magazine from our Canadian shelves. The message even goes so far as to suggest that censorship in Canada is of the same degree as censorship was in Nazi Germany and is in the present day Soviet Union.

Was this a case of censorship or perhaps a case of social outrage? Maybe . . . just maybe . . . people are getting a little sick of the suggestive pictures and articles in magazines permitted to be sold in grocery stores? If this is the reality of the situation, then it is the people of Canada (granted not unanimous), not the government, that are saying "no thank you" to this type of magazine. Is this Censorship or Majority Rules?

The message goes on to say "Freedom is everybody's business." I find it both interesting and hypocritical that Penthouse uses one form of human intellectual bondage (that of censorship) to support another form of human intellectual bondage (the suggestion that one sex should be dominant or submissive to the other). I think the reaction of the public and the officials of Canada to the latest edition of Penthouse Magazine was an example of people expressing their opinion and using their right of freedom of speech.

Magazines, the press and the media in general have a huge responsibility to society. Since all people are to some degree impressionable, (this includes children, men, women, criminals and christians), what the media does or does not release can have a significant impact on us. To imply sexual bondage as a norm is making many statements that should be considered strongly. Penthouse is trying to tell us that people don't have the right to decide that this is wrong for everyone. Well, does Penthouse have the right to decide that this is suitable?

After observing Penthouse's message, a friend and I discussed our opinions on the subject of censorship and the controversial pictures in Penthouse. He believed that in order to be effective in avoiding similar pictures, censorship has to be absolute. He also believed that if the pictures were of nude men in bondage instead of always nude women then this would be more acceptable. I have to disagree with both of these comments. Firstly, people can stop the production of such magazines (or drastically influence their contents) by simply refusing to buy or sell them. This isn't censorship, this is supply and demand or dollar votes. Secondly, any form of sexual bondage, be it male or female, suggests a link between violence and sex. What does violence have to do with sex? Also it isn't any more acceptable to say that men should be submissive to women that it is to say the reverse.

So what is the bottom line? What was Penthouse trying to accomplish with their swastika? Doesn't it usually boil down to the same motive? Sales and Money? It wasn't so long ago Penthouse made mega-bucks through it's timely release of that some nude photographs of the first black Miss America. This tactic of creating shock in their audience to sell magazines and then turning around and telling Canadians how moral Penthouse is for protecting us from the evils of censorship is exploitive. But it sure sells magazines doesn't it Bob!

The following letter is addressed to the hundreds of students who will be graduating from NAIT this year. If you are involved with the any one of the following technologies please take note:

Hydrocarbon Engineering Technology
Instrumentation Engineering Technology

Power Engineering Technician
Telecommunication Engineering Technology

Two men were killed on November 22, 1984. They were killed at a sour gas wellsite south of Drayton Valley. One man was 27 years old and the other was 23 years old. The younger man had graduated from SAIT as a second year Instrument technologist.

I knew both of these men as I had worked with them on my summer job. They were good, hardworking men. I can't say that I know exactly how they died, or the circumstances surrounding the incident. But I do know that every person in the above technologies will be directly involved with the Oil and Gas Industry. With this fact, every one involved with oil and gas industry will be faced with a dangerous, if not a fatal situation. It may not be sour gas, but it may be another deadly gas (and there are many in the petrochemical industry) which could cause harm.

Here at NAIT we are not exposed to the real dangers that we will all experience once we graduate. I have talked with both students and instructors of my technology, they feel as I do, that a safety course, as part of either curriculum or option should be implemented. Realizing of course that a safety course offered at NAIT would not fully prepare graduates to do their jobs. But that safety should again continue with the company with which we become employed.

In conclusion, I would seriously like to see a safety course implemented at NAIT. It would certainly be beneficial to all of those involved. Input to start a safety program should come from the President of NAIT. The program heads of the technologies forementioned, the oil and gas industry and the students of NAIT, also.

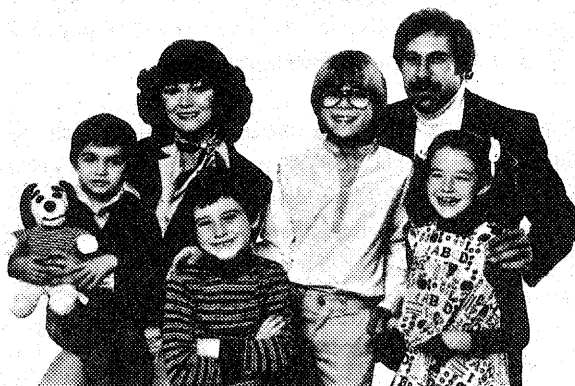

CHARITY DONATIONS

Dear Editor:

Once again folks, it's Christmas time and what a better way to end a year by donating to such charitable organizations as Santa's Anonymous (\$250), The Food Bank (\$250), The Red Cross (The Ethiopia Crisis) (\$300), and Big Sisters (\$250). These charities are only some of the charities in which NAITSA contributes too.

Our responsibility and dedication to each of the charities is due to the great response we get from the Association itself. It was nice to see during the 1984-85 budget a motion passed to increase the funds available for our charities to \$5000. This motion was made by Commercial Cooking and was put through by a majority vote. This allows the association to give a greater amount to each charity.

Due to the lack of files left to us by the previous executive, there was not a specific list of the acclaimed eighteen charities to be found. However, we have been able to implement a system which permits us to have complete control over the distribution of your (students) designated monies for charitable organizations.

The system works as follows:

- 1) Organization phones in
- 2) Check past cheque book records to see if we ever gave to them, and if so, what amount did we give.
- 3) If we did not give to them in the past then it is stated to them that the Students Association has voted in favor of not donating to any further charity programs that the ones which we presently donate to.
- 4) If we did not give to them in the past then it is stated to them that the Students Association has voted in favor of not donating to any further charity programs than the ones in which we presently donate to.
- 5) We only give to each organization once a year.

We are limited to the charities which we have donated to. This standard was implemented through a motion which was passed by the previous executive. Therefore, the system that we use allows us to ensure that we are donating to one of our designated charitable organizations.

Regarding the article written in the last issue of the Nugget entitled "Do You Need Money", I hope this will answer any questions. The eighteen charities which were quoted in this article was only an estimate given to us by the last years executive. At the present time we have the following eleven charities: 1) Daffodil Day 2) Shinerama 3) Big Sisters 4) Poppy Day 5) Burn Unit 6) Hire-A-Student 7) Santa's Anonymous 8) Any charities Red Cross sponsors (Emergency Crisis') 9) Food Bank 10) Unicef 11) United Way

As of December 10, these are all the charities that we have given to or are in the process of giving to.

It is nice to see someone writing an article showing such concern about the allocation of charitable funds.

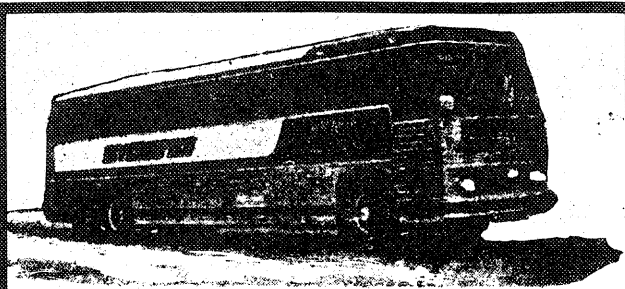

OOKS HOCKEY

The NAIT Ooks completed the first half of the ACAC hockey season with an unblemished 11-0 mark by winning a pair of games in Calgary over the weekend. NAIT clinged to a 7-5 victory over the SAIT Trojans Saturday and tamed the Mount Royal College Cougars 9-3 Sunday.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 8TH--NAIT OOKS 7, SAIT TROJANS 5 AT SAIT ARENA, CALGARY

The NAIT Ooks faced a vastly improved SAIT Trojans club and downed their Calgary counterparts 7-5 Saturday at the SAIT Arena in Calgary.

Marty Shenfield of the Trojans started the scoring with only 57 seconds elapsed in the first frame. Ross Kenny of the Ooks tied the contest at 1-1 a short 45 seconds later. NAIT went ahead 2-1 at the 2:56 mark when Gary Leach netted his 6th goal of the season. The Ooks gained a 3-1 advantage when Scott Melnyk tallied for fourth time this campaign at 10:20. Ross Kenny's second goal of the evening came with 18:08 gone to increase NAIT's lead to three goals.

Ross Kenny of the Ooks completed a hat trick at 8:01 of the second. Marty Shenfield pulled the SAIT Trojans back to within three at the 10:39 mark. Five minutes and five seconds followed before Randy Normandeau connected on the SAIT powerplay to make the score 5-3.

With two NAIT players in the sin bin, SAIT cut NAIT's lead to one with 10:45 passed in the third as Bob Woykin turned on the red light. Gary Haddon's shorthanded marker two minutes and two seconds later reinstated NAIT's two goal lead. The Trojans did not give up and narrowed the lead to one once again at 12:57 as Darcy Kerner scored. Garth Hayes' powerplay goal provided insurance for NAIT at 16:27 to make the final 7-5.

SAIT's Rick Cuch turned in a fine outing blocking 27 NAIT shots. At the other end, the Ooks' Kevin Stapleton also faced 27 Trojan drives.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9TH--NAIT OOKS 9, MRC COUGARS 3 AT GLENMORE ARENA, CALGARY.

Three shorthanded goals including two on the same shift lifted the NAIT Ooks to a 9-3 win over the Mount Royal College Cougars at Glenmore Arena in Calgary Sunday.

NAIT's Gary Leach opened the scoring with the man disadvantage at 8:10 of the first. The NAIT powerplay clicked at the 12:23 mark to give the Ooks a 2-0 lead as Ron Amyotte scored his fourth of the season.

The Ooks then opened up for six goals in the second period. With 2:14 elapsed in the stanza, Ken Goodwin tallied. NAIT's fourth goal came with the man advantage as Gary Haddon found the mark at 4:17. One minute and 20 seconds passed before Ken Goodwin of NAIT scored while the Ooks were killing a penalty. On the same shorthanded situation, Gary Haddon netted his fifth tally of the season at 6:42. Kevin Imrie's third marker of the campaign accounted for NAIT's seventh goal at the 17:46 mark. Murray Melnyk increased NAIT's lead to 8-0, 35 seconds later. Ted Materi of the Cougars broke the NAIT shutout bid capitalizing on a breakaway with 1:07 left in the period.

At the 8:47 mark of the third, Brad Davis notched the second Cougars goal. Fourteen seconds followed before Terry Bodnar of MRC made the score 8-3. Ron Amyotte of the Ooks completed the afternoon's scoring at the 18:02 mark.

NAIT goaltender Cleo Rowin faced 20 Cougar shots, while the Mount Royal tandem of Dean Dobrescu and Bill Iversen were tested 39 times.

Looking back on the first half of the season, NAIT Coach Perry Pearn stated, "We are extremely pleased with our performance so far and believe a 25 and 0 season would be a great accomplishment."

ON THE BENCH: With an 11-0 record the Ooks are six points in front of the Camrose Vikings (8-4). NAIT has the best goals against average (2.55) and the highest goals for (7.91) . . .The next league action for the NAIT Ooks will be Saturday, January 12th when the Ooks entertain the Mount Royal College Cougars at 7:30 pm . . .The Ooks are now preparing for their exhibition series in Switzerland. NAIT will play seven, possibly eight games in Switzerland. The Ooks leave Canada December 21st and return January 1st. Twenty two of the twenty four members are going.

Heilongjiang Province is the sister province to Alberta and the two are currently engaged in spot and cultural exchange. The Chinese were touring Alberta for one week as guests of the provincial government. They played College and University teams from all over Alberta. Stacked with two players from the 1984 gold medal Olympic Champions, they were said to be as good or better than Canada's National Team.

The ladies played in a best of 5 match, but only three games were needed for the Chinese girls to prove their superiority in the game of Volleyball. The Heilongjian girls defeated the Oookchicks 15-0, 15-3, 15-3.

When asked what she thought of the games, Diane Satre, Coach of the Oookchicks replied "Because China has such a strong team it was moral victory for us just to score." She went on to say "it was a great experience for the team who played extremely well, considering the competition they faced."

This was the first Internation Court Sport Event ever at NAIT. There was a lot of pomp and ceremony, since International Protocol was followed during this match.

The girls exchanged banners and buttons, while Mr. Art Dixon, Vice President of NAIT, presented a silver stein to Mr. Bai Yun, Vice President of Amateur Sport for all of China.

There was a lot of fan support and that showed the true NAIT spirit. The fans were treated to some great play making and were very appreciative of the Chinese talent.

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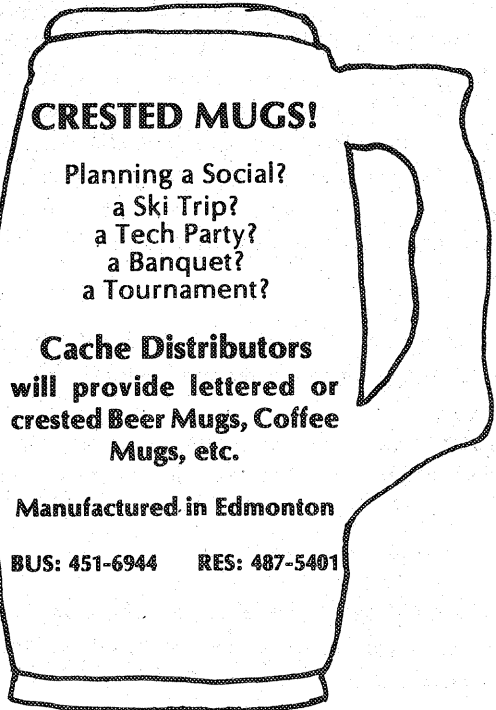

MOVIE UPDATE

"Beverly Hills Cop" poses the simple question: can one lone individual manage in less than two days to offend the police, the criminal element and the general citizenry of one of America's most famous cities while getting himself caught up in an international crime web of drugs, smuggling, high finance and murder?

Eddie Murphy stars in "Beverly Hills Cop" as the brash, single-minded Alex Foley, a guy whose emotional enthusiasm for his job with the Detroit Police Department causes him to forget the mundane rules and regulations by which the police must live.

When Foley sees a close friend inexplicably murdered, there is no way he can keep his hands off the case, despite strictest orders. Unfortunately, the key to the mystery is hidden many miles away in the never-never land of Beverly Hills, California. Suddenly, in a jurisdictional transgression of staggering proportions, unpolished Axel Foley bursts onto the marbled turf of one of the world's wealthiest communities.

"Beverly Hills Cop" marks Murphy's fourth film, and with it he takes a tale of action and suspense and laces it with the rare comedic talent has made him one of entertainment's most prized performers.

The movie was produced by Jerry Bruckheimer and Don Simpson, the people who produced the 1983 hit, Flashdance (not to be confused with the current epic film at the Jasper Cinema "Fleshdance").

The film co-stars Lisa Eilbacher, Steven Berkoff, Judge Reinhold ("Fast Times at Ridgemont High") and Ronny Cox.

Originally "Beverly Hills Cop" was slated to be a dramatic-heroic piece for Sylvester Stallone. However, when Sly asked for a ridiculous \$8 million big ones, the executives quivered in their space boots. Then they turned to Eddie Murphy and he re-wrote the script as a comedy about a ghetto black among the snobs. Fortunately for us, this is one movie that suits Murphy rather than Stallone. Don't miss this one, at this time of Holly and Mistletoe everyone needs a good laugh. "Beverly Hills Cop" delivers what it promises to be.

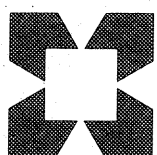
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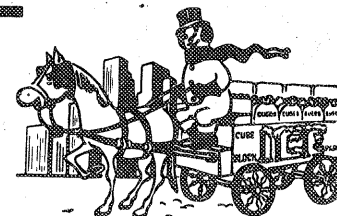

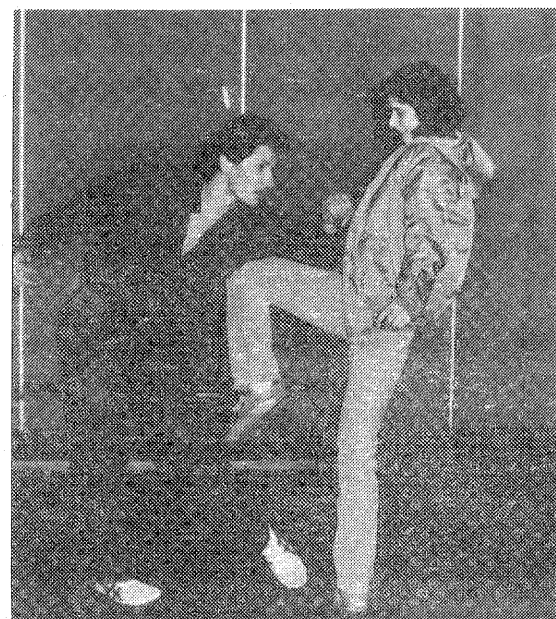
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
