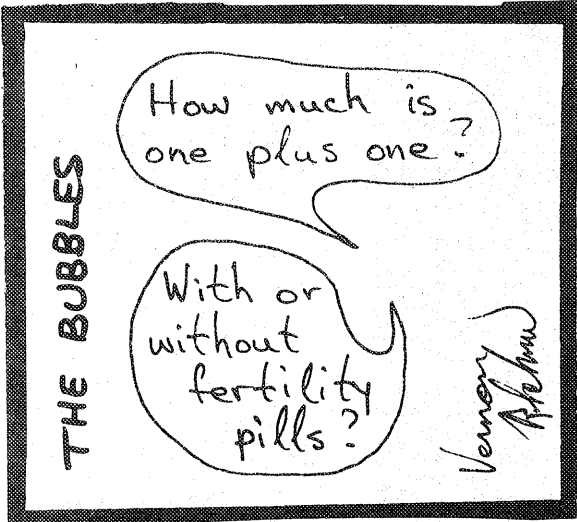

## Ooks Hockey

FRIDAY, JANUARY 27th--NAIT OOKS 3, RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS 2 at RED DEER ARENA

The NAIT Ooks scored a monumental 3-2 win over the Red Deer College Kings in Red Deer on Friday, the 27th in Red Deer. The contest was a see-saw battle with both teams having the opportunity to come away with a victory. Despite a number of setbacks, the Ooks came out on top. NAIT now has evened their five game series with the Kings at two games apiece.

Twenty three seconds into the contest Red Deer acquired a 1-0 lead on Dwayne Swansons's tally. Red Deer controlled the play for the better part of the first with NAIT starting to dominate towards the end of the stanza.

The second period was all Ooks. At 6:42, Kevin Hayes of NAIT notched the equalizer on a Randy Repchuk-Larry Oswald set-up. The NAIT powerplay connected at the 10:27 mark when Garth Hayes and Randy Repchuk assisted on Gary Haddon's point blast. Four minutes and 18 seconds later, a tired Hugh McCaskill fired a wrist shot into the Red Deer net gave NAIT a 3-1 lead. Assists went to Jim Lee and Tom Tookey.

The lone goal of the third came early when Red Deer's Mike Gouchie capitalized with the man advantage with 2:11 gone in the period.

NAIT's Cleo Rowein handled 28 Red Deer shots, while RDC's Neal McPheddran was tested 27 times.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 29th--NAIT OOKS 8, CAMROSE VIKINGS 2 at NAIT ARENA

The NAIT Ooks continued their domination over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings with an 8-2 triumph on Sunday, the 29th, at the NAIT Arena. In six meetings between the two teams this season, NAIT has won five in the regular season and one in exhibition play.

Dean Paprotika gave the Vikings a 1-0 advantage with 7:00 elapsed in the first. Two minutes and 32 seconds followed before NAIT's Jim Lee tied the match at 1-1 on a play with Mark Schultz. The Ooks powerplay then capitalized at the 11:58 mark. Gary Hoekstra scored from Larry Oswald.

Gary Leach increased NAIT's lead to 3-1 at 11:42 with help from Tom Tookey and Jim Lee. Eleven seconds passed before Mark Schultz netted a goal. Assists were credited to Gary Leach and Jim Lee. At 12:51, Brian Hermanutz scored on a breakaway with Gary Hoekstra and Hugh McCaskill to give NAIT a four goal cushion.

In the final frame, CLC's Lloyd McKinney brought Camrose within range with a powerplay marker at 4:14. Two minutes and 41 seconds later, Jim Lee set up a Gary Hoekstra with the man advantage to make the score 6-1 NAIT. The NAIT powerplay clicked again with Randy Repchuk scoring from Garth Hayes and Kevin Hayes at 8:05. Mark Schultz of the Ooks rounded out the night's scoring with a shorthanded marker at the 17:50 mark.

CLC netminder Brad Boychuk stopped NAIT on 34 occasions. NAIT goaltender Cleo Rowein stopped 31 Camrose drives.

NAIT Coach Perry Pearn was elated with the success of the Ooks recently and stated, "We are now in a solid position to finish in first place in the ACAC. We won two crucial contests and set back Camrose and Red Deer in their goal to finish first. We are just starting to reach our full potential, and the results are showing on the ice."

The magic number for NAIT to clinch first place is four. A combination of NAIT win or Red Deer losses totalling four will give the Ooks first place. The Ooks are firmly in first in the ACAC with a 16-3 record, while

Red Deer is 11-6 and Camrose stands at 10-9. The Ooks maintained their No. 2 national ranking and could move up in the near future. Meanwhile Red Deer is expected to drop from No. 4.

**ON THE BENCH:** The NAIT Ooks are hurting in more ways than one. Brian Keates and Larry Oswald are listed as doubtful for this weekend's action... Brian Hermanutz and Jim Lee lead all NAIT players in the scoring derby, and are in the top five of the league....On Saturday, February 4th the Ooks tangle with the SAIT Trojans in a 7:30 match-up. The following afternoon the Ooks entertain the Mount Royal Cougars at 2:00 P.M. See You There!

## Ooks B-Ball

The NAIT Ookpiks hosted the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings and the Red Deer College Kings over the weekend, and in grand fashion, won both games.

In Friday's game against the Vikings, the Ooks put away six baskets before the Vikes replied. The Vikings had good moves, but around the nets the Ooks dominated. Near the end of the first half the Vikings got competitive and were able to hold the Ooks to a 20 point lead for the rest of the game.

In the first half, the Ooks ran into a bit of foul trouble and allowed the Vikings some free throws.

After dominating the game, the Ooks closed it off with pizzazz as Bill Rehlaue took a last second shot which scored from almost half court. The final score for the game was 67-46 for the Ooks.

The high scorers for the Ooks were Scott McLaren with 20 points, Jim Barnet with 12 points and Darrel Ziehr with 10 points.

Saturday's game was similar to Friday's game. This time the victims were the Kings.

After a respectable first half by both teams, the score was 36-24 for the Ooks. In the second half, the Ooks jumped out to a 20 point lead and kept it for the rest of the game. The final score was 75-55 for the Ooks.

Coach Dave Hoy said that one of the team's goals is to play for 40 minutes of intensity. He also felt that the Ooks played a better game on Saturday. The team has now come together and as a result has a much greater depth. The Ooks can readily make changes without worrying about the quality of play. This will be a strong factor as the team travels to Medicine Hat and Lethbridge this weekend and the Ooks come to what Dave Hoy referred to as "the whole key to our season." Every game is a must win situation for the Ooks as they chase a playoff spot.

Scott McLaren showed why he was athlete of the week as he scored 18 points in Saturday's game. Close behind were Mike Klein with 14 points and Bill Rehlaue with 10 points.

## Ooks V-ball

The Grant MacEwan Griffins visited the NAIT Ookpiks on Wednesday, Jan 25 and walked away with a 3-1 win.

The Ooks lost the first two sets before winning the third. It seemed that the Ooks were about to make a comeback, but they fell behind early in the fourth set and just couldn't come back.

Although the Ooks tried, there was little intensity present on the court. On the other side of the net however, the Griffins had momentum and emotion behind them.

The Ooks now find themselves in the ticklish position of having to beat Red Deer College on the road in order to garner a playoff berth.

game against Red Deer which is on the following Wednesday.

The Chicks won their Friday night match with a score of 49-40 in front of a sizeable home crowd. Although coach Gregg Meropoulos felt that his team did not play too well, he said that "we'll take the win."

The first half of Friday's game was not too pretty. It seemed that the Chicks could not hold onto the ball and the Vikettes could not make a good pass. The score at halftime was 18-13 in favor of the Chicks.

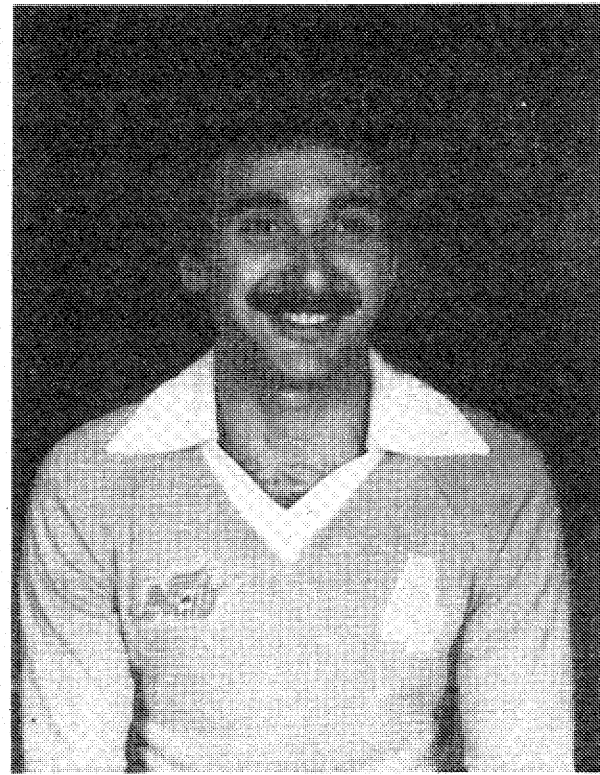
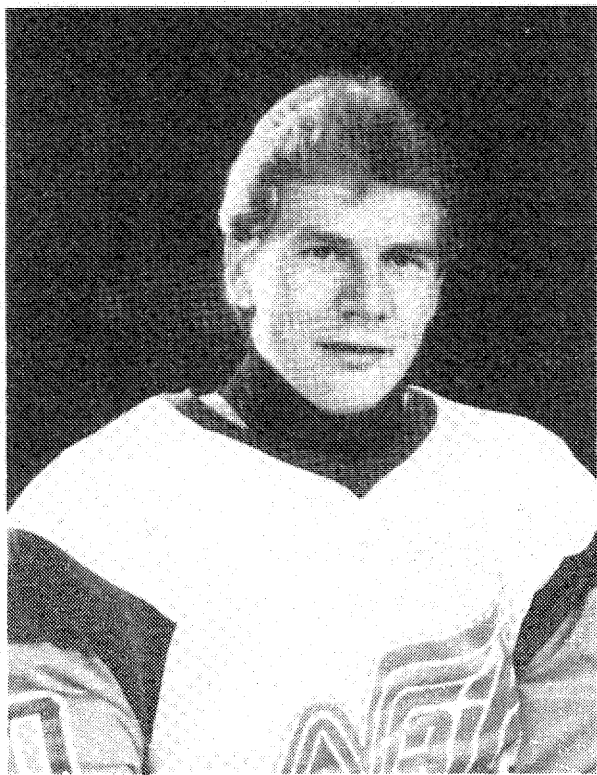
## ATHLETES OF THE WEEK

## Lesson #109 "The Beer Family"

Certainly, the two most popular members of the beer family today are lagers and ales. Lagers (sometimes called pilseners) originated in Germany and are made with a bottom-fermenting yeast that settles during fermentation.

Ale is the traditional and hearty English brew. Unlike lager, ale is made with a top-fermenting yeast and more hops. So the colour is darker and the taste heartier.

Heartier still are the porters and stouts. Brewed the same as ales, extra ingredients like roasted malt, barley or flaked oats account for their characteristically robust, full-bodied flavour and deep colouring.

The newest additions to the beer family are the light beers. Brewed with less alcohol, fewer calories and a lighter flavour, it seems that what people like about them most is not what they have, but what they don't have.

All in all, the beer family provides something for almost every taste and lifestyle. That's a lot of tastes to please.

Fortunately, it's one big happy family.
