NAITSA INCREASES CABARET SECURITY



You are probably well aware by now that security at cabarets is being discussed. At the recent Mid-term Mania Bash, several fights broke out. Eventually, the fights were controlled, but this situation could have turned into a disaster. If you are not aware, a few years ago, the Alberta Liquor Control Board (ALCB), took away NAIT's liquor license, which meant no cabarets for the rest of that year.

As a result, NAITSA, and the General Council passed a motion to have a minimum of 2 city policemen at each cabaret that has an attendance of 400 or more. With a city policeman present, they would be able to control a bad situation properly and quickly. Also, just the presence of a policeman could make the yahoos who want to cause some trouble, and ruin the party for everyone else, think twice before doing something stupid.

Part of the problem at the Mid-term Bash was that the bouncers that were used, were not experienced. With only volunteers used as bouncers, you cannot expect them to handle every situation perfectly, and some of the bouncers admitted that they did not know what to do when the fights broke out. Therefore, experienced bouncers should be used at all cabarets. They can be hired from NAITSA at \$6.00 per hour, per bouncer, and they can professionally control any problems that arise.

Since the bouncers are paid, they will be completely serious about what they are doing, and not have a few drinks or mingle with some friends. A good example of proper security was at Beerfest. There were about 30 bouncers at Beerfest, and they did not drink or mingle. They stood along the walls and were completely visible to everyone. When it appeared that a disturbance could arise, some bouncers moved close to the scene, to give the message to the trouble makers. With this type of security, the possibility of trouble rarely occurred.

If a very serious infraction of NAITSA bylaws occurs at a cabaret, the tech that is involved can be punished. If there are more people at a cabaret than the liquor license allows, the tech can lose a dollar per person over the limit, which would decrease profits. The NAITSA General Council could take away the privilege to have a liquor license for that tech. The tech would be allowed to defend itself, but a vote by the General Council could take the license away. The ALCB could also refuse to give liquor licenses to that tech or NAIT as a whole.

The cabarets at NAIT are great, but it seems that there are always a few people at each cabaret who can ruin it for everyone. To insure that these cabarets stay great, the security must be good. If the security is not good, NAIT could lose its liquor license like it did a few years ago.

ACTISEC

The first ACTISEC meeting for the school year was held in Vermillion, October 6, 1984.

For those of you not familiar with ACTISEC (Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council) it is an organization made up of members of the Student Associations throughout Alberta. ACTISEC exists to serve as a focal point for college and technical institutes. Issues of mutual concern, both internally (within the individual schools) and externally (government legislation, public concerns) are discussed and subsequent action taken. ACTISEC members share the common belief that results are most effectively reached by co-operative communication with outside agencies and departments. Issues requiring ACTISEC input are dealt with in a mature, business-like and diplomatic manner.

The meeting in Vermillion was well attended with 9 out of 12 member institutions represented. The first part of the meeting was spent discussing the ACTISEC budget and how best to distribute fees among the member institutes. It was decided to assess each school on a modified per capita basis.

Concern had been expressed during past meetings about transferability of courses between institutions. Mr. Brian Trorian, a member of the Alberta Council on Admissions and Transfers, spoke to us and outlined the procedures a student must follow to obtain credit for courses taken in other institutions. We obtained 6 copies of the 1984-85 Provincial Transfer Guide which provides up to date

information on transferability. The Registrars' Office has copies of this guide and your department head will be able to provide you with specific course information.

The ACTISEC chairman, Robin Nering, and myself have been working on a presentation to the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund. The proposal involves the establishment of the Charles S. Nobel Student Leadership Award. This award will be directed to post-secondary students who demonstrate outstanding dedication and leadership to fellow students and the community. It will also serve as an incentive for other students, who may otherwise remain uninvolved, to take positions of leadership in their institutions. The proposal has been accepted by the Director of the Scholarship Fund, Mr Leon Lubin and endorsed by all members of ACTISEC and the University of Alberta Students Union. It is presently under review and we are hopeful that the award will be established in the near future.

Every ACTISEC meeting has an information sharing session. Each institute gives a presentation and information is exchanged. This is a very important part of ACTISEC in that it creates a support system for the Student Associations.

The next ACTISEC meeting will be held at Grant McEwan College on December 1. The organization exists for the students of Alberta. We believe we can get things accomplished. If you have concerns please come and see Greg Scherf (NAITSA President) or myself in E133C or E133D.

CHEMICAL TECHNOLOGY

Many people ask, "What do chemical technologists do?" Chemical technology covers a very wide range of fields. Chemical technologists are employed in environmental study and research, chemical production and quality control, food industries, oil and hydrocarbon study and research, chemical sales, general chemical research, and other fields too numerous to mention.

Training of chemical technologists is concentrated in the areas of inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry, and instrumental analysis.

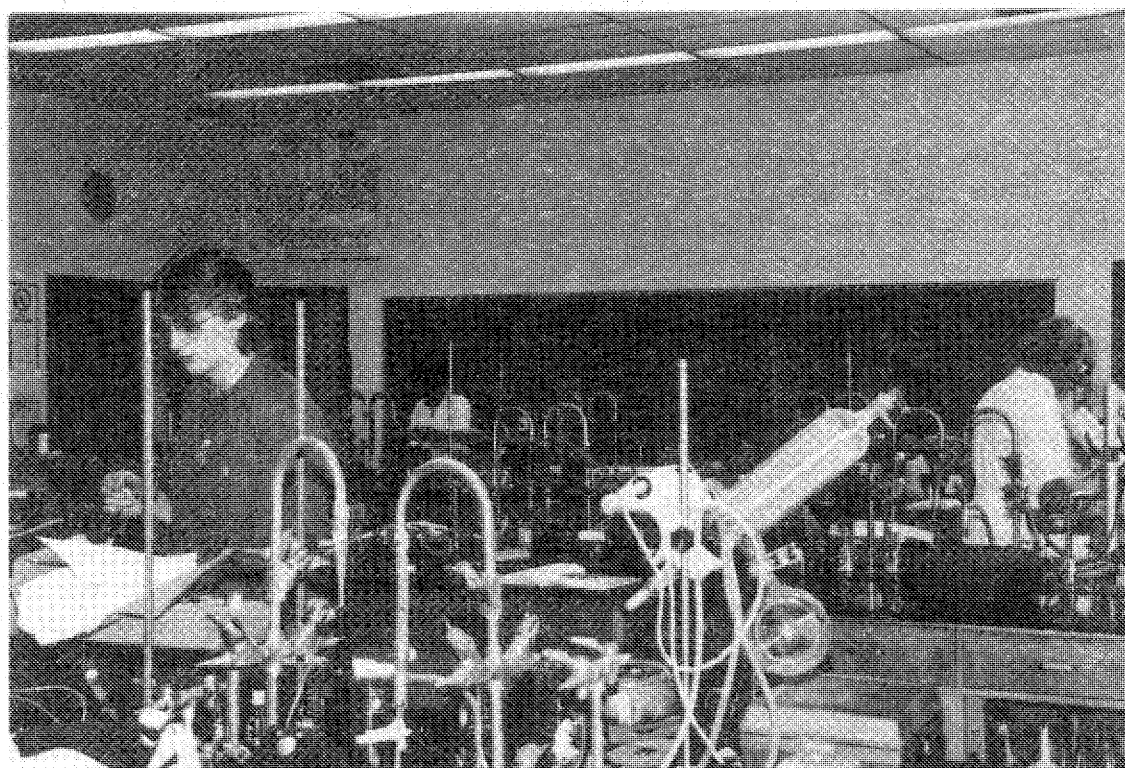
Inorganic chemistry involves qualitative tests for commonly occurring substances and quantitative tests by gravimetric, general volumetric, redox, and precipitation analysis. Physical testing of materials and chemicals is studied. Students are also trained in the set-up, operation, and analysis of bench scale models of selected industrial processes of chemical related industries.

Instrumental analysis is a field of chemistry related to the analysis of substances. Students are trained in the operation and understanding of instruments involved in gas and liquid chromatography, ultraviolet/visible and infrared spectroscopy, nuclear magnetic resonance, and electrochemical analysis. This field is used for both qualitative and quantitative analysis of substances.

Other areas of instruction include safety and first aid procedures, physics of light, physical chemistry, coal and heavy oil, biochemistry, glassblowing, basic electronics, and BASIC computer programming.

One of the unique courses in chemical technology is one in which students choose their own major experiment. The entire experiment is researched, performed, and reported by each student. In past years, industry has given us input into this course, and project reports have become a significant factor in the ability of students to receive jobs.

A recent industry evaluation of the quality of chemical technology programs and their graduates has NAIT's chemical technology program as the second best in Canada. This is a credit to NAIT, the chemical technology department, and the instructors. We are now going for number one.



The NAIT chemistry section has been selected to host the 1986 college chemistry Canada conference. This conference is attended by instructors from colleges and technical institutes across Canada and features some of North America's top speakers on chemical education. Chemical students and alumni are expected to assist in the organization of the conference.

We also have a 300 member alumni association. Their excellent reputation in the workplace always helps new graduates to get jobs. This is shown in that all but three of the 1984 grads have found jobs in their chosen fields. A former chem. tech. graduate, George Cunningham, is president of the Canadian Society of Chemical Technology.

Chem. techs. have been very successful with their involvement in intramural sports. We placed third overall in '83-'84 with a department of only 90 students. This shows the ability of the students to divide their time between the most demanding work load at NAIT and extracurricular activities.

Our department has held annual student - staff softball games since 1970. Our I-M hockey team is sponsored by Chemonics Scientific, who supplies our sweaters.

Chem. tech. students love the life away from their studies. Each year, our department organizes as many ski trips as possible, complete with chalets, parties, and hangovers. In past years, trips to Jasper and Whitefish have been most popular.

The chem. students also organize parties and cabarets, whether it's just a get-together or related to other functions such as our annual golf tournaments and slowpitch games. Our alumni are instrumental in organizing the annual Halloween Cabaret, ski-trips, and other functions.

We hope to have a lot of fun this year, and we would be happy to get involved in social events with other techs. Hope all the students have a fantastic year.

ENGINEERING DESIGN & DRAFTING TECHNOLOGY

This two year technology program is designed to prepare young men and women to be engineering assistants. They not only produce drawings of other peoples' designs, but also assist in the design process itself. The technical skills and knowledge acquired by students in E.D.D.T. provide job entry skills that are a valuable stepping stone to advancement. In order to keep pace with industry the *CADD system has been added to the 2nd year curriculum.

The E.D.D.T. student acquires knowledge of and skills in a number of drafting disciplines such as architectural,

electrical, mechanical, municipal, piping, structural and survey. A number of math and English courses are also taught to supplement the students knowledge. This enables a graduate to enter a number of fields of work from general drafting to more specialized areas such as pressure vessels.

While the engineering field is predominately male, drafting is becoming an occupation chosen by women and is an ideal outlet for their talents.

As a graduate of Engineering Design and Drafting Technology the student will find their chosen field rewarding and useful. The skills and knowledge they have acquired will provide them with the ability to succeed in their chosen occupation and to go on to further accomplishments should they so chose.

Terminator

The "Terminator" starring Arnold Schwarzenegger ("Conan, The Barbarian") is the story of a cyborg (part man, part machine), sent from the future to present-day Los Angeles on a deadly mission -- to kill a young woman whose life will have great significance in decades to come. Kyle Reese, a young but hardened guerilla fighter, portrayed by Michael Biehn, also is sent back in time to protect the Terminator's unsuspecting victim Sarah Connor (played by Linda Hamilton) from the relentless onslaught of the killer

machine. From their first terrifying fight to the deadly climax, the Terminator and Reese leave a path of destruction in their wake.

For big Schwarzenegger fans this movie is ok, but for hard-core science-fiction addicts it falls a little short. And for the first time in his career Arnold Schwarzenegger is handed a role that he can do something with. Instead of merely flexing his muscles for the camera.

"Give My Regards To Broadstreet"

"Give My Regards To Broad Street" is Paul McCartney's first movie since "Let It Be", fourteen years ago. A full-scale musical, it recounts the day in the mind of a pop star when the worst thing that could happen to him happens: The master tapes for his new album, a year in the making, disappear.

From then "Broad Streets" plot leaves equal room for musical excursions and visual flights of fantasy, and the search for the missing tapes nears its midnight deadline suspicion falls on an ex-convict Paul who is befriended and given a job.

The title of the film is a Beattle-like pun on "Give My Regards To Broadway," substituting the name of a London railway station which served as one of the film's locations.

McCartney says, "I wanted to make the sort of movie that I like to see. It's an old-fashioned musical, a good night out, nothing heavy. Like most people I want to be entertained."

For McCartney - Beatle fans (Ringo and his wife also star) "Give My Regard To Broadstreet" is truly a delight. However, even McCartney admits that this movie is light and just for the fun of it.

"Give My Regards To Broadstreet" is a combination of MPL Productions and Liverpool playwright Willy Russell (author of the 1975 hit play about the Beatles, "John, Paul, Ringo and Bert"). Originally in the script McCartney wasn't going to be cast because he felt it wasn't right. Later, Tom Stoppard, another successful playwright, was added to the writing staff.


