SUMMER JOB CREATION:

Details have been released about the federal government's 1984 Summer Canada employment measures for students.

These measures will create jobs, (about 41,000) in experience-giving projects. These projects should employ at least three local students and result in tangible goods or services, which would benefit the community.

In other words, the primary focus of this \$170 million package is human resource development, through work experience which will improve career chances for 69,000 participants, and resulting in 333,000 placements.

According to John Roberts, Minister of Employment; "Our youth will need high-level skills to meet the demands of the labor market in the rest of the 1980s and (the) 1990s.... Summer Canada 1984 will provide students with an opportunity to acquire the work experience their future employers will be looking for."

The second major component, is Summer Career-Access. This is a program which involves a wage subsidy which provides internships for students in the public, private and non-profit sectors. These internships allow students to groom and develop skills and also, to gain work experience to make their transition from school to work easier. Eventually, approximately 12,000 jobs will come about in 1984 through Summer Career-Access. (about 30.5 million in funds will be available.)

Furthermore, Hire-A-Student offices will again be operating at more than 450 locations across Canada, providing a summer job placement service for students. There will be approximately 1,600 student placement officers making more than 333,000 placements in 1984.

In addition to all of this, 400 jobs will be created to provide internship for Native Students within the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission.

These internships will give Native Students an opportunity to learn about counselling and placement, as well as about other tasks performed in CEIC offices. (funding will be approximately \$2.3 million.)

Finally, part of Summer Canada 1984 are programs administered by the RCMP and Department of National Defence. These programs will provide career-enhancing experiences and work skills in a variety of trades for about 14,000 participants in a military, or police environment (funding for National Defence Program: \$13million; \$1.2 million for RCMP Program.)

OOKS CHAMPS AT VIKING CUP !!



The NAIT Ooks became the first Canadian team to capture the Viking Cup with a 3-0 shutout triumph over the Czechoslovakian Junior Selects on Tuesday, January

4th. The six-team Viking Cup Tournament in Camrose was a great success once again with the ACAC representatives turning in outstanding performances.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 4TH NAIT OOKS 3, CZECH JR. SELECTS 0

Before the Championship Game between NAIT and the Czechs, the other four placings in the tournament were decided. IFK Helsinki finished fifth with a 7-4 triumph over the St. Albert Saints. The Saints placed sixth. Camrose Lutheran College won a bronze medal with a 7-5 victory over the St. Paul Jr. Vulcans. The Vulcans wound up in fourth.

The atmosphere for the Championship Game was fitting. A sold out crowd of 1,700 watched one of the finest games ever played in Alberta. NHL scouts from 11 teams were on hand to make notes about future draft picks. Then at 8:00 pm the match between the defending Viking Cup champs the Czechoslovakian Junior Selects and the NAIT Ooks started.

The game was a defensive struggle. NAIT scored first when Randy Repchuk's powerplay goal found the net at 9:41 of the initial stanza. Franco Disciglio of the Ooks scored his eighth goal of the tournament at the 18:24 mark of the second on a great set-up from Gary Leach. NAIT Captain Brian Hermanutz iced the victory with a slapshot from a sharp angle that beat the Czech netminder, Iro Capek.

Then with five minutes left in the match, the NAIT Ooks knew they had won the Viking Cup. The key to the victory was NAIT goaltender Cleo Rowein who was superlative in foiling the Czechs 29 times.

NAIT won the Viking Cup and three Ooks received special recognition. The Tournament MVP was NAIT goaltender Cleo Rowein who allowed only eight goals in four matches. The all-star center was NAIT Captain Brian Hermanutz who picked up eight points at the tournament. Franco Disciglio was named as an all-winger for netting eight goals and setting up another.

The win by the Ooks was a team effort. Each player put the team first and himself second. To achieve further success, all 22 members must know his role on the Ooks and learn to accept the responsibility. The NAIT coaches did an outstanding job in preparing the team for the tournament, especially for the Czechs and must be commended for their persistence, alertness and confidence.

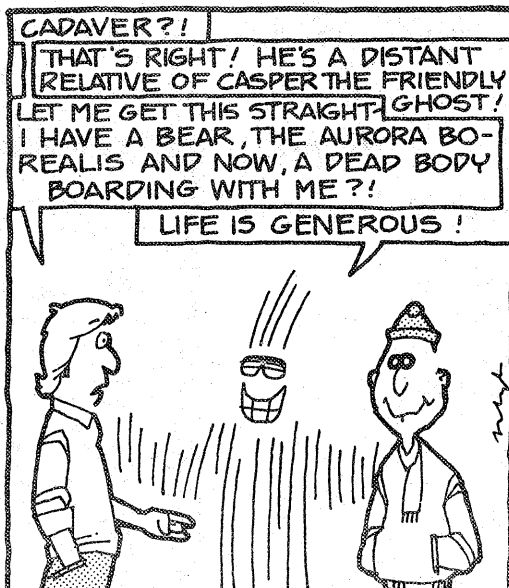

INCEST

A RISING PROBLEM

On Monday, Jan. 10, 1984, ITV aired the television show "Something About Amelia". The show presented a tactful approach to the problem. It also presented a therapeutic solution to a rising problem. In case no one saw it let me present you with a small version of the plot. The father has a wife and daughters (Amelia and Beth). Amelia was 13 years old and boys were just starting to be attracted to her. The father got quite uptight about her first date, and tried to make excuses for her not going. Apparently the father started to have sex with Amelia when she was 11 years old, and didn't want to stop. He didn't force her but rather told her that he loves her and that is how people who love each other expressing their love to one another. He also told her that if she told anyone he would be in big trouble. Poor Amelia was torn between two thoughts, at school other girls fathers didn't touch them and yet at home her father touched her. Finally Amelia, breaking under the pressure of these thoughts, went to a counsellor at school and told her what her father was doing with her. It goes on, but this version is small enough.

It was after seeing this show that I couldn't resist writing an editorial about this. I know it is a very sensitive issue but it is also one that very few "experts" have information about. I phoned various agencies and everybody was out or at a meeting (how convenient). It is also very hard to explain to someone over the phone why you want to get information on the topic, and not to sound like a KOOK.

How does one recognize a potential incest situation? One way to detect it is to see the touching between the parent and the child. If there is lots of soft touching, this is a good sign of an incestuous relationship. Another way to detect it, is an overly amount of reluctance to let the child to go out and see other friends. A third way, is that if the child runs away from home. A fourth way, if the child prefers on parent over another. A fifth way, if there is an excess of drinking by the offender. A sixth way to detect the problem is that if the offender talks about it to their friends, but not about sex but rather saying that the child will be "good" when they get older. These are, but a few of the tall tale signs of incest.

What can the system do for the poor children who suffer from this horrible and revolting situation? Social Services takes the child from the home immediately and will return the child only after the offender has left the home. While the child is at the Youth Centre, they would try to get the child to talk about it and get it out in the open where it would be better for the child. When the child is staying at the Youth Centre there would be other children with the same problem. There will be observation done by the Social Worker so she will have a better idea of how to handle the situation. There are alot of children out there who would not admit it out in the open. Sometimes it continues until the child leaves home or if the parents get a divorce for some other reason. There will always be some memories of these situations of fear and nervousness but the only way to get it out of your system is to talk about it. This isn't a popular topic to talk about and it's not well known in Edmonton.

There are many ways to approach a like situation; such as Social Services, Child Abuse Centre, Police or your Guidance Counsellor at school and or even tell your best friend and see what they say about it. Remember if you have this problem tell someone, don't keep it inside of you!

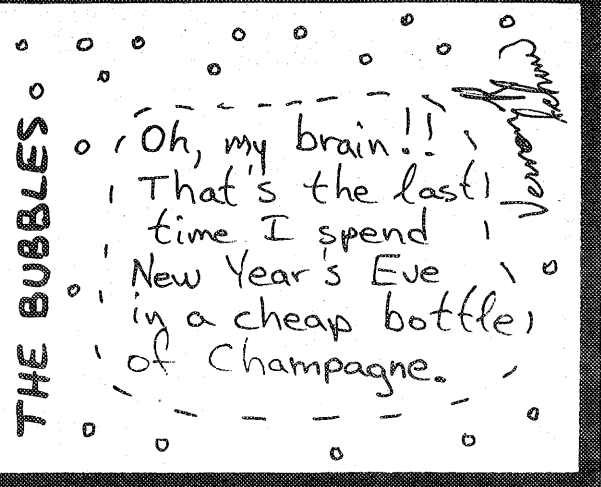

MOVIE REVIEW

Finally the movie companies most prized possessions have been released. Their year end hopefuls, and there a lot of them. They seem to edge out of the woodwork just before Christmas. In the hope that they might capture a glimmer of light to be seen on the Academy Awards. Some of these hopefuls include "Scarface", "Silkwood", "Two of a Kind", "Sudden Impact", "Yentl", "Terms of Endearment", "Gorky Park", and the "Last River to Cross".

SCARFACE A Universal Release

In MAY, 1980, Fidel Castro opened the harbor at Mariel, Cuba, to let some of his people join their families in the United States.

Most of the 125,000 "Marielitos" who streamed into Florida were honest hard-working people--eager for a new life in a free land.

But not all. Castro seized the opportunity to play Samaritan while exporting Cuba's crime rate to the United States. Hidden among the newcomers were the dregs of the island's jails, criminals considered beyond redemption.

They, too, say America as a land of opportunity.

Among the most ambitious was Tony Montana, the one called "Caracortada"...Scarface.

A Martin Bregman Production of a Brian De Palma Film, Al Pacino is "Scarface," which also stars Steven Bauer, Michelle Pfeiffer, Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio and Robert Loggia. A Universal Picture, it is produced by Martin Bregman and directed by Brian De Palma from a screenplay by Oliver Stone.

SILKWOOD A 20th Century-Fox Release

In her first film since her Academy Award winning performance in "Sophies Choice", Meryl Streep starts in the title role of "Silkwood", an ABC Motion Pictures' presentation of a Mike Nichols film.

"Silkwood" is based on the personal and professional struggles of Karen Silkwood, who died in a mysterious car crash in 1974 while she was attempting to expose the dangers in the plutonium plant in which she worked. TWO OF A KIND A 20th Century-fox Release

There are certain names in Hollywood that seem to belong together, names that ultimately evoke the special kind of screen chemistry which guarantees audiences a memorable time. Ever since they met on screen five years ago, John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John have been recognized as that special kind of screen couple--which is in no small measure due to the fact that their debut film together, "Grease", stands as the most successful musical of all time.

SUDDEN IMPACT A Warner Bros. Release

"Sudden Impact", starring Clint Eastwood, is the story of Harry Callahan, better known as Dirty Harry, San Francisco's street-wise homicide detective, on the trail of a ritualistic murderer.

Callahan is given this assignment because it will take him out of San Francisco, where his controversial police tactics have once again drawn criticism from the mayor's office. He is sent to a small northern California fictional coastal resort called San Pavlo, which is the hometown of one of the victims. There he meets a solitary artist named Jennifer Spenser (Sondra Locke) who harbors a mysterious resentment of his presence.

With the help of his partner, Harace King (Albert Popwell), a bulldog named Meathead, and some new firepower, Callahan methodically begins to put the puzzle together. Contrary to the hopes of his department, things do not stay quiet, as Dirty Harry

finds himself cleaning up an armed robbery, assassination attempts on his own life, and a very nasty and unusual murder case. The film was produced and directed by Eastwood from a screenplay by Joseph Stinson from a story by Earl E. Smith and Charles B. Pierce.

THROUGH THE LOOKING GLASS

Workshop West Theatre put on this play over the Christmas Holidays for a great entertainment for the kids and older people alike. Through the Looking Glass is a childhood fantasy of a little girl that we all know--Alice.

Alice (played by Lenny Albanese) played the perfect little girl. She was small with a childlike body (like some of the Business Students I know) and also had a great little girl act. When she played Alice, she added a nice touch of comedy to her acting to give it an enjoyable touch.

The White Queen (Susan Sneath) and the Red Queen (Anne McGrath) could not have done a better job. Leading Alice to her final destination, the Eighth Square on the chess board, to become a queen, made the two

queens go out of their way for Alice.

Both the White (Sparky Johnson) and Red (Doug Kier) Kings were lazy and very relaxed in their rolls. They were in little carts being pushed around the chess board, while sleeping the day away while occasionally waking to talk to Alice. They tried to help Alice to the Eighth Square.

The play starts out as the play "Alice in Wonderland" starts out, with Alice talking to Chester the Cat and daydreaming about how life would be somewhere else. But to show that they were on a train, they had a person on the top level of the scaffold with a little toy train. Everything was done to make it look like a fantasy land.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 16th-NAIT OOKS 8, STETTLER SABRES 3 AT STETTLER ARENA

Four second period markers spurred the NAIT Ooks to an 8-3 victory over the Stettler Sabres, an intermediate club, in a benefit match on Friday, December 16th at the Stettler Arena.

At the 1:50 mark of the first, Mark Cassidy of Stettler opened the scoring. Three minutes and 43 seconds followed before Randy Repchuk placed the Ooks on equal terms on a Kevin Hayes set-up. The Sabres' powerplay capitalized at 7:44. Norm Ternes notched the goal for Stettler giving Stettler a 2-1 advantage. At 12:16, NAIT's Gary Hoekstra tied the game at 2-2.

The Hayes Brothers teamed up to give the Ooks a 3-2 lead. Kevin assisted on Garth's goal with 4:06 elapsed in the middle frame. Two minutes and 24 seconds later, Ken Duncan of Stettler evened the score at 3-3. NAIT moved into the lead for good with Jim Lee's tally at 9:28 from Kevin Imrie. At the 10:43 mark, Gary Hoekstra found the net for the second time to increase NAIT's lead to 5-3. Tom Tookey was credited with an assist. With five minutes left in the period, Gary Hoekstra completed the hat trick with his second unassisted effort.

Don Simpson turned on the red light with 57 seconds gone in the third to give the Ooks a 7-3 advantage. At 13:30, NAIT's Kevin Imrie completed the night's scoring on a Jim Lee set up.

The evening was especially gratifying for the Paul Balmer family of Stettler as over \$3800 was raised to send one of their children to Toronto for a heart operation.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 17th-NAIT ALUMNI MATCH-WHITE 8, BLUE 5 AT NAIT ARENA

A number of familiar faces turned up on Saturday, December 18th for the annual NAIT Alumni Match in which the White Squad outscored the Blue Squad 8-5.

One of the current Ooks, Dave Simmons gave the Blue Squad a 1-0 lead at 6:24 of the initial stanza on a play with Jim Lee and Jamie Bartman. Four minutes and nine seconds passed before the White Squad tied up the match. Kent Wilmont and Greg Fischer set up former teammate Warren Sanregret for the tying goal.

Going into the Viking Cup Tournament, the hardest task for the NAIT Ooks would be to adapt to their international opponents. Before the Ooks took the ice for their initial contest against the St. Paul Junior Vulcans, there was a feeling of confidence and desire in the NAIT dressing room. The Ooks wanted to win.

In the opening contest of the tourney, the Ooks scored a 6-3 come-from-behind victory over the St. Paul Jr. Vulcans of the United States Hockey League.

Following a shaky first period, the Ooks gained strength as the contest developed. NAIT trailed 2-1 following the first. The Ooks jumped into a 4-3 lead after 40 minutes of play. In the final stanza, NAIT sealed the victory with a pair of goals.

At 8:00 pm on Friday, the Czech Jr. Selects made their debut at the 1984 Viking Cup Tournament. The Czechs acquired an 8-0 lead over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings after two periods. The Vikings rebounded with six goals in the third, before dropping a 9-6 decision to the Czechs. The final Czech goal was an empty net effort.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 31st-NAIT OOKS 7, IFK HELSINKI 2

Behind the strong goaltending of Cleo Rowein, the NAIT Ooks advanced to the semi-finals of the Viking Cup by downing the IFK Helsinki Junior team 7-2 in the 12:00 pm match on Saturday.

The Finns moved into a quick 1-0 lead with 25 seconds elapsed in the first on a quick wrist shot by Jarkko Laiho. Hugh McCaskill tied the contest on the NAIT powerplay at 9:24.

The Ooks scored three straight goals in the middle period. Franco Disciglio notched two and Randy Repchuk connected for one.

The third period was dominated by the Ooks. Franco disciglio completed the hat trick. Gary Leach and Gary Hoekstra of NAIT found the net for the first time in the tournament. Kari Tuiskula received credit for the second IFK Helsinki goal.

IFK goaltender Matti Makarainen turned away 27 NAIT drives. Cleo Rowein of the Ooks was tested 32 times by IFK Helsinki.

Later on Saturday afternoon, the Czech Jr. Selects built up a commanding 7-0 lead after two frames and went on to defeat the St. Albert Saints 8-3. With the win, the Czechs also advanced to Monday's semi-final.

The Camrose victory over St. Albert brought two ACAC rivals together in one of Monday's semi-final match-ups. The NAIT Ooks utilized their knowledge of the CLC Vikings in winning 6-3 over the tournament's hosts.

Brian Hermanutz and Franco Disciglio of the Ooks accounted for the first period scoring.

The teams traded goals in the second. Gary Leach, Franco Disciglio and Kevin Imrie tallied for NAIT. Bert Oleson, Dean Paprotika and Lloyd McKinney replied for the Vikings.

An insurance marker by Gary Leach of the Ooks finished the afternoon's scoring.

Cleo Rowein turned in another stellar performance in the NAIT nets blocking 37 shots. At the other end, the Camrose tandem of Ward Willson and Wayne Fischer blocked 23 NAIT shots. 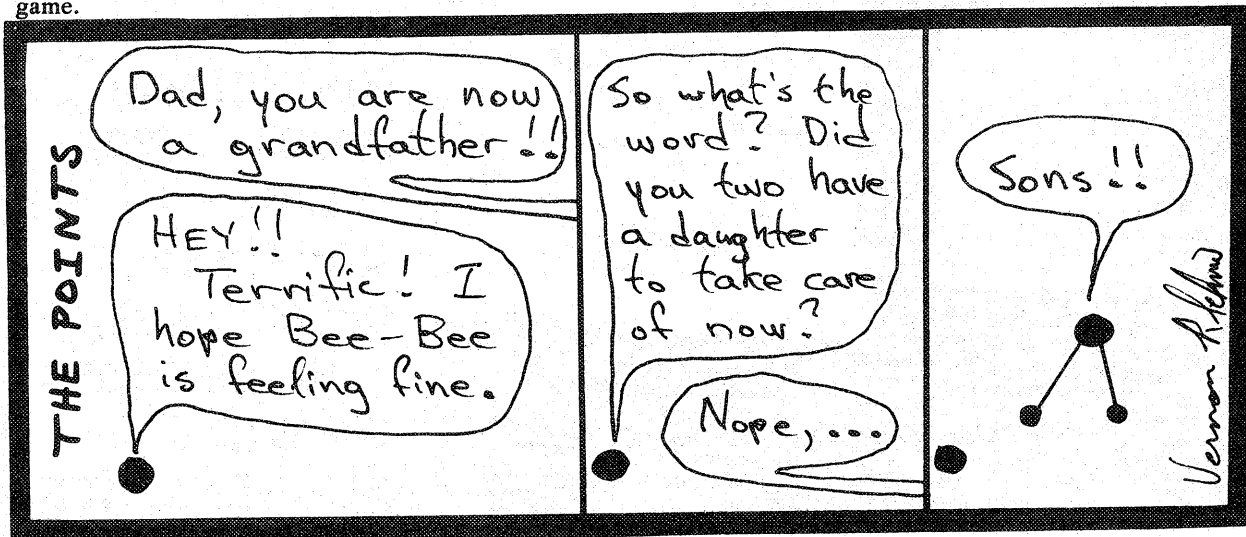
The next time the circus, er, SAIT is in town is February 25. Come out that Saturday and have a good laugh at an unclass act.

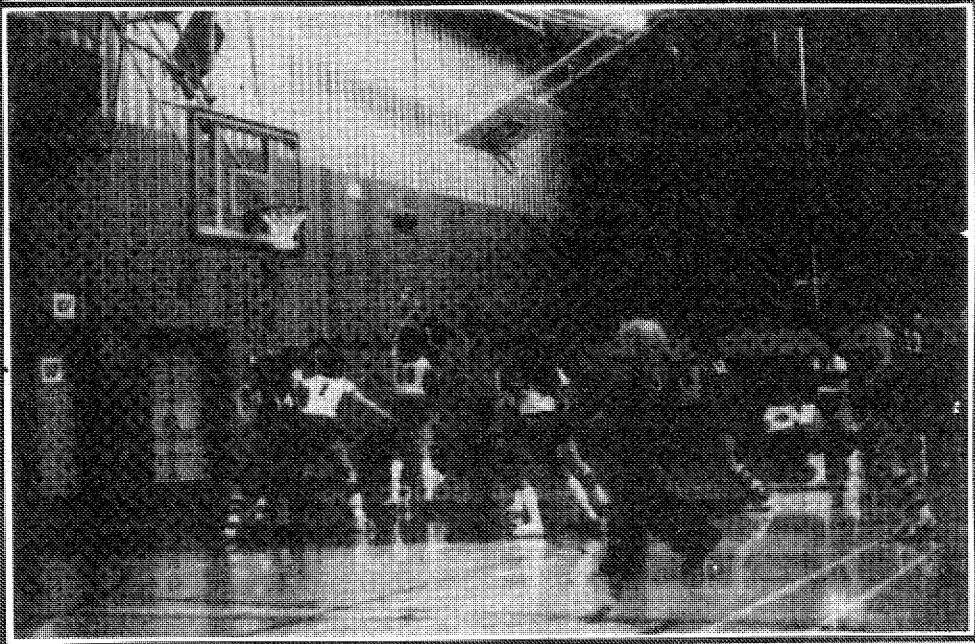

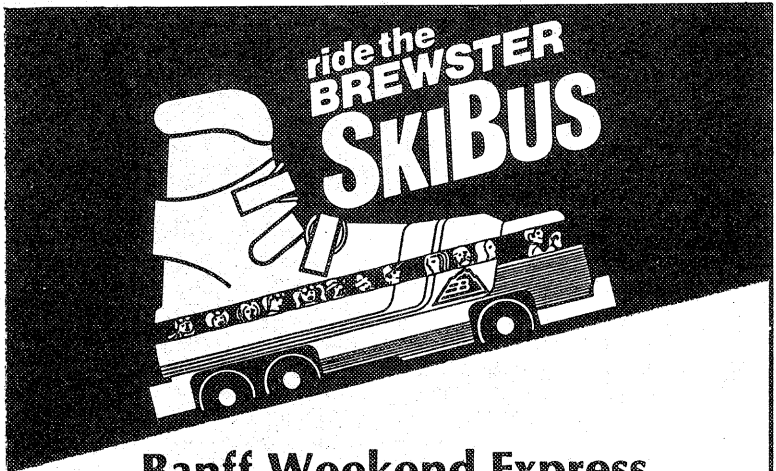

WRITE A RESUME THAT WORKS

Since the main purpose of a resume is to get interviews, your resume should make you come alive and look interesting to the reader. Prospective employers are looking for people who get things done and who will become part of the team. What follows are tips on writing a resume that works.

Consider yourself first. The next time you hear yourself saying, "I don't think it's important" or "It's no big deal" about somethings you've done, reconsider. What you are really saying is "I'm not important" and "What I've done, doesn't matter."

Sell what you have done. You need to translate your character traits, your achievements and your accomplishments into skills. For example, if you can save, manage and invest money, you have developed money management skills; if you have developed church, school or sports programs or if you've been involved in fund raising, you have acquired skills in program development, problem solving, and conference management.

If you don't toot your own horn—who will? Some people—the young, those over 45, and housewives in particular—feel they have no abilities at all! Everybody has abilities, and one of yours could be just what an employer is looking for—but you must show it. Remember, they are not psychics out there.

Be specific, be concrete and be brief! The use of action and skill verbs, and facts and figures allows for short statements. The reader will also be able to picture the activity you were involved in. Statements, such as "assisted at 2 social functions/year for Travel Society", "participated in Fraser River 12 mile raft trip", "taught 12 farm safety seminars", and "coordinated school trip for 25 to France" are short, punchy and factual.

Be positive and enthusiastic. If you feel positive and good about yourself, it will ultimately show in your resume and in your interviews.

How to psych yourself up. Begin by taking the time (hours if necessary) to document your personal inventory record. Anyone who has ever worked in the warehouse or stockroom knows that you cannot know what's there unless you count everything! And everything you have done counts. Areas to be covered include: post-secondary education, memberships, activities, sports, employment, high school, personal data and other interests, such as travel, types of reading, and hobbies. Under each of these headings list who you did it for (organization), where you did it (city and province), when you did it (dates-years only) and what you did (scope of work, accomplishments and achievements). Don't hesitate to acknowledge yourself even if no one else patted you on the back. It's okay if you felt good about whatever you did and it's okay to mention it.

Ask yourself some questions?? "Have I ever identified and/or solved problems?", "Have I recommended any new programs which were implemented?", "Have I instituted new systems or procedures?", "Have I established goals or objectives?", "Have I ever experienced something so good happening to me that I couldn't wait to get home to share it with someone?", "Have I ever contributed to increasing of sales?", "Have I ever assisted in reducing expenses?", "Have I made any suggestions concerning new products which were introduced?"

Documenting your inventory. Because most people were simply jotting down thoughts at random, I published Barbara Teeple's guide through the resume workbook. This workbook was designed to assist you to think about things you've done and to document everything about yourself from your first job to current activities in a very systematic and organized way. I've taken the book one step further to allow you to "create" and "complete" your own resume.

How long/short should a resume be? If you have done a lot of things (you are dynamic), you will find it impossible to document your story on one page. Use as many pages as necessary, however, you must use a format that is easy to read. That is why I have developed (and clients have been using very successfully over the last 3 years) a quick-scan, chrono-functional, 3 column format.

Now write your resume as if you mattered. And keep in mind, the results of your resume (getting interviews) will be in direct proportion to the amount of effort you put into preparing it. Ensuring that your resume gets into the right hands will enhance your employment chances.

Keep your resume up to date. As soon as you complete your resume it will be out of date. Counter this concern by having your resume prepared by word processing with the understanding that updating will be available. You may spend more at the out set, in the long run it will be a better bargain—not only in money but in time as well. I now have clients throughout Canada, in Arizona and California, and as far away as Australia who contact me when an update is required.

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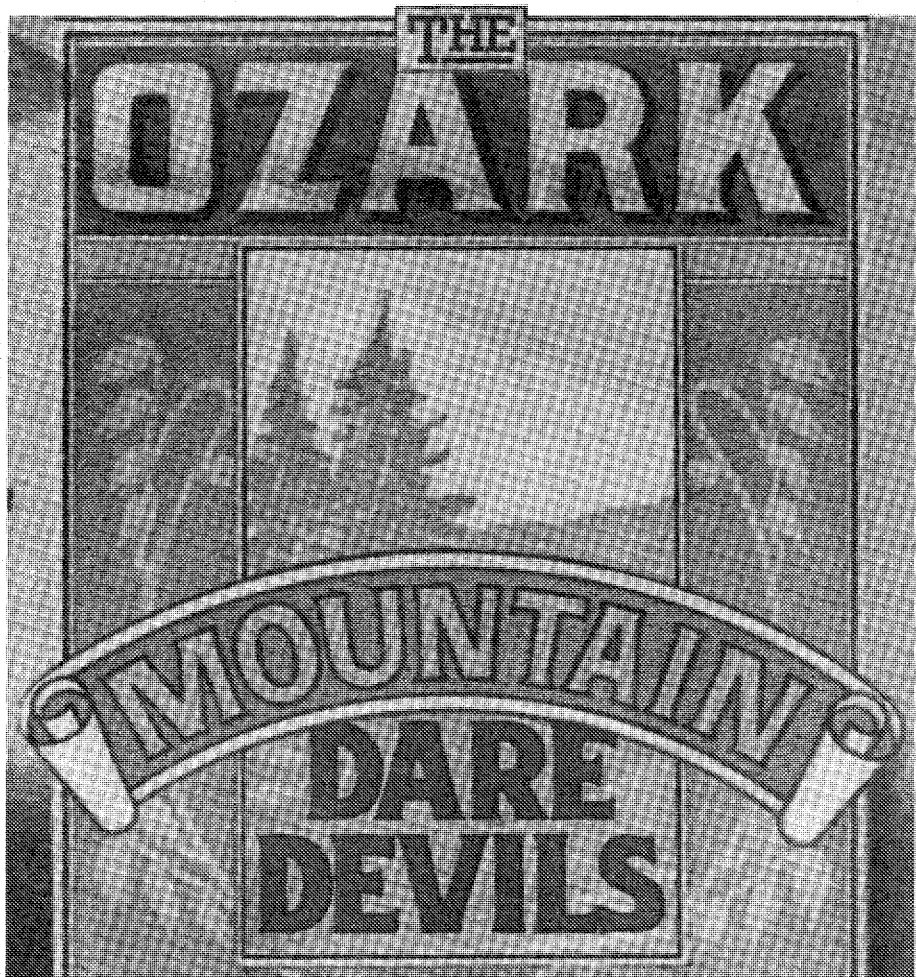
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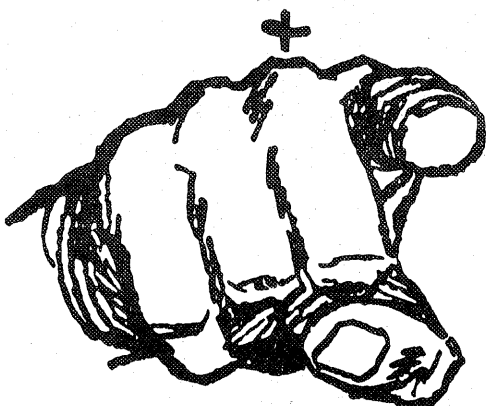

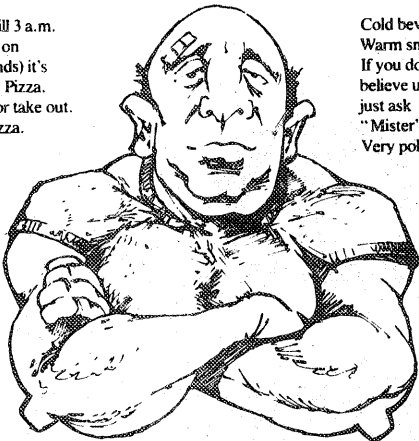
