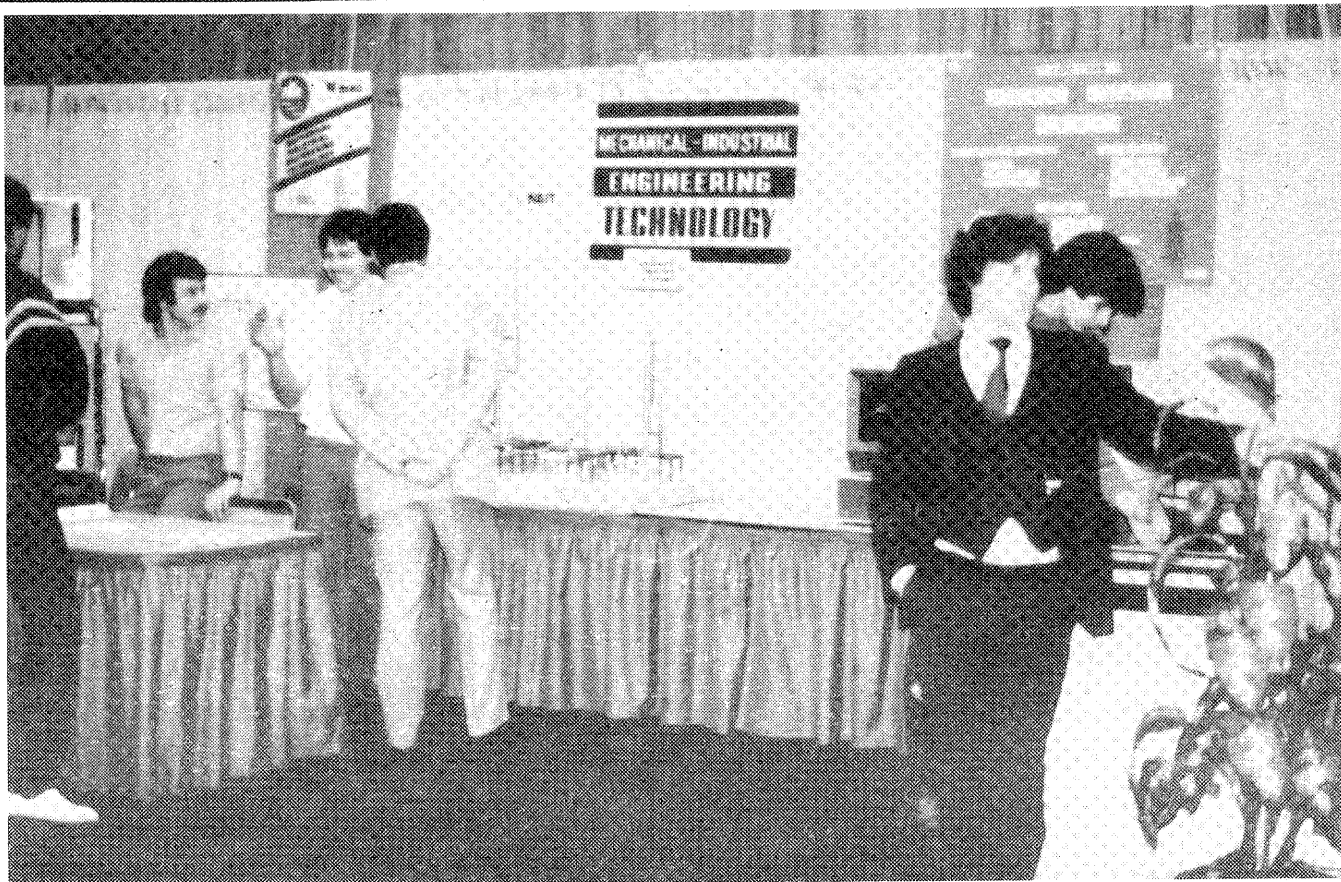

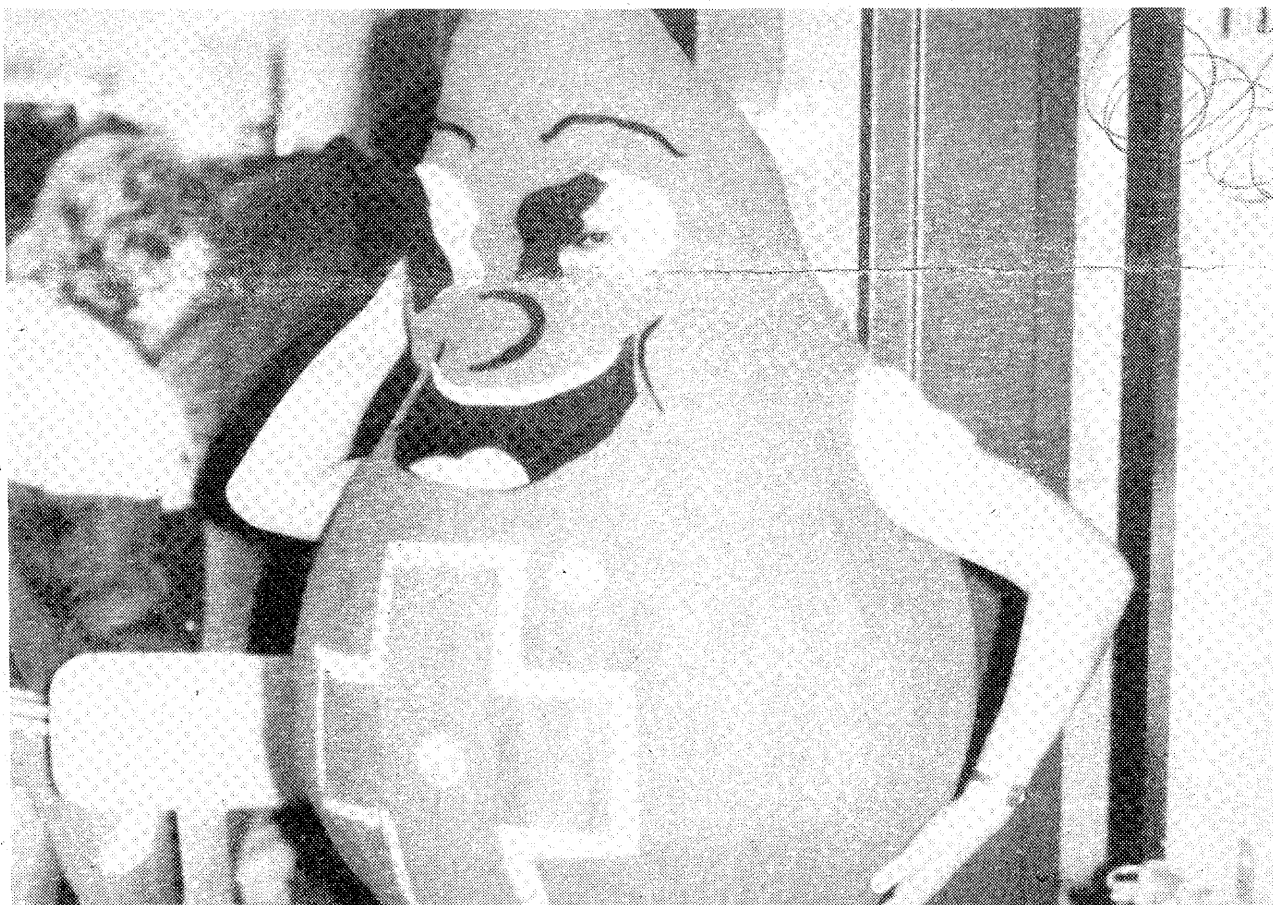

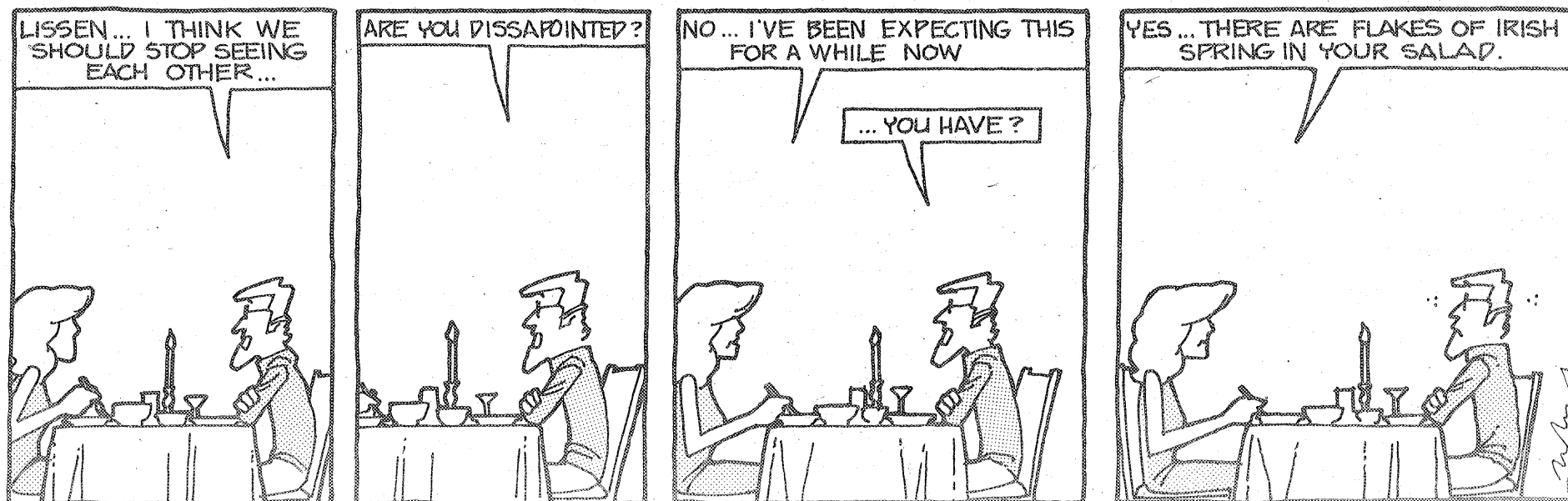

To imagine that these devices can continue to be manufactured and still avert a wide scale nuclear holocaust is totally unrealistic. We must look at this issue rationally and make decisions now that will preserve this planet in the future. "All we are saying is give peace a chance..."

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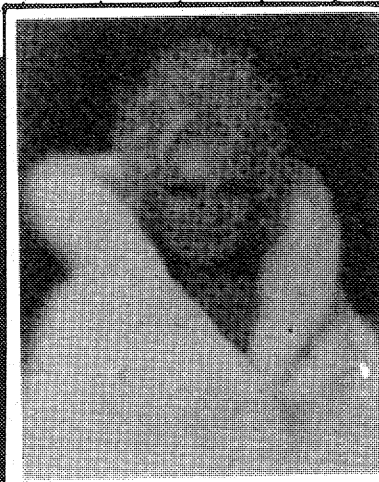

Ooks Hockey

The NAIT Ooks are ready to go for the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (national) championships in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec from March 21st through 25th. The Ooks are healthy and rested coming off a 12 day break between the ACAC finals and the CCAA championships.

NAIT will be in tough facing some very strong competition in the single knockout tournament. In the first match, NAIT will battle the Seneca Braves of Willowdale, Ontario on Thursday, the 22nd, at 5:00 p.m. EST, 3:00 p.m. Edmonton time. Cariboo College from Kamloops will be carrying the colors for B.C., Moose Jaw's Saskatchewan Technical Institute and Winnipeg's Red River College will be representing Saskatchewan and Manitoba respectively. Quebec will have two teams at the finals. The defending CCAA champions St. Hyacinthe is the host, while St. Georges de Beauce is the wild card club. The Cape Breton Islanders from Sydney, Nova Scotia round out the eight teams in the finals.

NAIT's first contest against Seneca is reminiscent of the 1982 CCAA championships in Calgary where NAIT defeated Seneca to capture the national title. The winner of the Alberta-Ontario match would probably tangle with one of the Quebec teams in the semi-final and the other in the final.

ON THE BENCH: NAIT coach Perry Pearn has been named ACAC Coach of Year, and is nominated for the CCAA Coach of the Year. Three Ooks are in the running for berths on the CCAA All-star team. They are netminder Cleo Rowein, blueliner Tom Tookey and center Brian Hermanutz. The NAIT Ooks have placed five players on the ACAC All-Star teams. Goaltender Cleo Rowein, blueliner Larry Oswald and Tom Tookey, and winger Jim Lee were all named to the first team. Center Brian Hermanutz is a member of the second team. The full story on the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (national) championships will be coming in two weeks. I'll be there to get the full story.

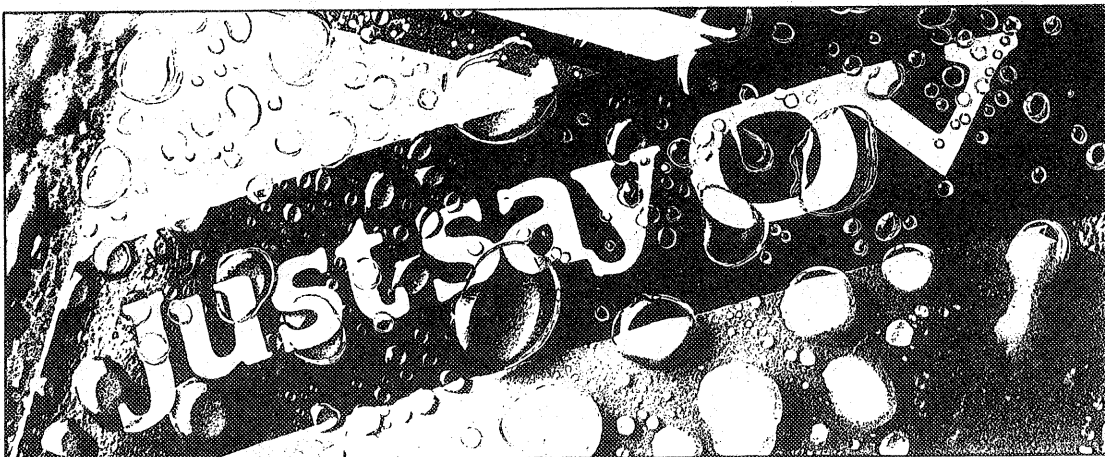

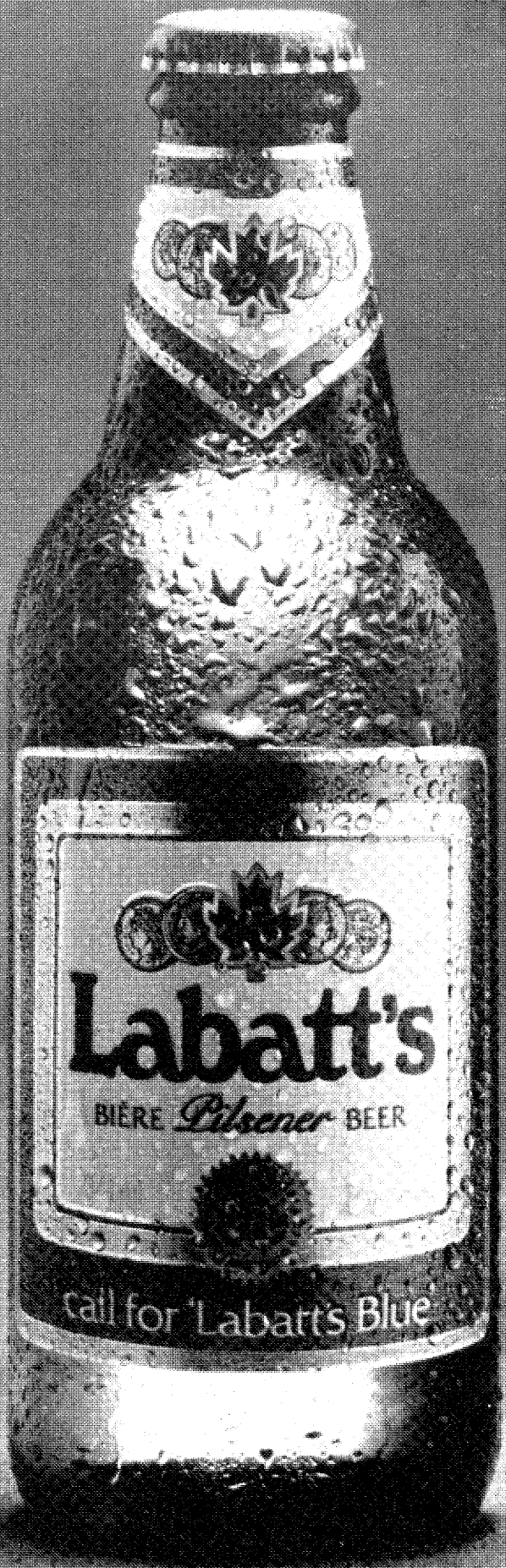

Dizzy Gillespie Nothwoods Inn

We arrived at approximately eight p.m., to find the dinner area of the Wintergarden Showroom barely one-quarter full; while the tables by the stage were almost already filled, (surprising because the show was only to start at eight thirty.) Perhaps the reason why the dinner area was almost bare was because it was opening night.

With the help of electric keyboards, the opening numbers transported the listeners to the very roots of jazz. The following numbers were more in the "modern" jazz vein.

The opening set was a bit disappointing to me, because I was expecting the forties style of jazz, as well as the "album sound" a first-time concert goer usually expects to hear.

Gillespie's band consisted of three other members, new to the Edmonton scene: on drums was Nassir Abdul Altomir, on tenor sax, flute and clarinette was Sahib Abdul Altomire, and finally, on bass fiddle and guitar, was Steve Bailey.

The first of Gillespie's 40's jazz, "Birk's Works", was an excellent tune played mainly by the baritone sax, with good clean tones and rhythms, while the bass fiddle tied in some very good improvs. By the expression on my companion's face Dizzy Gillespie's band is quite an experience for a first-time jazz listener.

The tune "Gee Baby Ain't I Good To You?" was sort of a "jazz-waltz", with the clarinette and trumpet carrying the jazz, and the bass and drums carrying the waltz tempo. The tune's high notes were accomplished with style and power and seemed to be reached as easily as breathing by Gillespie and Sahib Abdul Altomir. This tune was the type that I relate to best, one with clean, simple, uncomplicated jazz.

In between numbers and during intros, Gillespie displayed another facet of his versatility, by telling jokes which were witty as well as appropriate to the tunes he was introducing and the happenings on stage as well as in the audience.

"A Night In Tunisia" was a number in which was combined the usual "jazz chords" with music that would have been ahead of its time in the era in which it was written; soft rock music!

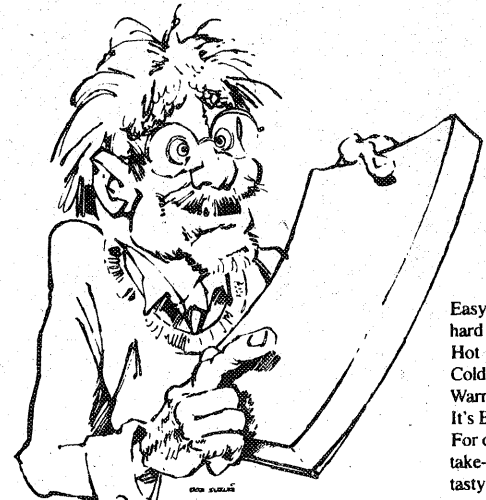
The only "low points" of the whole show were the lighting technicians, who, it seemed, did not know what they were doing, nor whom to follow threequarters of the time.

One of the numbers which the first-time jazz listener would be able to recognize at "first hear", would be their jazz rendition of the Beatles' "Yesterday" which was played with a jazz air to it. This turned out to be interesting combo.

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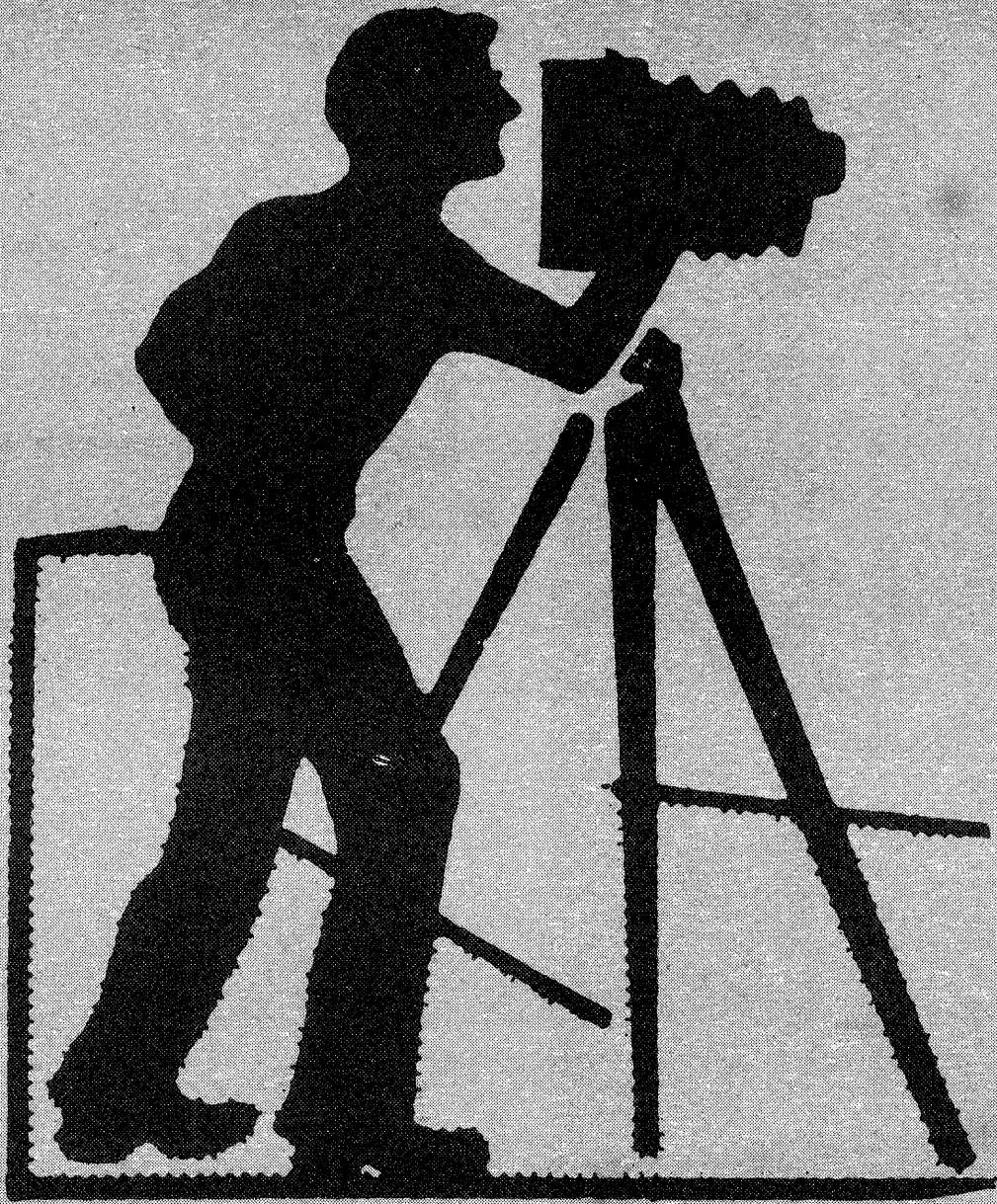
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A Lighter Side to Business

The Buddy System

For Joe Denniston, dreams are stuff that unrequited loves and unfinished novels are made of. For Emily Price, the world is a guantlet of steno tests in which her hands keep missing the keys. But within the comforting confines of friendship, these two will find the secret to reshaping their lives and discover an intimacy that makes falling in love look easy.

Richard Dreyfuss, Susan Sarandon, Nacy Allen and Jean Stapleton star in "The Buddy System", a romantic comedy about two people who find themselves by finding each other.

"The Buddy System" is about friendship and the nature of love," Alain Chammas, the producer, explains. "It's also about what happens to people who haven't quite grown up, who feel as if their lives haven't started yet. As John Lennon once wrote, "Life is what happens to you while you're making other plans." That's what this picture is about."

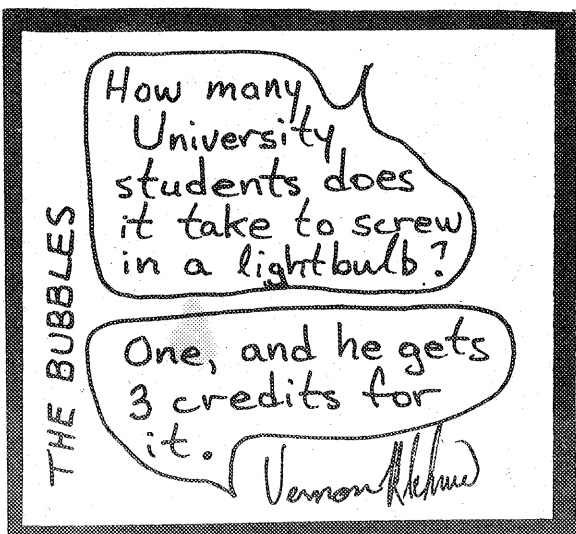
Telecom Madhatters Cabaret Review

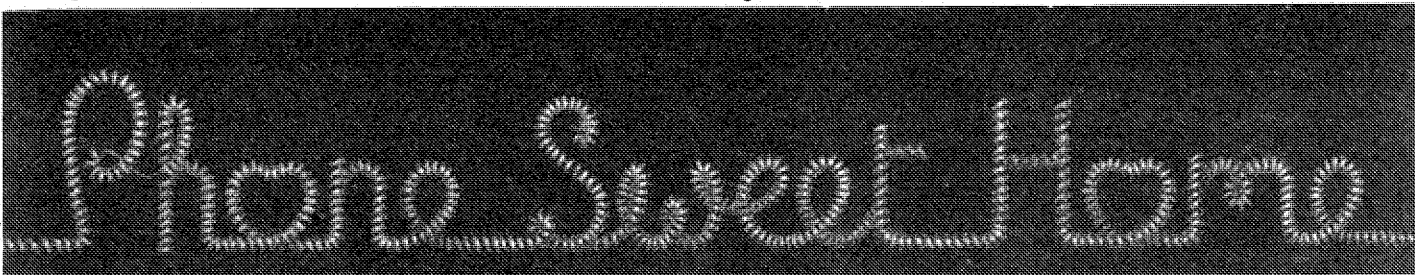
