

I am writing in response to last weeks letter from a disgruntled first year EET student. I'm in the second year of the course and I have some comments about that letter and the rest of NAIT as to the extensiveness of our course.

Dear Editor:

In my opinion and others as well, the person who wrote last weeks letter stands to be corrected on a few things. Firstly the course EET 151 should not be re-evaluated. Last year we thought the same thing, but as we later found out that material is in fact the basis for a large part of electronics. Secondly U of A students are going to be after different jobs than us, so we should not have to worry about job competition with them. I've talked to company representatives and they say that NAIT students are highly recommended because of the time we spend in the lab (400 hrs in the 1st year alone). Lastly there were 160 students who started last year and 120 made it to the second year, that's a 25 percent drop out rate. This is still a high figure but the program heads are making it harder to enter each year, in an effort to filter out the 25 percent of the people that do actually drop out.

A few things that I would like to mention to the first year EET students (and anyone else interested in how tough our course actually is) are as follows:

1) If you thought the first quarter was 'tough it doesn't get any easier. In the second quarter you have to start creating your own formulas, some that are a page wide (EET 252). And a lot of the learning comes on your own. In the 3rd quarter you're introduced to something called DIGITAL. This has very little to do with any of the other courses and is very hard to understand. (3 people in my class passed the final test).

2) You first years' have to create good study habits. This includes time management and setting your priorities straight. If you thought doing homework for 3-4 hours a night every night is too much, it's standard. In fact it's all uphill from there. About a month ago when our midterms rolled around we had 4 tests and three asssignments do in a matter of six days. On one of those weeks I was up untill 2:30 - 3:00 every night. Putting in up to eight hours of studying in one night.

All in all we do enjoy the course, I figure that something is worth a lot more if you put a lot of work into it.

We, the second year EET students are writing in response misinterpretation and the remaining 4.5 percent drop out (or to the letter you published last week from the first year EET student.

As well seasoned veteran students, maybe we can give you some advice.

1) We feel that you are in no position to be making comments pertaining to re-evaluation of any EET courses as a virgin NAIT student.

2 )There is no direct comparison between a NAIT student in EET and a U of A student in Electrical Engineering. 



MORTGAGE FORECLOSURE RELIEF FROM

#### PROVINCE NOW ESSENTIAL

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor today repeated his position that the Government of Alberta act to alleviate the unacceptable practice of mortgage foreclosures in the province. He expressed regret that the Legislature has ignored the question in its current do-nothing pose.

Taylor observed that the Alberta foreclosure rate has reached epidemic proportions and that the province has stood by while the savings and lives of families are being shattered and the urban housing market has collapsed.

"When I see data showing that Alberta has 20 times the number of foreclosures of any other province, I must conclude that the Government's lack of action reflects both its ignorance and heartlessness," charges Taylor.

"Alberta has been the most active government in Canada in subsidizing housing starts and purchases. An Economic Council research paper has assembled statistics showing that 21 percent of housing starts in Alberta were provincially-aided between 1971 and 1981. This intervention is 30 percent greater than the next most active government of "Socialist" Saskatchewan and overwhelms the impact of subsidies by other provinces."

"Provincial government subsidies created a great deal of the over-supply of housing, and thus encouraged the exposure of Alberta families to the current credit crisis. The Government is morally as well as economically responsible," argues Taylor.

"The Province should pick up the pieces of an industry it helped to topple -- and this applies to its intervention in credit markets through Alberta Housing and its promotion of a large construction industry. Alberta Housing should be wound down as a subsidizer and stopped as a foreclosure machine."

"The solution lies in keeping people in their houses and on their farms," explains Taylor. Alberta has on its books numerous laws dating back to the Territorial period and developed in the 1920's and 30's which would shield mortgagors from overly-aggressive financiers. A Liberal Party research paper released in July indicates that the means for provincial intervention on behalf of mortgagors rural and urban - is still there. Debt postponement and re-scheduling should stabilize the market as well as assist individuals until and when they are in position to reschedule or recommence their payments and obligations.

"Housing and farming are long-term assets which should be financed by long-term credit and long term income", Taylor notes. "In addition to withdrawing from the housing industry and instituting debt adjustment, the province could also implement other creative measures such as indexed mortgages (by which payments are tied to a real rate of interest plus fluctuations in income and inflation)." The Alberta Liberal Leader states that Albertans who now hesitate to enter the market due to their suspicions about credit practices and wobbly house prices would be encouraged by a stable situation. "Buyers would in turn encourage new construction that the market and not the Alberta Housing Minister created."

"Two short-term decisions are needed," Taylor concludes. "One, the province must get out of the subsidization of interest rates as well as abandon the foreclosure racket. Two, the government should respect its own laws and reactivate debt-adjustment boards to reschedule mortgage payments."





## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

There seems to a bit of confusion about NAITSA, what it is and what it is supposed to do.

First, NAITSA "the word", is an anacronym for the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology Students' Association. That's quite a mouthful.

Secondly, NAITSA has a set of bylaws and is registered under the Societies Act. NAITSA also has a seven member executive.

It is the day to day affairs of NAITSA that the Students' Executive deals with. Each member has his or her own jurisdiction. As President of NAITSA I have the responsibility to represent the students of NAIT on the various boards and committees I sit on. But it is still only the day to day affairs of NAITSA that are run by the Executive.

In addition to the Students' Executive there is a body called the Students' Council. This is made up of the Students' Executives and the Students Representatives, commonly known as Tech Reps. Also present in a non-voting capacity are the student members of the Board of Governors and of Academic Council. Any student who wishes to attend these meetings are more than welcome. However, they are not allowed to vote because they are already represented by their student Representative. These meetings are held once every second Tuesday in H5 (Little Theater) at 4:30.

So what, may you ask, does the Students' Council do during these meetings? Well, for starters, Students' Council passed a motion to allocate money to help build the new student area (without this support it never would have built), passed a motion so that the technologies can get a \$500 loan from NAITSA on their first cabaret instead of the regular \$300, passed a motion to eliminate mug shots from the yearbook, and passed a motion to increase security at large cabarets in the form of two policemen. Students' Council is also deciding upon a position regarding the academic year format change. And, by the time you read this, they may have passed a budget which deals with a revenue figure of \$490,500. That is almost half a million dollars!

What I have mentioned so far is just the really important decisions and then only some of them. The problem is that out of approximately 50 eligible technologies, we only have 34 attend Students' Council. That is a mere 68 percent. If you want to know if you are getting your fair representation on the half million dollars NAITSA spends or on any other issues affection students, come to the Students' Association offices at £133 and find out if your Student Representatives are attending Students' Council.


Along with the theory and shopwork, we spend considerable time at sanitation, trade calculations, and basic business knowledge.

## THREE CHEERS FOR

THE CBC

HESS CBC 740 Radio Broadcast Saturday, November 5

A couple of weeks ago I was extolling the virtues of the American public TV system, PBS. While the Americans have a fine record for good programming on this channel, let's not forget that Canada has equally good programming happening right under our noses - namely, the CBC.

A case in point was this Saturday's broadcast of Hess, the one man play about the Deputy Fuhrer of Nazi Germany Rudolph Hess. The play is a fascinating look at a man who has spent over forty years in Spandau prison for "Crimes against Humanity." Hess is very critical of the Allies who convicted him, claiming that it was the victors and not any neutral country that tried and convicted him and his colleagues. It is a shocking and unnerving look at the Nazi psyche, and an incredible insight into a side of the war most of us in the Allied nations never understood fully, nor perhaps wanted to.

It can be argued that the production of Hess came to us from the Fringe Festival, and before that from England where it was first performed. But PBS brings much of its programming in from the U.K. also, and furthermore, has no qualms about it. (Are you listening, Canadian Content Advocates?)

But whether the productions we see and hear on the CBC came from inside or outside our borders, it is of primary importance that our national radio and TV voice be allowed to continue to bring us the fine programming like Hess and others. There are already signs that the present government may cut CBC funding. In actual fact, it only costs the average Canadian seven dollars annually to keep the CBC going.

Let's not turn the volume down on Canada's loudspeaker of culture and excellence in broadcasting production.



## **MOVIE UPDATE**

### Terror in the Aisles

The Little Drummer Girl

As the audience anxiously awaits for the movie to begin, they settle into their chairs eating popcorn. At last, the lights finally dim.

An eerie strain of music wends through the theatre. On screen, in the stillness of night, a lone figure tentatively walks down a deserted city street. Suddenly, a body leaps out from a doorway.

The audience screams in utter terror.

It isn't just any scream, however, but a very special one. A unique sound to movie houses. This is the scream of "Terror in the Aisles."

The movie is a tightly-knit interweaving of the best suspense, terror and horror films. Among the films seen in "Terror in the Aisles" are such classics as "Psycho", "Halloween", "Alien", "The Exorcist", "Jaws", "Wait Until Dark", "Carrie", "Poltergeist", "The Shining", "Midnight Express", and the ever controversial "The Texas Chainsaw Massacre''. The film features appearances by many performers including Michael Caine, Bette Davis Jack Nicholson, Jamie Lee Curtis, Sissy Spacek, Dustin Hoffman, Laurence Olivier, Jane Fonda and Sylvester Stallone.

However, "Terror in the Aisles" is not just a compilation of movie clips. From the beginning, the filmakers wanted to do something different. To that end, the stars Donald Pleasence and Nancy Allen do not function as ordinary on-screen hosts but rather play characters within the movie -- characters who happen to narrate.

The psychology of espionage, the intrigue of international politics and the consequences of expedient ethics are all brought vividly to the screen by filmaker George Toy Hill in his major production of John le Carre's critically-aclaimed best-seller The Little Drummer Girl.

The screenplay was adapted by Loring Mandel, the picture stars Diane Keaton, Klaus Kinski, and Yorge Voyagis. Filmed in Europe and Israel, "The Little Drummer Girl" involves a vulnerable, aspiring actress who is recruited by Israeli counter-intelligence agents in order to capture a major Palestinian operative. In the process, she falls in love with the key Israeli operative in the master plan.

Utilizing familiar tecniques of intelligence gathering by agents and double agents, as well as the briefing and debriefing that characterized his master spy Smiley books (The Spy Who Came In From The Cold, Honourable Schoolboy, Smiley's People, The Looking Glass War and the trilogy Tinker, Tailor, Sailor, Spy).

For the filmakers, a high priority was placed on recapturing the reality, drama, and suspense which la Carre set forth in his book, which was no. 1 for 16 straight weeks on The New York Times Best-Seller list.

Under the direction of George Roy Hill, whose films include "The World According To Garp", "The Sting", "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" and Kurt Vonnegut's "Slaughterhouse Five", "The Little Drummer Girl" will undoubtedly be as celebrated. Diane Keaton is excellent, as is Klaus Kinski.

Truly, for the first time in a long time a movie does justice to a book, that according to The New York Times Book review, "the most mature, inventive and powerful book about . . . intelligence work and espionage and merely the vehicle for a book about love, anomie, cruelty, determination and love of country."



SATURDAY, NOV. 3--NAIT OOKS 17, MEDICINE HAT RATTLERS 1 AT NAIT ARENA

The Medicine Hat College Rattlers showed signs of promise early, but departed Edmonton without a point as the NAIT Ooks scored a 17-1 triumph over MHC at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, November 3rd.

NAIT defenceman Jamie Bartman notched his first goal of the season to open the scoring at 4:45 of the first. The NAIT powerplay doubled the advantage with 14:36 gone in the period as Sid Cranston connected for the NAIT Ooks. Scott Melnyk increased the NAIT lead to 3-0 one minute and 23 seconds later. 
