They had a lot of speed especially in their forwards. Though Dawson scored the first goal just minutes into the first half, the Ooks never lost heart. After a throw-in by Jerry Catena it was kicked towards the net by Ted Chrusciel and then gracefully headed by Aaron Sushyski across to Carlos Nunez. Carlos wasted no time in finding an opening in the Quebecois net. It was a tight game up until 7 minutes left in the second half when Dawson got the winning goal.

### GAME 3


On the Friday the Ook's played Nova Scotia. The Ooks were determined to post a victory after dropping two close ones on Thursday. NAIT won this game by smoking Kings College seven to one. They completely dominated Nova Scotia with Carlos Nunez and Oscar Nunex putting in two goals each and Fred Barrios, Joe Parrottino, and Ted Chrusciel all putting in one goal each. Keeper Brian Bens was spectacular on a number of occasions, keeping Nova Scotia to only one goal.

This left NAIT in 3rd position in their pool which meant they would not go on to the medal round. The Ooks then had to play Cariboo College of B.C. who also finished third in their pool.

The Ooks knew that this fourth game would be a tough one because of the reputation of B.C. teams. British Columbia has a very competitive league and were ranked number one coming into this tournament. It was a tough defensive game well up to the last remaining minutes. Though, with less than two minutes left captain Paul Rynn kicked in an excellent goal off of a corner kick. NAIT went on to win one to nothing.



### NAITSA HAS YOUR 75 DOLLARS

Make sure it's well spent!

At the November 6 General Council meeting the budget was presented to your elected representatives. The money in question is the seventy-five dollar Students Union fee that you paid along with your tuition and your ten dollar administrative fee at the beginning of the year. Just imagine what you could do with seventy-five dollars from every person who attends Nait on a full time basis. Quick math tells us that we're speaking here in terms of in excess of three hundred thousand dollars every year. 300,000

Your seventy-five dollars is divied up by your student reps. The Naitsa executive council presented a budget to the General Council (your reps) and the representatives were to look over the budget, ask questions, propose changes and then vote whether to accept or reject the budget. As predicted the General Council, your representatives, sat there like they were bound and gagged. Except for some good prying questions posed by the Hydro Carbon, Respiratory and Commercial Cooking reps, questions about the budget's validity and accuracy weren't even mentioned.

40 per cent of YOUR seventy-five dollars goes towards dollars of your money. Pause for a second and ask yourself if spent. you're getting thirty dollars of entertainment value during

the year from your intramural and athletic teams. If you think you are then fine. If you don't, come to the next General Council meeting, find your rep and tell him how you feel. Approximately \$22,000 of your money will be spent supporting the Nait Nugget. This money (which represents approximately \$3.67 from each student) is used for paying for our printing costs, our supplies and our honorariums. The Nait Nugget's editor, for example, earns a \$180 honorarium each month. This can be compared to the honorarium earned by the executive Vice President, the Publications Chairman, the Athletics Chairman and the Secretary which is \$228 per month. Again, if you agree with this or not, you're welcome to present your views in print via the letters to the editor or through your rep at the November 20 meeting at the Little Theater (H5). But, there are larger concerns at the moment than the honorariums given to Naitsa's hard-working staff.

Your executive has over \$300,000 of free money tied up in term deposits. This is money above and beyond what revenue is made this year. This money is sitting there waiting to be spent by you because since you've paid your financially supporting Nait's sports teams. That's thirty seventy-five dollars you have a RIGHT to say how it can be



### **VOLLEYBALL**

The staff of Health Services would like to give you some information on Epilepsy.

If you have Epilepsy or suffer from seizures please make sure your instructors and some of your classmates are aware of this. Tell them how it affects you and how often you have seizures. Should you then have a seizure in class they won't panic and think you have a sudden serious condition.

If someone has a seizure call the nurse (Main Campus 2400) Plaza II 2400) (Patricia Campus 451-6790)

### WHAT IS EPILEPSY

Epilepsy is a condition in which the brain function is briefly disturbed. It is accompanied by electrical disturbances which can be measured. The condition is usually associated with loss of consciousness, convulsions, and occasionally brief periods of unusual behavior.

### CAUSES OF EPILEPSY

The cause of epilepsy is not known in over 30 percent of patients. It can however, be caused by brain injuries, very often birth injuries and imbalance of body chemistry.

### FIRST AID FOR EPILEPTIC SEIZURES

Keep calm. You cannot stop a seizure once it has started. Do not try to revive the patient. Let the seizure run its course.

Try to prevent the patient from striking his head or body against any hard, sharp or hot objects but do not interfere with his movement. Protect the patient from serious injury but do not restrain him otherwise.

DO NOT FORCE ANYTHING BETWEEN THE PATIENT'S TEETH.

Loosen tight clothing.

Turn the patient to the side and make sure his breathing is not obstructed.

Place something soft, such as a rolled-up coat, beneath the person's head.

When a patients regains consciousness let him rest, if he wishes to.

If a seizure lasts beyond 5 or 10 minutes, or if seizures occur repeatedly, medical aid is urgently required.



### DANG FINE PLAY

Lone Star at Nexus Theatre in Macauley Plaza until Nov. 24

For those of us who frequent the movies but like the theatre, often it's the price of the ticket that deters us from attending. Small theatres are often more cheaply priced than movies, but the quality of the performance is sometimes equal to the price.

Not so with Lone Star, Nexus Theatre's latest offering for the theatre-goer. It's a gutsy tragicomedy worthy of the time and better than the money spent for it.

The play is set in a small town in Texas. The main character, Roy (Francis Damberger), has just returned from a two-year stint serving his country in the Vietnam War. He finds that things have changed considerably since he left; most of his friends have moved away, and the people have stayed have changed. He is trapped in wishing for a world that he left behind and now no longer exists. Damberger succeeds in portraying a man who desperately clings to all he has left - his '59 pink Thunderbird convertible, and his memories.

Steven Hilton plays Roy's brother Ray. Ray is a kind of idiot savant, although only in a figurative sense; his ability to reason is severely impaired (at one point he muses aloud as to why a Baby Ruth bar looks like a turd) but his empathy and his understanding of Roy's emotions shows he is far ahead of Roy in that department. Hilton does a fine job in a difficult role.

Myron Dearden as Cletis is the nerd who succeeds in spite of himself, the man who always lands on his feet and doesn't deserve to. The part seems to have been written in by playwright James McLure almost as an afterthought, so cartoonish is his character. But Dearden brings a depth to the character that adds believability to it.

There are no major hitches in Ben Henderson's direction of the piece, although there are times when Nexus' cramped space gets in the way of flexibility as far as blocking goes. Morris Ertman's set compensates nicely for this with a forced perspective and an overall design that makes good use of the space available.

Be sure not to miss Lone Star. It's one of the local theatre's gems this week. Hurry, though - students may only be able to catch it at its late night performance at 11:50 pm rather than the lunch hour performances, and the late night performance is Thursday only.



### COMMERCIAL COOKING-

Commercial Cooking is a two year program which covers most of the theoretical and practical knowledge needed for the food industry.

It covers such areas as baking, shortorder, meat cookery, sauces, management, classical and national cookery.

Students spend 5 and a half weeks out in the industry working in different areas of the food industry, such as hospitals hotels and private clubs.


After graduation, most students choose to enhance their qualifications by obtaining a Journeyman's certificate. In order to do this, graduates must tirst complete one year (1800 hours) or related industrial experience, after which they are eligible to write an examination for their Journeyman's certificate.


Commercial Cooking is not all work, we have a very good club as well, where many extracurricular activities occur. Such activities as an annual Christmas party for a group of orphans in the city. ### ELECTRICAL

### **ENGINEERING**

### TECHNOLOGY

This is a two year program which prepares its students for employment in the electrical field. Consisting of 120 guys and 4 gals, training is received in electrical and electronics theory, machines, protective relaying and a large portion of the course involves drafting and design of electrical systems. Of course, there's no avoiding math, physics, and english.



### SOCCER

Soccer plays an important and special role at NAIT. It gives ethnics and new Canadians an opportunity to get involved in a NAIT activity they can relate to. More important, is the idea of getting all people, no matter how different, to work, struggle, and triumph over adversities together. This not only makes these men better people, but it makes all of us who know them better people too.

### THE EARLY DAYS

Elements of present-day soccer are rooted in just about every culture of the world. The fundamentals of the game are very basic. So it is not surprising to find early traces of ball-kicking games as far back as 3000 B.C. The first evidence is from ancient drawings on the walls of caves in China; this game was known as "Tsu-chu". Fourteen centuries ago in Japan they played "Kenart"; in Greek and Roman times they had "Episkiyros and Hurpaston"; and in Mexico the Tarahumara Indians played a game called "Gomacari.

The early Olympic Games of ancient Rome featured twenty-seven men on a side. They competed so vigorously that two-thirds of them had to be hospitalized after only fifteen minutes of play. This same sort of violence seems to have marked the early history of soccer in the British Isles. Ireland had no limitations on the number of players or on the field size. City teams would sometimes play between the villages without taking breaks. Since they could use fists (as in Australian Rules football), a misdirected punch often led

In 1314, King Edward issued a proclamation that threatened to incarcerate anyone who was caught playing soccer. Throughout the years, great writers such as Shakespeare and the romantic writers of the time, condemned soccer as a low class form of entertainment.

It was about this time that soccer began to change for the better. An English nobleman in 1681 familiar with Italian soccer, introduced a new brand of the game to the Brits. Because it was different from the savage game inherited from the Romans and because it now had official sanction it grew in popularity and in population. However, organized games were difficult to arrange because teams played by their own rules. This problem brought about the set of "Rules for Association Football" drawn up by English universities. In 1848, "The Cambridge Rules" were introduced. These rules except for some minor changes have remained in international use ever since.

Today soccer is played in more countries in the world than any other sport. The sport links virtually every country on earth with a common language and interest; truly an international sport.

North Americans have come to embrace soccer with the same generous enthusiasm and exuberance as they gave the Beatles, hula hoops, disco-dancing, jogging and Japanese cars. Now anywhere you go in North America you can find signs of soccer abound, and NAIT is no exception.

The soccer program at NAIT started out quietly this year, with no real indication of how they would do. One thing that is evident is that the hard work and dedication of the coaching staff. Stuart Brown (Head coach) and Bob Buchan (Assistant coach) have shown that they've got what it takes to maintain a championship team in soccer and giving positive recognition to the athletic program at NAIT. They FOUL SHOTS have a genuine pride in their work and that certainly comes out when one looks at the quality of team at NAIT. Stuart Brown has been at NAIT since 1973. He has coached soccer for seven years. Bob Buchan has been with the team for two years. This year the team had a three win zero loss and one tie record in the ACAC tournament. Congratulation Stuart and Bob on another fine year.




