GET SMART ABOUT YOUR EXAMS

This week, I'd like to include in my editorial a guide to writing exams which was given to me last year by my Economics instructor, Linda Boisvert. I hope everyone will find it as helpful as I did. I wish everyone the best of luck on their exams, and especially all first year Business students who have a tendency to brag about how easy NAIT is.

WRITING AN EXAM

Before writing: vou start a. Glance over the whole exam. This does two things for

It gives you a "set" on the exam: what it covers, where the emphasis lies, what the main ideas seem to be. Many exams are composed of a series of short questions all related to one particular aspect of the subject, and then a longer one developing some ideas from another area.

It relaxes you, because if you read carefully all the way through it, you are bound to find something you feel competent to answer.

b. Observe the point value of the questions and then figure out a rough time allowance. If the total point value for the test is 100, then a 50 point question is worth about half of your time, regardless of how many questions there are. A quick rule of thumb for a one-hour test is to divide the point values in half.

c. Underline all significant words in the directions. Many a hapless student has penalized himself because he did not see the word "or", in "Answer 1, 2, or 3." You do not get extra credit for answering three questions in that case. If you do not clearly understand the directons, ask your instructor.

2. When you begin to work:

a. Tackle the questions in the order that appeals to you most. There is nothing sacred about the order in which the questions are asked. Doing well on a question that you feel relatively sure of will be reassuring and will free your mind of tension. The act of writing often unlocks the temporarily blocked mental processes; when you finish that question you will probably find the others less formidable. On the other hand, you may be the type of person who wants to get the big one off his mind first, and save the easy ones "for dessert." If you are writing in an exam book, be sure to identify the questions clearly.

b. Keep the point value and time allowance in mind. This may save you from a very common and panic-producing mistake -- such as taking twenty minutes of an hour test to answer a five-point question, and then finding you have five

- c. Work methodically, forcing yourself, if necessary, to do so. If you tend to rush at things, slow down. If you tend to dawdle, pace yourself.
- 3. When you are finished:

Check over your entire paper, for two purposes:

- to see if you have left out any questions you meant to tackle later, and to see if you have followed directions.
- to catch careless errors. Note: don't take time to copy answers, unless you're sure they're really illegible. You are not graded on neatness but on accuracy.





My next step is to find the entertainment, so at a recent conference I attended, I expressed a very great interest in BILLY IDOL and a couple other groups around that caliber.




We, the EET students, are proud of our program and of this institution to which we belong. We wish you success in your courses, and we'll see you all at the various NAIT activities.



MOVIE UPDATE

CRIMES OF PASSION

"Crimes of Passion" is one of those movies I just can't make up my mind on. On one hand I say ok, and on the other hand, I say why. Interestingly enough, though, the critics are raving about it. Now is that because of the topic 'sex' or is it really a good movie?

Kathleen Turner plays Joanna Crane a clothing designer who's terrified of intimacy.

So she creates an erotic alter ego that allows her to have sex without intimacy, giving her all the power in encounters with men. Nightly she leaves her plush apartment and taxis to a third rate hotel where she works as a prostitute called China What happens is a discerning and ironical commentary of all intentions in our sexual games.

Enter sexual repression. Rev. Peter Shayne, a deeply troubled man, played by Anthony Perkins, has fantasies of stabbing nude women. Shayne is a sexually tormented man, haunted by strength and control of the woman he's out to save-kill-rape.

China Blue's counterpart in normal urban life is Amy (Annie Potts), mother of two, married her high school beau, respectable to a fault. Her husband Grady, played by John Laughlin, is a former football hero and a clean-cut American boy who seeks for something other than the perfect relationship with his wife.

The conflict between sexuality and intimacy, which the film is directly related with, a remnant of the 60's. It's about the modern confusion concerning single people needing to get into relationships and married people desiring to get out of them and that in the end everybody experiences pain.

On the whole, "Crimes of Passion" is hard to accept. Not as a statement on sexuality but as a statement at all. The relationships are dismal at best with overall understanding of intended concepts shoddy. However, both Kathleen Turner and Anthony Perkins performances are well worth mentioning. Without question, director Ken Russell has made a critic's kind of film instead of a film for his audience.

GARBO TALKS


Estelle Rolfe has a fantasy shared by thousands of fans all over the world. She wants to meet Greta Garbo. Estelle is the consummate New Yorker, an activist, rights crusader and general complainer but when she is not in jail for disturbing the peace she is at home plopped in front of her television set wallowing in the reflected glory of old Garbo films. She is the bane of her son Gilbert's existance. He just wants to try and get through life and make a little money as a down-trodden, picked-upon accountant, but is not meant to be. His mother, who embarassed him all his life, imposes the ultimate burden when she becomes ill. Her final request is for a meeting with Garbo.

Needless to say Garbo Talks is a comedy. Anne Bancroft stars as the irrepressible Estelle, Ron Silver as her wimp son, Carrie Fisher his whining wife and Catherine Hicks the co-worker who makes life worth living.

Because Garbo has not been photographed, interviewed or appeared in a film since 1941, many people think she is dead, but ironically she is very much alive. She lives in Switzerland, spends time in the Upper East side of New York and the Riveria. She is not a total recluse. New Yorkers occasionally catch glimpses of her in the streets or in the back rows of a theatre, but Garbo has become an expert at dodging photographers and newspeople. So the reality of her illusive lifestyle set up the perfect 'situation' for a comedy like Garbo Talks.

Garbo Talks is a sightseeing tour of all the places the real Garbo is rumoured to haunt. Fraser Morres, the gourmet food shop, the Museum of Modern Art, Fire Island, the Delacorte Theatre, and four of the biggest book stores. With Sydney Lumet directing, they are just enough to make audiences think, 'well maybe it is the real Garbo who's disappearing out the door.'

Night Mother at the Kaasa Theatre; a Phoenix production through December 2

There are very few of us whose lives have not been touched in some way by the tragedy of suicide. But for those of us who have not encountered it first- or even second-hand, I recommend you go see Phoenix Theatre's current production Night Mother.

The play centres around two characters; Thelma, and her daughter Jessie. Jessie is an epileptic, but seems to cope with her affliction well. But she has decided to commit suicide, because she sees her life becoming an inevitable, sad progression of events from which she will never escape. Thelma, her mother, is an unkept Edith Bunker; she wanders about the house eating chocolates in a threadbare dress and ratty sweater, never really aware of what is happening around her. But she receives a rude awakening when Jessie tells her of her plans for suicide.

The play is incredibly tense, as the time draws ever closer for Jessie to go in her bedroom and take her own life.

Thelma's desperation is almost unbearable as she suddenly realizes that Jessie is not joking and tries argument after argument to divert Jessie from the seemingly inevitable. It is a powerful and sadly funny play which had me completely engrossed from beginning to end. Be sure not to miss Night Mother; it is easily the best play I've seen this year.

The NAIT Ooks played a single game this past weekend and faced a determined Red Deer College Kings squad. The Ooks skated away with a 6-4 victory on Friday at the Red Deer Arena.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 16TH -- NAIT OOKS 6, RDC KINGS 4 AT RED DEER ARENA, RED DEER

The NAIT Ooks exploded for five goals in the final frame and held on to down the Red Deer College Kings 6-4 at the Red Deer Arena on Friday, November 16th. For NAIT, it was their second win over Red Deer in regular season play.

Following a scoreless first stanza, the teams traded goals in the second. Greg Pulliam of RDC started the scoring at 5:24. Mike Spencer of the Ooks tied the contest at 1-1 with his seventh goal of the campaign at the 10:21 mark. Jamie Bartman and Mike Tookey were given assists.

In the third, Mike Spencer's second goal of the contest and eight of the season lifted NAIT into a 2-1 lead. Gary Leach and Ron Amyotte set up the go-ahead goal. Hugh Alexander of the Kings evened the contest at 2-2 one minute and 57 seconds later on the RDC powerplay. NAIT pulled in front with 10:30 elapsed in the third as Ken Goodwin notched his fourth goal of the season from Murray Melnyk and Garth Hayes with the man advantage. Forth five seconds passed before NAIT's Ross Kenny netted his first goal of the season from Ron Amyotte and Sid Cranston. At 12:03, Ross Kenny tallied for the seound time in the match to give NAIT a 5-2 advantage. Once again, Sid Cranston and Ron Amyotte picked up assists. The Red Deer College Kings did not give up. Garth Hildebrand cut NAIT's advantage to 5-3 a short ten seconds later. At 13:31, Red Deer pulled to within one as Hugh Alexander scored his second of the night. NAIT's Randy Repchuk sealed the victory with his fourth marker of the season on a Garth Hayes set-up with 3:55 left in the contest.

Bert Brooker protected the RDC crease and faced 34 NAIT shots. At the opposite end, NAIT's Cleo Rowein was tested by RDC on 33 occasions.

The win raises NAIT's record to six wins and no losses. Red Deer has three wins, three losses and one tie. The NAIT Ooks lead the league with the lowest goals against (2.00) and the highest goals for (7.83).


FROM THE FOUL LINE


