JOE'S BACK

The Right Honourable Joe Clark, Secretary of State for External Affairs, today released the following text of his message of condolence to the American Secretary of State, the Hounourable George Shultz.

"I was deeply shocked when I learned of the brutal and senseless attack against your Embassy premises in Beirut today. I extend to you, to the families of the victims and to your colleagues in the foreign service my deepest sympathies. We are very conscious of the often appalling risks to which their commitment exposes them.

I offer my strong support to you personally, and look forward to our discussion next week in New York when we might give further attention to the threat to peace which international terrorism represents. We must work closely together against this senseless violence which has had such tragic results for those who have dedicated themselves to the service of their country."

Whether you are concerned about transferring to a different school, the recognition of the work of students, overcrowding in NAIT, extra-curricular activities in NAIT or anything else that concerns you about the operation of NAIT, ACTISEC will try to help.





On January 20, 1984, Cynthia Scullion, on behalf of the Computer Systems Society, made a \$360.00 deposit with Studio City Musical Ltd. for the band "Slash and the Bleeding Hearts" to perform on Saturday, April 28, 1984. The band subsequently changed their name to "Casualty."

On Wednesday, April 25, CSS was informed by Studio City Musical Ltd. that the lead singer of "Casualty" was suffering from a cold and the band would be unable to perform. This alleged sickness was played to CSS till 1:00 p.m., Friday, April 27, when CSS was forced to sign another band. Due to speculation of "Casualty", a name-band, not appearing, ticket sales were down significantly and our Tequila Cabaret ran at a substantial loss.

The following week it was brought to CSS's attention that "Casualty" had performed at the Capri Hotel in North Battleford, Saskatchewan. A subsequent call to the Capri's booking agent confirmed this.

Due to Studio City Musical Ltd.'s booking practice and the loss sustained at our Tequila Cabaret with "Casualty" not appearing, the Computer Systems Society has agreed not to deal with either Studio City Musical Ltd. or the band "Casualty" in the future.

This year's yearbook is also a change from the '83-84. It will be a Activities Book with no individual pictures. If this concept is to work, we need your help.







BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Nait's Business Administration Program prepares you for a variety of careers within the business community. First year courses are the same for all students. In the second year you are able to specialize in the area of your choice. The four areas are: Accounting, Administrative Management, Finance and Marketing Management. All provide highly specialized training enabling the graduate to fit into a work environment more easily. Electives chosen either fit in with your chosen career or reflect individual interests.

The Accounting program is very thorough in providing you with in-depth knowledge and competance in the accounting field. Balancing these number crunching accounting courses are sufficient managerial courses to assist you in a move into supervisory positions. Many courses are exemptions in the RIA and CGA designations.

The Administrative Management program provides a solid core of knowledge and managerial skills for use in business, industry or government. There are 3 streams of elective courses: Management, Personnel or Public



Business Administration Society

Administration. These intend to arm you with necessary theoretical and practical insight. Many courses are task oriented, developing your potential managerial skills.

The Finance program provides the student with a good understanding of principles and practices used by managers in deciding how to use and control their financial resources.

Courses chosen help acquire the special skills for advancement into management positions with financial institutions or finance department of business firms. You can also specialize in commercial banking if that's where your interests lie.

The major emphasis of the Marketing program is in applied marketing. Students participate in projects in conjuction with the business community. In this way, you are able to gain valuable practical experience. Marketing grads are qualified for many jobs relating to researching consumer needs, making product decisions, deciding on distributing activities as well as selling, promoting and advertising. The approach to the Marketing program is very much a learning by doing, applied approach also aiming to provide you with a comprehensive knowledge of the functions of business.

Aside from course study, there are lots of opportunities for involvement in extra-curricular activities. The Business Administration, Administrative Management, and Marketing Management societies organize activities such as cabarets and ski trips. As well, these societies interface with the business community through meetings and guest speakers to help take your mind off homework, projects and exams for a while.

ANIMAL HEALTH TECHNOLOGY

The Animal Health Technology Program is two years in length, consisting of a nine-month session at Nait in the first year and a seven month session at Nait in the second year followed by a two-month term at Fairview College.

As the programs goal is to produce a skilled technician to work in the veterinary field, this is accomplished by a blending of academic studies with practical experience. The two-month session at Fairview College is a major part of this practicum. Courses given during this training are Large Animal Clinics, Animal Handling, Artificial Insemination

and Farm Animal Husbandry.

The graduate Animal Health Technologist (A.H.T.) will be recognized by the Alberta Association of Animal Health Technicians. Many graduates from this program have found employment in a small and/or large animal practice. Using the knowledge and skills learned, the technicians will be performing laboratory analysis of blood, urine and fecal samples, assisting and performing sanitation and sterlization procedures, assisting in the examination and treatment of animals, some administrative chores, assisting in anesthetic and surgical procedures as well as other duties.


Other graduates will find employment in animal laboratories, zoos, feedlots, federal and provincial health of animals and contagious disease regulation, veterinary and medical schools, and in institutions engaged in specialized research such as cancer and heart disease.


Although Animal Health Technology is one of the smaller technologies at Nait we still try to be fairly active in Intramural Programs. "The Wild Life"

Cameron Crowe, the writer who introduced the humor and struggles of contemporary teenagers in "Fast Times at Ridgemont High," now gives us a hilarious 'suburban epic' that examines the precarious move from high school and life at home to adult living in "The Wild Life."

Bill Conrad (Eric Stoltz) is a young man who's graduated and is ready to begin his life as an 18-year-old single adult. What awaits Bill and the friends around him is "The Wild Life."

The movie centers around Bill Conrad, following him from the security of a room at home to a singles apartment complex and a new life in the "real world" of adults. At first, it's a disaster. Taken by a bad contract on his first apartment lease, Bill runs out of money. To stay in his apartment, he must enlist the help of his partner from work. The only person available, notorious party animal Tom Drake (Christopher Penn - brother of Sean Penn who starred in "Fast Times at Ridgemont High"). This coupling affects those around him from his girlfriend to his parents. Set against the backdrop of the last week of summer, "The Wild Life" is about making the tentative step towards adulthood. To of teenage life while attempting to achieve independence.

The story follows five young people through their lives at the end of summer. Two girls outgrow their boyfriends and

venture forth into the world of older men. One boy develops a friendship with a Vietnam vet that will change him. The film ends when they must all go back to school. It's the first time, after seeing the full and dynamic lives that all five characters lead, that we realize they are still teenagers.

All the characters have their own themes. These young people struggle with new-found responsibility, independence, money and sexuality while trying to find the path that will lead them to the next step in their lives. What they discover is that just being older doesn't make things easier.

"The Wild Life" is about normal kids, and the small moments in their lives that are, of course, monumental to them. Christopher Penn and Eric Stoltz give excellent performances that in parts will have you rolling in your seats.

"The Wild Life" though not a sequel to its forerunner "Fast Times at Ridgemont High" is just as funny and somehow seems to add an overall contemporary statement
