

- 2) Concentrate on the development of a nuclear equipped Trident submarine attack force.



INDUSTRIAL STRATEGY PAPER SHOULD BE

MARKED "F"

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor points out that the just-released Economic Council of Canada study of the Western Provinces' economies contains some warnings which should be heeded before new economic policies are decided on. One is that neither large growth nor employment will come from traditional manufacturing industries. But most important, it is the service industries and not Lougheed's White Paper's recommended petroleum industry which will provide the means for Alberta to create jobs and achieve economic growth and stability.

"Moreover, the recent National Energy Board forecast of Energy Supply and Demand cautions against optimistic growth-oriented hopes about demand for oil and gas products. Despite this, the Alberta White Paper continues to hope that petrochemical and other smokestack industries will magically come to dominate our economy," says Taylor.

Commenting on the Alberta government's White Paper on Industrial and Science strategy, the Alberta Liberal Leader expressed extreme disappointment. "It is an incoherent document, promising to diversify in virtually every conceivable sector of the economy, yet it offers few clear suggestions about any one of them," Taylor stated.

"The broad emphasis of the White Paper continues to be on industrialization by processing non-renewable resources. As a means of diversifying the economy and creating jobs" Taylor continued, 'this is a hopeless procedure and only a


postponement of the inevitable transition from these resources."

"The White Paper reflects the Alberta government's assumption that it can defy logic and the market-place in promising a planned economic future," Taylor charges.

"Take the White Paper's emphasis on manipulation the educational system so that it is chiefly a tool for job training. In this area alone, 12 years of Lougheed predictions have been notoriously unreliable and the careers of deluded students set back by policies and programs based on training for skills the cabinet thought was needed five or ten years ahead." "As for the White Paper's aims to propagandize 'risk-taking' and to view world geography for its benefits to Alberta trade, I would dismiss it as so much Reaganomic claptrap," says Taylor.

"The 'Industrial Policy' the Alberta government wants to create will be a monster and a bureaucratic beast. While it is clear the Premier wishes to be its jockey, he reminds me of Stephen Leacock's famous horseman, who saddled up and rode off in all directions at once."

BASIC BANKING AND


BUSINESS

Hi! We're in the Basic Banking and Business program. It's a one-year program of studies in which we learn the practical skills essential for employment in a financial setting, or in other areas of general business.

During first quarter, most of the subjects we take are related to banking and business theory. In second quarter, this theory is put into practice in our banking lab where we assume the roles of staff in a financial office. We learn cash handling skills, balancing procedures, and how to complete the many different financial services that the public requires today, such as foreign exchange, bank drafts, money orders, traveller's cheques, and many others. In case you were wondering, of course our banking labs are computerized. Students process their work through on-line terminals, just as they would in business today.

About 60 percent of our program relates to the general business field, while about 40 percent is specifically banking-oriented. This allows a graduate the alternative of pursuing a career in a general business setting of their choice, or in banking.

Why are there no bars on the NAIT campus? Many first year students are surprised when they arrive at NAIT and find no drinking lounges on the institute. It would only seem logical for students to have easy access to a social drink following classes, after all the University of Alberta has RATT and Dinwoodie. After a hard day of classes or exams, it is not uncommon to find groups of classmates deciding on a place to meet, usually Captain John's or Franklin's. Why is this so?

After speaking to Mr. A. W. Nixon, Vice President of Educational Support Services and Greg Scherf, NAITSA president, some light was shed on the matter. According to Mr. Nixon, one of the biggest hurdles to overcome is the lack of space at NAIT. All available rooms are used for instructional or study purposes. Personally, Mr. Nixon would be in favour of a bar campus depending on the way it is set up. Under the current circumstances he feels there are higher priorities.

NAITSA President Greg Scherf echoed the same basic problems as Mr. Nixon - notably the lack of available space. According to Greg, NAIT's liquor license includes only special events and doesn't cover a full-time bar. The only college or institute that has a bar on campus is the Red Deer College and apparently there has been no abuse of the facility. In dealing with the fact U of A students have such an easy access to RATT, Greg feels that one must take into consideration that NAIT and other institutes attract a different type of student than at the University. NAIT tends to have a bad reputation as far as drinking is concerned, and NAITSA must overcome this fallacy for it may be a future stumbling block to getting a bar at NAIT.

After discussing with other students the proposal of installing a bar at NAIT, their response has been basically favorable. Most felt they would enjoy staying at NAIT after classes for a social drink instead of driving to other spots. Yet, there has been some negative feedback. A few students felt this privilege on campus would be abused, where students may tend to skip classes, show up late or even get drunk.

It's obvious that in order to get a bar at NAIT many difficulties must be overcome. It would have to be on a trial basis at first, and many concessions would probably have to be made - perhaps only opening it after class hours. Maybe in the future the board could bring this subject up and at least discuss the possibilities of having a bar on the NAIT campus.



- -payroll



CIVIL ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY

Civil Engineering Technologists are assistants to engineers in planning, designing, and constructing industrial, commercial, and residential works.

Academic training includes statics, strength of materials, surveying, and report writing in the first year. These courses serve as the base for second year, where students apply their knowledge and drafting skills to municipal, structural, design courses, as well as project management courses.

Graduates of civil find work in many areas of the engineering field. They may survey for a residential subdivision or aid in the design and drafting of underground utilities, highways and city streets, and steel and timber structures. Many graduates find jobs in the actual construction for the project or as material testers and inspectors. The choice of outdoor, office, or lab job atmosphere is available.

"METROPOLIS"

"PRINCIPAL PLAZA"

Metropolis has been brought back to life! This is the original silent movie carefully put back together, with color added and a brand new soundtrack (Pat Benatar and Loverboy among others).

The setting is somewhere in the future, when the rich live like kings above ground with trams and skyscrapers and airplanes (biplanes of course, this is 1926) while the workers live below doing 10 hour shifts at the factories.

The storyline is weak, involving a factory owner's son trying to help the workers. The over dramatizations are partly the fault of the newness of movies. Actors still acted like they were on stage, playing to the last row of the audience. Instead of a coherent story you walk out of the film remembering a series of images - like an extended rock video might do.

But what images they are! The visual effects of Metropolis make up for any weaknesses. You don't need sound when you see row on row of dark shuffling workers lining up at the change of shifts. You don't need sound when the banker's son sees maimed and dead workers carried off on stretchers while the next shift goes on as before with barely a halt, or when the silent water starts flooding the streets, and children come out to play in it.

The idea behind these visuals is frightening. The workers, the ordinary people, are undistinguisable. They follow anyone, becoming a mob that destroys their own city. The idea of dictatorship being the way to control an unintelligent mass was a sign of the times. The film was made in a German studio following WWI. It is said to be one of Hitler's favorite movies. The fascist implications are there. You might wonder why it is doing well today.

I'd advise you to catch Metropolis, while it's in town. It's taken 60 years to come back, you might have a long wait before it's here again.

MOVIE UPDATE

A SOLDIER'S STORY

"A Soldier's Story" is an American story.

It is 1944, nearing the end of World War H, when Master Sergeant Vernon C. Waters, leader of the all-black 221st Smoke Generating Unit's "C" Company based at Fort Neal, Louisians, is shot and killed on a lonely road outside the base. The Department of the army, under pressure to investigate the murder, dispatches Captain Richard

Davenport, a polished, black, Harvard University-trained military attorney---much to the dismay and initial distrust of the white base commander, who assumes his findings are a foregone conclusion. But neither Davenport nor his integrity are to be under-estimated as he doggedly pursues the investigation, finding unsettling facts along the way.

As Davenport unravels the circumstances surrounding Waters' death, the stories of the soldiers he speaks with, reveals a temper and a temperment of a nation on the threshold of change. The men of the 221st talk of pride and prejudice, of honor and humiliation, of freedom and frustration, of dignity and disdain.

Based on Charles Fuller's Pulitzer Prize-winning play, the film stars Howard E. Rollins Jr. (Ragtime) as Captain Davenport, whose performance is nothing less than excellent. Adolph Caesar who plays Sargeant Waters, beautifully personifies a black man obsessed with bettering

himself in order to be more acceptable to whites.

Directed by Canadian Norman Jewison, "A Soldier's Story" becomes a contemporary statement in which the struggle of blacks trying to belong in a dominant, often demeaning white world. This movie should not be missed, it is an excellent murder-mystery that unfolds not as a simple story but more of a tribute to an uncomfortable time in history.


CHEAP THRILLS:

INTRAMURAL HOCKEY RULES

The Intramural Hockey Program shall be governed by C.A.H.A. rules with the following modifications:

- There will be two referees with equal authority.
- No intentional body checking and no slapshots.
- Minor penalties will be three minutes.
- Major penalties will be five minutes.

Penalties will be fully served even if goal(s) are scored against the penalized team.

Games will be played in 2 - 25 minute halves. Intramural hockey will be timed on a "straight time" system. Participating teams must bring one person each to act as scorer or timer. Failure to do so results in a default.

A team must have six players to start the game. A minor penalty will be assessed against a team refusing to start when they have six players. The penalty shall occure at the commencement of play.

All players must wear headguards with chin straps fastened. Any player who wishes not to abide by this rule may cost his team a minor penalty for delaying game. Players must also wear complete hockey attire as provided by the Intramural Department.

SPEED BALL RULES

This one is for you ladies. A volleyball is advanced down the floor by dribbling with the feet (as in soccer) or passing (as in Continental ball - 3 steps and/or 3 seconds to get rid of the ball. The ball is put into play with a jump as in basketball at the center of the court. There are six players on a team: three forwards, two defense and one goalkeeper. Goals are scored by field goals, throw goals and penalty shots. Field goals are kicked through the goal and result in two points. Throw goals are thrown through the goal and only one point is scored. In a penalty shot, the number of points scored depends on whether the ball is being played by the feet or hands just prior to the infraction.

There are two types of play restrictions, personal fouls and violations. Personal include kicking, tripping, charging, holding or blocking an opponent. One more serious personal foul is unnecessary roughness. Personal fouls result in a direct kick or throw at the point of the infraction or a penalty shot from center court. Violations are travelling and touching a "grounded ball", which results in an "indirect free throw" at that point.

Games are played at the gym. There are two 15 minute halves. More detailed rules can be picked up in E-134. Remember the entry deadline is today.


