It appeared that the upset of the tournament was in the making. Realizing they were in trouble NAIT Ooks staged a late comeback with Carlos Nanez scoring, putting a penalty shot in. Paul Rynn scored the equalizer with only minutes left. The Ooks were lucky to escape with a tie and stay alive in the tournament. The team learned a valuable lesson about concentrating on the current game rather than looking ahead to future games.

3rd Game: NAIT Vs. Lethbridge

Sunday morning; after the scare the team received from GMCC, NAIT played brilliant soccer. Lethbridge the newcomer to ACAC soccer had created the tournament upset on Saturday. They beat the highly rated SAIT team. NAIT had to play well to win. Carlos Nunez with a great shot from the left wing opened the scoring. Lethbridge replied to make it one to one at half time. Midway through the second half, Aaron Suchynski put NAIT ahead, and Ted Chrusciel made it three to one. Later Lethbridge came back to make it three to two.

BOUNCER'S BEEFS

The Business Administration Society had their first cabaret last Friday. Because business students think big, Sportsworld Roller Skating Rink was rented as a hall and was filled with over 700 people. Besides Beerfest, this has been the largest NAIT party that I have been to in my two years at this Institute. (The previous record was held by the attendance of over 500 people at Architectural's Beach Party last year). Although these huge bashes are a lot of fun, they bring to light a few serious questions to be asked about security.

BAS's bash was going perfectly until a number of fights broke out around 1:00 am. (I always wonder what kind of idiots have to prove their masculinity by getting into drunken brawls, but that can be pondered some other time). Although the bouncers acted swiftly to quell the melees, things nearly got out of control. After the action calmed down, I talked to a few of the security. One bouncer, who asked not to be identified, said "...we really didn't know what to do. But, the worst part was, we (the bouncers) were arguing amongst ourselves as to what had to be done."

This comment reveals some questions: What exactly is entailed in a bouncer's authority? Can bouncers kick paying party-goers out of cabarets? Should bouncers separate opponents, or should they wait till the aggressors beat themselves senseless? Do bouncers have the right to use equal force on violent individuals? How much is it worth to a bouncer to put himself in danger?

After considering all these questions, I came up with some possible recommendations for Bruce Antoniuk (Activities Chairman), NAITSA, and all technology executives.

- 1) The recruitment, selection, training and provision of bouncers should be centralized and controlled by the NAITSA head bouncer. NAITSA could hire out these security personnel to the different techs. The benefits to this would include impartiality, experience, and organization - components which are necessary to keep the peace at a large gathering.
- 2) A standard policy should be formulated to guide the actions of all bouncers. This would be to eliminate any confusion as to what actions are to be taken in the event of any altercations. This policy could state "The security shall escort any fight participants outside, by force if necessary, and not allow them to return."
- 3) Any tech which organizes a cabaret of over 300 people should consider hiring Edmonton City Police Officers to augment their security. Dinwoodie's lounge at the U of A regularly handles up to 500 people, and though they only have two officers for security, fights are rare. The officer's job would not include door security, just crisis prevention and back-up.
- 4) Hard liquor should not be served at cabarets. Although it is well known people can get just as drunk on beer, feelings or aggression are lessened when one is too bloated to move.

These suggestions will be looked at during the next General Council meeting. Hopefully, by the time BAS has their next bash, some of these recommendations will have been put into action. (If BAS gets their expected turnout for their 'Darkroom' cabaret they will need beefed-up security).

NO ARMOUR AGAINST FATE

Alberta's most upsetting news in a long time came to be last Saturday as it was confirmed that Grant Notley, the Provincial Opposition Leader had been killed in a plane crash in the Grande Prairie area. Grant Notley, 45, had already dedicated over 25 years of his life to the people of Alberta supporting the ideals in which he so strongly believed.

Mr. Notley was a very admirable man. I'd always admired him and I was fortunate enough to have met him. In the summer of 1982, I worked on a construction crew that repaired the Dunvegan Bridge, near Dunvegan in Northern Alberta. I was a flag man who had to stop everyone and warn the drivers of the one lane traffic on the bridge which is situated at the bottom of a long and steep hill. Grant Notley was one of the people I stopped. I immediately recognized him and although he was on his way home, he was more than happy to take the time to talk politics with a naive 17 year old flagman. He was patient when I asked him a question and he laughed when we joked. In those precious moments in which I spoke with him, he never had one bad thing to say about anything.

This seemed to be the way he ran his party. His never ending optimism and his pertinacious never say die attitude kept the issues on the front pages where they belonged. If Mr. Notley hadn't continually asked prying and exposing questions to our overwhelmingly large Conservative majority government, I can only shudder to think what they might have gotten away with.

We as Albertan people must take Grant Notley's cue. We must do our best effort without complaining to change this world into a better place. As well, we must start to question Peter Lougheed because we no longer have Grant Notley here to do it for us.

Thank-you Mr. Notley for sharing your time with me. Your words and actions have been a true inspiration to me.

A positive attitude and your lifetime service is what you gave to us. It's too bad that it took your death for everyone to realize it.

TAYLOR SEEKS TAX CUT, REDUCED ROLE FOR GOVERNMENT IN PRIVATE SECTOR

The Alberta government should make an income tax cut the highest priority of the legislative session opening this week, says Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor.

The government should also act to eliminate its role in the businesses of liquor, airlines and oil and gas while taking a hard look at what role it should be playing in banking via its Treasury Branches.

A tax cut now, Mr. Taylor said, would provide help for specific under-\$25,000 groups such as working women and young wage earners. "Let's put some buying power into the economy and stimulate business. Alberta, with its Heritage Fund income, does not need to soak the taxpayer. Leaving money with the taxpayer should be the highest priority of the legislative session beginning Wednesday."

PRIVATIZATION

The Alberta economy--and the treasury--could get another boost if the Alberta government were to get out of competition with business in the private sector, he said.

"The Lougheed government is like some 60s-style go-go conglomerate with too much cash and too little sense or direction. It's involved in oil and gas, liquor retailing, banking, recreation and airlines - everything except running a simple, economical government."

"GET OUT OF LIQUOR"

"It's a mystery why the Alberta government is still in the liquor business," Mr. Taylor said.

"The present system is an insult to the people of Alberta. High prices, lineups and limited hours provide an atmosphere you would expect at a retail establishment behind the Iron Curtain, not in Alberta."

"When we say we want out of the liquor business, we mean that the province would still tax liquor but would turn sales over to private retail outlets such as grocery stores and privately - operated liquor stores."

"Beer and wine sales wouldn't be limited to corner groceries. They could do well enough from the addition of these products, even if they aren't exclusive agents."

"The government's role is to tax and to promote moderation and public safety."

Mr. Taylor said present employees of the liquor stores would be re-employed privately and many would possess the expertise to start their own businesses.

OIL AND GAS: A CHALLENGE

The Alberta government should stop competing in the oil and gas business and concentrate on developing a creative role in encouraging the industry, Mr. Taylor said.

"The Lougheed government should challenge Ottawa to match a series of cuts in gross royalties charged to producers and replace this revenue with income taxes based on the profitability of individual pools."

"It's also time the government completely divested itself of its remaining interests in Alberta Energy Co., which plans to bring 300 additional gas wells in the Suffield Block onto an already glutted market. The government should completely stand aside from direct participation in the market and limit itself to providing basic regulations."

EXAMINE GOVERNMENT'S ROLE

This government has a long history of talking one way and

then acting another when it comes to its activities in areas that would be best left to private industry.

Similar to its interference in the gas market, the government continues to hold a major interest in Pacific Western Airlines and Time Air. This puts it in potential conflict with private companies, especially those providing air services to small centres.

Mr. Taylor advocated that all aspects of government ownership of corporations active in what would normally be considered the private-sector market should be examined with a view to eventual government withdrawal.

The Alberta Liberal Party will hold a policy convention in Edmonton in April, he announced. Resolutions will include ones aiming at government divestiture of Alberta liquor stores, Alberta Energy Co. and its remaining airlines interests. These will reaffirm and strengthen previous Alberta Liberal positions.

THE ALBERTA BRIDGE BUILDING CHALLENGE CUP

What do you get when you put a few hundred enthusiastic people, some rope, and a creek together? You get the Alberta Bridge Building Challenge Cup.

This year's bridge building was held on October 13, at Whitemud Creek. The contest involved 10 teams, 9 teams from NAIT, and one from the U of A. The teams from NAIT were: Air Conditioning, Civil Engineering, Architecture, Secretarial Arts, Mechanical Industrial Engineering, Engineering Design and Drafting Technology, a combination of Pre-Technology and Building Construction Engineering Technology, and two teams from BCET. Civil Engineering represented the University of Alberta.

Each team consisted of 20 members. Their objective was to construct a rope bridge, which was about 150 feet long, over Whitemud Creek. Then all the team members were to cross the bridge twice, then the bridge was dismantled. However, there was one feature added, to make the bridge crossing a little more difficult. Two of the team members had to carry one team member across the bridge twice, on a stretcher.

It was a challenge for the members to keep from falling into the creek. Most people kept from falling in, but there were a few that took the plunge.

When the contest was over, Architecture won the Alberta Bridge Building Challenge Cup with a time of 20 minutes. They were followed closely by one of the Building Construction teams who a time of 20 minutes and 22 seconds. Civil Engineering, the University of Alberta, was third with a time of 22 minutes and 15 seconds.

The contest has been going on for about 19 years and has always been held at Whitemud Creek. Architecture ran the contest for the first few years, then Building Construction took it over.

The enthusiasm of the teams was shown by the way some of the members were dressed. Long underwear, in various colors, was a common sight at the event. Some members wore loud summer shorts, funny ties, and one member wore an athletic supporter outside his long johns.

This year's Alberta Bridge Building Challenge Cup was a very enthusiastic event. With 200 competitors and many spectators showing up in cold weather, this is one of the better events at NAIT. Chairman Steve Drury and his organizers, should be congratulated.

DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOU'RE GOING?

Where are you going? Have you ever thought about it? Are you heading towards a goal? Or are you floating (rushing) through life aimlessly?

It is really incredible how many people do not have an objective they wish to achieve. Most student's goal is to finish this academic year. That is fine, but what happens then?

I realize that for those of you who are graduating, the future is uncertain, but you can reduce this uncertainty through planning. How you do that is through setting goals. When you set a goal, then you can plan for it. And, although you may not reach your goal, you will at least know where you stand.

After you have set your goal you should organize how you are going to achieve it. Suppose you are graduating this year. Perhaps your goal would be to have a job by the time you graduate. How you would achieve that goal would be to look early, dress accordingly for your interviews, and make yourself the best candidate for the job.

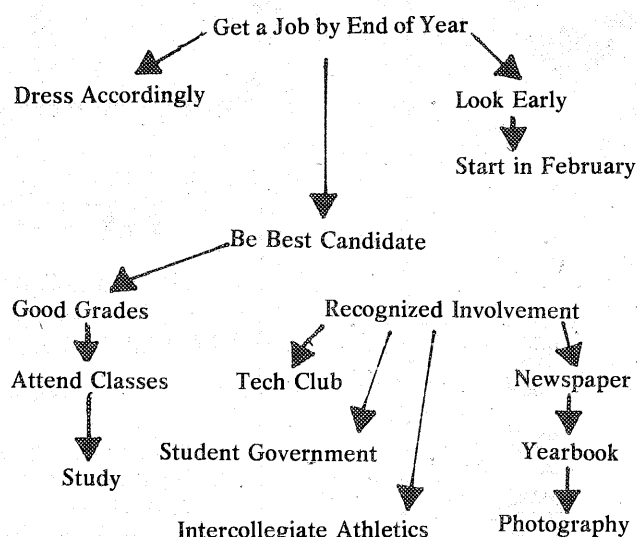
First, when you look early you should start around February. Then you can get a jump on the slowpokes.

Secondly, you should dress according to the job you are applying for.

Thirdly, you need good grades, and recognized involvement to become the best candidate for the job. Good grades come through studying and attending classes. Recognized involvement means participation in your tech club, in student government, in intercollegiate athletics, on the newspaper, yearbook, or photography and in committees needing student input.

Now this is not a complete list of ways to get a good job, but it is one way of achieving this goal.

If we were to draw a diagram of this goal setting strategy, here is how it would look.



So when you set a goal, you also set up how you will achieve your goals.

Now if you haven't set up at least one goal and an outline for achieving that goal, now you should. Your goals can be short or long term and may change over time. One rule to remember though, is that your goals should not be unrealistic simply because if they are too high, you will rarely achieve them. Nor should they be too low, since you will not be challenged. Set your goal high enough that they are a challenge.

Start slowly and build up.

OOK'S HOCKEY

The NAIT Oaks capped off the 1984-85 preseason by capturing the ACAC Preseason Hockey Tournament Championship in Red Deer this past weekend. In the championship contest, the NAIT Oaks tamed the Mount Royal College Cougars 9-1 Sunday. NAIT advanced to the final by edging the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings 4-3 in overtime Friday and by downing the Red Deer College Kings 7-4 Saturday. In the final preseason match before the Red Deer tournament, NAIT doubled the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings 6-3 at the NAIT Arena on Sunday, October 14th.

The NAIT Oaks continued their dominance over a vastly improved Camrose Lutheran College Vikings squad on Sunday, October 14th at the NAIT Arena scoring a 6-3 triumph.

A shorthanded goal by NAIT's Sid Cranston with 2:09 elapsed in the initial stanza opened the scoring. Dave Kendall of the Vikings tied the game at the 17:09 mark with a powerplay marker.

The NAIT powerplay connected with 13 seconds gone in the middle period as Ron Amyotte turned on the red light. Ron Amyotte notched his second of the game nine minutes and 57 seconds later. At 12:06, Rob Hrystak increased NAIT's advantage to 4-1. The Vikings then narrowed the gap with two tallies before the completion of the period. Bruce Kiryluk found the net with 12:22 passed in the frame. Max Brennan cut NAIT's lead to 4-3 at the 15:42 mark.

In the third, NAIT's penalty killing unit once again picked up a goal as Mark Schultz tallied at 11:16. Gary Haddon of the Oaks closed out the scoring with a powerplay marker with five minutes and 31 seconds left in the game.

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MOVIE UPDATE

AMADEUS

Adapted from Peter Shaffers long running Broadway stage hit, "Amadeus," is a fantasia based on fact. However, it is not a biography of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, nor was it intended to be. In telling the story about Mozart and his arch-rival, the court composer Antonio Salieri, the specific nature of Mozart the man, and Mozart the composer, has not been violated in the relationship.

Overall, the film of "Amadeus" much more than the play, is a celebration of Mozart's music.

Shaffer has used known, undisputed facts about Mozart's life and music, as seen through the jaundiced, hate-filled eyes of Antonio Salieri, to illuminate a number of universal themes that transcend both of these 18th century composers.

It is not Mozart, but his jealousy-maddened rival Salieri that Shaffer has cast center stage. What is interesting is Salieri's tormented vision of Mozart. "Why do you favor him, God? This clownish, giggling repulsive buffoon whose very name, Amadeus, could be taken to mean 'beloved by God?' Why have you lavished your divine gift on this blasphemous oaf, and withheld it from me--Your Servant-- who prays to you daily to invest me with genius?"

What lies at the heart of "Amadeus" is Mozart's music, and Salieri's constant reaction to it with a mixture of wonder and jealousy, of religious exaltation, bitter frustration and self-contempt for his own puny exploits when compared to Mozart, whose pen "seems to take dictation directly from God." What is most ironic is that Salieri hears in Mozart's music the sound of divine genius.

To his employer-patron, the Archbishop of Salzburg, Mozart is merely a troublesome, clever performing monkey hired to do a job.

To his simple wife Constance, he is a talented, lovable child without the knack of making money, attracting paying pupils or getting on at court. Salieri recognizes this misfit as the towering figure we celebrate today. Continued on Page 12

THIEF OF HEARTS

"Thief of Hearts" is the story of Scott Muller, a high-class, street-wise thief living life in the fast-lane, who learns that love is the one thing that cannot be stolen. It is also the story of Mickey Davis, a woman whose fantasies become realities when her most personal possessions, her diaries, are stolen. Soon she discovers that her private secrets are no longer secret.

Steven Bauer stars as Scott Muller, in his first leading role on screen. More recently Bauer made his debut as Manny Rivera, Al Pacino's right-hand man in "Scarface."

Barbara Williams, a Canadian actress, stars in the role of Mickey Davis. Producer Jerry Bruckheimer who brought us "Flashdance" teams up with Don Simpson to mark the first motion picture to be made under the aegis of Simpson--Bruckheimer Productions. Douglas Day Stewart who was nominated for an Academy Award for his original screenplay for "An Office and a Gentleman", makes his directorial/-writer debut.

Overall, "Thief of Hearts" is weak not only in concept but in acting. John Getz who plays Ray Davis, Mickey's husband is awful. The only memorable performance is by David Caruso, Muller's partner.

Perhaps Stewart should have spent more time with his typewriter instead of behind the camera to make this work as a movie not as it's billed "A Contemporary Romantic Suspense Thriller". Granted "Theif of Hearts" has its moments but overall are lost in structure between the various triangles of circumstances that overlap instead of naturally leading into each other. One very evident factor in "Thief of Hearts" is the "Flashdance" type of music track that Bruckheimer has seemed to have captured. Unfortunately it's not quite enough to bring "Thief of Hearts" into the same category as his 1983 runaway hit "Flashdance."

PBS-ANOTHER WINNER

Most people have an image of public television from the states as being dull, dry & unpalatable. This is unfortunate, as a lot of PBS programming is far from that.

A case in point was Saturday's Great Performances which showed A. R. Gurney JR's play The Dining Room. The play is a series of vignettes about the rituals, traditions and passages of the North American WASP is the Dining Room of their houses.

The play utilizes seven actors who play many roles in scenes which are all played out in an elaborate dining room set, in one scene, one actor plays a father who decides that his children are "old enough to eat with the grownups in the dining room". In another, the same actor plays a six-year old at a friend's birthday party. The scenes were all ingeniously interwoven. One character from the next scene would come on and begin performing even while the previous scene was still winding up.

It was a marvelous play, and I thoroughly enjoyed myself. But had I simply looked at the title in the program guide and snubbed it because it was on PBS, I would have missed an enjoyable evening's entertainment.

NAIT SCUBA CLUB

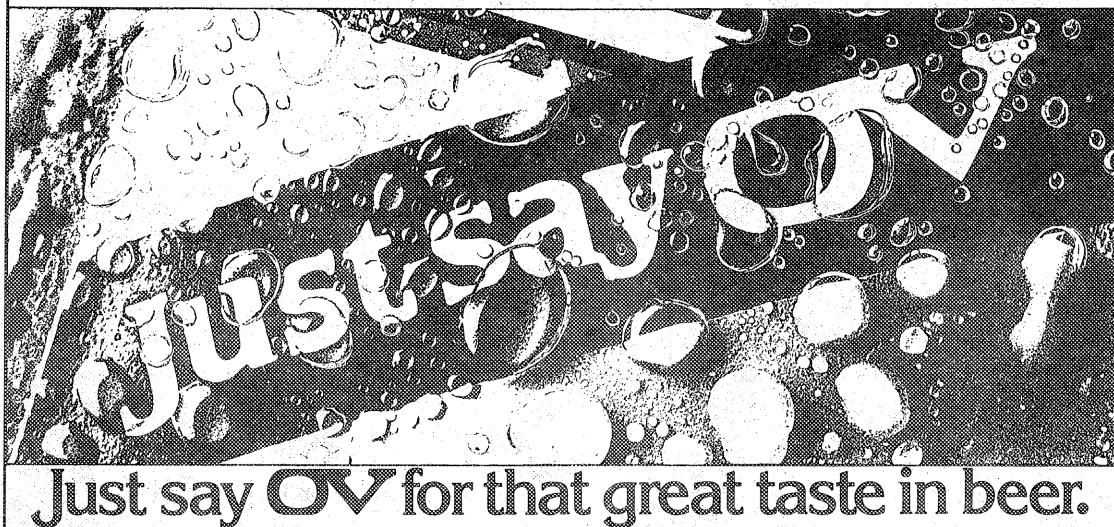

The universal theme of mediocrity in confrontation with
genius goes for beyond Mozart and Salieri; it is manifest in
any era and in every human pursuit--business, sports,
politics and the fine arts.

Another theme that is explored is that of man's relationship
to God. As John Milton often wondered, how can God's
often perverse ways be justified to man?

Having defied God, Salieri sets out to destroy his divine
voice that sings through the pen of his favored Mozart.
History tells us of Salieri's completed success, aided by
others equally jealous of Mozart's talented and repelled by
his arrogant childish behaviour. Interesting enough strikes
still another note, the genius poorly rewarded by society.

Tom Hulce, relatively unknown, stars as Wolfgang
Amadeus Mozart in a performance that is nothing less than
a delight. His comedic persona is excellently personified as
Amadeus the clown, the child-like genius. Interestingly,
Hulce has never played the piano before. In addition, he
was called upon to duplicate one of Mozart's legendary
piano stunts--playing suspended upside down, lying on his
back, with crossed hands.

"Amadeus" is a powerful film, a movie that should not be
missed. And time will tell whether it be as celebrated on
Broadway as at the box-office.

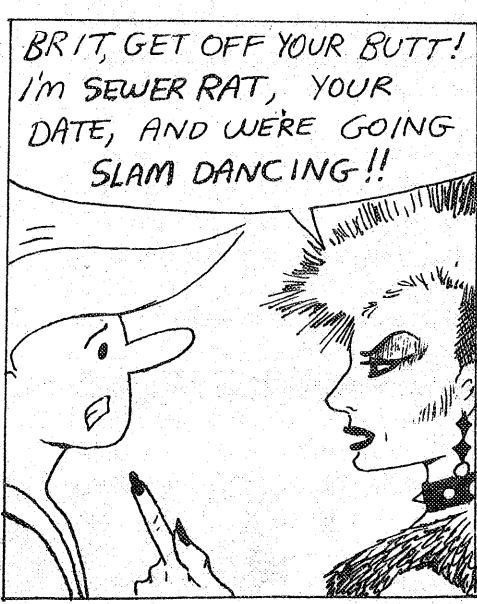
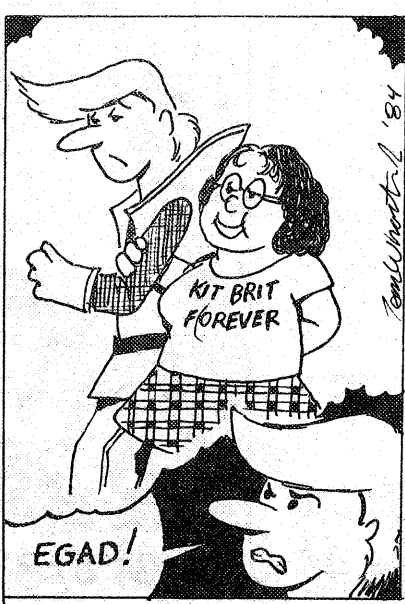
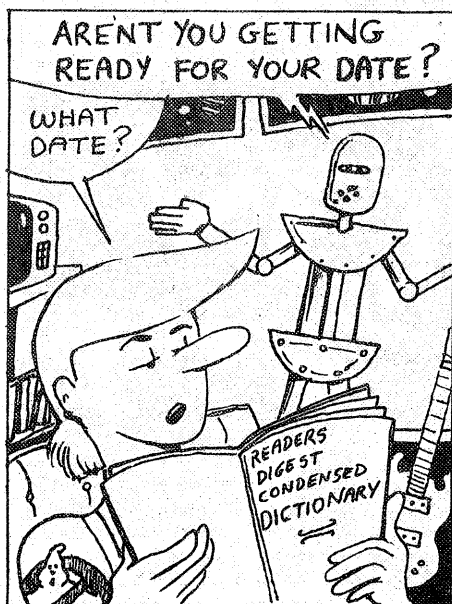
