Michael, who visited NAIT last week, is inflicted with a disease which attacks his lungs and his digestive system. Four times a day Michael must ventilate with compressed air. Then, after ventilating, Mike must undergo physiotherapy to make him cough to free the mucous from his lungs—four times a day! Our friend Michael must also take reams of medication daily to ensure the proper functioning of his internal organs. Mike must take a pill for everything he orally consumes. He is constantly taking antibiotics to avoid infections and as well, he's taking numerous multi-vitamins to preserve his already frail health.

While at Nait, Michael and his mother revealed to a shaken General Council that Michael was lucky to have spent only two weeks in hospital this summer. She said that regular trips to the hospital to revitalize people with Cystic Fibrosis is a common practice.

On top of all of Mike's other medical woes, Michael must have regular doses of allergy shots. One has to wonder what kind of spirit is needed to keep this fight for survival going.

Michael knows that with today's technology he won't live much longer than you and I have already lived. Yet, he keeps plodding along, fighting to at least maintain his body's struggle against his eventual killer Cystic Fibrosis. This of course is where you come in.

Last year a pathetic 5 percent of all of Nait Students participated in Shinerama. It is for that reason that Nait students are no longer given an afternoon in order to shine shoes. Why didn't more of you people shine shoes for Cystic Fibrosis? Why? Could it be that you're so concerned about being good typical Canadians with indifferent attitudes that your indifference had spread to avoiding thinking of others? Or, is it just that we take what we've got for granted and don't give a shit about others because "What did they do for me." What every your problem is or was, just consider a few facts.

- -10 years ago Michael Glessing would have had to consume 100 pills a day. Now, it has been reduced to 10 pills a day.
- -Cystic Fibrosis receives no Government funding for research or financial assistance to help pay for the expensive drugs needed for survival.
- -Medicare helps cover some of the drugs needed but after the victim is 18 years old, no help is given what so ever.
- -Shinerama is a huge part of funding for Cystic Fibrosis.
 78 percent of the money raised goes towards research.
 Another portion of the money raised helps families afford the drugs for their suffering members.
- -Sait raised almost 3 times more than we did last year. \$18,000 to \$5,000

After all, the tech. representatives stand for the wishes of everyone in their tech, and with all the representatives being on council, all NAIT students are spoken for. Is everyone pleased with the fact that their student fees are being spent by someone else?

There is a way to fix this machine that is only working at half efficiency. I suggest that firstly, everyone find out who exactly is on their student executive. Your program head or instructors should be able to answer this. Some people will be surprised to find out they don't have an executive. The obvious next step in this case is to elect one. Most technologies, however, do have a student executive. Make sure your reps are going to General Council. If you have any problems, concerns, or suggestions, take them to your executive who will in turn take it to NAITSA.

Our Student Government is only as successful as we make it. NAITSA wants to know all student opinions so they can benefit the general populace of NAIT. General Council meetings are every second Tuesday at 4:30. The next one is October 2. Make sure your voice is being heard.

NICK'S PICKS

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor says the Lougheed Government's latest natural gas policy foray will worsen the problems facing small natural gas producers.

Taylor says "It is insulting that the Government tells gas producers it is trying to market their gas at the same time the State-owned energy company, Alberta Energy, has announced it will drill 300 new gas wells this year."

"To compound the injury, the wells will be drilled on the Suffield military reserve which the Premier transferred from Crown ownership to Alberta Energy for a pittance," noted Taylor.

The Alberta Liberal Leader referred to a recent Royal Bank study which concluded that gas exports were not expected to rise in spite of lower Canadian prices. "This only shows that Americans never buy from us if they have their own surplus, be it beef, eggs or gas, no matter what our price is."

"The Government's continued reliance on State enterprise stems from the same paternalist and spendthrift attitude by which it justifies continued first-class air travel and personal companions travelling at taxpayers' expense."

"The gas markets must be shared fairly between all producers under a system of pro-rationing," argued the Liberal Leader. "This is the case for oil, and it works well. The sale of small-company owned gas reserves to stimulate exploration activity is a much better way than big government doing the drilling themselves," Taylor concluded.

Have you thought about what you are going to do after you finish NAIT? You could win a lottery or maybe you could live off of your parents. Both of those ideas probably will not work. Hey! Here's an unusual idea. Why not try to get a job.

Now, I know about today's job market and I wonder if I will ever get a job, especially after I hear the monthly unemployment rate. But before you start thinking about what life will be like on the unemployment line, why not drop by the NAIT Placement Centre.

The NAIT Placement Centre, which is located in the south lobby, is a free service to help NAIT students find employment. Whether you are looking for a full-time job after you graduate, or for a part-time job or summer employment to help pay for expenses, the Placement Centre staff is here to help.

The NAIT Placement Centre shows students inside tips on how to get a job. The Placement Centre helps students to: Write effective resumes, prepare for job interviews, develop effective job searching skills, and arrange on-campus interviews with employers.

The NAIT Placement Centre has contacted about 10,000 companies, to inform the companies about the NAIT graduates, who could become the company's employees. This service also supplies the students with information about prospective employers. The Placement Centre keeps in constant contact with employers, and when there is a position available, qualified students will be notified.

Throughout NAIT there are several bulletin boards with job notices for full, part-time and summer employment. These bulletin boards, set up by the Placement Centre, and by students are located by: The cafeteria, by the cafetorium, on the second floor of Plaza Two, and on the second floor of the Tower Building.

Another of the NAIT Placement Centre's services is the recently installed Job Hotline. By calling 471-8845, you can hear short, up-to-date information, about the NAIT programs which have job openings available. After calling the Job Hotline, you can call the NAIT Placement Centre at 471-8874, to receive more detailed information on the jobs that you are interested in.

Jerry Cossit, the Placement Centre's Co-ordinator said:

"The best thing about the new Job Hotline will be its convenience. Students can now have access to recent information about job openings at any hour of the day. The Job Hotline will also be of particular use to students who have graduated, and can't be on campus every day."

Presently, the Job Hotline receives about 30 calls every two days.

The employment picture does not look great, but with the help of the NAIT Placement Centre, the picture can get brighter.





If you have a Guaranteed Provincial or Canada Student Loan and are continuing full time studies you must reinstate the loan(s) PRIOR TO THE EXPIRATION OF THE SIX MONTH EXEMPTION PERIOD. You do this by:

(A) obtaining the necessary Reinstatement Forms from your bank, or

(B) negotiating a new Certificate of Eligibility within the six months exemption period.

You should check your most recent copy of the Certificate of Eligibility or Reinstatement Form for the latest academic year end date. Your exemption period expires six months from that date.

Even though you may have applied for further financial assistance and/or other types of awards, this does not automatically reinstate your loan. Negotiating a Canada Student Loan does not automatically reinstate your Guaranteed Provincial Loan, or vice versa.

Separate Reinstatement Forms must be submitted — Schedule 2 for Canada Student Loan and/or Form B for Guaranteed Provincial Loan.

If you fail to reinstate your loan within the stipulated exemption period you will be required to pay the interest charges accrued up to the reinstatement date.

If you should resume full time studies and have been paying on the Guaranteed Student Loans, you must also submit forms to have your loans reinstated to Interest-Free, Full-Time Status. Interest accrued must be paid up to date of reinstatement.

NOTE:

You will not be required to pay interest charges on your Guaranteed Student Loan(s) until the six month exemption period has expired. If you should remit any payments on your loan(s) prior to expiration of the six month exemption period, be assured that the payments are being applied only on the principal; no interest charges have been assessed by the bank

Students who change from Full-Time Studies to Part-Time Studies (less than 60% of full-course load) will be considered as withdrawn.

MEDICAL RESIDENT STUDENTS (POST-GRAD MEDICAL) — You cannot be reinstated to Interest-Free, Full-Time Status. Although you may be assessed tuition fees which may be paid by the sponsoring hospital, you are in receipt of a salary and therefore considered to be gainfully employed.

BUILDING CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY

This program was established

at the request of the Alberta Construction Association to provide a source of personnel to fill positions in administration and supervision within the construction industry. Due to changes in methods of construction in recent years, it is no longer possible to properly job-site train a person from tradesman through to foreman,

superintendent or administrator, in the time frame dictated by the requirements of the industry.

The student in this program will become familiar with the work of all the usual construction trades (carpentry masonry - plumbing - electrical, etc.) and will acquire a good understanding of construction, basic structural design in wood, steel and concrete, surveying, proper use of equipment, methods of estimating costs, scheduling office procedures and job management.

Graduates from this program will be dealing with people at various levels in the industry, or will be supervising tradesmen or construction jobsites. The hand skills required of the various trades in the construction industry are not taught in this program.

There is a large and growing demand for people from this program, due to the tremendous expansion and changes within the construction industry. Graduates have found employment as project coordinators, estimators, timekeepers, purchasing agents, superintendent trainees,

assessors and building inspectors. Opportunities for promotion are limited only by the desire, energy and ability of the graduate.

As BCET is one of the larger technologies at NAIT, we are very active in the Intramural Programs. Last year we beat the record for points, the previous record was set by BCET

We are also very active socially. Our first cabaret was held on September 21st at NorthmountHall, and was a great success. Our next major function is "The Annual Bridge -Building Contest", held over the icy waters of Whitemud Creek on October 13. One of the best cabarets of the year will follow that evening. 

"METROPOLIS" A VICTIM

OF POPULAR TASTE

METROPOLIS

NOW PLAYING AT THE PLAZA CINEMA

It always seems to me that all the moronic and inane movies seem to do the best at the box office, but the ones which require even the minutest mental effort on the audience's part are quickly shuffled off the screens and into Pay T.V. or the home video market.

So it was with such films as "My Dinner With Andre" and "Local Hero."

So it will be with "Metropolis." For this classic silent film, however, it won't be the first time. Originally made in 1926 by German director Fritz Lang, it was received poorly in America at that time because it had been edited down and chopped up "to suit American audiences." Recently director Giorgid Moroder decided to resurrect the film, painstakingly piecing it together from footage and stills obtained from numerous sources. Next, he added color to the film by some method. Finally, he added a soundtrack performances by Pat Benatar, Adam Ant, Billy Squier and others of songs and music written by Moroder for the film.

And the result? Well, the historical interest was what drew me to the film initially, but I found myself caught up in the story of Metropolis itself - An Orwellian world where oppressed workers ran underground machines to serve a surface-dwelling elite.

Standard story? Hardly. As anyone knows, it is not the story which captures one's attention, but the skill of the

story-teller - and Fritz Lang is a master.

The skill with which Lang uses his camera to "tell" the story of Metropolis is what makes this film work. A multiple image of workers converging on the Tower of Babel; the irridescent rings passing over the female robot as it takes on the identity of Maria, the heroine; the many gripping close-ups of human faces - the list is long.

The soundtrack and color may distract the purist silent-film watcher, but I found they added an important element for a generation accustomed to hearing as well as seeing its movies. The singing was a bit much at times - a purely instrumental soundtrack would have been enough, perhaps.

Despite Moroder's efforts to bring this classic to the screen once again, it seems "Metrpoplis" will be doomed to the same fate it was when America first saw it in 1926. The theatre was less than one-third full on the night I saw the film.

In short, my recommendations are these: if you don't mind working a little on your attention span in order to obtain some priceless cinematic gems, I suggest you go to see this movie. Judging by the lack of audience interest, you should hurry - this film may be gone by the weekend, if it isn't already by the time this gets to print.

The NAIT Ooks received their first look at the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings on Friday, September 21st. The Ooks continued their dominance over CLC position a 10-0 shutout win. FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21st-NAIT OOKS 10, CAMROSE LUTHERAN COLLEGE VIKINGS 0, AT NAIT ARENA.

The NAIT Ooks capitalized on the powerplay five times on the way to a 10-0 blanking over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings at the NAIT Arena on Friday, September 21st. The score is not indictive of what could happen in the regular season as CLC Coach Mike Johnston dressed no veterans.

Mike Dollevoet opened the scoring for NAIT at the 57 second mark of the first on a play with Tom Tookey. The NAIT powerplay capitalized as Gary Leach connected with the help of Sid Cranston and Mike Tookey at 10:04. Five minutes and 24 seconds followed before Jeff Martin increased NAIT's lead to 3-0. Colin Leney and Randy Repchuk assisted. Denis McCormack of the Ooks, closed out the initial stanza's scoring with a powerplay marker at 19:13.

With the main advantage, Mike Dollevoet set up Mark Schultz at 3:03 of the second to widen NAIT's cushion to five. With 6:00 passed in the frame, NAIT's Randy Repchuk notched his first goal of the night with help from Colin Leney. Four minutes and 36 seconds later, Gary Haddon scored the seventh NAIT goal with the help of Mark Schultz. Mike Spencer turned on the red light with 12:56 elapsed. 
