CITY OF EDMONTON BYLAW 6177

GENERAL COUNCIL
RECOMMENDS
60 PERCENT
NON-SMOKING FOR
NEW STUDENT
LOUNGE

General Council has voted to recommend to the Safety Committee that the new student loungebe 60 percent non smoking. Original 35 percent and 50 percent non smoking motions were turned down in favor of the 60 percent figure. "The non smokers will have to enforce the rule" said Greg Scherf, Naitsa's past President. "All the non smoking signs do is give non smokers the right to ask people smoking to please move to the smoking section" said Scherf.

No motion was made to change the present smoking restrictions in the Tower Building's Lounge. At present only 10 percent of the Tower Lounge is non smoking. The non smoking in the Tower Lounge is situated along the east side windows.

General Council based their decision upon the facts that the NAITSA smoking survey provided. "80 percent of the survery respondants said they were non smokers" said Scherf.

The recommendation will be passed on to NAIT's Safety Committee at their next meeting.

The dispute over the Naitsa elections has ended. General Council quashed the attempts for any byelections after the somewhat questionable procedures at the returns office. Although there will undoubtedly be hard feelings surrounding these recent events, at least NAITSA will now be forced to create some bylaws regarding future recounts. Even though I still find it hard to believe that such a problem occurred during the elections, I think that some of the good points about the polls outweigh the problem that marred them.

Does anybody remember last years elections? Probably not, they weren't worth remembering. Out of six elected positions, two were filled by acclamation. The remaining four positions only had nine candidates vying for them. This was a crowning moment for student apathy. How are you supposed to carry out a democratic, fair election if you have so few choices?

It was good to see that things were different this year. For the six elected executive offices, there were seventeen candidates. This meant that you were actually able to make a choice because you had someone to choose from! It also seemed to me that all the candidates who ran wanted to prove to all NAIT students that they would work hard if elected. It's good to see the democratic system being upheld by having the ability to vote for who you feel is the best candidate. It was also good to see that no offices were filled by acclamation. Incidents such as that are monuments for student lethargy.

Believe it or not, the percentage of student body votes also increased from last year by a whole 1.9 percent! Although it doesn't sound like much, it means that 114 more students voted this year than last year. True, it was only a jump from 7 percent of NAIT students to 8.9 percent, but at least it shows that some interest is growing. Perhaps in twenty years we will have a voter turnout percentage that will match the Federal turnout.

Even though my thoughts might be a little "tongue-incheek", I am still pleased with the elections. Ignoring the mistakes in counting and the empty Secretary's position, the increased participation is encouraging. I wish the new NAITSA Executive success in their upcoming year.

Democracy in education means reversing monopoly's attack on Canada's students. The financial barriers which discriminate against the working class must be removed by first freezing and then gradually rolling back tuition fees. As well, an all-grants program of student aid or living stipends should be provided.

Funding for universities and colleges must be increased to a level that will permit full accessibility and the improvement of quality. This requires drastic reforms in the financing of education. As things stand now, the share of taxes paid by big business has been shrinking steadily, while more of the burden has been loaded on working people. The corporate sector has derived enormous benefits from post-secondary education and gotten away with paying next to nothing for them. Corporations must be made pay their share through a restructured and fairer tax system.

Education should be integrated with economic and social objectives which will benefit the country as a whole, not simply meet the short-term job market needs of a capitalist economy geared to the needs of transnational - particularly U.S. based - monopolies. This reugires planning in the interests of the people, and is only possible through the implementation of policies to curb the power of monopoly. A policy to actively foster the development of manufacturing and processing throughout Canada would help address the problem of unemployment facing graduates.

The alternative to monopoly control of education is open and democratic planning at all levels of the university and college system. Students, support staff, faculty and the community at large must be fully involved in discussions and decision-making about the future and direction of postsecondary education. The governing bodies of postsecondary institutions must be taken out of the hands of big business, and significant representation from the comunity, trade unions, students, staff and faculty must be guaranteed.

The trend to narrow specialization, particularly in the colleges, must be reversed. Students should have access to a broad education to enable them to use their training in a so socially responsible way. Courses and programs on the history and struggles of the labor movement, women, and native peoples should be part of the curriculum. Specific procedures to eliminate sexist, racist and anti-working class bias in the curriculum should be instituted.

IT'S OFFICIAL

APRIL 9, 1985

On April 9 the NAITSA executive was under the gun. As the story goes Craig Somers, whose position as Athletics Chairman was revoked, presented his case to the NAITSA Executive council meeting.

The debate was over the counting procedures used by Miss Holly Root. The ballots were initially counted in Craigs favor. After a recount demanded by Patty Marcinishyn, it was discovered that three spoiled ballots that were disqualified in other categories, were applicable to the Athletics position.

The change in procedure and the addition of the three ballots resulted in Miss Marcinishyn being declared the winner. After continual discussion resulting in little being accomplished, the BCET representative called for a bi-election.

President Greg Scherf demanded the meeting be brought to order and asked the representatives to vote on what should be done. To much of his surprise twelve out of the seventeen representatives called for a re-election. "I do not really know where we go from here!" said Mr. Scherf.

It was noted since there was no quorum present, there could be no vote at this time. The issue was tabled to Tuesday, April 16, at which time the council will vote upon it.

Tuesday, April 16, 1985

Council met with its technological representatives to resolve the Athletics position once and for all. NAITSA had brought in a lawyer to define its election by-laws for those parties interested.

Once explained to them that indeed the results of Miss Marcinishyn's win was legitimate, the hopes of Craig Somers were dashed.

The council then voted on a by-election It was defeated by a substantial margin of 15 to 7.

INTERESTED IN PHOTOGRAPHY

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CHIEF RETURNING OFFICER'S REPORT

As most of you already know we now have a new students' executive. I would like to at this time capture the election event.

Each of the candidate's campaigns were underway Monday, March 25, 1985. The campaigning went throughout that week and into the next. On April 3, 1985, voting took place. The polls were open from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. I know this time does not seem long but this time was brought to the General Council meetings three consecutiv times and none of the technology representatives brought any feedback to my attention. If the students had a complaint about the times of voting, this is the place to bring up these kinds of concerns. Nothing was ever brought to my attention from these meetings concerning this matter.

After the polls were closed the counting of the ballots began. Those present at the count were David Holubitsky (Publications Chairman), Deneen Miller (Secretary), and Holly Root (Vice President and Chief Returning Officer). Each of the different positions were counted twice to double check the count. Once we had gotten to the Athletic Chairman's position, it seemed to be a very close race. We counted the Athletic Chairman's position once and came up with Craig Somer's in front. The count was then made three more times each coming up with different counts, but Craig coming up the winner by one or two. Begin that it was now 4:25 p.m., and the winners were to be announced at 4 p.m., we decided to leave the Athletics Chairman at the last count of Patti, 127 and Craig, 128. We knew that Patti would probably ask for a recount and at that time we would recheck the count.

The following day, Thursday, April 4, 1985, Patti did ask for a recount. There is nothing in the NAITSA Bylaws that states anything regarding a recount. As the Alberta Election Act states, if there are no bylaws stated regarding a recount, it is up to the Chief Returning Officer to decide if there will be a recount or not. As Chief Returning Officer, I did decide there would be a recount that day at 3 p.m. Both of the candidates were notified of the recount and each could have been present during the recount. Neither one of them were told that they could not be present. Those present at the recount were Greg Scherf (President), Holly Root (Vice President and Chief Returning Officer), as well as another student body member. A recount is not a secretive matter, and the only ones that were actually involved in counting the ballots were Holly Root and Greg Scherf. The first time the recount was done, we got a count of Patti, 129, and Craig, 127. We at this time decided to use a different counting method. We sorted out one pile for Craig and one pile for Patti and another pile for the other candidates running for the Athletic's Chairman position.

There had been some ballots which were eliminated in the first count. The reason for this was because in one of the positions on each of the four ballots, the voter had added his/her own candidate or we could not distinguish who they were voting for. All four of these ballots were only spoiled in one particular area and none in the Athletic Chairman's position. We then at this time decided that the ballots were only spoiled in the one area and did not affect the rest of the positions. All of these ballots were for Craig Somers. By adding these ballots they in no way changed any of the other results.

Once these ballots were added into the count and all piles were separated, we came up with a new count of 132, Patti, and 129, Craig. The difference in count is unexplainable except that it is a human error. On the day of voting there were 500 and some ballots counted twice for each as well as four times for the Athletic Chairman's position. I would suggest to Randy Fibke, the new Vice President that a different counting method be administered.

This count was recounted three times and each of the three times we came up with the same count of 132, Patti and 129, Craig. Once we were sure of the count I then related the news to Craig Somers. To reassure him of the count I gave the ballots to him and allowed him to count the ballots on his own. He and a fellow classmate counted the ballots while I and Greg Scherf were present. After counting the ballots they came up with the same count of 132, Patti and 129, Craig.

The error was an unfortunate mistake but that is what a recount is for; to check the accuracy of the first count.

As the last edition of the Nugget so blatantly stated there was to be a special General Council Meeting on Tuesday, April 16, 1985 to vote on a re-election. The motion came up at the meeting to have a bi-election which was not passed. The majority vote was that Patti was the new Athletic Chairman by a vote of 132 to 129.

Congratulations to Patti and an apology to Craig Somers for the error of the initial count.

I would like to close by wishing the new executive the best of luck in the upcoming year, and I would hope to see some new by-laws brought into the constitution regarding elections and recounts.

Cult mind control.

In their recruiting and rituals, many cults are using a form of mind control -- a sweeping manipulation unlike anything ever witnessed before in our society.

This new form of mind control rearranges the way the brain sends nerve impulses. It changes the way a person thinks. This personality change is accomplished through several orchestrated techniques, some of which are listed.

- 1. Isolation A loss of reality induced by physical separation from society and rational references, usually with the introduction of the concept absolute good (us) against absolute evil (outside world).
- 2. No Questions Automatic obedience and acceptance of beliefs accomplished by discouraging questions. One basic principle of psychological coercion is that if you can make a person behave the way you want, you can make that person believe what you want.
- 3. Confusing Doctrine The rejection of logic as a pledge of faith is fostered by lecturing on complex and cyclical dogma, which no one could understand.

4. Rejection of Old Values - The love of the new lifestyle is speeded up by constantly putting down the old lifestyle.

- 5. Confession A destruction of personal ego, increased vulnerability to new teachings and the weaknesses of new recruits are revealed through a sense of intimacy contrived by the sharing of innermost secrets.
- 6. Disinhibition An abdication of adult responsibility is encouraged by orchestrating child-like behavior.
- 7. Finger Pointing A false sense of righteousness is created by pointing to the shortcomings of the outside world and other cults.
- 8. Peer Group Pressure Suppression of doubt and resistance to new ideas is achieved by exploiting the natural need to belong.
- 9. Fear Loyalty to the group is maintained by threatening soul, life or limb for the slightest 'negative' thought, word, or deed.
- 10. Guilt Teachings of eternal salvation are reinforced by exaggerating sins of the former lifestyle.
- 11. Hypnosis A state of high suggestibility often thinly disguised as meditation.
- 12. Financial Commitment Increased dependence on the group is achieved by 'burning bridges' to the past through the donation of all assets.

The transformation of personality and thinking that occurs in cults is a seductive process. The first crucial element in the syndrome is gaining access to potential converts -- recruitment tactics. It is important to remember that nobody wakes up one morning and says, "Gee, I think I'll join a destructive cult today." Everyone must be recruited.

The recruitment process used will depend upon the cult involved and the targeted recrutiee. It may begin with a friendly invitation to a free dinner and lecture with a terrific group of people, to promises of exciting new adventures in human awareness.

Destructive cults prey on all kinds of people, from all age groups, in all socio-economic classes. It is a very democratic manipulation. The effects of cult involvement are equally alarming. To remain within the strict mental and social confines of a cult for even a short period of time can have various combinations of effects on a person.

There are many steps one can take to resist mind control. Going passively along 'on automatic', is often our worst enemy. When we habitually take simple assumptions for granted in a setting, we fail to check out the reality. The following are suggestions for awareness and resistance;

- 1. Be willing to disobey simple situational rules when you feel you should, to sound false alarms occasionally or cause a scene. Never do anything you do not believe just to appear 'normal' or to get someone off your back. The includes your comportment during classtime with professors.
- 2. Practice 'seeing through' programmed responses to authority. Pay attention to the social roles you and others play, including such subtle indicators as title-example-Doctor, or clothing-example-business suit, repair person's uniform.
- 3. Be aware of who is controlling whom in situations, to what end and at what cost.
- 4. To the extent that it seems possible, refuse to accept the initial premise that someone else is more powerful, more competent, more in control than you are.
- 5. Learn to recognize when a message is confused or ambiguous, perhaps intentionally so, especially if someone suggests, "You're just too stupid to understand," You have a closed mind," "Your defense mechanisms are reacting," or "Women are too emotional to think logically."

CHANGES TO EARNINGS FOR

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

The Canada Employment and Immigration Commission today announced approval of regulatory changes in the treatment of severance payments for Unemployment Insurance (UI). These changes were originally proposed in Mr. Wilson's November 8 Economic Statement.

Effective March 31, 1985, certain payments made to an employee on separation will be considered earnings for UI. These payments include severance pay, vacation pay, accumulated sick leave credits and other similar payments.

After March 31 the start of a claim for UI can be delayed by these kinds of payments. The claim would be delayed by the number of weeks these payments represent. For people getting separation payments while on UI claim, the money received will reduce the weekly amount of benefits payable.

The intent of these regulatory changes is to treat separation income in the same way as all other income from employment. In other words, UI should not be paid to any

person still receiving money from previous employment.

There are three exceptions to the new changes.

*If a claim was started before March 31, 1985, it will continue to be treated under the old regulations until it runs

*If the payments received are covered by a collective agreement or a labour-management agreement that was in force before December 31, 1984. (This exception stays in force until the agreement expires or until March 26, 1988, whichever is earlier.)

*If the payments are made because of a policy of the employer and this policy existed, in writing, before December 31, 1984. (This exception stays in force until the policy is changed or until March 26, 1988, whichever is





MOVIE UPDATE By Byron A. Martin

PORKY'S REVENGE

Now before you make a judgement about this one, take heed because "Porky's Revenge" does justice to "Porky's" of old. And yes, you can still, "Get it at Porky's."

Once again, the boys and girls of the wildly misnamed Angel Beach High tangle with the school administration, their own raging labidos, and last but certainly not least, Porky himself. The pachydermic proprietor of the den of all-around sin, gambling and corruption which was so gleefully demolished by our heroes in the first "Porky's."

Well, Porky is back and so is his club. But, you'd better know how to swim in case of trouble -- for Porky's is now housed on a lavish showboat, with the famous neon sign blinking above, keeping a few knots ahead of the law and other antagonists.

The Angel Beach High gang have been staying out of Porky's way until their basketball coach, unable to pay his gambling debts, is threatened by the bullying behemoth and his neanderthal henchmen with death or worse -- unless the team throws the championship game.

This, of course, means war. Plots and counterplots inevitably lead to an epic confrontation between the "Dirty Half-Dozen" and their corrupt arch-enemy, with many surprises along the way.

Did you know, for instance, that there's a man in the romantic past of Miss Balbricker, the misanthopic gym teacher?... That Porky has a daughter named Blossom?... And that Blossom has certain appetites which match her old man's, albeit in a somewhat different direction?. . . And what really goes on between Miss Webster, Angel Beach High's vengeful biology teacher, and Mr. Dobish, the scarcely temptation-proof chaplin?...

All of these questions and more will be answered in "Porky's Revenge." The newest in the highly acclaimed series of raucous, no-holds-barred comedies celebrating the great all-American rites of passage. Don't miss this one. You'll laugh your neighbour right out of his seat and cry yourself to sleep at the absolute stupidity of some of the antics at Angel High.

LADYHAWKE

The legend of cursed lovers has its roots in medieval times, from an obscure Hungarian prince and princess to the famous Romeo and Juliet. The latest, is Ladyhawke, in which director Richard Donner has gone back to the mythology of the Middle Ages, blending "mysticism and reality" to mirror the times.

Rutger Hauer (Osterman Weekend, Blade Runner, Nighthawks) stars as Etienne Navarre and Michielle Pfeiffer (Grease II, Into the Night, Scarface) as Isabeau of Anjou, play the star-crossed lovers cursed to spend their lives "always together, eternally apart." Matthew Broderick (Wargames) is Phillipe Gaston the pickpocket who is destined to intervene in his romantic adventure. Donner has brilliantly used reversed symbollism in producing this film, casting the corrupt Bishop in white, and the hero Navarre in black. The Bishop, spurned in his passion for Isabeau, strikes an unholy bargain with the Evil one, dooming Isabeau to the life of a hawk by day, while Navarre is a ferocious wolf by night.

Phillipe Gaston unwittingly drifts into this eternal doom. Sentenced to die for his crimes, Gaston escapes from the Bishop's fortress-like jail, the first prisoner to do so. Through a series of lucky occurrances, Gaston and Navarre manage to save each other's lives. It is here that Navarre realizes, after two years of futile effort, that if one can escape from the fortress, one can also get back in. Danger escalates as Gaston, Navarre and the "Ladyhawke" travel towards the Bishop and their date with destiny.

Numerous scuffles ensue and an aimless arrow wings the hawk, imperiling her life. Phillipe is entrusted to bring the bird to the only person who can save her, the only person who can break the curse cast upon Navarre and Isabeau. Donner took painstaking care in creating an atmosphere that accurately depicts 13th century France. Despite the French setting, location shooting was done entirely in Italy. The crumbling castles and medieval ruins that Italy offered were just what was called for to depict the Middle Ages. In all, some 13 sites of historic significance were adapted for Ladyhawke, including the Etruscan bridge dated approximately 600b.c. and the catacombs running beneath the famous Via Salaria in Rome. In essence Ladyhawke is a romantic comedy, filled with action and adventure. Matthew Broderick is excellent as Gaston, the pick pocket, as is Michielle Pfieffer the damsel in distress. The film not only takes the audience on a journey back in time but emits a sense of love confounded within the depths of the characters. Easily evident when for the first time Gaston meets and discovers Ladyhawke. Without question Ladyhawke is an adventure to its truest form since Robinhood of old, and easily eclipsed by no other.

POLICE ACADEMY 2

Police Academy is back. This time they are on their first assignment. "Police Academy 2: Their First Assignment" focuses on the further comic adventures of the misfits of last year's smash success, "Police Academy." And yes, they are all back again on the streets in which the raucous rookies ae assigned to clean up a gang-terrorized neighborhood.

Reunited are seven of its stars, reprising their arresting characters: Steve Guttenburg, as Carey Mahoney, who never wanted to be a cop; Bubba Smith, as Hightower, the ex-florist; David Graf, as Teckleberry, the weapons freak; Lavelle Jones, as Michael Winslow, the human sound-effect machine; Marion Ramsey, as Hooks, the timid female officer; Bruce Mahler, as the ever-awkward Fackler, and George Gaynes, as the inept Commandant Eric Lassard.

New to the scene is Howard Hesseman (WKRP-Dr. Johnny Fever) as Pete Lassard, brother to the Commandant, who is given thirty days to clean up his department or lose his job.

Like old, the new Academy is full of gags. Mahoney changes Lt. Mauser's shampoo to a plastic chemical compound which hardens in minutes leaving Mauser's hands stuck to his head. Winslow, as usual, using acoustic buffers scares away potential criminals. Tackleberry carries a handgun that would scare Dirty Harry. The list goes on and on.

Overall, their first assignment was a good and successful one. However the antics at the Academy are hard to beat. This time, Academy seems to go for the quick laugh instead of telling the joke. They go straight for the punch-line.

I enjoyed the movie, Hesseman as Pete Lassard and Guttenberg as the laid-back comedian, both were great and added a definite spice to the show. But somehow, Their First Assignment, between the time they received it and graduating from the Academy, lost it.


