There is no doubt a public apology is in order.

You should! The first time these people screw up a lot of you are going to be screaming and yelling bloody blue murder; yet those of you who didn't vote will have no right.





THE NAIT OUTDOOR EDUCATION PROGRAM

Did you ever wonder how much it would cost you to go on a canoe trip, to learn how to ski or to learn how to survive in the outdoors? Well the Physical and Leisure Education Program at NAIT is currently offering these courses throughout the school year at no cost to the student. All equipment transportation and instruction are provided free of charge. The outdoor education courses vary with the seasons from Canoeing and Backpacking in the Fall, to Cross Country Skiing and Wilderness Skills in the Winter, to River Canoeing in the Spring.

Over the years the Outdoor Education Program has evolved from being totally optional for all students to a point where several technologies have included specific courses as being compulsory for their students. The Biological Science program was the first to recognize the value of good outdoor skills to graduating students in the "ecology" option. separate courses are now offered to Bio Science students in River Canoeing, Survival Skills, Cross Country Skiing, Rifle & Shotgun Familiarization, Swimming, First-Aid and Fitness. Other technologies have made certain courses compulsory for their students ie. Surveying Survival course,

Forestry, Cross Country Skiing and next year, Earth Resources Survival.

As more techs made outdoor Education compulsory there is a corresponding reduction in the number of optional courses available for the general student body. The optional courses have been plagued by a number of cancellations over the past few years by lack of sufficient numbers even though plenty of students had registered in the course. Such lack of responsibility by these people threaten the optional program which is being offerred as a service to the students.

In the third quarter there are two optional courses offered; Wildnerness Skills March 30-31 and Canoeing May 4-5. These courses held their registration at the beginning of the third quarter but you can register in person by attending the first lecture (late registration is subject to space available). Normal Outdoor Education courses are designed for the novice outdoorsman and are looking to provide a positive initial outdoor experience. The program welcomes staff involvement as well as students, so take advantage of this service while here at NAIT.

GOOD PR, BAD BUDGET

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor states that he is "amazed at how the media have been taken in by the Alberta government budget and congratulates Hyndman and the Lougheed team on being able to elicit headlines like 'Alberta Holds Line', or 'Alberta Will Not Raise Taxes' or 'Taxpayers Saved Again'."

"Premier Lougheed, who purports to be a fiscal conversative and an admirer of Reagan, did the unheard of thing for a pro-market economy by refusing to cut taxes and thereby increase spending. Nearly every capitalist government which can afford it, is cutting taxes so that more income is placed in the hands of the people. That action would generate spending and create jobs," explains Taylor.

The Alberta Liberal Leader points out, "last year the government ended up with a budgetary surplus although a deficit had been forecast. Likely the same thing will happen this year. With umemployment at about 15 percent in our major cities, it has to be almost criminal for the government to keep hoarding tax money."

Taylor wonders what Hyndman and Lougheed are afraid of. "Government might heavily tax away money in times of inflation; but our inflation is practically zero. Government should put money back in the hands of the private sector, particularly small business and individuals, to make the economy grow.

"Added to this insult to the taxpayers, is the injury of literally ignoring the farmers in spite of huge bailouts to financial institutions and favoured businesses. We have a government which has lost all touch with reality and seems obsessed with milking our non-renewable resources as fast and quickly as it can to maintain its Heritage Trust Fund and protect some special interests," concluded Taylor.

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
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Ooks Hockey


Room 237 provided us with some wrestling bouts. Hulk Hogan was not in attendance so Cleo took his place.

To the people of Edmonton, we thank you for the use of your garbage can lids. Unfortunately they were in no shape to return.


To the Diversified bus drivers, we thank you for putting up with us.

The Dental Assisting Program at NAIT is bringing you our own Dental Health Week from April 8-11.

Good nutrition is a key factor in maintaining a healthy body and also maintaining a healthy mouth.

During this week of April 8-11, we will be selling fresh fruit & vegetables near the main cafeteria & near the north cafeteria.

DENTAL ASSISTING

Dental Assisting is a nine month program during which we are taught many different skills which augment the dentist. Upon completion of the course we are Certified Dental Assistants with many intra-oral skills, such as applying webber dams and taking x-rays. We also do proplylasais and fluoride as well as taking impressions.

During the course we have patients in to have x-rays and during 3rd quarter, we will also be cleaning teeth for children from 5 to 15 years of age. We then have a 3 week externship at a private practice.

DENTAL WORKOUT: MAKE IT PART OF YOUR FITNESS PROGRAM

It's never too late to make dental care an essential part of your total fitness program. The care you put into cleaning


your teeth now will go a long way to helping you keep them when you're older.



King David stars Richard Gere in the title role, Edward Woodward, Alice Krige, Jack Klaff, directed by Australian Bruce Beresford.

Spanning 55 turbulent years the film captures the tragic and triumphant times of this life; the patronage of King Saul that turned to hatred; the ambitions of his two sons; and David's fall from grace with God and, eventually, his redemption.

According to Beresford: "I wanted to do the film in as realistic a way as possible. It's such an incredible story and it's never been told in its entirity before. I hope it comes off. It's a wonderful script and the chance of a lifetime."

Indeed it is. And yes, without question he has pulled it off.

CANADA'S BEST

It was a week to remember.

The NAIT Ooks joined the elite company of the 1948 Calgary Stampeders who won a Grey Cup, the 1972 Miami Dolphins who were Super Bowl champions, and the neavyweight boxer, Rocky Marciano who retired as heavyweight champion. All of the above finished their season or career as undefeated.

The NAIT Hockey Ooks captured their second Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (National) Hockey Championships on Saturday, March 30th by wrapping the season with a record of 33 wins and no losses in the regular season and conference and national playoffs. The Ooks were 25 and 0 in the regular season, 5 and 0 in the ACAC playoffs, and 3 and 0 at the CCAA Hockey Championships in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.

TUESDAY, MARCH 26th

The day started out with the taking of the team picture at 8:00am followed by a brisk practice at the NAIT Arena. The Ooks than returned to the NAIT Arena close to 12:00 noon to prepare their baggage for their trip to Moose Jaw, Ssaskatchewan for the CCAA National Hockey Championships. At 12:30, the Ooks left as a team on the NAIT bus for the Edmonton International Airport. The Ooks then left on Air Canada flight AC274 bound for Regina. Also on the flight were the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves Women's Basketball Team who were hoping to bring home a medal, too.

The Ooks arrived in the Queen City around 4:40 CST only to load up and head for the city of Moose Jaw, a center with over 30,000 people.

Following a team meal, the team attempted to see a show. We did not know that there are great line-ups on \$2.00 Tuesday and were left stranded outside the theatre.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 27th

There were a pair of things on the agenda for Wednesday, March 27th. One was a gruelling 50 minute practice. The other was the CCAA Awards Banquet to be held in Caronport, Saskatchewan.

The practice was the first time NAIT skated inside the Moose Jaw Civiv Centre. From all indications, the players seemed to like the atmosphere at the venue.

Then at 7:00pm, the NAIT Ooks were joined by other college teams participating in basketball and hockey teams at CCAA All-Canadian Awards Banquet hosted by Briercrest Bible College of Caronport, Saskatchewan, 15 miles west of Moose Jaw. Saskatchewan Premier Grant Devine was among the dignitaries at the head table.

The NAIT Ooks were up for awards in four categories. NAIT goaltender, Cleo Rowein, received his third All-Canadian Award by compiling a 2:19 goals against average in 685 minutes of play. NAIT right winger, Ron Amyotte, was selected as an All-Canadian in his first year with the Ooks. The former Weyburn Red Wing finished second in the ACAC scoring race with 29 goals and 22 assists for 51 points.

NAIT goaltender commented on his award, "I think in my position as a goaltender, goaltenders are only as good as the hockey team in front of you. It was really easy to be an All-Canadian with an All-Canadian team in front of you."

NAIT winger Ron Amyotte was surprised with his selection. "It was a great experience, I didn't expect it at all. When they called my name I got a thrill down my spine."

Coach of the Year honours went to Alain Chainey of the Victoriaville Vulkins. Chainey could not accept the award in person as he returned to Quebec to make arrangement for his father's funeral. Yvon Pare, athletic director at Victoriaville accepted the award on Chainey's behalf.

NAIT coach Perry Pearn was relieved he did not win Coach of the Year honours like last year. So far, a CCAA Coach of the Year award winner has not been able to win a national title in the same year.

Alberta did very well at the Awards Banquet bringing away plenty of hardware. In women's basketball, CLC coach Gail Amort Larson was named Coach of the Year in her final year behind the bench before retirement. Tricia Harrison of CLC was named to the All-Canadian team as a forward. In men's basketball, Dave Adams of Lethbridge College was named Coach of the Year after the outstanding fight his club put up against the SAIT Trojans in the ACAC finals. Two ACAC men's basketballers were named All-Canadian. They were Chad Nicholson of the Medicine Hat College Rattlers and Ryan Heggie of Lethbridge Community College.

ΓHURSDAY, MARCH 28th

Action began at the Moose Jaw Civic Center on Thursday, March 28th, and there were no upsets in the first round. Although the Kelsey Amaruks appeared to be vastly improved and the Red River Rebels from Manitoba seemed to fold like an accordian.

THURSDAY, MARCH 28th--NAIT OOKS 8, CARIBOO COLLEGE CHIEFS 2 AT MOOSE JAW CIVIC CENTRE

Like their first playoff series with the Camrose Lutheran College Viking, the Ooks seemed to be tentative in their first match at the CCAA Hockey Nationals. The Ooks shook the cobwebs off in the last 40 minutes with the Cariboo College Chiefs to score an impressive 8-2 win.

The Ooks opened up the game with Ron Amyotte receiving a Mike Tookey pass on a breakaway and fooled Cariboo netminder Gerald Forbes for NAIT's first goal on the powerplay at 5:05 of the first period. Brent MacMillan tied the game for the Chiefs at the 10:23 mark. The Ooks gained a 2-1 advantage when Hugh McCaskill rallied shorthanded with 42 seconds left in the period. The Ooks then thought

they would go into the dressing room with the lead. This was not to be as Rob Cederberg, and All-Canadian with the Chiefs, capitalized on a giveaway at center ice and scored on the resulting breaking with 10 seconds left on the clock. The Ooks were outshot 15 to 13 in the first period.

The Ooks were a different hockey club in the second continually applying pressure. Sid Cranston scored the go-ahead goal for the Ooks with 4:06 elapsed in the second on a Gary Haddon set-up. Mike Tookey and Garth Hayes then combined to set-up Ron Amyotte's 7th goal of the playoffs at 6:00 even. The NAIT powerplay then clicked once again as Garth Hayes netted his third goal in post season play. Assists went to Mike Tookey and Sid Cranston.

Ken Goodwin of the NAIT Ooks then scored on an unusual play with 2:30 passed in third from Ron Amyotte. Ken shot the puck at the Cariboo net, the puck hit a Chiefs defenceman in the calf and went into the net. Two minutes and 31 seconds later, Murray Melnyk's initial playoff tally came on a play with Mark Schultz. Garth Hayes then pocketed his second goal of the game from Mike Tookey and Randy Repchuk. The game MVP was Sid Cranston of the Ooks.

Gerald Forbes of Cariboo handled 44 NAIT shots. NAIT goaltender Cleo Rowein was tested on 28 occasions.

NAIT rearguard Ken Goodwin felt that condition played an important role in the Ooks' dominance as the game continued. The third period we came through playing really well. The other team just couldn't keep up with us."

Garth Hayes, right winger for the Ooks was relieved to win the first game. "Coming into the first game, everyone had some butterflies. As the game continued, the nervousness wore off and we just got stronger."

Other scores from the first day were predictable. The Cape Breton Capers of Nova Scotia scored nine straight goals en route to a 12-7 victory over the Red River Rebels of Red River, Manitoba. The Victoriaville Vulkins of Quebec coasted to a 10-4 triumph over the host Briercrest Clippers of Caronport. The Kelsey Amaruks of Saskatchewan put up a valiant effort against Seneca but came up short, losing 4-2 to the Braves of Ontario.
