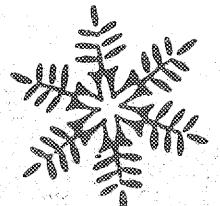

LOAN INFORMATION

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Application forms and information for all financial assistance programs are available from the Financial Aid and Awards Office, NAIT. Completed applications must be returned to this office. For Alberta residents there is no deadline for receipt of applications. However, you are urged to apply well before the beginning of the academic session for which assistance is required. The time required to process an application is approximately 8 to 10 weeks.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible to apply for financial assistance from Alberta you must be:

- A. A Canadian Citizen or have Permanent Resident STATUS.
- B. An Alberta resident, and you must be,
- C. A full-time student, i.e. take a minimum of 60 percent of a normal course load for the entire period of study for which assistance is required, i.e. approximately 200 hours per quarter. However, the actual number of hours depends on the total number of hours in your program. Students who intend to register in only 60 percent of their program should verify their status with the Financial Aid and Awards Officer.

CANADA AND PROVINCE OF ALBERTA STUDENT LOAN PLANS

Financial assistance is available in the form of loans and grants where personal resources are insufficient to provide for the cost of full-time studies at the post-secondary level. The purpose of a student loan is to supplement your income, not to replace your own financial resources, i.e. savings, summer earnings, parental or spousal contribution if applicable, and part-time earnings. Loans are funded through two government sources: federal & Canada Student Loan and provincial (Alberta Student Loan). In Alberta, both the Canada Student Loan and the Alberta Student Loan are administered by the Students Finance Board. The same application form covers both loans, and financial assistance may be given under one or the other or both plans. The maximum loan assistance available per year is \$4,300. If you are not an Alberta resident, you must apply for assistance to your home province.

PART-TIME STUDIES

If you are a part-time student, i.e. taking less than 60 percent of a course load, you may be eligible to receive a bursary provided you are in financial need and are registered in a

course or courses that are part of a program approved by the Students Finance Board. The maximum amount of a bursary that may be awarded per quarter is \$300. Bursaries are intended to cover the cost of tuition, books, child-care and travel, if required.

REMISSION

The Student Finance Board may repay, on your behalf, a portion of the funds that you are required to borrow for each year of full-time studies. These payments are called remission and under this program the Province may repay a maximum of 50 percent of loans issued in the second year, and 25 percent of loans issued in the third year.

Remission is estimated according to the information you submitted on your application for a student loan. Refund is processed once you begin repaying your student loan and you have submitted an application to the Students Finance Board. Applications may be obtained from the bank, and must be completed by the bank before it is mailed to the Students Finance Board.

INTEREST RELIEF IF YOU BECOME UNEMPLOYED

If you become unemployed because of inability to find work or temporary illness and have insufficient resources to repay your loans without undue hardship, you should immediately advise your lender or collection agency, whichever is monitoring your loans, and request an Application form for Interest Relief. If the lender has submitted a claim to the government and you have not been contacted by the government or its agent, you should request an application form from the Student Assistance Directorate (see Additional Information section). Under the Interest Relief section of the Canada Student Loans Act, the Government of Canada will pay, if you are eligible, the interest charges due on your Canada Student Loan for a three-month period, renewable for up to 18 months if your circumstances have not improved. You should complete an application form in accordance with the instructions on the other side and return it to the lender or collection agency for forwarding to the government. You will be advised by the government whether or not your application is approved and, if approved, the period of interest relief granted.

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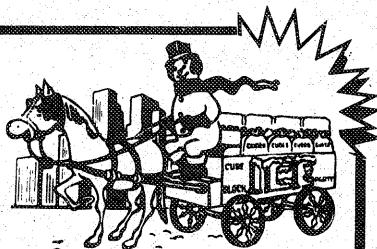
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CAFETERIA SERVICES OVER THE HOLIDAYS

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SWAP Program

NAIT students have been given the chance to work in a foreign country this summer, through SWAP, the Student Work Abroad Programme. The project is run by the Canadian Federation of Students and they call it a "working holiday."

Students may find themselves shearing sheep or cleaning rooms but the Federation feels that students benefit from hav-

ing any kind of foreign work experience appear on their resumes.

The average cost is about 800 dollars for visits to countries like Britain, Ireland and Belgium, but up to fifteen hundred for trips to New Zealand or Australia.

Students are required to speak the language of the host country and buy their tickets through Travel Cuts Edmonton, a national student travel agency.

JOBS FOR STUDENTS

Jobs for students look promising in the near future with the recent sale of the Sheraton Hotel to a major corporate developer.

Jack Levit, President of Lakeview Development of Canada Ltd., announced the takeover which has been in effect since December 2. Mr. Levit said, "Plans for an extensive renovation program are underway," and that could mean the creation of over one hundred student jobs. Positions could range anywhere from part-time construction work to full-time help on the kitchen or managerial staff.

However, Levit is dependent on Provincial grants to help the Sheraton become the high profile hotel he is hoping for.

NAITSA COUNCIL MEETING

The wages for the student executive was for a 30 percent increase. The final reading was Tuesday, December 17 and it was passed. Effective immediately the raises will commence and will not be retroactive.

The quiet study areas in classrooms in different locations at NAIT will not occur until after Christmas. The main issue here is time-tables and trying to allocate classroom availability.

Some of you may have noticed that the free phones have been disconnected. It seems that there were about 35-40 lines coming from the NAIT switchboard. When

all the SLI lines were in use, it caused the switchboard to jam. NAIT Executive is looking into the matter.

The proposal for the construction of a whirl pool is being processed. A lot of facts had to be obtained and weighed out the advantages and disadvantages. It will hold 12-15 persons and will cost about \$42,000. This will also help attract more people in to the swimming pools. There is still some details to be worked out, but it looks good. It could be finished by the summer of '86.

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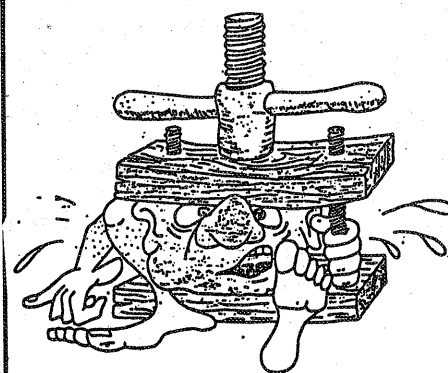
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EDITORIALS

This makes it the worst in aviation history. The JAL, Air India and most recently the Arrow Air Inc. crash, killing some 256 soldiers and crew, have been some of the infamous crashes this year.

What has happened to the so called 'safest transportation' presently available to man. Have companies neglected simple maintenance on such monstrous machines? Have governments not been enforcing the strictest of standards to the fullest? Have security checks been avoided negligently?

Corporations, whose ego's are as big as 747's, may be attempting to lure customers via special prices, special treatment, and endless travel points, but, are they concerning themselves with simple yet important maintenance checks?

How many times have such things as hairline cracks in engines caused hundreds to die. Neglect of such menial tasks is unscrupulous. Is an airline company more willing to pay out millions in lawsuits or would it be more profitable to hire mechanics that can detect such problems.

Airline corporations may also be too sentimental. How, you ask. Well, most airplanes that crash are usually over ten years old. How many vehicles have you known to last that long without any major problems surfacing. Maybe companies should consider replacing airplanes more frequently.

Governments have implemented the strictest codes of rules and regulation to the aviation industry yet, one has to wonder if the enforcement presently adheres to such a code. With the dramatic incline in accidents, are persons actually carrying out proper checks and maintaining high quality control. It seems not to be the case.

Governments are not reprimanding or scrutinizing the airline industry enough. It's time that an evaluation of standards be conducted so to reduce possible tragedies like the Arrow Air accident. An implementation of strict penalties should be incorporated. Maybe governments are too scared to do so, for fear of losing free winter vacations.

The NAIT Ookpiks, ACAC and CCAA Champions are defending the 1986 Viking Cup by being victorious during the last Viking Cup in 1984. The Ooks shut out the Czechoslovakian team 3-0 in the Viking Final.

All the finalists from the 1984 Viking Cup are grouped in the same pool for the 1986 tournament in Camrose, Alberta. This pool contains the NAIT champs, Czechoslovakian Junior Selects, and Alk Stockholm the Swedish junior champions. The Notre Dame College Hounds from Wilcox, Sask., hosting Camrose Lutheran College Vikings and the Finnish junior champions Kariput Oulu are the other pool which makes up this fantastic international six-team tournament.

The 1986 Viking Cup will be held in Camrose, Alberta from January 1-5. The Swedish Alk will take on the Czechoslovakian team on

New Year's Day at 2 p.m. to open the round-robin portion of the tournament. The opening ceremonies will be on the same day at 7:30 p.m. with hosting Camrose to play Kariput the Finnish champs at 8:00 p.m.

The first game for our Ooks is January 3 at 8 p.m. They will be meeting their rivals the Czechoslovakian Junior Selects. Each pool will play round robins with the first place finishers in each pool to play the second-place finishers in their opposite pools on January 4 in the semi-finals. The consolation final and championship game is scheduled January 5 at 2 and 7 p.m., respectively.

I hope to see many loyal fans down in Camrose throughout the tourney cheering the Ooks on. Good Luck team and everyone have a safe, great holiday.

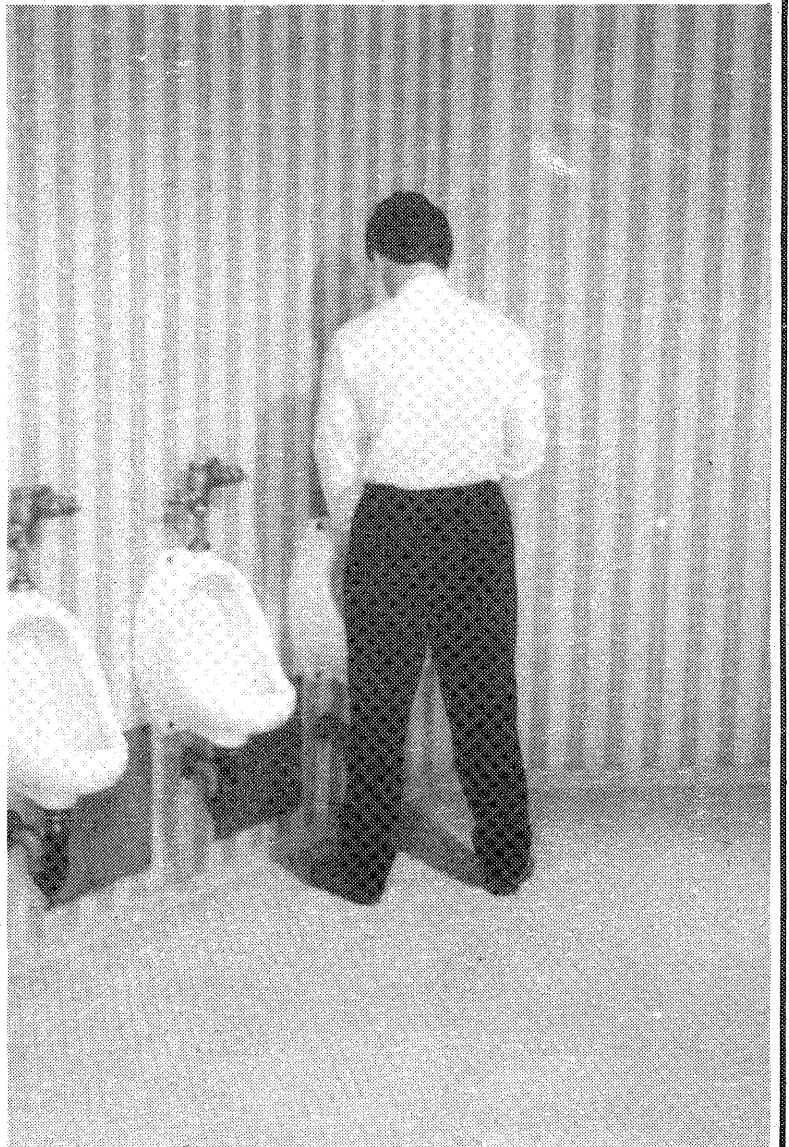
AJ'S A BREATHTAKING? EXPERIENCE

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
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Anyone for a little bubble

Gage--played by John Malkovich, who was last seen as the blind boarder in *Places in the Heart*--has already distinguished himself as an investigative reporter in New York. He now brings that same talent to bear in uncov-

for some of the best directors in Europe: John Schlesinger, Maximilian Schell, Trevor Nunn.

"And then I got to Los Angeles," a vivacious and articulate Nelligan recalls, "and the most striking thing was that it didn't matter. None of it mattered."

"And to swallow that," she adds, "was the hardest thing I've had to do in my life. To look at it and say, that is the truth. And you can either go back to England and continue with that. Or you can deal with this--which meant going to offices where they don't know who you are or what you've done, where they've never heard of the National Theatre. And not get angry and not be offended. To just say, I am *nobody* here."

"And some days I thought I must be out of my mind."

Kate Nelligan has not stopped going out of her mind entirely. After all, just last year she was passed over for the role of Susan Traherne in the film version of *Plenty*. But tenacity--not to mention great talent--have begun to earn the 34-year-old actress success on this side of the Atlantic, not the least of which is her current role in the movie *Eleni*.

The year is 1948, and *Eleni*, a peasant woman, is trying to survive the civil war which has wracked Greece in the aftermath of the Second World War. When Communist guerrillas take over her remote mountain village, she obediently suffers their oppression. After the lives of her children are threatened, however, *Eleni* rebels. On the night of June 20th, 1948, she arranges to have her four young kids smuggled past guards to freedom in the Western world.

In point of fact, *Eleni*'s heroic story is only half the story of the movie *Eleni*. The other half takes place 30 years later when Nicholas Gage, one of her four child-

ering the circumstances of his mother's mysterious death shortly after she arranged his escape.

It is a search which, in real life, consumed six years of Gage's life, taking him to half a dozen countries and ending--as it does in the movie--in an apartment in a Greek suburb, with a tape recorder and a gun.

"I've had a wonderful time doing the stage work I've done," says Nelligan, whose greatest success continues to be in the theatre, most recently in a London-to-Broadway revival of Eugene O'Neill's *A Moon for the Misbegotten*.

"But," she adds, "film work is the most exciting thing right now I can do. You have a lot more control on stage and a lot more immediate response, I know all of that. Maybe it's just a fascination with something very difficult because there's a lot of factors in filmmaking that can destroy what you're trying to do."

"But I think the basic reason I continue to try and work in film is that my own loyalty as an audience member is to film. I mean, if I'm offered a theatre ticket or a film ticket, I will take the film ticket. Always. All my heroes as actors are movie actors. The greatest fun I've had as an audience member has been watching movies."

She knew she was a born actress, she recalls, the first time she stepped on stage. She was 17 and she was playing Hamlet's mother in a University of Toronto student production, "and I was in heaven," says the actress who grew up in London, Ontario.

"Clearly I was a closet pretender and all I needed was the stops to be taken off. It was a totally natural thing for me to come into a room with perfect strangers and pretend to be somebody else. Which is deeply weird."

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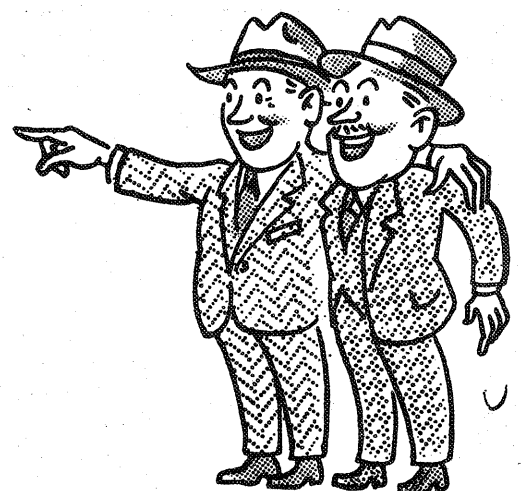

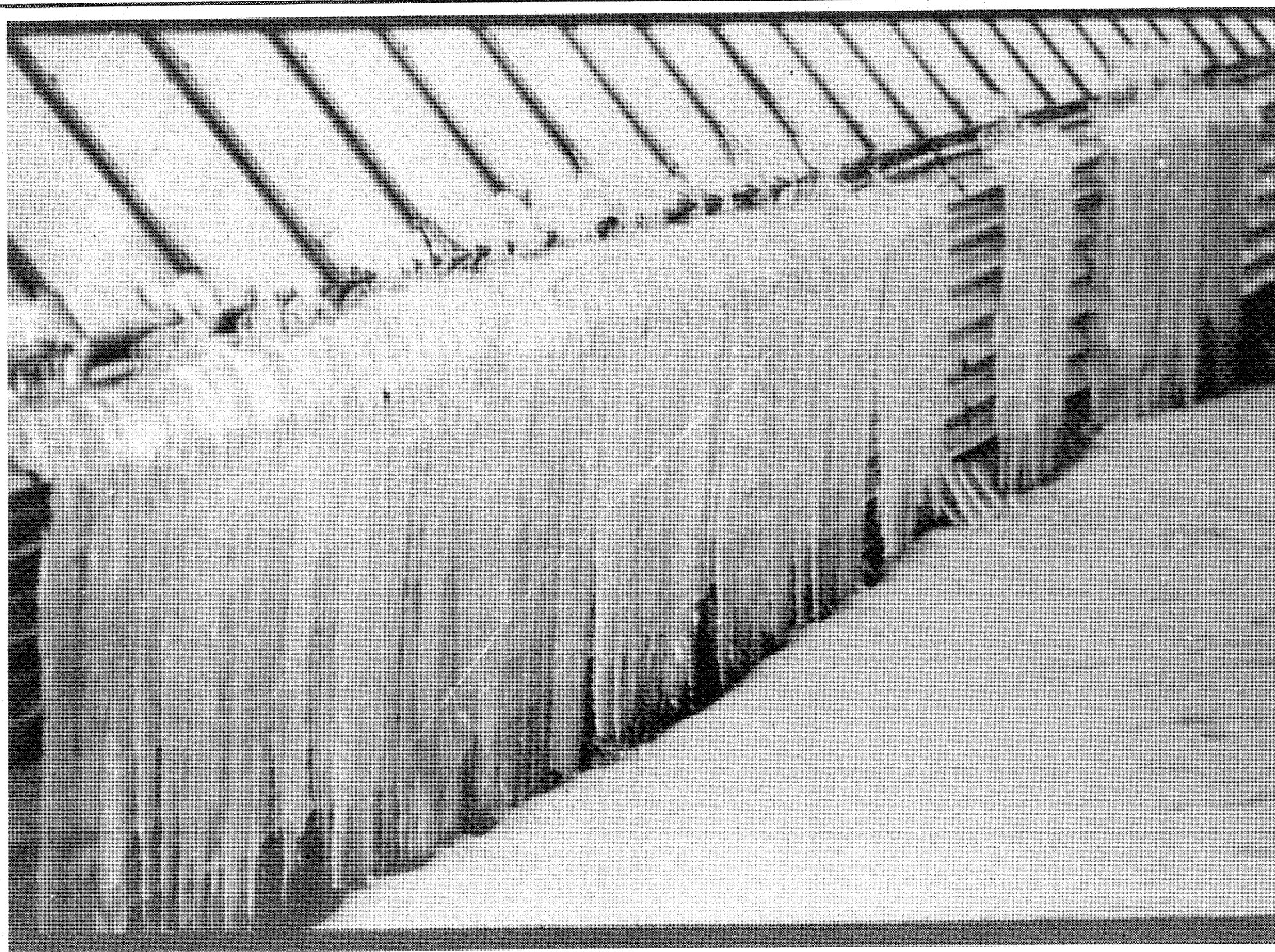

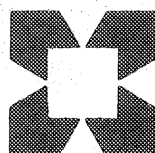
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
