Ten students and one student advisor from Humber College Student Association Council (S.A.C.) arrived Wednesday, November 24, from TheyToronto. They were greeted by NAITSA President Glenn Mason and the NAIT OOK at the International Airport.

The students of Humber and NAIT were here on an exchange sponsored by the Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC), which is directly funded by the Federal Government.

The exchange was intended for councils to learn the different ways that student councils run and how they are operated. Another reason was to breakdown barriers that exist amongst colleges from the east and west.

The students from Toronto went through a vigorous itinerary which was both educational and social. NAITSA President Glenn Mason stated, "the trip was most educational in learning to organize and coordinate programs that will inturn benefit the students of nait. To observe and take part in Humber Student politics was vital to me as both a student and as a President."

In observing the way SAC runs via meetings, executive council meetings there were noted differences in the structure and organization of the two colleges.

For example, one major difference is that SAC executive consists of three members; a President, V.P. Finance and V.P. internal.

This is in comparison to the seven executive members from NAITSA. Instead of having more executive members Humber College employs five full-time staff and utilizes technology members ot organize activities and functions.

EDMONTON -- A new nonsmoking campaign, aimed at positively affecting the lifestyle of youth, was announced today by Social Services and Community Health Minister, Dr. Neil Webber.

The program, entitled "Break Free" is a cooperative venture of the federal and provincial governments and major national health organizations.

The national program is a long-term comprehensive effort which will focus on both smoking prevention and cessation strategies.

"All too often, educators, concerned health organizations and governments try to convince adolescents and young adults about the dangers of smoking by telling them about the negatives. Research shows this approach has limited success compared with providing a message which allows young people to make the decision to be non-smokers on their own," said Barbara Jones, Manager of Health Education and Promotion for Alberta Social Services and Community Health.

Alberta is launching a \$150,000 provincial advertising campaign directed at youth, which is running in conjunction with similar programs across the country. Members of the Alberta Interagency Council on Smoking and Health, which includes the Alberta Public Health Association, the Alberta Heart Association, the Alberta Cancer Society, the Alberta Cancer Board, the Alberta Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission. and the Alberta Medical Association, will be delivering complementary programs in the community. In addition, Alberta will be chairing the national steering committee which will give direction to the pro-

"The advertising campaign has been produced using a 'rock video' style suggesting the idea of 'being oneself' and breaking free from the smoking addiction," Ms. Jones explained.



Developing A Resume

Your resume is a written summary of all the information abut you that will interest an employer. It is an important tool in any job search; a good resume transforms a job applicant into a job candidate.

- Position applied for (state title of position and include any competition numbers).
- Name
- Address
- Telephone numbers (business and residence).
- Education (include name of educational institution, course completed, date and diploma or degree obtained)
- Training courses.
- Date available for work if accepted.

WORK EXPERIENCE OR EMPLOYMENT RECORD

An essential ingredient of any resume. Dates should be given along with company names and addresses and a description of your work. Job descriptions should be brief but include the specific tasks performed, the skills required, the scope of your responsibility and any promotions or recognitions.

If you are just entering the work force, you may feel that you have very little experience and you, therefore, cannot produce an effective resume. NOT SO. You can state job goals, part-time work, summer work and volunteer work. Anything that is favorable should be included.

REFERENCES:

References do not necessarily have to appear on the resume, however, they should be available upon request, so have them ready. Choose your references carefully and try to get a "variety". Previous employers are usually willing to act as references. Avoid using the names of relatives. Consult the people you choose before you use their names.

A POINTER TO REMEMBER WHEN YOU ARE PUTTING THE CONTENT TOGETHER:

Your resume should be tailored to the job. "Blanket" resumes may not be effective if they do not emphasize the appropriate facets of your qualifications in relation to the job you have applied for.

The Interview

The interview may determine the future course your career is to take. For this reason, many people are nervous about having to go through an interview. One of the best methods of overcoming this nervousness is to be well prepared. Review the job ad carefully and if possible, research the position before the interview. Try to anticipate beforehand some of the questions that may be asked to explain why you have applied for the position. It may be helpful to go through a "mock interview" with a friend who will give you fair and honest feedback on how you have handled the interview. Try to be well-rested before your interview and allow enough time to get to your interview so you will not arrive late or feel rushed. Employment interviews for positions with the Alberta Government are usually conducted by a panel of two or three interviewers, consisting of a Personnel

Administrator and the

supervisor(s) of the posi-

tion. During the interview,

tions and answer them fully, but try to be specific in your answers. If you do not understand the questions, ask for clarification. If you are not sure if more detail is required in your answer, ask the interviewer if your answer was sufficient or if you should go into more detail. If you do not have an answer, admit it--do not attempt to bluff your way through. Speak clearly. Make eye contact with the interviewer.

What good does the library do us when it is only open from 1:00 to 5:00 on Saturday and Sunday. By the time you get there, settle down, it's already time to leave. Not only that the Media Workshop is closed on Sunday. With these types of hours and scheduling one has to wonder the point of staying open.

We've all been complaining about lack of quiet study space and finally something is being done. President Glenn Mason has approached general council for their help in locating classrooms for quiet study. But only two of the fifty seven tech reps have responded. The only foreseable way to resolve the problems associated with the LRC would be to a) Recieve funding from the NAIT Administration, and b) Lobby the student council to take some initiative. But with the bureaucratic redtape from administration and lack of interest from students, you can bet on that the LRC will not change its' hours for quite some time.

Gidelines Smoking O. Institute Premises

In keeping with Institute Health and Safety policy statements the following guidelines pertain to smoking at Nait.

- Smoking shall not be permitted in classrooms, laboratories, shops, or athletics areas.
- 2. Cafeterias and dining rooms shall have 50 percent of their seating capacity designated as a non-smoking area.
- Personnel in public service areas shall refrain from smoking when dealing

directly with the public.

- 4. High-risk areas (eg. fire, chemical, etc.) shall be designated as non-smoking. Physical Facilities and Services will assess and appropriately identify such areas.
- 5. Staff and students are expected to develop their own guidelines with respect to smoking in their specific offices and/or office areas.
- Smoking at meetings shall be at the discretion of the chairperson and members in attendance.

The Ooks played a lackluster first half, leading 25 - 17 going into the locker room. Neither team seemed to be able to establish a scoring attack. In the second half, the Ooks came out smoking. Saturday, November 24 NAIT 76 Mount Royal 77

The Ooks first regular season loss occurred in a roller coaster ball game against the Mount Royal College Cougars.

The Cougars jumped out to an early 22-9 lead only to see the Ooks come back and go ahead 29-24. Travis Heighington and Mike Klein lead nait scores with 8 points each at half time, as Mount Royal took a 39-37 pt. lead into the locker room. The Cougars roared out of the tree to start the second half and took a commanding 57-39 lead after 6 minutes were played. The Ooks, however, did not give up and came back to within one point 77-76 at the final buzzer. 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CBC RADIO Broadcast Airs Concerns About Media

On the subways, in their cars, in the office and at home, people gobble up the latest news and information, seven days a week and sometimes every hour on the hour. But while the public appetite for "portable" journalism seems

insatiable, it's safe to say that few readers, listeners and viewers really know what people in the media actually do, or how, or even

Along comes The Media File, CBC Radio's new weekly half-hour program designed to act as a public conduit for concerns and questions that relate to the national and international media, newspapers, magazines, television and radio. Its premise is to examine what "they" in the media do, and in a way, hold the media to account, not

excluding the CBC itself. The Media File, where the message is the media, is broadcast Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m., on the CBC Radio network. Senior editor is Stu Allen.

Vince Carlin, chief correspondent for National Radio News, is the program host and plays a large role in contributing story ideas as well. Carlin has been co-host of the World Reports since April, and has

hosted many news specials. Prior to joining CBC Radio, Carlin was Managing Editor of CBC National Television News. As a print journalist, he was with the Washington Bureau of Time/Life, then moved to Montreal to become bureau chief for the Time/Life News Service.

He hosted the CBC Montreal morning show. then worked in television news as assignment editor in Montreal, Toronto and in Ottawa for the Parliamentary Bureau.

Stu Allen is actively soliciting "letters to the editor" from the public about their media complaints, and compliments, too, some of which will be selected for broadcast. part of his plan for public involvement is to hold an open forum and then broadcast it.

Allen's own file of program ideas is a fat one. Some of the topics he intends to cover are: television iournalism; why certain cabinet ministers and other newsmakers are single for heavy media attention; how to listen to and read the news: media censorship; ''chequebook'' journalism--buying exclu-

sive rights to stories or photos; Third World coverage; how politicians manipulate the media--and

vice versa; how The World At Six is put together; television commercials and print advertising.

The Media File is not solely intended to be negative and self-critical; rather its aim is to explain how the media works, examine the latest trends in print and electronic journalism, profile the personalities involved. There will be a regular

review of the media by different contributors. Humor will be an ingredient too--offbeat stories, quirky headlines, bloopers, and

examples of gobbledygook, speeches by politicians and others which, under examination, don't make much sense.

Allen, an experienced broadcast journalist, was the senior editor of Sunday magazine, and before that, The World At Six and The World At Eight. He is responsible for all the crisis specials on CBC Radio News, from invasions to plane crashes to earthquakes. The Media File, he says, is "for anyone interested in the media."



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

About post-finals activities --Ron Horne of Hydrocarbon figured that he'd get a job (is that full-time, Rob?). Architecture student Shauna Noves shouted


"Architecture Bash!" while Jeff from 2nd year Finance didn't hesitate to tell us that he planned to spend a few romantic evenings with his sweetie.


