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



The Importance of Your Opinion

"Public opinion is highly influential in our society. Favorable public opinion can help elect a political candidate, sell a consumer product, or raise the price of a corporate stock. Unfavorable public opinion, on the other hand, can be the kiss of death for an individual, a product, or an institution."

The preceding quote was taken out of a textbook entitled "The Practice of Public Relations." I think that it captures quite well the spirit of this week's editorial comment.

Public Opinion has proven itself to be the most powerful weapon in society. Two cases in recent memory show that to be true. In New York a poll showed that an incredible 94.8 per cent of the population agreed to acquit Bernard Goetz of murder charges for his vigilantism on New York's subways. At the same time, Provincial governments in our own country are having a difficult time convicting Dr. Henry Morgentaler for a criminal offence because so far there hasn't been a jury that will find him guilty.

On a much smaller scale, NAIT is also affected by its public's opinion. This year at the Nugget, Sean O'Neill, the Editor, and I have tried very hard to educate the NAIT student body as to the usage of their student association fees (the \$75.00 paid by each attending full-time student) and to the particular concerns voiced by various NAIT Technologies vis a vis NAITSA and its policies.

In the process there have been some feathers that have been ruffled simply because we've said some things that some people didn't like to hear. Although that's unfortunate, the Nugget's editorial position is that of informer and we feel that you, the NAIT Student, has a right to know exactly where your money is going.

Because "The Nugget" has a certain role to be played, people look at us and accept us as "The Newspaper." Therefore, although the editorial comment is well read it in itself does not posess the power to influence the decision makers. That is where you come in.

The Nugget's primary function is a forum for the public (NAIT's students) to voice their views. Kevin B. (who wrote a letter to the editor this week) and many others before him must be applauded for taking time to express their views to the student via the Nugget.

You students are the ultimate decision makers. If you agree with something or if you disagree with something, you as an individual have the power to do something about it. The NAITSA executive is elected by you the students not us the NAIT Nugget therefore, they owe you an explanation if you have a beef or concern -- an explanation that they don't owe the Nugget editorial staff.

As a public your opinions are powerful but they are also hidden. Bring these feelings out into the open. If you agree or disagree with a comment, it's not enough to think to yourself that you agree or disagree with a column. If you want changes let the people concerned know. It's time you people realized that you hold the balance of power in your hands. Use it for your good, that's why we're here.

SUMMER JOB CREATION AND PROBLEMS

Once again students are beginning to look for summer jobs. Now doubt this year it will be just as difficult to find one as in the previous few years.

Flora MacDonald, Minister of Employment and Immigration, and Andree Champagne, Minister of State for Youth, have announced the introduction of Challenge '85. This project is placing \$205 million toward the creation of up to 95,000 jobs.

Under Challenge '85 there are six initiatives. For the program to work there must be greater co-operation between the federal, provincial and municiple governments.

The six components are:

1. Summer Employment / Experience Development (\$163 million) (SEED)

The formation of this project is to provide wage subsidies to stimulate career development opportunities for students.

2. Student entrepreneurs (up to \$30 million in loans; up to 7.5 million actual costs)

This project is for students to develop their own summer business to support provincial initiatives. There will be financial help given in the form of loan guarantees or start-up loans.

3. Federal Departments and Agencies - Career Related job for students (\$24.2 million)

This pilot project has Federal government departments and agencies placing students in career related summer jobs. Two subsidiaries are also provided for:

- (i) Cadet and Reserve Training Programs
- (ii) Supernumerary Special Constable Program
- these programs are a continuation from last year.
- 4. Work Orientation Workshop (WOW) (\$0.5 million)

This project is aimed at potential school-leavers and disadvantaged in-school youth with information about the future job market. The workshops will provide information on workplace practices and relations, financial management, job searching techniques and other variable involved in the workplace.

5. Canada Employment Centres for Students (\$13.6 million) and Native Internship Program (\$2.4 million)

The Hire-A-Student campaign will be available again, with some 450 offices. This is a placement centre and a referral service for all students.

The Native Internship Program is designed to help increase opportunities for Native Students.

6. Business Drive for Jobs (\$1.3 million)

This project is to initiate the business industry to hire students through subsidies.

The SEED, WOW and Student/EEET programs will total \$143 million, of that \$12 million will be allocated in Alberta.

The Government's program is counting on heavy co-operation from private industry, especially those involved in high technology. But with the recession and many employees being laid off companies are sceptical in allocating their money into job creation for students.

There is an expectation on the government's part that 2/3 of all summer jobs will be created by the private industry. Although some of these programs look good on paper, it is not very realistic to expect the private industry to make jobs.

With enrollment higher than ever the outlook, in actuality for summer jobs is not very good.





BY BYRON A. MARTIN MOVIE UPDATE

Based on Pulitzer Prize winning correspondent Sydney Schanberg's 1980 article for The New York Times Magazine, "The Death and Life of Dith Pran," "The Killing Fields" stars Sam Waterston as Sydney Schanberg and Haing S. Ngor as Dith Pran.

Schanberg, now a columnist and formerly metropolitan editor of The New York Times -- went to Cambodia in 1972 as The Times correspondent to cover the growing war between the country's revolutionary Khmer Rouge and the Lon Nol government. His assistant was Cambodian born Dith Pran, and the two soon became inseparable as their friendship and professional relationship blossomed under the rigors of covering an increasingly brutal war. To Schanberg, Pran was indispensable and as an interpreter, troubleshooter, reporter and friend there was no equal. But when the victorious Khmer Rouge troops entered the capital city of Phnom Penh on April 17, 1975, their lives would change forever.

Pran saved not only Schanberg's life that day but several other foreign correspondents as well, claiming that they were all neutral French journalists. When the Khmer Rouge ordered all Cambodians out of the cities, and into the countryside Schanberg and the others could do nothing for their friend. Dith Pran disappeared into the countryside and all foreign correspondents were ordered out of the country.

Schanberg, who disregarded his editor's pleas to leave Phnom Penh and remained in the city to cover the Khmer Rouge takeover, won a Pulitzer Prize for "international reporting at great risk", as well as numerous other awards.

But Schanberg's guilt and anguish over his friend's fate would not leave him. What had happened to Pran after he left? Could he possibly survive the death camp that had become Cambodia?

"The Killing Fields" is intense and dramatic. It is as if one man took a camera on his shoulder and filmed the war as it happened. The entire movie has a self-composed look to it. The look however, is not of Hollywood. That's why "The Killing Fields" is different. It brings to the screen an intensely personal story of friendship and survival amidst the torment of war. Basically, it is a love story of two men that have come to rely on each other in life and death situations. And what is unique is that the movie comes across that way. It doesn't seem to have been staged or deliberate.

OOKS GOING FOR THE RECORD!

The NAIT Ooks moved one step closer to accomplishing something no other ACAC hockey team has done before this past weekend. No hockey team in ACAC history has gone undefeated in regular season play, and NAIT is just one weekend away from possibly changing the record books. On Sunday, February 17th, the NAIT Ooks overpowered the Mount Royal College Cougars 8-3 at the NAIT Arena.

The NAIT Ooks won their 49th consecutive match against ACAC rivals on Sunday, February 17th at the NAIT Arena with an 8-3 win over the Mount Royal College Cougars.

Gary Haddon of the Ooks opened the scoring with his 11th goal of the season from Sid Cranston and Hugh McCaskill at 1:30 of the first. The Mount Royal powerplay tied the game at the 6:15 mark as Dan Anderson found the net. The Cougars acquired a 2-1 advantage at 11:30 of the first with Brad Davis's marker. Randy Repchuk returned to the NAIT line-up as he evened the terms at 2-2 on a play with Garth Hayes and Don Simpson.

At 9:02 in the second frame, Murray Melnyk's 12th tally of the season placed NAIT in front 3-2. Cleo Rowein and Kevin Imrie assisted on the play. Mike Spencer's slapshot with 11:28 gone in the stanza increased NAIT's lead to 4-2. Ross Kenny tallied his 10th of the season one minute and 54 seconds later gave NAIT a three goal cushion from Scott Melnyk and Gary Haddon. Ted Materi pulled the Cougars to within two at the 15:52 mark. Ross Kenny then reinstated NAITs three goal lead a short 37 seconds later on a Don Simpson set-up.

Kevin Imrie netted his 7th goal of the campaign from Mark Schultz with 3:49 passed in the third period. Scott Melnyk and Garry Haddon then helped out on Ross Kenny's third goal of the game at the 9:40 mark. Kenny now has 12 goals on the season.

ON THE BENCH: The NAIT Ooks are ranked no. 1 in the country for the fifth week in a row sporting a 23 and 0 record in the ACAC. Red Deer, Camrose and SAIT have also qualified for the playoffs, but the post-season match-ups have not yet been decided in the closest playoff race ever. Only two points separate the three teams. Depending on this week's action, any of the three teams could finish fourth, third, or second. . . . NAIT defenceman Tom Tookey is listed as doubtful for this week's play. . . . The Ooks close out the regular season with two home games at the NAIT Arena. The Ooks entertain the Red Deer College Kings (13-7-2) on Saturday in a 7:30 pm match-up. The Ooks conclude the regular season on Sunday when they face SAIT (12-9-2) at 2:00 pm. History is in the making. One of the best teams in ACAC history will attempt to complete an undefeated season. 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
