CATERING TO THE STUDENT

No, it's not a high-schoolish "National Skip Day," it is the 10th Annual NAIT Business Conference. This event is a major activity in a Business Student's two year sojourn. It is also another example of how NAIT has the benefits of its students as a foremost priority.

The conference, which is taking place at the Edmonton Inn, will be a learning experience for the Marketing, Accounting, Finance and Administrative Management students who attend. The major portion of this learning will be that which is absorbed from the various lectures presented by different speakers. Such topics to be discussed include: "Immediate Career Opportunities for the Graduate," "The Computer and the Business Manager," and "Importance of Attitude in Business Today." Each student will attend three 2 hour lectures, making it almost equivalent to a full school day. On the practical side of things, attending the conference will teach students how to attend conferences. This is just another portion of the active job seeking service that NAIT offers its students. In Business, a lot of emphasis is placed on the technique of getting a job. The program now goes as far as to allow a student to put his knowledge into practice by actually putting student and employer in the same room. "What good is an education if you can't get a job?" NAIT recognizes this common question, and takes steps to resolve it. Clearly, this is a benefit not many other schools can claim to offer.

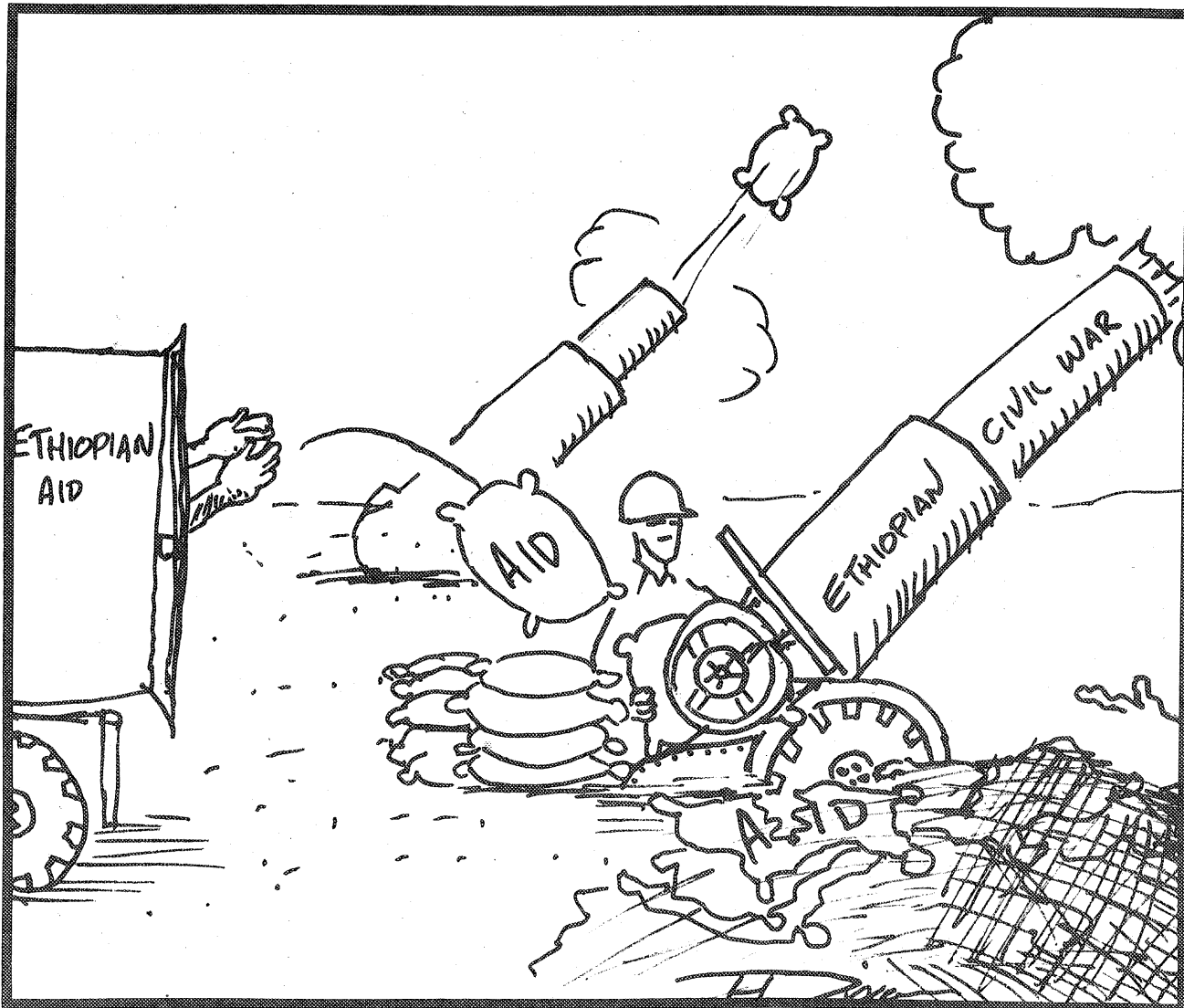

POSTER POLICY PROBLEMS

NAITSA's poster policy has been a cause of friction between the NAITSA executive and several NAIT tech executives so far this year. Perhaps some questions need to be raised as to the policies of NAITSA how these policies are enforced and how these policies serve the NAIT students at large.

B.A.S.'s Sherry Shaw has posted Sports-Can posters on the walls in the tower building. The purpose of these posters is to advertise Sports-Can and BAS combining to give Business Students the opportunity to purchase class jackets. Since these are not of a NAIT function, these posters were not stamped therefore they did not qualify to be posted on Campus. BAS felt that these jackets offered an important alternative to the business students so, in violation of the poster regulations the posters were put up.

Predictably the posters were torn down by NAITSA's poster marauders and more needless friction was caused between a technology and NAIT's student association executive.

According to the regulations as they exist, there is no question that NAITSA had every right to pull the posters but BAS feels that they're also in the right. Sherry Shaw, BAS's activities director reasons that BAS is simply representing their members. "The jackets in the NAITSA store aren't as nice as those offered by Con-Sport and we're simply offering the Business Students of NAIT a viable alternative." she said.

Obviously there is something wrong with the regulations when two organizations clash when they're only trying to effectively represent their students. That brings up the next obvious question. . . Who does NAITSA represent?

Do they represent the students in the student's best interests or are they simply pawns for regulations and decisions that were made long before. As well, if NAITSA has a regulation, why can't they enforce it. A procedure has to be outlined for violations of regulations. The last time I saw NAITSA President Greg Scherf enforcing a regulation was when he ripped down a poster and then verbally reprimanded a tech rep in a crowded hallway, much to the embarrassment of the rep in question. Come on, Mr. Scherf, you are the leader of an organization that should have procedures to reprimand those who don't follow regulations. That doesn't mean that you're the local policeman with the divine right to yell at offenders.

NAITSA has got to examine their poster policy to discover whether or not they're representing the true student needs. If it is determined that the needs are being met then an effective and business-like method for enforcing the rules must be established. And, if worse comes to worse why not take that long daring step and change the regulations so they suit the student's needs better.

NICK'S PICKS

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor urged the Loughheed government to pay serious attention to water-use problems in the Lloydminster area.

Noting that about one million barrels of surface water per day was consumed by current secondary recovery methods used by the oil industry, in the area between Edmonton and Lloydminster, Taylor said a serious conflict between industrial users and agricultural and residential water users is at hand.

Taylor challenged the Loughheed government to declare a moratorium on new removals of surface water for industrial use. He urged, instead, the use of deep reservoirs of saline ground water (unuseable by agriculture or consumers) for industry.

Under present rules, Taylor noted, new heavy oil projects could result in more than 30 wellsites per one-quarter section of land. To preserve farm lands in the Lloydminster-Vermilion region, Taylor said the province should stipulate directional drilling of multiple wells from a single location for heavy oil withdrawals.

Taylor was speaking before a meeting of Lloydminster-area Liberals.

THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS OUT

After reading the editorial in the January 31 issue of the Nugget, I feel that I should some of the NAITSA Executives actions and clarify its motives.

The editor said that he viewed the paper as being editorially free. So do I, within one constraint. That one constraint is that those articles are responsible. As a matter of fact, that one constraint is the only constraint which I feel is imposed upon the newspaper as a whole.

At this point, I would like to recall some history. In the spoof issue of last year's Nugget there was an article regarding this past year's NAIT Queen. This article was slanderous and NAITSA could have been sued. This was the result of an irresponsible journalist and an irresponsible head editor. Fortunately, the NAIT Queen was convinced not to sue, and to the best of my knowledge, there was no deal struck.

Now, in the January 24, 1985 issue of the Nugget there was an article which might have raised the question of last year's article and which provided, in my mind, the potential for the resumption of a lawsuit against NAITSA.

After two NAITSA Executive members and I discussed this article with the editor and assistant editor, it was initially decided to leave the article in. However, another Executive member was found and the article was further discussed among the available Executive members. While we were able to contact the assistant editor and inform him of the fact that we were re-discussing the article, the editor had just left for his home in St. Albert. After more discussion, it was

decided to pull the article. Since the paste-up was already at the printers, we could not censor the article in a piece meal fashion; we had to pull the entire article. It was an unfortunate oversight that we, as an Executive, did not inform the editor of the reversal of our earlier decision and we apologize for that failure.

As a result, the editor and all but one of his staff chose to resign without contacting any of the Executive to at least find out why the article was pulled. There was no attempt to try to clarify a simple break in the communication link.

Returning to the issue of responsibility in journalism, I feel that this brief history can highlight my point. In light of the previous article in last year's issue, the article which was pulled was not a responsible article. Also, the article was misleading due to the fact that it contained incomplete and unqualified facts. This problem might have been eliminated if the writer had searched out some information rather than, as I suspect, writing off the top of his head.

On the Executives part, we would have been remiss in our responsibilities to allow NAITSA to be open to a lawsuit. However, we should take the time to inform you of our decisions.

To conclude, I feel that there is nothing wrong with disseminating information and ruffling a few feathers, so long as the information and its dissemination is responsible.

BUTT OUT!

It drifts through the halls, classrooms, cafeteria, and just about everywhere else in NAIT. Many are ill by it and even disgusted. It hangs over our heads like a cloud. It's everywhere. It's cigarette smoke and about the only place where it isn't found is in the Nugget office.

We have repeatedly proved the effects and dangers of smoking, but most smokers tend to ignore the warnings. Quitting smoking is no easy task, but here are some facts that may make you consider it:

-33 percent of all cancers, and up to 30 percent of coronary heart disease is attributed to smoking.

- cancer of the lung, attributed by smoke, is the second leading cause of death in women

-“second-hand” smoke is just as harmful as smoking a cigarette

-it will cost approximately \$10,000 to sustain the habit for the rest of your life.

In a recent article titled “Smoking in the Workplace,” Dr. R. Orford has found that smoke in the workplace raises the contamination levels of other chemical substances found in

cigarette smoking, for example, carbon monoxide. He also found that “the contamination of cigarettes may occur, leading to inhalation or ingestion of workplace substances, like lead.

All of these concerns are legitimate. But the reason for this article is not to lecture but, only to bring to the attention of students and staff of the overwhelming problem of cigarette smoking in NAIT. Recently many complaints have been received by the Health Services department regarding the ‘open’ smoking policy of NAIT.

Fran Leroux, R.N. with NAIT Health Services recently submitted a letter to NAIT President, Dr. Stan Souch, asking for some type of solution, to satisfy both the smoker and non-smoker. She states that solutions can be obtained through management policies, hygiene measures, health education and legislation.

Mrs. Leroux would like to see a non-smoking policy and believes that a management policy should be obtained in doing so.

In responding to her letter, Dr. Souch has asked the Health and Safety committee to look at the problem. Recommendations are expected sometime in March.

“TOO CLOSE FOR COMFORT”

The NAIT Ooks undefeated string almost came to an abrupt end this weekend in ACAC hockey action. NAIT squeaked out a narrow 2-1 victory over the SAIT Trojans on Saturday, February 2nd at the NAIT Arena. The following afternoon, the Ooks were not sharp in chalking up a 10-2 victory over the Medicine Hat College Rattlers.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 2ND -- NAIT OOKS 2, SAIT TROJANS 1 AT NAIT ARENA

The NAIT Ooks clinched first place in ACAC hockey by edging the SAIT Trojans 2-1 at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, February 2nd.

The first period set the tempo of the game which was to be a defensive struggle. After twenty minutes of play, the teams were locked in a scoreless contest.

At 6:41 of the second, SAIT acquired a 1-0 lead on Darcy Kerner's powerplay goal. The major event of the second period occurred at the 13:09 mark when NAIT goaltender Jeff Lastiwka was knocked unconscious by a blistering slapshot. Lastiwka spent the night in hospital under observation and was replaced by Kevin Stapleton.

As the game progressed, NAIT seemed to be getting the chances, but could not place the biscuit between the pipes. Then with 10:27 of the third, NAIT's Tom Tookey notched a shorthanded goal to tie the game at 1-1 on a play with Gary Haddon and Mark Schultz. With only 24 seconds left in regulation, Tom Tookey netted his second of the evening and fourth of the campaign to give NAIT a 2-1 victory.

The NAIT netminding tandem of Jeff Lastiwka and Kevin Stapleton faced 21 SAIT shots. Rick Cuch was brilliant in the SAIT nets as he turned away NAIT drives on 41 occasions.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 3RD -- NAIT OOKS 10, MEDICINE HAT RATTTLERS 2 AT THE NAIT ARENA

The NAIT Ooks scored four first period goals and skated to a 10-2 triumph over the Medicine Hat College Rattlers at the NAIT Arena on Sunday, February 3rd.

Sid Cranston of NAIT opened the scoring at 2:52 of the first on a Gary Leach set-up. Jamie Bartman doubled NAIT's lead to 2-0 with his third goal of the season at the 6:28 mark from Ron Amyotte and Garth Hayes. A quick 47 seconds later, Scott Melnyk's sixth of the year gave NAIT a 3-0 advantage. NAIT was killing a penalty when Gary Leach notched his 15th of the season to increase NAIT's lead to four.

Rob Brobar of MHC broke NAIT's shutout bid with 7:47 elapsed in the second frame. Kevin Imrie reinstated NAIT's four goal lead at 9:17 after receiving a pass from Gary Haddon. The NAIT penalty killing unit accounted for NAIT's sixth goal as Sid Cranston connected at 12:35 on a play with Brenn Leach and Ken Goodwin. Cranston then completed his hat trick for NAIT at 15:19 with help from Gary Haddon.

The Medicine Hat powerplay clicked with 34 seconds passed in the third as Daryl Robertson made the score 7-2. Thirty-eight seconds followed before Mark Schultz scored his 11th of the season. The top goal scorer on the NAIT Ooks Ron Amyotte was not to be denied his 19th goal of the season. Smyotte's tally was assisted by Brenn Leach and Garth Hayes at the 1:58 mark. Sid Cranston capped off the day's scoring with his fourth of the game and 17th of the year from Gary Leach at 13:06.

Kelly Schacher cannot be faulted for the loss in the Rattlers goal as he turned away 68 NAIT shots. Cleo Rowen of the Ooks responded with 21 saves for NAIT.

As the playoffs draw near, the NAIT Ooks must be concerned with all facets of their game particularly the power play and intensity.

The Ooks powerplay is not as efficient as it should be. In a close post-season contest, a potent powerplay can mean the difference between a win and a loss. When the playoffs draw near, the powerplay should not be a question mark.

In addition, NAIT must realize that intensity is a crucial ingredient in post-season success. Better mental preparation and a dedication to team goals is essential for success. Each and every member of the club must be prepared to give it his all each and every shift.

ON THE BENCH: On the injury list, Randy Repchuk, Dave Simmons, Don Simpson, and Jeff Lastiwka are all listed as questionable. . . Sid Cranston is currently atop the ACAC scoring race with 17 goals and 23 assists. . . This weekend, NAIT has a three game series in Medicine Hat. Contests are scheduled on Thursday (9:00pm), Friday (8:30 pm) and Saturday (12:00 noon).
