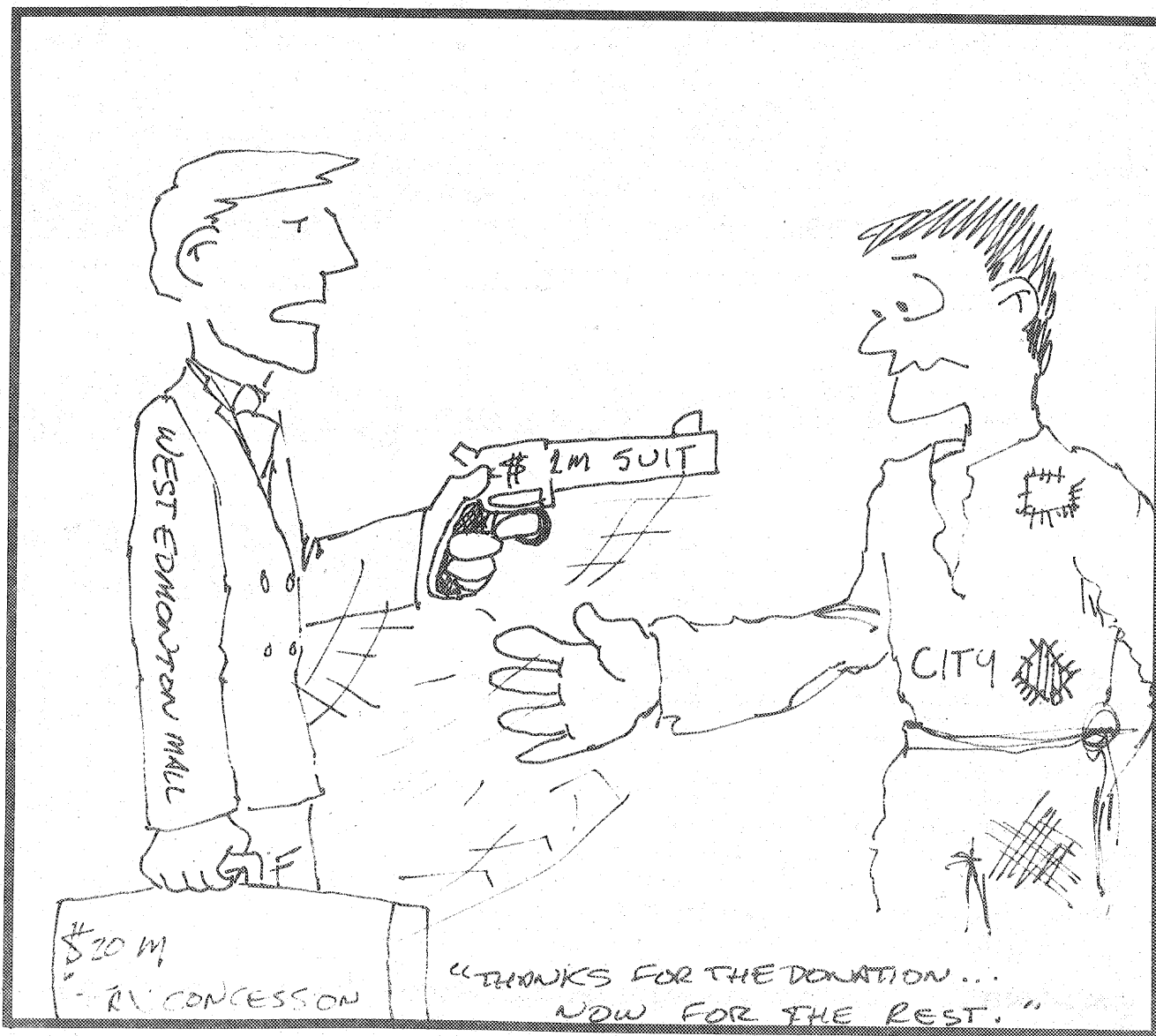

LOUGHEED CAVING INTO OTTAWA?

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor stated today he was "extremely apprehensive about the lack of publicity and public debate over federal-provincial matters affecting Alberta."

Mr. Taylor said he "suspected the Premier was quietly caving in to Central Canada on some major issues, while preparing to blame Ottawa for its failure to see the Alberta perspective on others.

"There were over half a dozen areas," Mr. Taylor continued, "where important problems were placed on the agenda for change in the last two years by Alberta and Federal Conservative politicians. Yet on none has public discussion been raised since September 5th."

In Agriculture, the continuing problems of farms and ranch credit are ignored by Ottawa while Alberta avoids comment. Plummeting farm incomes and foreclosures are the rule of the day in Alberta amid a deafening silence from both Ottawa and Edmonton.

Transportation matters ranging from passenger rail service to freight rates to de-regulating air service are being "studied" by Ottawa while the Lougheed government passively allows the lack of services and looming rate increases to continue.

Potential conflict over the issue of universality of health care services is not even mentioned while Albertans see hospitals downgraded and moth-balled and surgery waiting lists mount.

On constitutional matters, our Premier pledges cooperation with Ottawa and allegiance to anti-separatists in Quebec but refuses to discuss the constitutional rights Quebecers need in order to bury separatism.

Federal environment and wildlife watchdog facilities in Alberta have been almost destroyed. The main check on pollution and wildlife conservation has been lost without a whimper from Lougheed.

Overhauling our tax system has involved no Alberta input save the Treasurer's hope for provincial tax collection and higher personal income taxation. Little or no serious consideration of the total tax burden of Albertans has been raised while Ottawa considers "Minimum" taxation.

The entire energy question - taxation, pricing, incentives, remains subject to secrecy and bureaucratic diplomacy. While the Federal Energy Minister indicates she really had no agenda for change, our Provincial Energy Minister parrots the government line about onerous federal taxes and weak American gas markets. No Alberta initiatives to reduce heavy provincial royalties on conventional oil or to sustain gas production and marketing has been suggested. A few chosen heavy oil developers are granted tax relief while the rest of the industry suffers.

Even the question of foreign ownership has not been debated, only celebrated by our Premier and Prime Minister. No information about the alleged loss of foreign investment in past years (despite excellent studies by the Conference Board on this) or about possible future foreign investment amounts has been provided for the public. As for either the scope for greater foreign investment in oil and gas or the impact of expanding foreign control, Alberta has nothing to say.

Mr. Taylor deplored "the secrecy and repression with which issues were being discussed." He argued that "much more public input into discussions was essential if Alberta's interests were to be upheld.

"We were promised open government and an era of open consultation during last summer's election. Yet our Alberta government has been completely willing to go along with the closed-door approach of the federal government. Just what is this government doing to stand up for Alberta?" Taylor asked.

"ACTION TO CURB PORNOGRAPHY NEEDED"

Nick Taylor, Alberta Liberal Leader, called on the Lougheed government to deal with the "degrading and exploitative forms of pornographic material now virtually freely circulating in Alberta."

"Under the Amusements Act, the Lougheed government could provide more stringent and published classification of films, block the loop-hole which drive-in theatres now use to elude the classification board, and empower the board to scrutinize videos available in both retail stores and on satellite television. Even printing the guidelines the board uses would be useful," explained Taylor.

Taylor condemned "the delaying tactic adopted by the Calgary caucus of Tory MLA's and by the Government in refusing an early response to the current problem."

"Not only does the Lougheed government have the jurisdictional clout to control pornography, it also has a moral responsibility to segregate and limit, if not stop, the unacceptable expressions of anti-female and anti-child sentiments," the Liberal Leader stated.

"The provincial government could also re-examine the Municipal Act to see that the distribution of printed pornography is, at the least, controlled to prevent sales to minors" added Taylor. "Finally, Lougheed could ask the Mulroney government to clarify those Criminal Code provisions on obscenity which authorities currently find so unclear."

Taylor explained that he regarded pornography as distinguishable from erotic material or serious artistic works. Pornography is violent, coercive and exploitative

material that usually treats women and children as mere objects. Indeed, it exults in the pain, suffering and humiliation it can show.

"I am quite willing to see that there is some basis for arguing that individuals have the right to the private indulgence of their tastes, but I fail to see where sadistic portrayals of sex and the illegal treatment of children can be equated with artistic expression or fair individual behaviour"

"There are those who would have us believe that to do nothing will lead to natural limits but we have only been coarsening our society and strengthening all those tendencies to exploit women and children" claims Taylor.

Taylor notes, "it is time for government to act in order to ensure that the rights of ALL individuals are considered in this area. The rights of women NOT to be constantly belittled by lewd treatment must be adopted. The rights of children NOT to be viewed as candidates for gratification must also be realized."

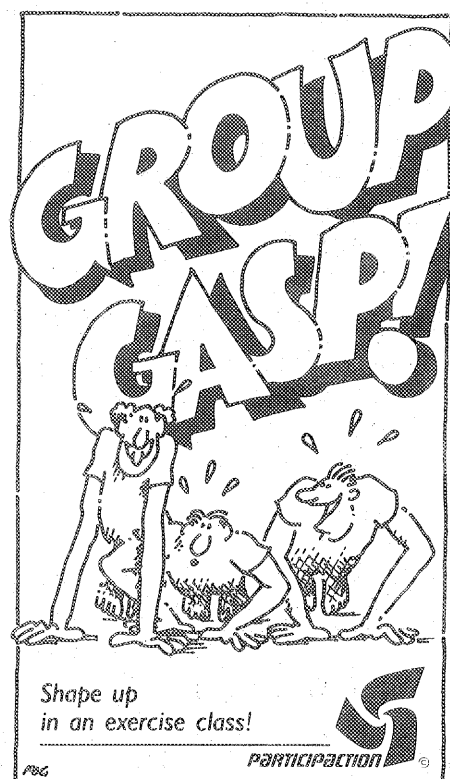
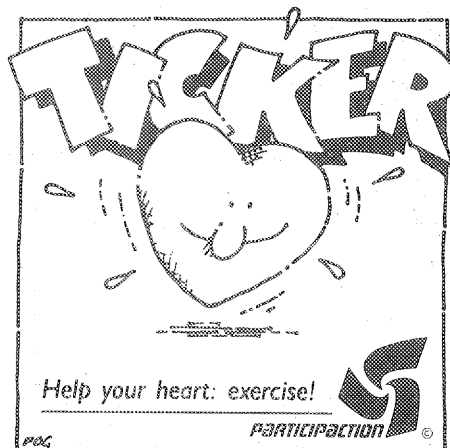
"At present we have caved in to what amounts to a combination between a huge economic interest-group, the pornographers, and a psychological asylum of sexual exploiters. Their use of 'rights' as an excuse totally distorts the rights of all individuals to a basic quantity of individual dignity and security."

"Our governing authorities, starting with the Premier of this Province, should act to ensure that the rights of all are not made a mockery by the current amount of pornography" concluded Taylor.

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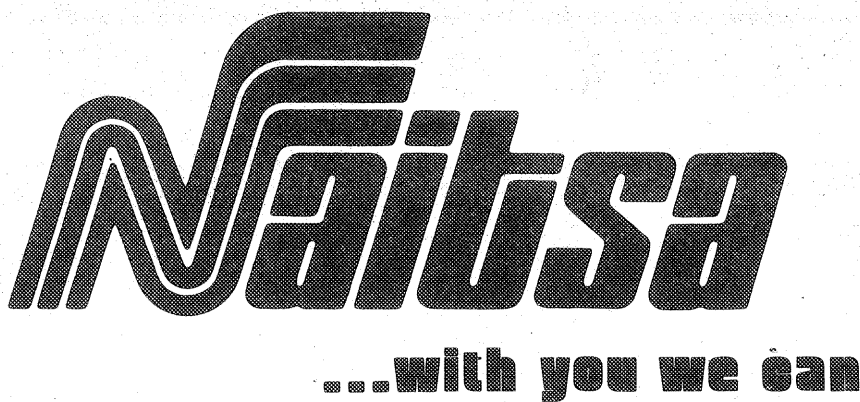

INTRAMURAL PROTESTS

To those who play hockey and do not know the rules and can not control themselves at games. Irwin Strifler, Co-ordinator of Intramural and Intercollegiate Athletics has written a book for you.

INTRAMURAL COUNCIL

The Intramural Council will act as the ruling body. Each technology is responsible for electing one student to act on their behalf at Intramural Council Meetings. The Council will be chaired by the NAITSA Athletic Chairman with the Co-ordinator of Intramurals in attendance as a resource person.

ELIGIBILITY

A technology may enter as many teams as they wish in a given activity provided individuals only participate on one team. Once a persons name is placed on a technology team, he/she may NOT change teams in that specific activity. Each individuals name must be on the team roster sheet. No names may be added to the team list once the regular schedule is completed.

Candidates or players trying out for OOKPIK teams are ineligible for intramural competition in that activity. This applies only to situations where the intramural activity and the NAIT team activity run concurrently.

PROTESTS

Protests may be made on the playing of an ineligible player in writing to the intramural office before 5:00 Pm the following school day of the contest in question.

MOVIE UPDATE

THE FLAMINGO KID

The El Flamingo Beach Club, New York, is an island of leisure in a sea of upward mobility. It's a sandbox paradise for elite with all the trimmings.

Cabana boys scurry back and forth through the land of the open palm. Overhead, the P.A. system plays the latest rock hits and news of fun and games. Tanned bodies glisten in the sun.

To Jeffrey Willis (Matt Dillon), a plumber's son from Brooklyn, the Club is a revelation. So, too, is flashy Phil Brody (Richard Crenna), the flamboyant sports car dealer who reigns as the club's unofficial "king" and its star gin rummy player. Every youngster needs an idol. Jeffrey now establishes his.

The story plotted in the sixties reveals a glow of rich vs. the poor's contentions and dreams.

Jeffrey's father sets up a summer job for his son at a lawyer's office as an office boy. However, when he discovers he has a choice between that and his new found El Flamingo, he decides on the Club. Quickly his dreams of college and a good future are tossed away with opportunities of becoming rich as a sports car salesman. The rich have it too easy. Fast cars, women and money are his future promises now. He leaves behind his family and friends in search of his fortune. It's a summer filled with the ultimate in glamour, elegance and luxury as Jeffrey pawns with the rich.

However the story itself doesn't at the best of times reveal itself completely. The idea of poor boy meets rich people - falls in love with girl - is not a new one but can work if dealt with properly. Unfortunately, in "The Flamingo Kid" it misses entirely. The movie is too dry, and the intended message is not conveyed in the end. Matt Dillon, who has had some good roles in the past, just can't seem to emit an acceptable characterization. However, Richard Crenna (First Blood) as the flamboyant cardealer is excellent. He exemplifies the rich flash type that merely takes advantage of those who let him. Jessica Walter who plays his wife is held back and not allowed to really do much with her role except portray the spoiled rich wife with nothing to do but bask in the sun. She complains frequently and never has anything really to say.

It's unfortunate because with a good script and a few more centralized characters, "The Flamingo Kid" could really have taken off.

DUNE

Frank Herbert fans, beware.

The makers of Dune, the movie of the classic Herbert novel, have decided to throw accuracy out the window.

While the film is brilliant in its establishment of mood, setting, and plot, the film departs significantly from the book in several major aspects. A new weapon - a "weirding module," which uses thoughts and voice commands as a killing force - never appeared in the book; the Fremen look half-dressed as compared to the costumes described in the novel; Baron Harkonnen's suspensors simply held up his weight, but did not allow the maniacal flights he took in the film; Dr. Yuch's long pony tail is missing - need I say more?

But in spite of all this, the film does have some redeeming qualities. It has given director/writer David Lynch (Eraserhead, The Elephant Man) another opportunity to weave his weird, twisted moods into the film. The Harkonnens are made especially vile under Lynch's talented pen. Secondly, it may encourage more people to tackle Herbert's tetralogy; while the details have been tampered with, the plot remains essentially untouched, and seeing the movie first may give some readers a bit of an advantage when trying to fathom Herbert's meticulously detailed conceptions.

So, divorce your thoughts from the novel, and it's a good cinematic experience.

JOHNNY DANGEROUSLY

I've never been so disappointed in a movie more than in Michael Keaton's latest "Johnny Dangerously." It has everything going for it. An excellent cast - Marilu Henner, Danny Devito (both from the TV series Taxi), Joe Piscopo, Dom DeLuise - some good gags and good music. But they forgot to make a story out of it. Taking place in the thirties, the stock market has just collapsed and things are really tough. Crime is about the only thing that does pay. The mob lives by its own code and gang wars are more popular than the World Series.

From this crowd one individual emerges. He's a ladies' man, tough yet sensitive, good looking, soft and hard at the same time. He's also a criminal genius who is loved by the mob. He outmaneuvers the Japanese competition and adds such fringe benefits as a dental plan.

A cunning yet naive orchestration. "Johnny Dangerously" is a rich amalgamation of silliness and over completed cliches that we have all learned to love in the 30's gangster movies. Bogey at his best, Edward G., the bad guy and Cagney are all incorporations. Everything is overdone, overplayed. The ridiculous is an extremity throughout its entirety. There are some good-real funny gags- like Ray Walston (Fast Times at Ridgemont High - Mr. Hand, the teacher) who plays a vendor in the street who's blind. Every morning when his papers are delivered he gets hit in the head -unbelievable he can see - but there's one problem, he's now deaf. And the antics go on and on.

Both Joe Piscopo and Michael Keaton are very good but aren't allowed to expand. They're far too plastic. For every good joke that works there are three that fail or are missed. Visually some scenes are explosive while others are boring. There is too much mixture overall. This is undoubtedly due to a visual dream of Amy Heckerlings rather than a movie that was intended to have a set tone and insight. It is unfortunate because with such a good cast and an excellent idea the movie neglects its primary objective - to entertain.

MICKI & MAUDE

The millionaire drunk is back. From his first debut in "10" to his comedic role in "Best Defence," Dudley Moore is always a box office draw. And his latest film "Micki & Maude" is no exception.

For the movie, Moore is teamed again with director Blake Edwards (Victor/Victoria, 10, S.O.B., Pink Panther). Edwards is credited with more than 40 films, 20 as a producer, 36 as a writer and co-writer and 29 as director. Most recently, he and his wife Julie Andrews teamed with Burt Reynolds for The Man Who Loved Women.

Micki and Maude are two lonely, very talented, very pregnant women - both married to Rob Salinger played by Dudley Moore.

Salinger is a reporter for America, Hey!, a TV news magazine show. His wife (Ann Reinking) is a very successful lawyer on her way up to a superior court appointment. Having a baby is the last thing on her mind. However it's just the opposite for Rob.

While covering a classical recital, Rob meets cellist, Maude (Amy Irving). It's love at first note - Rob is ecstatic, as is Maude when word of her being pregnant arrives. He's finally going to be the father he's dreamed about. He marries Maude, leaving out the minor detail that he's already married to Micki. Luck has it, just when Rob has the best of two worlds, he finds out that Micki is pregnant too.

The results are hilarious. And the consequences, well, you'll just have to see this one to find out how Moore manages two wives and two babies.

Friday saw New World Pictures release this year's New Year Classic, Avenging Angel. This like so many other movies lately is a sequel. 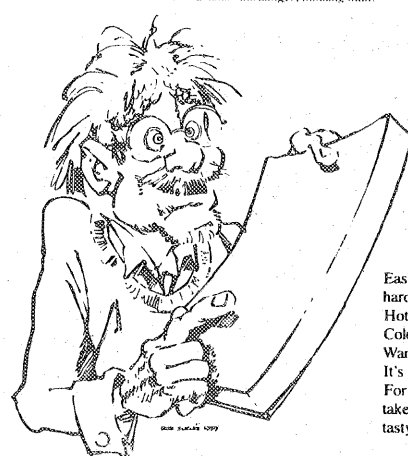

The two team traded goals in the first period. Murray Melnyk's fifth of the year lifted NAIT into a 1-0 advantage with 4:28 gone in the first. Mark Schultz and Gary Leach assisted on the play. The lead was short lived as Mike Gouchie of RDC tied the contest at 1-1 at the 7:53 mark.

Hugh McCaskill of the Ooks notched his second of the season at 17:04 of the middle period from Ross Kenny and Ken Goodwin to give NAIT a 2-1 lead.

A trio of third period tallies sealed the victory for NAIT. Ron Amyotte's 9th of the season at 3:31 gave the Ooks a two goal cushion. Ken Goodwin and Garth Hayes received assists on Amyotte's marker. Sid Cranston's 10th goal of the campaign from Ross Kenny and Jamie Bartman went across the red line at 13:19. Sid Cranston then rounded out the scoring with 1:51 left in the game as he tallied on a set up by Ross Kenny and Hugh McCaskill.

NAIT netminder Cleo Rowen turned away 29 Red Deer blasts. At the other end, Bert Brooker of the Kings was tested on 37 occasions.

NAIT improves its record in ACAC play to 13 wins and no losses. The Ooks have a nine point lead on second place SAIT who are 8-5-1.

NAIT coach Perry Pearn was very positive about the way the Ooks started the second half and commented, "We played our best game of the season Sunday against Red Deer. On Saturday, we did not perform to potential as we were probably looking ahead to Sunday. We had a good week of practice which helped us prepare for the two contests."

Pearn was also pleased with the performance of two players, "Scott Melnyk played very well this past weekend and Hugh McCaskill did an admirable job on the Sid Cranston line."
