No swilling, spilling and spraying of champagne in a wild-and-wooly locker room scene.

And they only hoisted the coach onto their shoulders and carried him off the ice after being cajoled into it by an Edmonton Sun photographer.

Despite capping a record unbeaten untied 25-game Alberta Colleges Athletic Association regular season hockey schedule with a 13-3 massacre of the SAIT Trojans, all was cool with the NAIT Ookpiks.

The Ooks, it seems, believe the real season's still ahead of them.

HAVEN'T WON ANYTHING

"When I think about it now, I'm pretty happy - but we haven't won nothing yet," said Ooks' centre Sid Cranston who celebrated his 22nd birthday with a two-goal, six-assist performance in front of 300 fans at the NAIT Arena. "That 25-0 doesn't mean anything once the playoffs start. We're back to square one now."

NAIT, who open the ACAC playoffs this Thursday against Camrose, not only ran its mark to 25-0 in 1984, but stretched its winning streak against league rivals to an incredible 51 consecutive games, including playoffs and exhibition action.

Not since being thumped 8-3 by Red Deer back on Dec. 4, 1983 have the Ooks fallen to an ACAC squad.

Still "The streak is significant," understated Ooks' coach Perry Pearn. "It hasn't been done before and when you look at the longest ones in the NHL and what not, we compare favorably, and we're very proud of that. But we didn't really emphasize it. The focus was on improving and getting ready for the playoffs."

So what does it mean?

A LOT OF CHARACTER

"I think it shows there's a lot of character on this team," declared two-goal man Mike Spencer, a guy who's familiar with winning - he was with the 1984 Centennial Cup champion Weyburn Red Wings. "You're going to have your lulls. Just to keep the interest up for that long a period of time is something. It's nice to go unbeaten."

Defenceman Ken Goodwin agreed. "We have to make sure now that we keep it going in the playoffs."

If anything was surprising about No. 25, it was the ease with which the Ooks handled third-place SAIT. After all, wasn't it the Trojans who, three weeks ago, nearly ended the streak at 19 games?

"Yeah, but that was probably our worst game of the year,"

shrugged Cranston, whose club scored twice late in the third period to pull out a 2-1 win. "This one was easy because we made it easy by playing our game. We wore them down." And out. The only time it was 2-1 yesterday was after one period. NAIT exploded for five unanswered goals in the middle frame to make it academic, and then bombarded beleagured SAIT goalie Rick Cuch with 26 shots in a six-goal third period.

Cuch, who faced 55 drives, as opposed to a mere 23 handled by NAIT's Cleo Rowein and Jeff Laskiwka, was beaten in just about every conceivable way. Breakaways, deflections, rebounds, 10-foot slapshots - you name it, he saw it.

Gary Leach had enough time on his second-period tally to run out for a coffee before popping a wrist shot high to Cuch's glove side.

KEEP ON COMIN

"We try to keep coming for 60 minutes," said Pearn. "In theory our strongest period should be the third, and that's what happened. They tried to play with four defencemen. And unless they're awfully fit, you can't do that against us."

Besides Spencer's hat trick and Cranston's pair, Ron Amyotte and Garth Hayes added two each for NAIT. Leach, Gary Haddon, Scott Melnyk and Mike Tookey added singles. Daryl Baxandal, Marty Shenfield and Duance Potekal replied for the losers.



Once again there has been mounting concern about the potential health hazards of second-hand smoke in NAIT. A student of NAIT presented the problem in a letter to Dr. Souch. The letter contained concerns about not having designated non-smoking areas within NAIT and particularily the new lounge.

This is not the first time that Dr. Souch has been confronted. Over the past two years a number of concened staff and students have tried to persuade the President and Health and Safety Committee to come up with some sort of policy. But the only accomplishment obtained was the partial non-smoking area in the cafeteria.

When confronting Dr. Souch with the problem, he claims there is action being taken. His concern was to make sure that any action taken be done carefully so as not to upset smokers and non-smokers.

Dr. Souch states that "it is difficult for both sides to be totally satisfied, thus there must be some sort of compromise made.

When Dr. Souch was asked about the problem of no-smoking signs being ignored in the tower, he replied that without these problems being brought to the attention of the administration, no actions can be taken. Of yet no mention or complaint has been leveled regarding the tower lounge.

NAIT's counterpart SAIT was faced with the same problem. Their efforts surmounted to a non-smoking area in the cafeterias and non-smoking offices for those who wanted them. SAIT feels they have the same problems in getting new policies as we do, and that getting any action taken is half the problem.

There are legal responsibilities for NAIT to take. NAIT has the legal right to prohibit all smoking but realistically this will probably never happen. Hopefully, with the upcoming recommendations from the Health and Safety Committee there will be some changes made. But again the responsibility will fall on the Board of Governors and Dr. Souch to implement and enforce a no-smoking policy.

The attempted impeachment of SAITSA Vice President Lavina Wohlford during a closed-door session Monday night has raised a number of questions regarding freedom of information on Campus.

The main question posed is: Does the student body have the right to know what is discussed and how their representatives voted during SRC meetings?

Normally all SRC meetings are open to the public and the Emery Weal reporter who represents the SAIT community has the freedom to report which issues were discussed, what motions were passed, and, in the case of division, who voted for or against a motion.

But Monday night when the motion to impeach the Vice President was introduced, council, without discussion, voted to hold the debate and vote in secrecy.

The Emery Weal reporter and other members of the public were ordered to leave and all members of SRC were further ordered not to reveal or discuss any of the proceedings of the secret session.

A secret vote was ordered on a representative basis which means each member of council gets one vote for every 20 people in his or her faculty. And, apart from the result, Chairman Steve Harding would not reveal how each member voted.

What council won't tell the Weal or students is why a matter of such obvious importance was debated and voted on in close secrecy.

It would appear SRC needs to be reminded of a few fundamental obligations of elected office. Such as the fact that they were democratically elected by the student body to represent them, to echo their views, and to report back to them on preceedings.

Council should also be reminded that although their secret meeting may well have been quite legal, fair and just, that this is perhaps not enough. To quote a well-known phrase "Justice must not only be done, it must be seen to be done."

The only question left is how the student body feels about this secret meeting.

You could try talking to your student representative who voted for you Monday night but don't bother asking how he voted, or what was discussed - he won't tell you - he's sworn to secrecy.

What appears to be a routine report of a shocking murder suddenly explodes when the killer contacts Malcolm. He appoints the reporter his personal spokesman to explain to the public why this heinous crime was committed and why others just as brutal will follow. Malcolm dubs him the

The killer's calls continue, each revealling details of his mayhem and clues to his own identity. Malcolm is manipulated by the power of the story and pulled into a trap laid by a shrewd, calculating madman. The "Numbers Killer" takes Malcolm with him on his trail of murder. The curious teaming of criminal and reporter becomes national



Don't miss "The Mean Season" it's easily so far the year's best in suspence drama.









OOKS RUN AWAY WITH RECORD!!

The NAIT Ooks are the number one ranked hockey team in the nation and reserved a spot in the ACAC hockey record books for themselves this past weekend.

NAIT closed out the ACAC regular season at the NAIT Arena with two home games this past weekend. On Saturday, February 3rd, the Ooks tripled the Red Deer College Kings 6-2. The Ooks then felled the SAIT Trojans Sunday, February 24th, 13-3.

The Ooks concluded the season with a 25 and 0 record the best ever in ACAC hockey. NAIT now has 51 consecutive wins against ACAC rivals.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 23rd--NAIT OOKS 6, RED DEER KINGS 2 AT NAIT ARENA

The Red Deer College Kings finish second in the ACAC even though they lost their last two games of the regular season. The Kings dropped a 6-2 decision to the NAIT Ooks on Saturday, February 24th at the NAIT Arena.

Grant Couture of the Kings started the scoring on the Red Deer power play at 1:21 of the first period. Mike Spencer of the Ooks notched his 20th of the year to tie the game at 1-1 with 12:50 gone in the first on a play with Sid Cranston.

The Ooks then exploded for four goals in the middle stanza. Sid Cranston's 28th of the season from Brenn Leach lifted NAIT into a 2-1 advantage at 3:05. Randy Repchuk and Ken Good win then set up Ron Amyotte with 4:32 elapsed in the frame. Sid Cranston's second of the night increased NAIT's lead to 4-1. Mike Tookey then tallied his ninth of the campaign completing a play with Ron Amyotte and Jamie Bartman.

Like the first frame, the two teams traded goals in the third. Garnet Klassen pulled the Kings to within three of NAIT at the 3:06 mark of the third. Ron Amyotte's 27th of the season closed out the night's scoring with 50 seconds remaining in the game.

Jeff Lastiwka faced 27 Red Deer shots in the Ooks crease. At the opposite end, Bert Brooker blocked 48 NAIT shots in the Kings net.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 24th--NAIT OOKS 13, SAIT TRO-JANS 3 AT NAIT ARENA

The drive for 25 was completed successfully as the NAIT Ooks capped off the regular season with a 13-3 triumph over the SAIT Trojans at the NAIT Arena Sunday. The Ooks became the first club in ACAC history to go undefeated in regular season play as ACAC scoring champion Sid Cranston added eight points (two goals, six assists) to up his total to 68.

The SAIT powerplay captialized with 5:03 elapsed in the first as Daryl Baxandall connected. Sid Cranston tied the game for NAIT one minute and two seconds later. Cranston then found the net for the 31st time this season at 14:26 to move the Ooks ahead 2-1.

With 1:11 passed in the second, Scott Melnyk tallied his eighth marker of the campaign to give NAIT a two goal cushion. Mike Spencer widened NAIT's lead to 4-1 at the 10:59 mark. Mike Tookey's 10th goal of the campaign increased NAIT's advantage to four. Gary Haddon accounted for NAIT's seventh goal at the 16:54 mark. One minute and 58 seconds followed before Garth Hayes of NAIT rounded out the period's scoring.

Ron Amyotte chalked up his 28th of the year with 7:16 passed in the third. Mike Spencer placed NAIT in double digits a short 38 seconds later. Gary Leach made the score 11-1 in favor of the Ooks at 8:23. Marty Shenfield of the Trojans then replied with SAIT's second goal at the 9:22 mark. One minute and 42 seconds followed before Mike Spencer reinstated NAIT's ten goal advantage. Duane Potekal then placed the biscuit in the NAIT net with 14:09 gone in the period. Ron Amyotte of the Ooks scored his 29th of the season at 16:26 of the third. Garth Hayes then scored the final goal of the regular season with 30 seconds left in the game.

The NAIT netminding tandem of Cleo Rowein and Jeff Lastiwka blocked 23 SAIT blasts. At the other end, the Trojans Rick Cuch was tested 55 times.

ON THE BENCH: The ACAC best of three semi-final match-ups have been decided. NAIT will play Camrose in one series while SAIT meets Red Deer in the other . . . Tom Tookey, Cleo Rowein, and Scott Melnyk are all listed as questionable for this week's action . . . NAIT opens up their best of three affair with Camrose Thursday at the NAIT Arena. Game time is 7:30 pm. Game 2 in the series will go at the Camrose Rec Center on Saturday, March 2nd. The action starts at 8:00 pm. Game three if necessary will be back at the NAIT Arena on Sunday, March 3rd at 2:00 pm. The NAIT Ooks are ranked number one in the nation. Come out and support the Ooks.
