TAKE A CLOSER LOOK

The quality of an organization is dependent upon the ability of its members and the strengths of its leader. This is a recognized fact. It is also recognized that if an organization is to be one of responsibility and importance, then it is imperative that it have excellent members and leadership. Such is the case with our student government. In order for NAITSA to be successful in their highly significant role, they must be comprised of the most qualified people available. If perhaps, this level of quality has not been attained, now is the time to start considering the criteria under which the upcoming candidates for NAITSA shall be subjected. As elections are next week, I'd like to offer some suggestions on candidate scrutiny.

I have already had the opportunity to peruse the articles submitted to us by the different candidates. I ask you to take the time to read these, because I feel they are one of the better indicators of the individual's intentions and abilities. There are obvious areas to be looked at. Does the candidate seem to know the job? Does he or she have any related experience, be it with school or otherwise? These are questions that can be easily answered, but at the same time are not as revealing. It is the subtle clues that are subjectively judged by you, which can be more revealing. Does this candidate stress benefits to you, or to himself? Does this candidate really comprehend what their job entails, or does it appear that all they know about the position is what they've heard in a five minute talk with the executive incumbent? Do they have any innovative ideas, or are they just content to be mediocre and let things continue as they are? Do they deal in specifics, or do they use the same, trite rhetoric that any politician could dream up. Do they emphasize benefits to you, or do you interpret only benefits to them? These are a few points to look at, but even simple things as the length of the articles give some correlation with the effort that a person is willing to expend. Use your own intuition.

But why is it so important that we take the time to vote responsibly in the upcoming elections? If you look at the responsibilities of NAITSA, this can be answered easily enough. NAITSA deals with the collective student fees that all full-time NAIT students pay. They administer this \$400,000 plus budget in accordance to student wants and needs. An unresponsive or incompetent executive could misallocate these monies. For instance, this year it has been suggested that the new lounge was not as pressing a priority as perhaps new library resources. Whatever the case, the executive must be in tune with student concerns on any allocation of the student budget. Besides the responsibility of administration within the Institute, the executive represents us to the public and to other colleges and universities. The opinion of employers and others with regards to NAIT students can be considerably affected through NAITSA's one on one dealings with the public. This is especially true of the President's position. NAITSA's official functions are one of great responsibility, and should not be so quickly relegated to just anyone.

When it comes right down to it you are the boss. Prove it on voting day, April 3, 1985.

THEY'RE OFF AND RUNNING

This years election campaign for the 1985-86 NAITSA Executive is off and running. A total of twenty candidates are running for nine positions.

A total of six people are running for the position of Athletics Chairman. Craig Somers, first year student is one of them. He says he would like to see more promotion of NAITSA as a whole. Brian McDonald candidate for Publication Chairman agrees. Brian also sees a need for better communication between NAITSA, The Nugget and the yearbook staff. "NAITSA as a whole is not as cohesive as it could be. It is up to the new executive to create closer ties between the executive itself and the whole of NAIT."

Two positions have been filled by acclamation. Bruce Janzen will be in charge of Academics while Tom Walls and Larry Retzlaff, will represent students on the Board of Governors.

During the campaign each candidate is limited to one hundred dollars for expenses. This is to cover costs associated with posters and other general expenses. Many complained that the NAITSA election fund should have been used to subsidize each candidate.

There seemed to be some misunderstanding as to who is eligible to vote. Holly Root specified that only 1st year students and certain technologies were allowed to vote. But when candidates brought out the constitution and pointed out that any paid NAITSA member could vote, Miss Root changed her tune immediately.

Election speeches can be heard in the new lounge April 2, 12:00 - 2:00 p.m. On April 3, 1985 voting will take place throughout NAIT between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.

YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

"Only in Alberta could a Provincial Treasurer bring in a budget that completely ignores the current hardships being experienced by young people," said Mike Moroz NDP Youth Critic yesterday, in response to the budget announcement. "With unemployment in the City of Edmonton running at 15.5 percent, this government refuses to do anything more than pat itself on the back for doing a wonderful job, and continue it's sermon about a mystical recovery somewhere in the future. It's not coming, and Albertans know it."

Moroz suggests that the government "Has no business being laudatory about having a huge bankroll of money, when it is clear that many Albertans will go another year without a job or the prospect of one."

"Mr. Hyndman tells us that this budget has a heart. He's right, a heart of a stone. The employment programs the Treasurer praises in his address, do little more than create temporary short term jobs for young people. Programs like the Summer Temporary Employment Program, leave students without real future employment prospects."

Echoing NDP Leader Ray Martin's comments, Moroz said "Mr. Hyndman should be ashamed of this budget. In his 1984 budget address, the Provincial Treasurer said that, 'Young Albertans represent the future of our province.' He's clearly forgotten that."

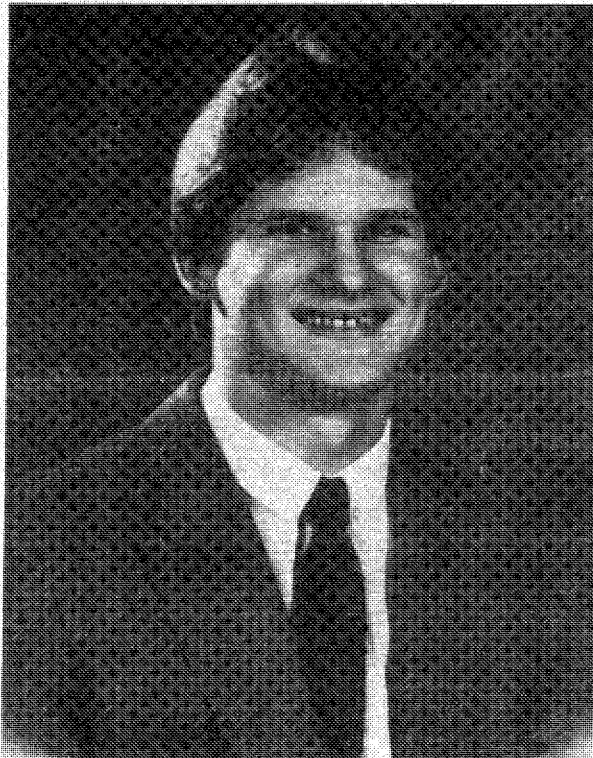

WHAT EXPERIENCE HAVE I HAD?

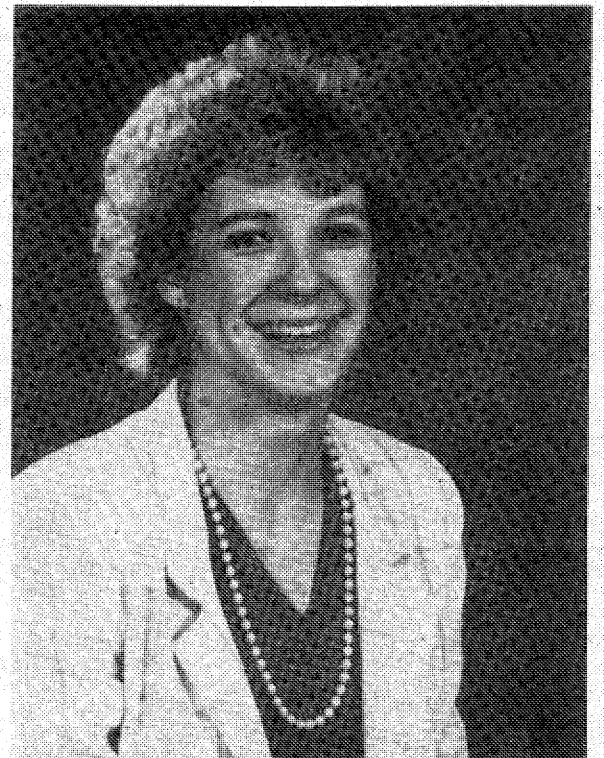

My promise to you is that I will make every effort to represent you as the concerned and honest NAITSA President.

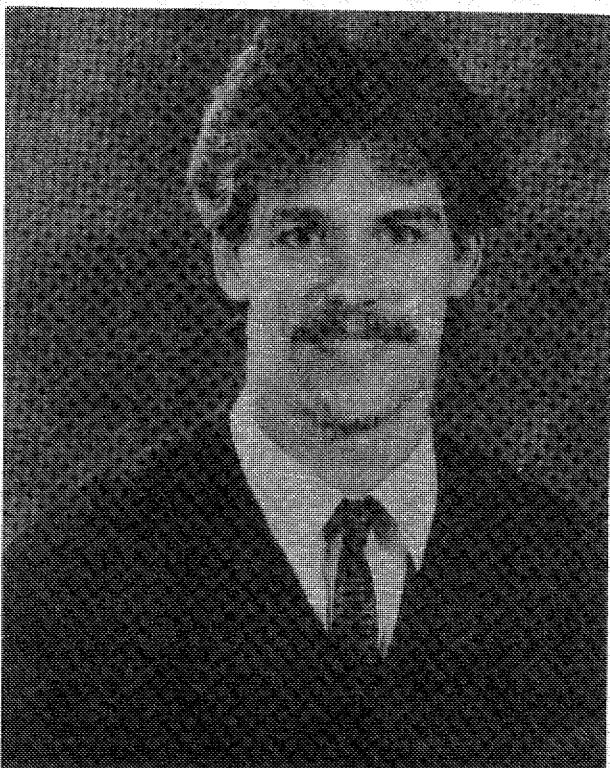
RANDY FIBKE

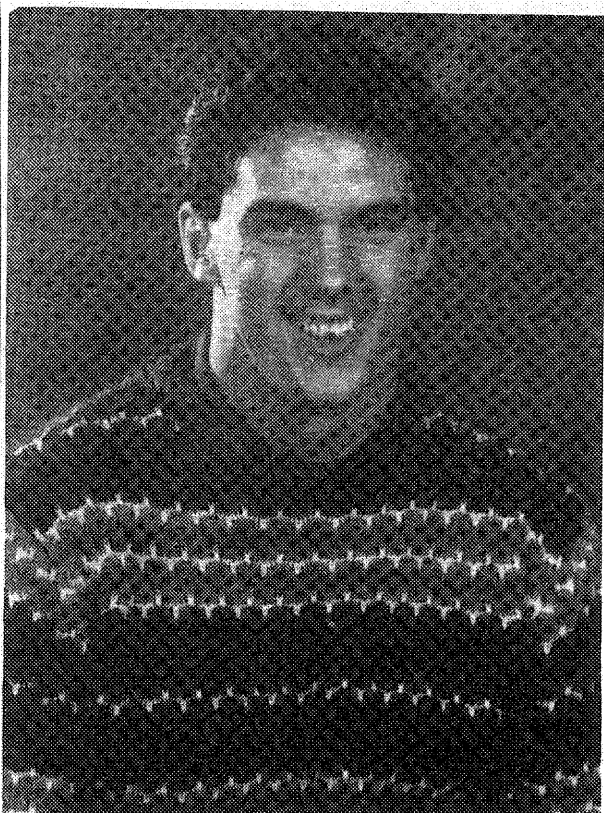
I am presently a class representative for the Business Administration Society (BAS), which helps me promote BAS activities and keep in touch with you and what you want.

provide recreation, fun, and competition. Participation is important; and if more "fun" sports were available, everyone could get involved.

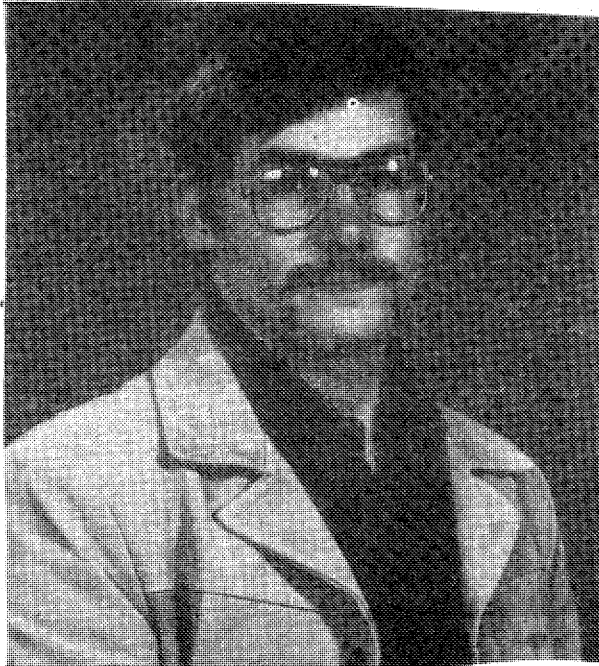

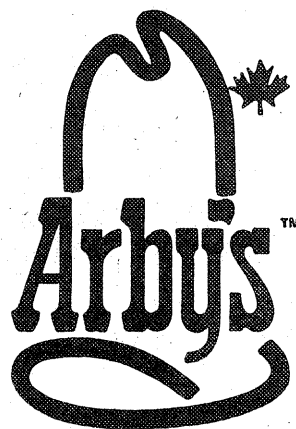

OOKS AT NATIONALS

Well, once again the experts were proved wrong with the outstanding success of the Faceoff '85 at Northlands Coliseum. A total of 13,354 viewed the event which is sure to become a fixture on the local sports calendar. People do care about amateur sports in Edmonton.

The tightness of the game also proved the outstanding progress the NAIT hockey program has made in comparison to its counterpart over at the U of A. Even with three regulars out of the line-up, the Oaks pushed the Bears to the limit. There is no doubt either team could win a game against each other on any given night.

The Oaks are in the midst of the CCAA (National) Hockey Championships in Moose Jaw this week. Joining the number one ranked Oaks at the eight team tournament are representatives from six other provinces. The Cape Breton Capers from Sydney, Nova Scotia are one of six returnees from last year's nationals in St. Hyacinthe. The Red River Rebels from Red River (Winnipeg), Manitoba, the Cariboo College Chiefs from Kamloops, B.C., the Seneca Braves from Willowdale, Ontario, and the Kelsey Amaruks from Saskatoon, Saskatchewan are also making their second straight appearance at the Nationals. The Victoriaville Vulkins from Victoriaville, Quebec and the Briercrest Clippers from Caronport, Saskatchewan will also compete in the tournament.

The favorites in the tournament would probably be Alberta, Ontario, and Quebec. St. Hyacinthe will not be back to defend their CCAA crown which they won last year at home in St. Hyacinthe. Victoriaville will take St. Hyacinthe's spot. Seneca (3rd last year) and NAIT (4th last year) will probably meet one of the "A" side semi-finals on Friday.

The Cariboo College Chiefs and the Cape Breton Capers are long shots to win and if a big upset occurs, it will probably come from one of these teams. Red River, Kelsey and Briercrest each have chances of slim and none of reaching the final. In all likelihood, slim left town and these three teams will be battling for 6th, 7th and 8th.

NAIT's first action occurs on Thursday, March 28th at 1:00 p.m. when they take on the Cariboo College Chiefs from Kamloops, B.C. The winner of this match will meet the winner of the Seneca-kelsey contest on Friday at 2:00 p.m. The CCAA Championship game will be on Saturday at 8:00 p.m. at the Moose Jaw Civic Center.

The Oaks after their tune-up with the Bears should be able to bring the CCAA title back to Alberta on Saturday night. The Oaks will return home on Sunday, March 31st at 9:39 on Air Canada flight AC 225.

One thing in NAIT's and Seneca's favor is the fact the draw at this year's nationals does not show the favoritism of the 1984 St. Hyacinthe draw. Each team will meet tougher clubs as they climb the ladder and not battle one another from the start.

Three NAIT Oaks have been nominated for the All-Canadian team. They are goaltender Cleo Rowein, defenceman Jamie Bartman, and right winger Ron Amyotte. NAIT coach Perry Pearn is also up for Coach-of-the-year honors.

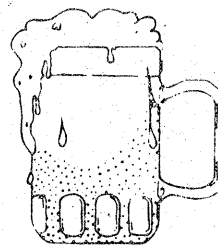

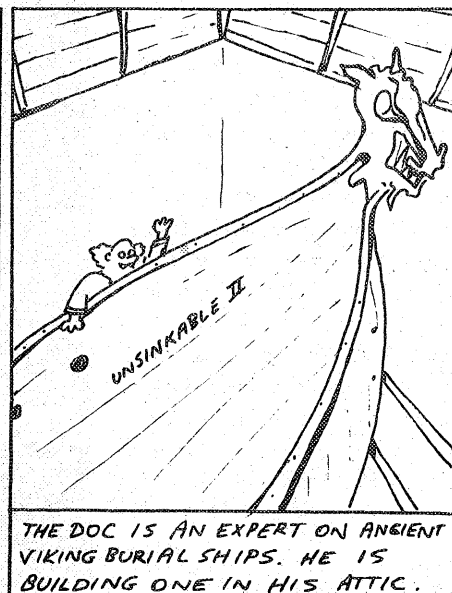
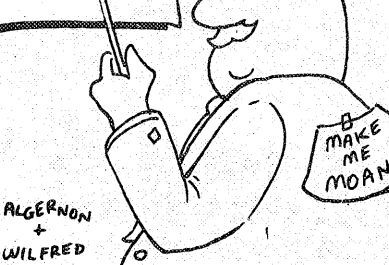
