ARE JOBS GOING BEGGING?

REPRINTED FROM NAITLINE

Several years ago economists coined the term "psychology of inflation" to describe a widespread attitude among consumers that inflation is inevitable and therefore adjustment of personal behavior to counteract it is futile. One hears little of the "psychology of inflation" today, but there seems to be evidence of a prevailing "psychology of recession", particularly among young people.

How else can one explain the fact that a significant number of job postings of relevance to NAIT graduates are going unheeded? Placement Coordinator Jerry Cossitt reports that some 100 summer and nearly 200 full time openings are on file in the Placement Centre. He notes that a mindset of "no jobs so why bother looking" seems to have developed among students on this and other campuses. Jerry finds himself in the position of asking program heads to explicitly encourage students to apply for jobs.

There is reason for cautious optimism about employment opportunities for NAIT graduates according to Cossitt. Typically, six to ten job orders a day come in to the Centre. About 60 percent of these orders come from small and medium size employers. During the last few weeks, three to five employers have been on campus every day, and for the first time in three years, there are now days when interview rooms are totally booked.

Feedback from employers about NAIT students and the services of the Placement Centre has been very positive. Several employers have spoken favorably of students' resumes and interviews. The services provided by the Institute to employers (graduate profiles, parking arrangements, attractive interview rooms, and lunch arrangement with program staff) have been given high praise. There is strong evidence that employers enjoy coming to the NAIT

campus to do business. For example, a Toronto-based employer, who planned to visit several institutions in Edmonton, decided not to go any further than NAIT after the service and response for students.

We seem to be on the right track in helping students, but in the final analysis, they must take responsibility for going after the jobs.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN INTERVIEW WITH JERRY COSSITT.

QUESTION

What use are the 'employment boards' having on students at NAIT?

ANSWER

Right now on display, there are approximately 100 positions for fulltime graduating students and 100-150 summer employment possibilities for students. There has been good response to some of the positions advertised and other positions, depending on the technology, there has not been probably adequate response to those. We encourage students to apply to those positions.

What I see now on the part of employers is a cautious optimism. There is not an excess of positions, but there are positions for students to apply for. Right now we are dealing with medium to small size companies whose needs are sometimes two weeks, three weeks or a month ahead, and as a result we see activity throughout the calendar year.

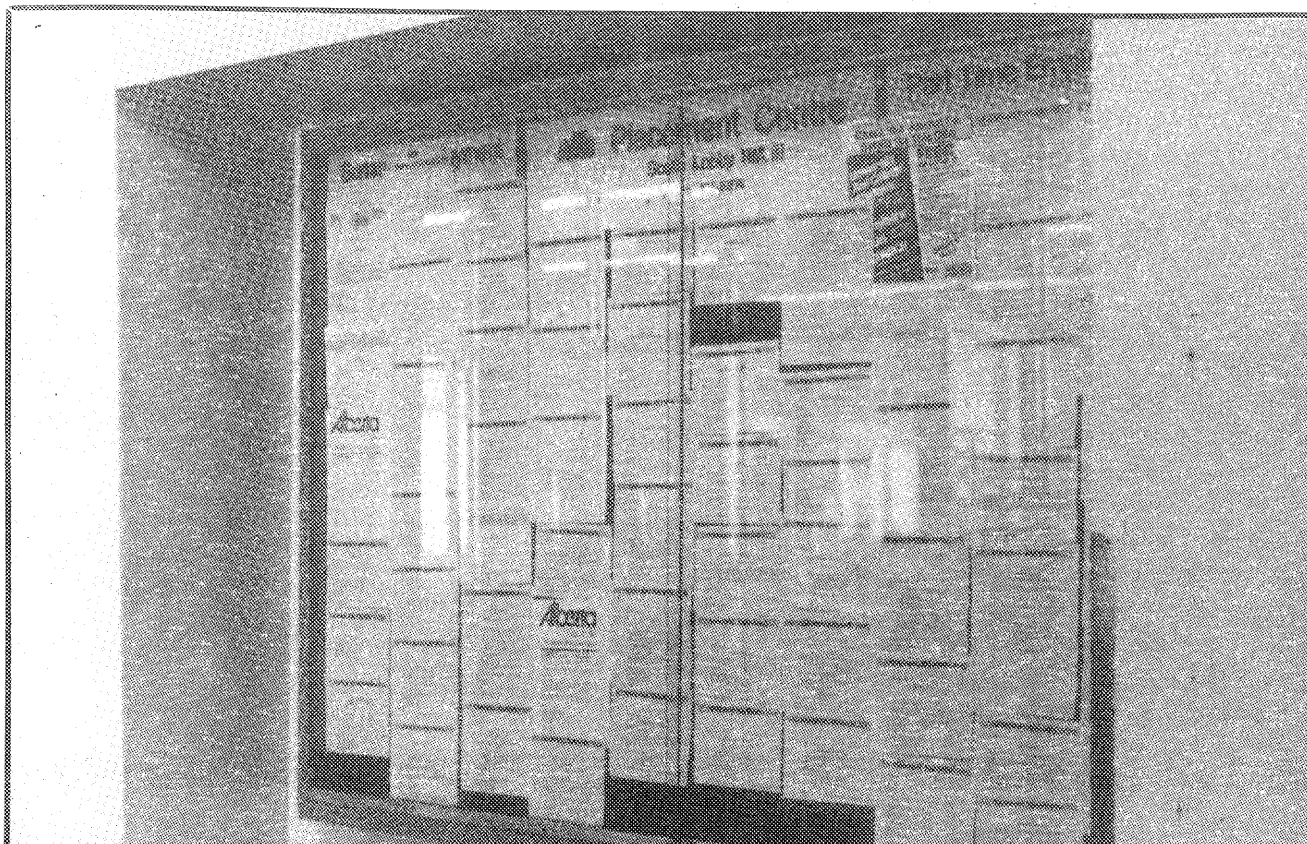
QUESTION

Why aren't the students not answering to the jobs posted? Is there some sort of skepticism?

ANSWER

I have checked with some other colleges and universities as well. There appears to be in some students, that they believe there are no positions. They may have a friend, parent or relative that is unemployed, so there are no positions, so why bother looking or why bother applying.

Keeping The Ball Rolling

I don't think that any of our reader's are unfamiliar with the stance that "The Nugget" has taken about the issue of smoking on campus. We have historically tried to defend the rights of the non-smoker, and perhaps advance them by informing students of the outdated policies regarding this issue. We have hoped that these efforts would be followed by initiatives on the part of the student body to take action and support their own rights, be it that of the non-smoker or the smoker. I am happy to see, by recent events, that perhaps some of these initiatives have been put into play.

Last week, General Council voted to recommend to the Nait Administration's Safety Committee, that the new student lounge have 60 percent of its space allocated to non-smokers. This is a landmark recommendation. City Councils, who have been too afraid to step on constituent's toes, have never considered recommendations of more than 35 percent. Finally, the wishes of the majority are being considered as important. It has been too long for the minority of smokers in our population to dominate all public gathering places. I'm personally happy to see that General Council had the courage to introduce a recommendation which will be protested by many people, but is nonetheless sensible.

Now that the initiative in this area has been taken, the momentum must be continued. It is important for all the non-smokers out there to stick to their guns. This is because the non-smoking recommendation, if brought into play by the Nait Administration, will have to be enforced by the non-smokers in the crowd. This clause in the recommendation is necessary out of practicality. Since this non-smoking regulation cannot be feasibly controlled by any police action, it must be enforced by the offended parties. They being, of course, the non-smoking victims of lung abuse.

So, even though most people are sick of reading anti-smoking articles in this paper, I think they've done some good. We feel that we have been representing the opinions of the majority of students at NAIT. If the newest recommendation becomes a regulation, the responsibility will once again be on the shoulders of the non-smoker. Now that the initiative has been made, it should not be dampened because of apathy. I urge all non-smokers to fight and continue fighting for their rights. In only this way can we be considered a major lobbying force in this Institute. This is our finest hour!

The media did nothing to quell the fears of unemployment. Articles like those that appeared on the front page of Mondays Edmonton Journal regarding the thousands of people looking for the tens of jobs were enough to despair the staunchest optimist.

You have come to NAIT to acquire an education which will hopefully propel you on to bigger and better things. In Alberta the job situation is not as desperate as the media so happily displays. First consider who is unemployed? Seventy five percent of construction workers in this province are unemployed. Are you a construction worker? If you aren't there you go, some confidence already. Do you have any education? Of course you do, and a damn good education it is! Do you personally have any qualities which set you apart from and above of the crowd? You've just made it through two years of your life in which you've proved to yourself and to those around you exactly what you're capable of. What more could you ask?

Jobs are posted on the job board by the cafeteria here on Campus. It is crazy that there are jobs being sent back by the counsellor's office with no applications for the positions filled out. Are NAIT students so choosy that these jobs were deemed undesirable? No, it is simply a case of believing that jobs are actually not available.

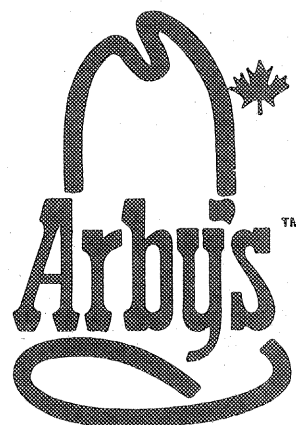

Other institutions, including ourselves have found that, this has happened in some cases.

Some students that are planning to continue their education or other students planning to take the summer off.

QUESTION

Are too many people assuming there are no jobs?

ANSWER

Yes, there are different reasons for it. In some cases, we have had very little response to the jobs posted. More frequently now companies are willing to interview anyone who applies. In a lot of cases program heads have had to make students aware of these and really encourage them to apply.

We encourage students to watch the employment boards on a daily basis.

QUESTION

What is the overall job situation in Edmonton?

ANSWER

There is still not an excess amount of positions for people looking and there is still quite a high rate of unemployment in certain areas.

QUESTION

What percentage of students do you expect to place?

ANSWER

Last year we placed approximately 60 percent of those who registered with us. At present we have placed approximately 95 students within the past month.

QUESTION

Those are mostly graduate students?

ANSWER

Yes, 65-70 percent are full time positions while the remainder are summer.

QUESTION

How effective will the STEP and SEED programs be?

ANSWER

They are being advertised now. You will see a majority of the summer positions under these two programs.

QUESTION

Are a majority of the jobs from the private or public sectors?

ANSWER

STEP projects are from the public sector, non-profit organizations, and Provincial Government departments. SEED projects are from the private sector.

QUESTION

What competition faces NAIT students as regards to the University students finished a month earlier?

ANSWER

There is still quite a bit of competition. However, by encouraging potential employers some of the jobs offered, are starting June 1. Therefore NAIT students have a reasonable chance of obtaining a good job.

QUESTION

What procedure should students take to acquire a job?

ANSWER

For summer employment it is a matter of watching the employment boards on a daily basis. And once they have finished their course, Hire-A-Student is an option, it is located 9943-109 St. and it is essentially first-come, first served.

At the Placement Centre at NAIT, we register full time graduates. Students can register in person. Also the 24 hour job hotline goes into effect June 1.

HIRE-A-STUDENT ANNUAL OPENING

I was contacted Thursday, April 18, by Hire-A-Student who asked if NAIT could be present at their official opening Friday, April 26. Hire-A-Student requested that NAIT have 3 or 4 technologies set up displays that would promote student professionalism.

Since such short notice was given Greg Scherf and myself sat down and chose 4 technologies that would cover the wide range of technologies at the institute. We also considered the fact that some technology students have a rougher time of getting work for the summer and upon graduation.

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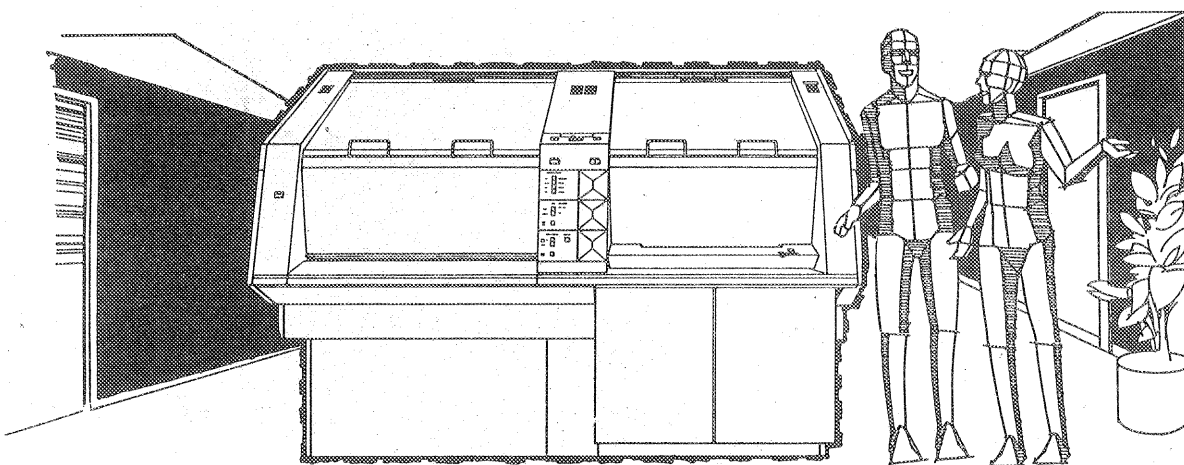

Pushbutton Drafting



1. Scissors-And-Paste Drafting

- A. Create a new drawing by merging information and views from existing drawings.
- B. Create mirror-image or opposite-hand views.

2. Changes/Revisions On Engineering Documents

- A. Create new drawings by printing without "fusing", then deleting unwanted areas.
- B. Make minor changes by using adhesive labels

3. Overlays

- A. Re-format prints into a new format by overlaying a title block.
- B. Create a new drawing by merging the acetate overlay format with a section of a detail drawing.
- C. Use pin-bar drafting to create a finished print from composite overlays.

4. Non-Reproducible-Blue

- A. A light blue grid can be used as a guide to help keep drawings precise and exact; then, in printing the final drawing, the light blue grid drops out.

5. Reduction

- A. Reduce and re-format documents
- B. Use variable reduction (or enlargement) ratios

6. Enlargement

- A. Create full-scale drawings from 35mm microfilm prints or microfiche
- B. Change the scale of parts drawings
- C. Enlarge any graphic instantly for special presentations

7. Restore Old Or Damaged Drawings

- A. Make old drawings look new

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
