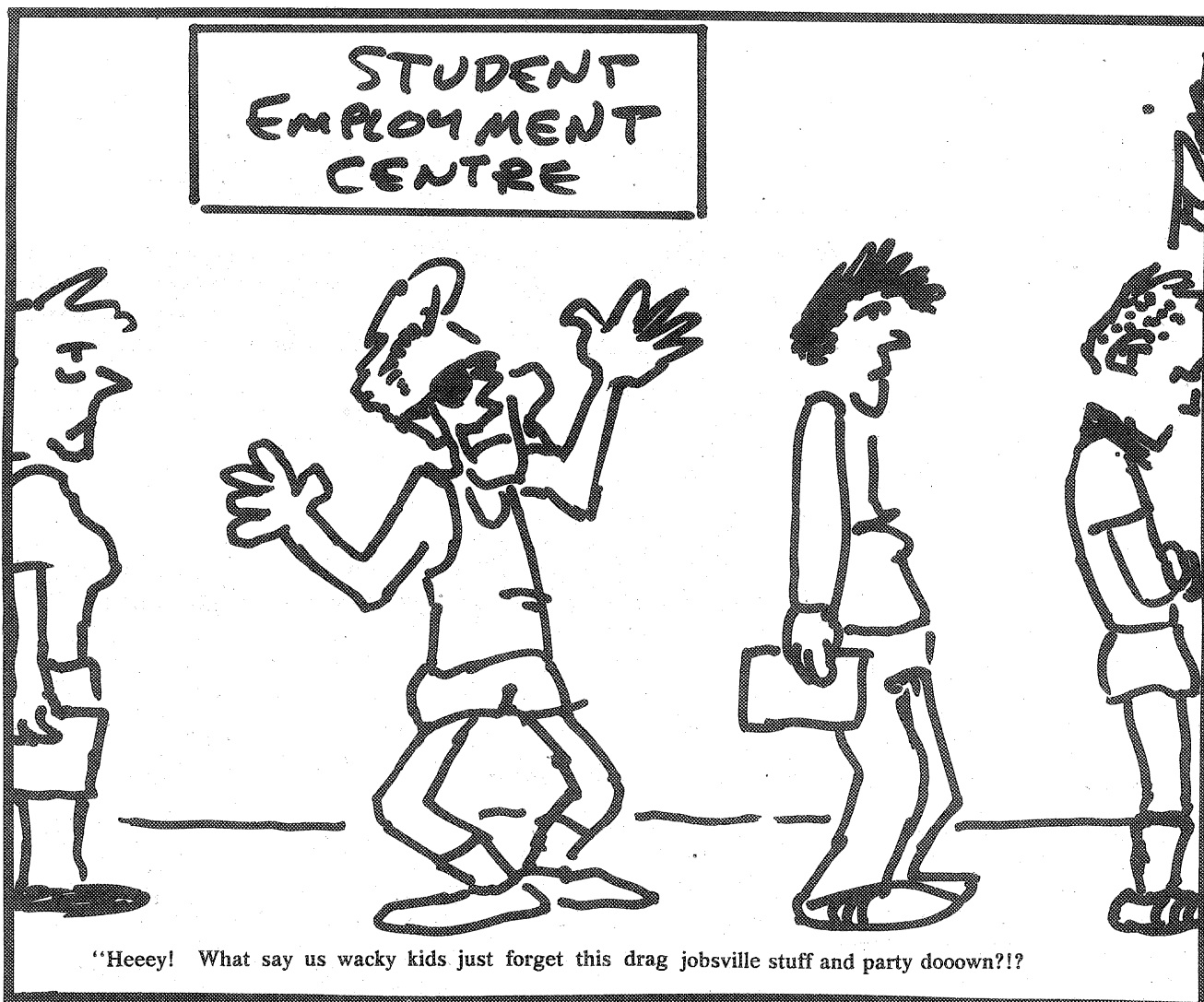

You're "happily dismayed" and I'm inconsistent? You're off to a great start as a newspaper editor - subterranean or otherwise.

Dear Sean Bishop:

Thank you for your letter in the May 9 edition of the Nugget. In that letter you clearly and emphatically emphasized your experiences with and opinions of four separate organizations from whom you solicited help regarding your financial situation. Three of the four, Social Services, Students Finance Board and NAIT Administration, I am not responsible for nor can I answer for. The fourth, however, NAIT Student Association, I am responsible for and I should answer for.

NAITSA's mandate is essentially to represent and serve the NAIT Students. Because of this I was eager to help you when you approached us. When we at NAITSA examined our options, we discovered that there was not much that we could do for you without setting what appeared to be a detrimental precedent. There are no provisions or policies anywhere within NAITSA, NAIT or the SFB for emergency loans such as you needed. We at NAITSA did actively get involved on your behalf as much as possible, Sean, were you aware that even Dr. Souch was involved on your behalf? As incoming Executives, we were quickly made aware of an obvious fault in the system.

A few days later another student came to NAITSA asking for an emergency loan. Once again, NAITSA did not feel we could simply dispense loan funds without some guidelines and protection for the students' monies which we administer. However, by this time we were actively involved in negotiations with the NAIT administration to see if we could address this inequity in the system.

Sean, I cannot make you any foolish promises. However, I want you to know first of all that we do not feel that you are "some fool incapable in managing his own money". You are, in fact, only one among many students who is struggling financially. At the same time you were in need of an emergency loan, I was in virtually the same situation. I empathize with you.

Second, we are aware of the problem and we are still actively working on a solution. Any solution must be implemented with the cooperation of both the NAIT Administration and NAITSA. We at NAITSA strongly support an Emergency Loan Proposal and we are poised to cooperate with the Administration on a mutually approved program. Presently, several options are being considered and hopefully the best one will be implemented. While I realize this does not resolve your problem of several weeks ago, I believe I can safely say that we will have a program operational for the September semester.

Thank you Sean for educating a new Executive about an obvious need. We trust that our effort will usefully benefit NAIT students.

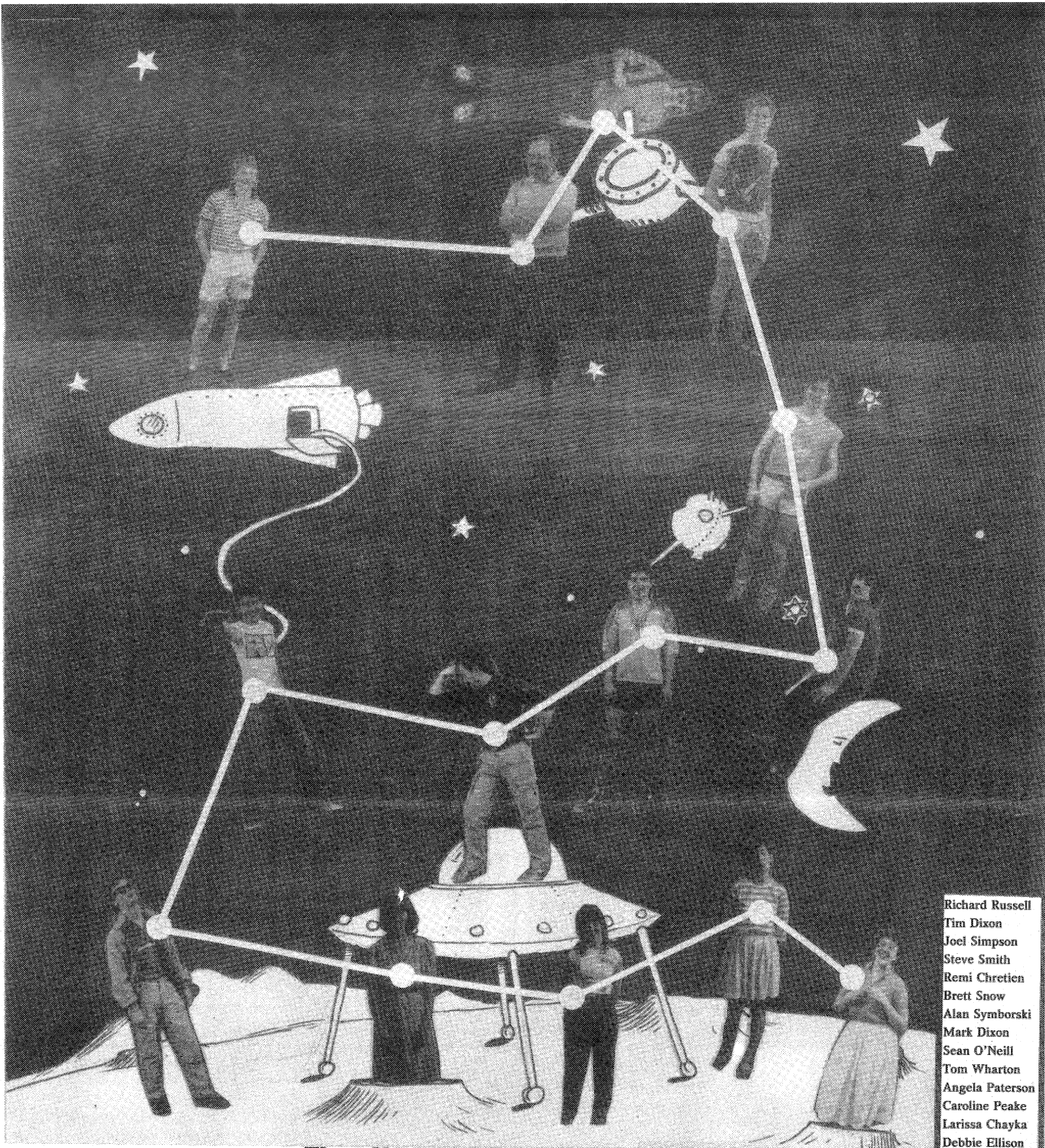

NEW NUGGET EDITOR NAMED

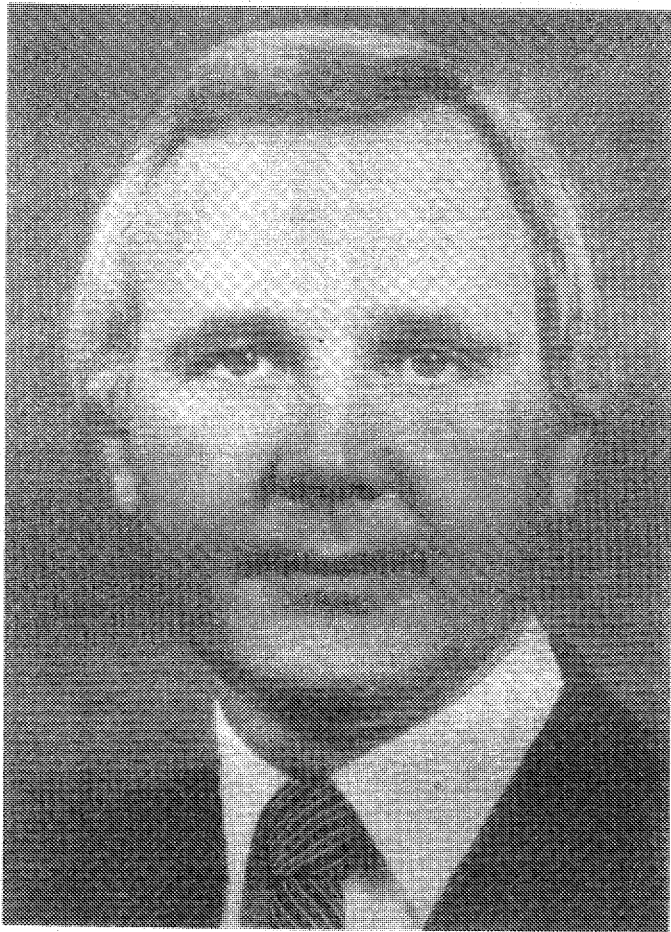

AN ALUMNUS TO ADDRESS THE GRADUATING CLASS

Dolliver H. Frederick, a 1965 graduate of NAIT's Administrative Management program, will be the keynote speaker at the Institute's twenty-first graduating ceremony on Saturday, June 1, 1985. Frederick is the first-ever alumnus to be invited to address a graduating class. He will also be the first recipient of NAIT's newly-established Distinguished Friend of the Institute Award.

Frederick is Chairman, President, and Chief Executive Officer of Cochrane-Dunlop Ltd., a dominant supplier of industrial products to the resource extractive industries of Canada. The company does over \$100 million in business per year. Earlier this month, Cochrane-Dunlop Ltd. announced its purchase of Marshall Wells Ltd. for \$20 million in cash and notes.

Harold Daum, Program Head of Administrative Management, fondly remembers Frederick as a solid

student with a keen interest in stocks and bonds. While attending NAIT, Frederick worked in the men's shop at the Hudson's Bay Company, where as a member of a management training class he prepared a study suggesting that the Bay must establish itself in suburban shopping malls (at that time there were few of them) if it was to survive in a highly competitive future. Clearly his business intelligence was finely developed even while he was a student.

In a letter to NAIT, Mr. Frederick recently wrote, "It will be twenty years next May since I had the privilege of being a graduate of Business Administration of your fine institution, and I cannot help but feel very strongly as to the outstanding 'skill set base' which the programme provided me with. Hard work and perseverance have resulted in success which I would have never imagined possible.

NAITSA GETS \$55,000

FOR IMAGE BUILDING

NAITSA Council has allocated \$55,000 for renovations and expansion to NAITSA executive offices. The money has been allocated from the General fund.

"We want to keep a professional image," was the logic used by outgoing president Greg Scherf. Emphasis was placed on image building and having increased office space so that the executive may conduct on a more professional level. The present conditions of the offices were described as "piss pot" by Scherf.

The cost proposal is \$40,000 to renovate, \$15,500 for furniture and \$1500 as a buffer. All estimates were given by NAIT. The motion was passed by an overwhelming majority and renovations will take place over the summer.

COMING THIS SUMMER

Mel Gibson stars in the third of the Mad Max series "Mad Max Boy and Thunderdome". The movie is an action adventure film set in a post-apocalyptic future. It was shot entirely on location in Australia in a series of exotic locales that included Black Heath, a jungle paradise in the Blue Mountains; Camperdown, a Sydney suburb; and Olga's, the most sacred burial grounds of the Aborigine tribes located in Central Australia near famed Ayres Rock. Starring with Gibson in this new film is Tina Turner, winner of three 1985 Grammy Awards.

Everyone has been to Oz. But Walt Disney Pictures is taking us back-and they insist that their Return to Oz is neither a remake nor a musical. Nine year-old Vancouver schoolgirl Fairuza Bulk plays Dorothy the juvenile heroine who revisits Oz to rescue her three loyal friends (The Scarecrow, The Tinman, and The Cowardly Lion) from Nome King who has destroyed the Emerald City. They're right-it doesn't sound like a musical.

Mary Shelly's classic novel, Frankenstein, has proven irresistible to film makers time and time again. Doctor Frank Roddan's offering of "The Bride" has Sting (The Police) cast as Baron Von Frankenstein and Jennifer Beales (Flashdance) as the perfect woman the scientist whips up for his earlier, malformed creation. Not all the sparks that fly between the two on 'the screen are scientifically generated.

Spielberg is loose again this summer not with Indiana Jones nor little creatures from beyond but with "Goonies", his latest release. "Goonies" is a humorous, suspenseful adventure centering around a group of friends with a very strong peer group. The breathtakingly beautiful scenery of the Northwest coasts of Oregon and California add suspense to the adventure, bringing physical obstacles into play, as much as human impediments. And like usual Spielberg productions, a surprise ending will be implemented that will be incredibly unexpected and extremely secretive.

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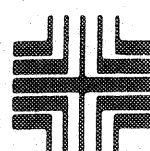

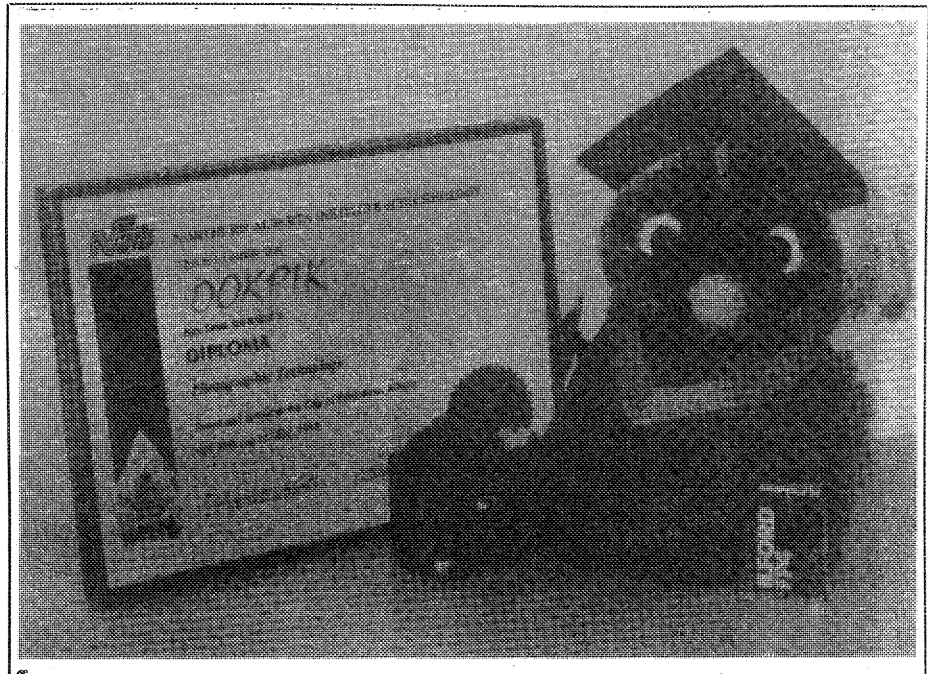
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
