NO WITCH-HUNT IN CANADA

In 1952, Joseph McCarthy, a US Senator from Wisconsin, became chairman of the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee. This position was a very powerful one for a Senator who had thus far had a rather obscure career until then. In fact, McCarthy's only prior claim to fame was when he astounded the United States by charging that the State Department had been infiltrated by Communists. In his new position, he used his power to propagate the fear of Communism. Through public hearings, the use of unidentified witnesses, reckless and unsubstantiated accusations, and a total disregard for the laws of evidence, McCarthy hounded anyone unfortunate enough to be labelled, by him, a Communist. Careers and lives were destroyed by the slightest implication and the flimsiest evidence. The term "McCarthyism" sprange from his unorthodox methods, and the word denotes assaults characterized by sensationalist tactics and reckless accusa-


The study of history is as imperative as it is interesting. We have been warned that "those who don't learn from history are doomed to repeat it." Have we learned anything from the embarassment of the McCarthy era? I wonder. At the present, a 64 year old Lithuanian tailor is being brought before the Deschenes commission. He is accused of being a Nazi war criminal. Most of us know about this, however mainly because the front pages of our Edmonton newspapers have boldly pointed out that a Nazi has been found in our own backyard (Brooks, Alberta). The sensationalism surrounding his charges, coupled with the recent trial and conviction of Ernst Zundel, and the fact that emotions are at a climax due to the 40th anniversary of the end of World War II; all this sets a perfect scenario for our own Canadian version of McCarthyism.

It was only last month that the Simon Wiesenthal Center submitted a list of suspected Nazis to the Deschenes Commission. Was our 64 year old tailor on the list? And if so, how many more names will be called?

Before you make a rash connection between this editorial and the swastika ad that was displayed outside our office at the beginning of the year, pause a minute. I do not sympathize with Nazi war criminals; I believe that they should be prosecuted. However, above this, I advocate justice — democratic justice which is promoted by our Canadian Judicial System. To fall into the same quagmire that the US found itself in during the '50's would be a disgrace to all Canadians. Let us not be swept up in the emotion and sensationalism which could potentially surround this issue. Let us not rush blindly into a Nazi witchhunt similar to the Communist witch-hunt. We are presently walking a tightrope between justice and McCarthyism. Let's keep justice a priority. Let's not repeat the mistakes of our neighbours.

In the meantime, I'd better shut up. If things get out of hand, I might be called to Ottawa too. Auf Wiedersein.

WE HAVE NOTHING TO REMEMBER

United States President Ronal Reagan's visit to the Nazi Military cemetary in Bitburg West Germany has caused Ronald Reagan more political strife that he's ever encountered during his presidency. What originally was planned as a demonstration of reconciliation between the United States and West Germany turned into an incredible Public Relations headache.

Ronald Reagan accepted the invitation to lay a wreath at the military cemetary from West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl. Upon announcing the Bitburg visit in the itinerary of his recent European visit, Reagan received immediate flak from Jewish communities and veteran groups throughout the world.

Instead of being perceived as a gesture of reconciliation and peace, Ronald Reagan was perceived as a man who was willing to forgive and forget the atrocities that the SS unit of the Nazi army had committed. Although Reagan's speach specifically stated that "we can never forget", the offended groups felt that his actions spoke louder than his words (besides who would ever believe that Reagan himself actually wrote the speech but that's another story).

The excitement created over this recent mention of Nazi's has added fuel to the Nazi hysteria that our media seems compelled to promote. The Edmonton newspapers have had several major news stories regarding suspected war

criminals living in Canada. "Alberta Man Denies He Killed For Nazis" shrieked Monday's Edmonton Sun. The story went on the explain how a now 64 year old tailor now living in Brooks, Alberta was a member of a Lithuanian army unit in world war II who fought along with the Nazi's against the Russians.

I think the media takes a particular glee from slashing that one word on the front page; NAZI. What does it mean to you? Do you even know what a Nazi or Nazism actually is?

Here in North America we are so sheltered from the harsh realities of what actually happened during World War II. I was priviledged to live in West Germany for five years and I've seen a glimpse of what that terrible war left behind. I ve visited concentration camps and military cemetaries. The rows upon rows of white crosses needed no explanation and the emotion those crosses evoked was incredible to say the least.

I've also had the opportunity to visit Japan. Hiroshima was one of my stops and I've witnessed countless monuments to the war dead. In Europe and Japan you are reminded daily of the horrors war brings but here in North America all we hear about is who the "Nazi of The Week" is.

North American public opinion is established by the media (like it or not). If the media continues to present the war as **Continued on Page 3**





THE NAITRIUM

The Naitrium study lounge is a unique project on the NAIT campus. It is the first facility to be jointly funded by the Student Association, the Board of Governors, and the Government of Alberta.

The origins of the lounge can be traced to the recognition by both the Student Association and the Board of Governors that study and lounge space on the NAIT campus was not adequate to meet student needs. Following consultation with the Nait administration and the Campus Development Committee of the Board, the Student Association pledged \$125,000 from its building fund to a proposal to develop

additional space. The Board of Governors matched the students' pledge, and application was made to the Advanced Education Encowment Fund for a matching grant. With the receipt of a favorable response from the Endowment Fund in May, 1984, Funding arrangements were completed and artchitectural planning was undertaken.

Construction of the project commenced during fall of 1984 and was completed in the winter of 1985. Students have been enjoying use of the lounge since late February. The time lapse from initial idea to completion was less than a year, making the execution of the project as noteworthy as the funding arrangements.

"FUTURE POSITIVE"

On Monday and Tuesday night some staff and students had the opportunity to hear Ian Percy speak on motivation. He is an energetic and dynamic speaker, who can really move an audience.

Ian Percy is a management physchologist and president of the Canadian Training Resources Inc., a management consulting firm which he founded while an undergrad at the University of Windsor. A resident of Richmond BC, he was invited to Edmonton by NAITSA through the efforts of Joan Davies. While in Edmonton Ian Percy also gave seminars on motivation at the Edmonton General Hospital and the U of A

He holds a degree in Education and Theology, as well as Clinical and Organizational Psychology. He is a frequent conference speaker through out Canada and the US. Ian percy is particularly well known for his innovative work in organizational renewal, managerial effectiveness and motivation. With us he discussed motivation.

There wasn't many in attendance on either night and that was too bad because what this man had to say I think could have benefited all of us.

The seminar was called Future Positive and Ian Percy talked mostly about how we as individuals can influence our world. "You must think about your future....you are going to spend the rest of your life there." Thats how he started his sermon on motivation. He discussed with us in detail four steps to influencing our world. These steps were; Understanding your Context, Utilizing Change, Developing your Credibility and Strengthening your Confidence. A lot of this stuff 1 think most of us know already but when it comes to doing them we sometimes forget our goals or get off track, and then we get down about ourselves, our friends, and our studies (work). After listening to Ian Percy lecture I came out feeling up about myself, my friends and my studies. In talking with other people, they expressed the same positive feelings.

FONYO FUND RAISING

A total of \$812.00 has been raised for the Steve Fonyo Run for Life Campaign. Due to the poor participation of technologies only \$406 was raised by technologies, while the other half was matched by Naitsa.

BCET which initiated the challenge will be awarding a plaque to Architecture for raising a total of 233. BCET followed with \$150.00 and Business Administration raised only \$23.00.

Stick

"Stick" stars Burt Reynolds in the title role as an ex-convict who is given one last chance to go straight amid the turbulent underside of Florida's posh Gold

The film is Reynolds' latest effort as both star and director, a dual assignment he has performed with considerable success on three previous occasions: "Gator," "The End" and "Sharky's Machine."

Based on Elmore Leonard's popular novel of the same title, "Stick" tells the story of Ernest Stickley as he returns to Florida determined to pick up the pieces of his life following seven years in a Michigan prison for armed robbery. Almost immediately after jumping from a freight boxcar into the heart of Miami, Stick becomes mired in a tangled web of intrigue. Involved are drugs, death, a flamboyant millionaire and his beautiful financial consultant, shadowy criminals and, ultimately, revenge.

Co-starring with Reynolds in "Stick" are three former Academy Award nominees -- George Segal, Candice Bergen, and Charles Durning -- two of whom earned Oscar nominations for films in which Reynolds also starred.

George Segal as the flamboyant millionaire is excellent, as is Charles Durning, the crazy pill-popping drug dealer. Reynolds himself is up to snuff, as the ex-con who attempts to go straight but finds that it is easier to delve into crime.

Overall the movie is boring and falls short of what a Reynolds movie should be.

A first in "Stick" is Dar Robinson's 20-story fall from Grove Towers complex, a trademark that has become one of Reynolds attempts to spectacular special effects.

The jump itself is mind boggling, not to mention the danger involved in such a leap. However on the screen, the effect loses its potential and becomes nothing more than just another gag.

The story of "Stick" itself is interesting. A man tries to clean the slate of his past but gets caught up in worse things that got him sent to the joint in the first place. On the screen, "Stick's" attempt gets stuck in the mud.

Gotcha

"Gotcha" stars Anthony Edwards as a Southern California student who goes to Paris searching for fun and romance and, instead becomes the target in a deadly game he can't comprehend.


Linda Fiorentino stars as the fascinating stranger who takes him for the ride of his life, a trek that leads behind the Iron Curtain.


"Gotcha" idealistically becomes one of life's more enjoyable fantasies involving travelling to a exotic land, encountering a fascinating stranger, becoming immersed in an incredible adventure and surviving, a better person for the thrill.

The age-old scenario is at the core of Universal's latest release, the story of an American college boy's hair-raising adventures with precarious international implications.

Anthony Edwards as Jonathan, the idyllic dreamer, is the perfect choice to create the character of the student on the rampage - loose, away from home. Both Jonathan and his roomate Manolo (Nick Corri) are humorous in their search for new conquests in the land of love, mystique and the Eiffel Tower. Linda Fiorentio as the American spy is lack luster. She's dry, plastic and uninteresting compared to Edwards.

However, Fiorentio's stiffmess doesn't take away from a good adventure story that takes us from America to France to Germany then back to America. "Gotcha" is a comedic-action adventure that is full of laughs. It is a good movie, enjoyable and fun.

BOARDSAILING!

Are you a part of the fatest growing sport of the '80's?

Boardsailing is a sport that is technically fifteen years old, but is only now beginning to catch on in the Edmonton area. Developed in Southern California in the late sixties, boardsailing has had a slow beginning as a new recreational activity.

The idea of attaching a sail to a surf board was created by Hoyle Schweitzer, he used a common universal joint to connect the sail to the board. Although this revolutionary idea received some interest by the locals at the beach, it never really caught on in a big way until the idea was tried in Europe. It was the Europeans that began to develop the idea and improve the construction of the sailboard. Over the past fifteen years, the European sailboard market has expanded to the point where over 600,000 units are forecasted to be sold in 1985.

The North American sailboard market is estimated to be five years behind the Europeans in terms of market growth. This potential is just beginning to be recognized in Edmonton, as local retailers are presently gearing up for an expected increase in sales of 50 percent over last year.

An abundance of ideal sailing lakes within close proximity to the City of Edmonton is one of the main reasons the sport will grow here. The sailing season for the lakes in the Edmonton area runs from late May to early September. There are numerous public beached at these lakes, and some have excellent sailing clubs with "learn to boardsail" programs. For example this summer the Lac Ste. Anne Sail


Club is offering a full Canadian Yachting Association (C.Y.A.) learn to boardsail certificate program. It will be available to all members of the public, as a club membership is not required.

One of the major aspects of boardsailing that apeals to the novice, is the relatively low start up costs as compared to other water sports. Prices start from \$400-\$800 for a basic beginner board, this price includes all the necessary equipment to participate in the sport. The intermediate and advanced board usually run from \$800 to about \$1800 depending on how it will be used.

A nice feature of the sailboard is the fact that there is no maintenance, it can be used continuously with no service requirements. Sailboards are easy to transport and can be stored just about anywhere. They are great if you don't own lake property, you can easily put the board on a car and head to the lake for the day.

Unfortunately reading about the sport will not provide you with the taste for the outdoors and the exhilarating feeling that this sport offers. You must now take the plunge, try the sport that is taking the country by storm. Join the thousands who are quickly making the sport of boardsailing the fastest growing sport in the world.






Only a few minor incidents involving flying beer containers seemed to upset the Edmonton City Police. But all in all a good crowd who enjoyed a very successful cabaret.






