NAIT'S MARTIN REPRESENTS CANADA

The dream of every athlete is to represent your country in a world championship. For curling sensation Kevin Martin and his team of Rick Feeney, Dan Petryk and Mike Berger this dream becomes a reality March 16-26, 1986 when they will represent Canada in the World Junior Uniroyal Championship in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.

The new kings of Canadian Junior curling earned the right to carry Canada's flag with their outstanding performance in St. Johns, Newfoundland in February 1985. They finished second in round robin play, defeated Quebec 5-4 in an extra end in the semis and defeated Prince Edward Island 6-3 in the nationally televised final.

For Kevin and mates it is going to be a busy six months. They are curling twice a week in a men's league. They practice every

Wednesday. They have played in the Ottewell Thanksgiving spiel losing out in the qualifying game. They are scheduled to play in four spiels before the new year, the Wetaskiwin Bid, the Spruce Grove Bid, the Poor Boy and the Yuletide. They will be looking at two more local spiels in the new year before their championship in March. To culminate their training a couple of exhibition matches are in the makings against two of Canada's outstanding curlers Pat Ryan and Tommy Reed. A big bonus for the team this year is the trip to INVERNESS, SCOTLAND November 19-26, 1985. It is a tradition for the National Junior Champions to participate in this spiel, a chance to familiarize and understand European curling. Many of the teams in this spiel will probably be representing their country in the World's. To say the boys are excited is putting it mildly.

Naitsa Executive Asks General Council for Raise

A constitutional issue was brought up at the General Council meeting on Nov. 5/85. The constitutional issue was that of executive salaries. In order to change the salaries a motion must go through three readings in General Council.

A payroll analysis was done by Naitsa Treasurer, Cheryl Anslow. The findings are as follows:

- Naitsa Executive salaries have not been revised since 1980 (5 years).

- The hours required by the Naitsa Executive are such that no other part-time jobs can be undertaken to supplement income.

Although Naitsa is the largest institute in ACTISEC population-wise, the Naitsa executive is the lowest paid by over 60 percent. The proposed increase is as follows:

President \$600/month Treasurer \$500/month All other executives \$400 /month. This is approximately a 60 percent increase. It should be noted that this is the first increase in five years. The extra money required to pay this proposed increase will be taken from the Naitsa budget and will amount to \$9800. The Naitsa Council feels confident that this proposed increase will not detriment other student activities that Naitsa is responsible for.

The first two readings of this proposed increase were passed affirmatively by General Council. The third and final reading will take place on November 19, 1985 in the Little Theatre (H5). If this third reading is passed, the increase will be in effect as of November 30/85.

We are all here for two years, or perhaps less, so we should make the best out of it. We can look back on the days of happiness, sadness, sickness, health, and the struggle during our time at NAIT. The NAITSA student executive, excluding the activity chairman, on an exchange attended Toronto to observe how the students executive operates in comparison to NAIT. I asked Glenn Mason (President of the Student Union executive) what was learned and what ideas can be applied to better NAIT students and NAIT itself. He replied that: first, there is a small executive consisting of 3 executive members including a full time President and several directors. Each director represents about 400 students and is responsible for things like video, satellite programming, film programming, posters, etc. For example, the activities chairman's job would be divided between 6 and 7 people who are volunteers. These people receive a small honorarium at the end of the year. They have no trouble getting volunteers. When comparing our 'general council' to their 'centennial council' the directors would be the equivalent to our council body. We have 40 representatives from each tech and they have 20. All of their executive are full time students as is our own. NAITSA executives find student involvement at Humber extremely high but finds that the 3 member

The student executive also visited Mohawk College in Hamilton. They found that the student activities are the best in Canada. While our executive was there, they

observed an auction going on for the United Way, and a noon hour concert. Mohawk has 3 or 4 activities going on at one time for the students and most of the events are free.

When we walk down our hall, one would think that all we do is put on beer bashes and cabarets and that we aren't exposed to much else other than alcohol. This concerns our executive and they are trying to change this image. Glenn states that they will try to have more speakers and other activities.

Another item our executive learned was that Humber students evaluate their instructors. It's to let the instructor know if they're communicating with the students or not. This would be an area which might be

considered. The executive of NAIT spent a full day at a leadership development watching themselves work on their goals, morale and values. When asked what other things can be changed at NAIT, Glenn replied that a licenced lounge on campus was indicated as a goal set at the beginning of the year. When asked what the lounge would be like, he stated it would be similar to the ones seen in Ontario. There was also some talk of opening a new students' building across the street in 5 to 7 years down the road to facilitate a new lounge. Another alternative was to have a lounge off campus, which in effect would be smaller.

The executive noted that no yearbooks were published. Although Humber has 1000 to 1500 more students than NAIT, the Humber student association doesn't want to get involved with a yearbook and feels that no one is interested. If

some course like business, administration or health wanted a yearbook, they would have to produce and sell it themselves. They have no free newspaper like the Nugget. Instead they put out a paper called the COVEN' which is put out by journalism students. This paper does not involve any student input. At one time students did try to produce their own paper, but failed because they were grossly mismanaged and went severely into debt.

The traditional rivalries between East and West will go on and it's important that future generations understand the people across Canada. The Secretary of State's viewpoint in funding the exchange is that students learn about another part of Canada and to see how other people live and what they do for fun. In this sense it was valuable. When asked what will be in store for Humber students when they arrive in Edmonton. the reply from Glenn was that the executive will give a tour of NAIT, have discussions on the student association and social activities. They'll also see the campus of Grant MacEwen College and Alberta College. They will tour the Rockies, West Edmonton Mall, and the Legislative Grounds. The students will attend classes with one of the executives to show them what a day at NAIT is like. Of course, there will be more for them to see and do.

The students exchange was funded through ACC (Association of Community Colleges). The actual funding was made possible through the Secretary of State.


LETTER TO THE EDITOR

WHAT PRICE FOR DRUNK DRIVING?

On Tuesday Nov. 12th, the life support systems of Philadelphia Flyer's goaltender Pelle Lindbergh were unplugged, ending his brain dead life.

Lindbergh was fatally injured hours earlier when he sent his Porsche 911 slamming into a cement wall. It was revealed that the young goaltender had a blood alcohol level of .24 at the time of the accident. (A motorist is considered legally drunk in New Jersey if he exceeds a .10 level.)

This tragic accident ended the life of a 26 year old man who was living on top of the world. He was a 1984-85 all-star goaltender, and the winner of last year's Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goalie. He was the heart of the Philadelphia Flyers hockey team. He was planning to marry his young fiancee in the very near future. He was indeed a man with a glorious path ahead. All of this was snubbed out. The cold, dark reality of mixing alcohol with driving. And perhaps this is the greatest tragedy of all: a life was ended senselessly by the irresponsibility of drinking and driving.

How can we explain the motives, the wanton mental state of a person who sits behind the wheel knowing he is impaired? What compels a person to think he is capable of operating a motor vehicle safely? Is it the cocky confidence: "Oh, I can drive fine when I'm drunk!" or the inane mentality: Drunk driving is only a crime when you get caught. Whatever compul-

sion these people may have, in no way justifies their actions.

People who drink and drive have to be punished severely. The charges laid on a drunk driver today are merely a slap on the wrist. Something has to be done... now! If a drunk driver doesn't kill himself, or damage property, he murders innocent people. How much more does a society have to pay in giving these people a license to kill by our slack laws?

Sadly, Pelle Lindbergh paid the price. We can only take comfort in the fact that his stupidity didn't kill more people.
