





Editorials

To Each Her Own

The endless saga of Dr. Henry Morgentaler's efforts to give women the facilities and rights to abortions, has hit another snag. The Ontario Supreme Court has overruled the decision made last year that Dr. Morgentaler is innocent of procuring an abortion.

The decision, all made by male judges, claimed that no jury has the right to: a) pass judgement involving innocent third parties, or b) to interpret abortions laws in accordance to

emotional bias.

Up until 1973, abortions in the United States were illegal. Under no circumstance were women allowed to have abortions. It was only until the feminist movement in the 70's, through numerous protests, that finally changes were made to the laws. But this took many years. So abortion was finally legalized but, only after many women had died in trying to rid an unwanted pregnancy.

No records were legally kept, but research on the subject shows that approximately one-half of maternal deaths in New York State resulted in botched illegal abortions. Most notably a majority of those that died were married.

Contraceptives were also illegal until 1973. Married women therefore had to keep quiet about abortions for it was immoral to conceive the notion that abortion was a choice. Thus. back alley abortion clinics were a result which led to many of the unwarranted deaths.

In Canada, abortion laws are still too strict. The difficulty in getting abortions varies from province to province. In Quebec, they are easily obtained, while in Alberta you must go through enormous hospital red tape.

Prolifers in general are declaring that they want no one should have control over their bodies. They are willing to go through unwanted pregnancies he it by rape (by a stranger or by their husbands), by mistake or even if it endangers the mothers' life. If a pregnancy is endangering a woman's life, it seems to me that her life is much more valuable to soceity than the fetus'.

This issue is an ongoing battle, but on clear fact that comes to mind. No male judges, nor anyone for that matter should be making personal judgements for another human being. That is why the decision should be to

each HER own.






The final game on Sunday against the U. of M. Bisons was a tough one to watch. The OOKPICS seemed to lose interest. They lost 10 to 3.

After The Gold Rush. Neil Young. (1972) This was a fop-selling album in 1972 and has come to be known as one of Neil Young's best efforts. It contains such timeless classics as: Tell Me Why. After the Gold Rush, and When You Dance I Can Really Love. Inspired by the Dean Stockwell-Herb Berman screenplay, "After The Gold Rush," this album is a thoughtful collection of songs written by Young, varying in style from the more folkie Tell Me Why to the driving rock beat of When You Dance I Can Really Love.

Get Happy!! Elvis Costello and the Attractions (1980).

This album came out during the growth stage of the New Wave movement. Elvis Costello has been called the genius behind New Wave, as many acts including Joe Jackson, and The Cars have been inspired by his dynamic musical style.

The album contains 20, yes 20, songs on it. Each are about 2 to 3 minutes in length. Notable cuts are: Secondary Modern, King Horse, New Amsterdam, Temptation, Five Gears in Reverse, Man Called Uncle, Love for Tender. As the titles imply, this album is packed with short, creative, danceable tunes that really emphasize Costello's ability to write songs with great variety and catchy hooks. Get Happy!! is a must for the eclectic music listener. Unfortunately, it is a rare find in second hand stores. If you do find it, buy it and...Get Happy!!





STAGE POLARIS

NAIT - RADIO AND TELEVISION ARTS

There's a new theatre in town. Well, actually, it's an old theatre with a new name. The Fort Edmonton Players who, for the past four years have been quietly producing historical theatre for the general public and school groups, are expanding

STAGE POLARIS, as the company is now known, was conceived by Susan M. Woywitka who has been involved in the Edmonton theatre scene since the age of six. Susan transmitted her dream to arts administrator Claris Cowan and actor/teacher Leslie Bland and together they have founded STAGE POLARIS.

Susan's idea grew out of an increasingly strong awareness of a gap in Edmonton's theatre landscape. Despite the numerous theatres in the city, it was determined both through unsolicited feedback from the public as well as specific research that two segments of our population were being passed over. Except for the Christmas season, there is very little theatre offered for entire families--and especially at prices which an average young family can afford.

In addition, although there are theatre experiences available for children during

their school years, there is almost nothing offered for pre-schoolers who are, of course, fully entitled to the exposure and delight of theatre's magic.

STAGE POLARIS' main objectives are to fill these two needs within the community.

A closely related endeavour, STAGE POLARIS ACADEMY OF DRAMA, is also being launched at this moment. Providing theatre arts courses to the general public, the ACADEMY offers a wide range of theatre-related subjects for all ages taught by professional teacher/performers including composer Wendy-Jean Albrecht (who is also Principal), dancer Maria Formolo, actor/clowns Jan Henderson and Robert Astle, actor/teacher Leslie Bland and others.

STAGE POLARIS' offices, classrooms and StarryTime Theatre season are all located in Old King Edward School. Built in 1913, the building is gorgeous to look at and a pleasure to be in. Thirteen-foot ceilings, large windows and wide hallways all provide an aura of grace and light.

For more info. Contact Lynn Vibert at 432-9483 Radio and Television Arts is a program that has been offered at NAIT for almost twenty years. 'The facilities and curriculum have

changed a great deal over the years. A program like Radio and Television Arts is unique because it operates a radio station and a television station. Because students at NAIT don't find out much about what other students do every day or what they learn in their programs this article will try to tell you a bit about R.T.A.

CHNR is a radio station run at NAIT by Radio and Television Arts students. The station can be found at 102.5 on FM Cable with Shaw. CHNR brings you NAIT News and contemporary music, five days a week, 7:30 a.m. - 11:00 p.m.

D.J.'s go 'on location' Tuesdays and Thursdays in the main foyer at NAIT, so if you see one of us sitting there with equipment on the table in front of us, stop and say 'hi'.

Radio students learn about what is involved with being on air, they learn how to write for radio, they learn how to produce commercials and specials and they find out about career in radio.

ENN is Edmonton NAIT News, a news show that focuses on NAIT News and NAIT sports. Students put together a package of entertainment and news four days a week. Friday is a special show which goes to air on Shaw Cable at 6:30. The news show is put together by producers, reporters and video editors, everyday and taped at noon.

Television demands long hours and group effort to get together a product. Students produce music videos, entertainment pieces, commercials and other work. The two-year program gives you a good overview of the industry.

Radio and Television Arts wants the students of NAIT, to be aware of our Radio and Television stations. Then perhaps you will understand what students with cameras and lights are doing around the school setting up here and there. Or maybe you will see the D.J.'s out on remotes in the main foyer and you will know what they're doing.

So listen in to CHNR if you have a cable and be sure to catch the special NAIT news show on Friday's at 6:30 on Shaw Cable. You'll enjoy listening and watching NAIT students bringing you news and programs with you in mind.
