## STUDENT LOANS

### If You Do Not Reinstate Your Student Loan(s) The Interest-Free Status Will Expire

You are responsible for maintaining your loan(s) in good standing. The credit institution (Bank) has no obligation to remind you of your responsibility.

If you have a Guaranteed Provincial Loan or Canada Student Loan and are continuing full-time studies you must reinstate the loan(s) PRIOR TO THE EXPIRATION OF THE SIX MONTH EXEMPTION PERIOD. You do this by:

- (A) obtaining the necessary Re-instatement Forms from your bank, or
- (B) negotiating a new Certificate of Eligibility within the six month exemption period.

You could check your most recent copy of the Certificate of Eligibility or Reinstatement Form for the latest academic year-end date. Your exemption period expires six months from that date.

Even though you may have applied for further financial assistance and/or other types of awards, this does not automatically reinstate your loan(s). **NEGOTIATING A CANADA STUDENT LOAN DOES NOT AUTOMATICALLY REINSTATE YOUR GUARANTEED PROVINCIAL LOAN, OR VICE VERSA.**

Separate Reinstatement Forms must be submitted—Schedule 2 for Canada Student Loan and/or Form B for Guaranteed Provincial Loan.

If you fail to reinstate your loan(s) within the stipulated exemption period or prior to termination of your full-time studies, you will be required to either pay the interest charges accrued up to the reinstatement date or to make arrangements for repayment.

If you should resume full-time studies and have been paying on the Guaranteed Student Loan(s), you must also submit forms to have your loan(s) re-instituted to interest-free full-time status. Interest accrued must be paid up to date of reinstatement.

#### NOTE:

You will not be required to pay interest charges on your Guaranteed Student Loan(s) until the six-month exemption period has expired. If you should remit any payments on your loan(s) prior to the expiration of the six month exemption period, be assured that the payments are being applied only on the principal; no interest charges have been assessed by the bank.

Students who change from full-time studies to part-time studies (less than 60 percent of full course load) will be considered as withdrawn.

#### MEDICAL RESIDENT STUDENT (POST-GRAD MEDICAL)

You cannot be reinstated to interest-free full-time status. Although you may be assessed tuition fees which may be paid by the sponsoring hospital, you are in receipt of a salary and therefore considered to be gainfully employed.

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## NAIT GRAD WINS INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION

It normally takes a few years for a NAIT graduate to make a mark on the international stage. However, this was not the case with Warren Mitchell, 21, a 1985 graduate of Instrumentation Technology.

Warren was recently chosen winner of an international paper-writing competition sponsored by the Instrument Society of America (ISA). He will be travelling to Philadelphia to receive a \$500 award and an engraved plaque at the ISA's awards dinner to be held on October 20.

Entitled "A Precision Surface Texture Measurement Technique," Warren's 38-page paper was initially written to fulfill a course requirement in Instrumentation Technology. Instructors in the program were impressed with Warren's work and encouraged him to enter a district competition.

The ISA is organized into 13 districts around the world, Western Canada being one of these. Winning entries from each district were submitted for final judging at the international level. The purpose of the competition according to the ISA is "to encourage student interest and participation in all facets of instrumentation sciences and technologies."

Warren is presently employed by Kenonic Controls (Fort McMurray) where his work is directly related to his NAIT training.

Earlier this year, New Democrats announced the formation of a Task Force on Youth. During the months of October and November, New Democrats want to talk with and listen to groups of young people and interested parties.

But why a New Democrat Task Force on Youth? Will it be any different than the recent Senate Committee on Youth? Yes. The Senate Committee focused solely on government programs and policies directly affecting youth. New Democrats believe that the problems young Canadians face cannot be properly addressed in isolation from the broader socio-economic issues.

The objectives of this task force are to:

- provide a forum for young people to respond to the various government programs and policies which affect them;
- provide a forum for young people to express their views on a wide variety of social, economic and political issues;
- seek your input in finding solutions to the problems faced by youth;
- encourage the exploration of alternative strategies for economic and social development for Canada's 4,260,000 young people between the ages of 15 and 24.

In this year of the United Nations celebration of Youth, New Democrats recognize that thousands of young Canadians face an uncertain future. Yet while there are many problems, we believe that working together we can find solutions. We believe that young Canadians have an untapped wealth of knowledge.

We want to hear your comments, concerns and opinions on such issues and questions as:

- employment and unemployment
- education and training
- family and social issues
- deficit and the economy
- social programs
- equality
- environment
- peace and disarmament
- Canada's changing economy

Listed are some points and questions you might want to discuss with us. But keep in

mind that our Task Force is there to listen to whatever you want to say.

### Employment and Unemployment

Canada's unemployment rate is approximately 12 per cent. Yet for those persons aged 15 to 24 it is 20 per cent. Additionally:

- the rate of unemployment is worst for those who are the least educated, and consequently the last hired and first fired during tough economic times;
- youth and students who are working are often underemployed, stuck in service industry ghettos or part-time work;
- what can we do to reverse these trends?

### Education and Training

Post-secondary education has suffered because of a lack of long-term planning. Funding for post-secondary education is often the first to be cut in times of economic downturns.

- how can we ensure that quality and access are not compromised in the name of fiscal restraint?
- whose responsibility is the funding of post-secondary education?
- are students regularly "streamed" into sexist or racist stereotypes?

We do not offer many alternatives to formal education, unlike many European countries. Canada has very low levels of apprenticeship programs and training on the job. Are there other alternatives?

### Equality

Canadian women continue to earn far less than the salaries earned by men. Among young people:

- young women on the whole earn 75 per cent of incomes earned by young men.

Among native Canadians, 52 per cent of the population are under the age of 20. According to the Nielson Task Force:

- in 1981 only 2/3 of all native men in urban areas were employed, compared to 3/4 of non-native men;
- by 1991 one out of two new entrants to the Manitoba and Saskatchewan labour force will be native.

Canada does not have adequate studies of unemployment among people in visible minorities. However, those studies which have been done show they face discrimination in the work force. Young people in these ethnic groups face the twin discrimination of racism and discrimination because of age.

Again, there are few adequate studies of unemployment among the handicapped. However:

- the lowest estimates have an unemployment rate of 50 per cent;
- young handicapped people face the same sort of double discrimination as young native people.

The topic areas we have listed have been provided to give some scope for discussion. However, comments do not have to be limited to the issues outlined. We are very flexible.

We know many of the problems. We need to answer the question about what can be done about them. How do we move forward to find solutions? Our Task Force is designed to provide the forum for your input. By working together our efforts in Parliament will be more beneficial to all.

## A.C.A.C. Preseason Tournament Coverage NAIT BREAKS AWAY Ookpiks near perfect at 2-1

On Oct. 11 and 12, NAIT's basketball teams played in an Alberta College Athletic Conference 'Preseason Tournament' at Grant MacEwan.

### GRIFFINS 66 OOKS 65

The Ooks roared into their first game of the tournament with unabashed enthusiasm.

Grant MacEwan's Griffins had beaten them seven times straight last year, and the Ooks wanted to win--badly.

The stands full, starters for the Ooks were Travis Heighington (8), Darren Aughtry (9), Mike Klein (12), Powell Jones (13), and Brian Lazaruk (14). Lazaruk was at center court for the jump ball.

Within two minutes, both Lazaruk's massive slam dunk and Jones' power move had made baskets. Then Lazaruk turned in a third hoop before the Griffins scored on a jump shot and foul.

At 17:57, the score was the Ooks 6, the Griffins 3. A minute later, the Griffins trailed ten-three.

The Griffins' coach burned, remembering that

his team had been in last year's playoffs.

It was a game big on fouls, the majority belonging to the Griffins.

With six minutes left in the first half, Jones took a foul shot. The score was 23 to 19 in favor of NAIT.

Twenty seconds later, NAIT had twenty-five, the Griffins twenty three.

The Ooks broke away at this point. Number five, John Geissler, scored on a foul. Mike Kelly (7) made two points on a lay-up. Back with two foul shots came Scott Holmes, number eleven.

The score was now NAIT thirty seven, the Griffins thirty.

In the second half, it was Jones putting in two baskets, then Heighington, Leggatt (10), and Lazaruk. At 11:55, NAIT led 51 to 45.

From somewhere, though, the Griffins banged forth with energy. They closed the six point gap and moved to winning sixty six to sixty five, scoring with 24 seconds to go.

### OOKS 82 WARRIORS 51

Day two; game two.

The Ooks took on the Warriors, a Division One team in the Major Men's League. The Warriors are angry old men, around twenty five, looking to beat down the young competition.

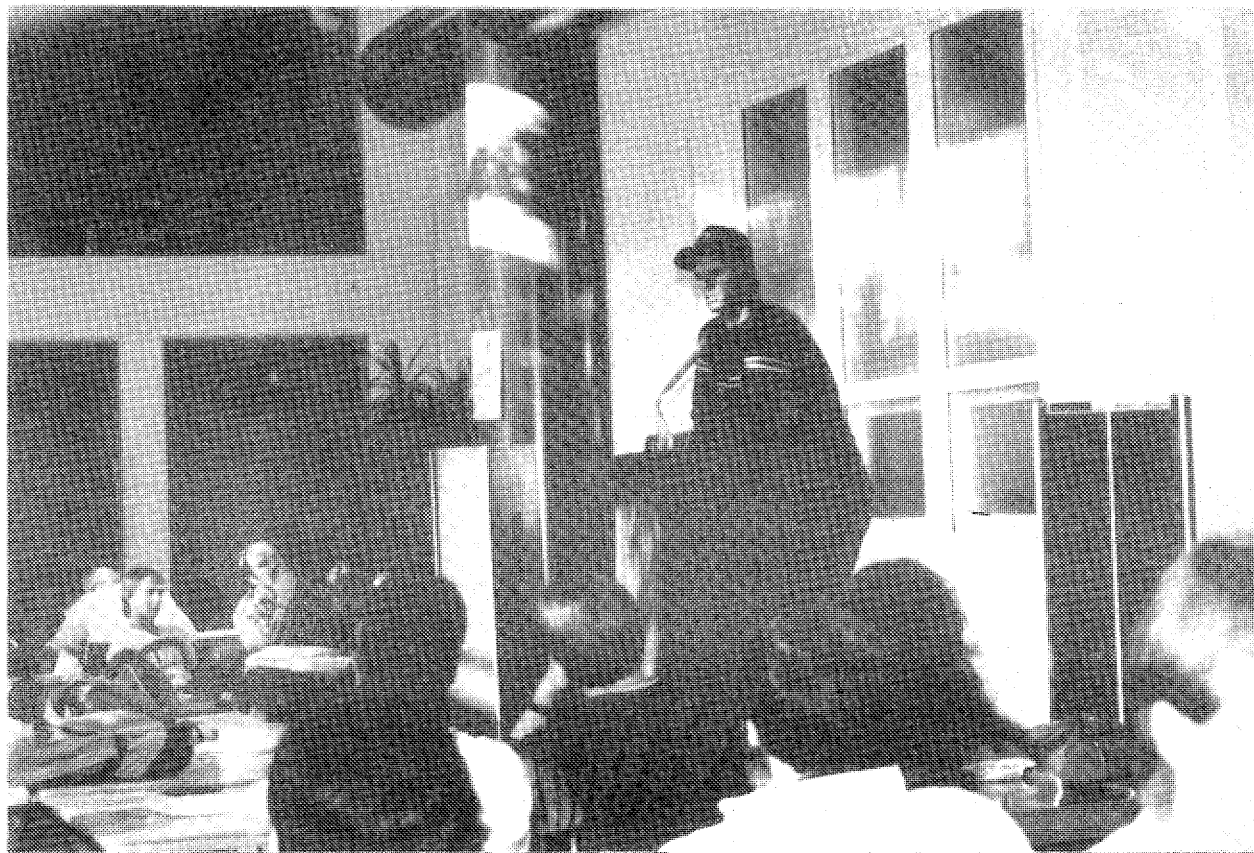
Although the turnout was disappointing, those that did show got 1.3 miles of exercise and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

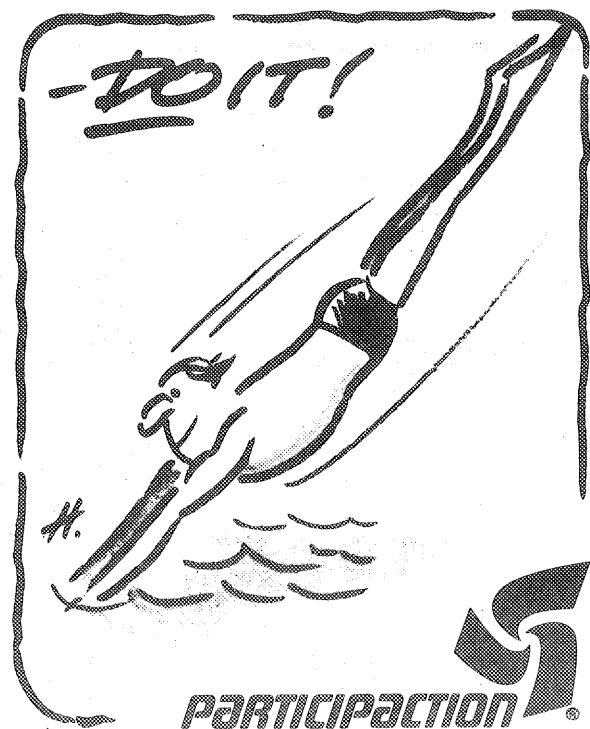

## CHICKS BASKETBALL

The Chicks opened their exhibition schedule last weekend with three games in the Grant MacEwan Early Bird Tournament. The rookie-laden Chicks came out of the short end of all three games losing 68-38 to Grant MacEwan, 73-30 to Barry T's (a senior women's team) and being edged out 48-47 by Camrose Lutheran College.

The tournament was the first chance the Chicks have had to scrimmage full court and the girls got some much-needed playing experience against some quality opposition. Against the Griffins, experience showed through as Rhonda Wolfram (an ex-U of A Panda) dominated the boards and led all scorers with 24 points. Shelley Green had 13 points in her first game with the Chicks. NAIT's second game was against Barry T's, a team which had several university and college graduates. The rookie-laden Chicks were no match for the senior ladies' team, but the girls fought hard throughout the game and showed a lot of character in defeat. The final game of the tournament was an evenly matched game against the Vikettes from Camrose Lutheran College. The Chicks held a 25-23 half-time lead but were edged out 48-47 at the buzzer by a stubborn squad from Camrose. Patti Mar-

cinyshyn hit stride in this game and led all scorers with 24 points, good enough to earn herself a spot in the tournament All-Star Squad.

The Chicks' lack of depth at the guard position was evident throughout the tournament and the loss of Meach Cucinotta for the second and third games left the squad with only one guard. Sherry Lee was called on to play three complete games as the point guard under some very tough pressure. The All-City guard from Strathcona Composite High School turned in a gutsy performance throughout the tournament, but could have benefitted from a few minutes rest. Living on a student's budget often means being choosy about how to spend those hard-earned pesos. Take clothes, for instance. When your only source of income is the Student's Finance Board, personal savings, or a part-time job at some convenience store, trendiness has to take a back seat to durability and practicality. In other words, a good, durable pair of Levi's may be more suitable than some pleated cotton-polyester watchamacallits. I happen to feel this way about music, especially. I'll rarely buy a new chart-topping album that I may only listen to for a few

months. I mean, why bother if I can just turn on K-97 and listen to the songs on that album over and over again, anyways?

So I invest in music--the tested and trusted stuff--that I know I can listen to now, or five years from now. Make sense?

At any rate, here are a couple of moldy-oidies that I picked up for my Walkman last week at Mr. Sound in Kingsway Mall--two cassettes for ten bucks--such a deal.

### Lou Reed, *Transformer*

This one is pure enjoyment from beginning to end. It features Reed's anthem for certified freaks, "Walk on the Wild Side" and some other very memorable tunes like "Andy's Chest," the bizarre lyrics of which rival John Lennon's acid-inspired "I am the Walrus."

The musical styles on the album vary greatly, yet still flow nicely into one another. From the rhythmic power chords of "Vicious" to the Monkee's-like backup vocals on "Andy's Chest" to the burned-out, laid back pace in "Satellite of Love" the album is fun to listen to, all at once.

### Supertramp, *Crisis, What Crisis?*

Vintage Supertramp. The band put this one together right after their blockbuster breakthrough album *Crime of the Century* (another good buy). *Crisis, What Crisis?* takes one back to the more relaxed mid-seventies (well, at least I was more relaxed then). For example, the song "Poor Boy", a catchy little romp, looks at some people's unexplainable drive for success "when half of what they got you know they never will use." "Poor Boy" features some great vocals by Rick Davies, who also sings "Another Man's Woman."

That classic 'old Supertramp' sound reigns throughout the album--lots of rich keyboards, deep forbidding bass, and clean, crisp lead & rhythm guitar. Some of the tracks which deserve mention are "Sister Moonshine", "Ain't Nobody but Me", and "A Soap Box Opera". Incidentally, the last two of these made it onto Supertramp's *Paris* live album, and are classics in their own right.

*Crisis, What Crisis?* is a must-have for mildew-music freaks like myself.

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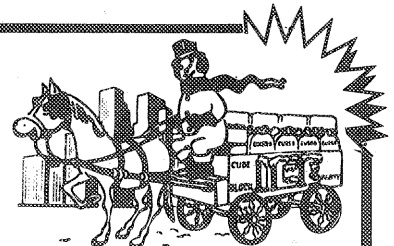

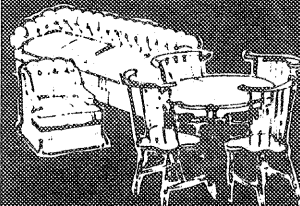
