

Did you know "Drunk driving" accounts for fully half of all auto fatalities. In numbers, from 1981 over 26,000 Albertan drivers were convicted of impaired driving or failing to provide a breath sample. In 1980 and 1981 Alberta had the highest fatality rate per capita in Canada of deaths in automobile accidents. After 10:00 p.m. one out of every 5 drivers has been using alcohol prior to driving. Even CHECKSTOP has admitted it catches only 1 out of every 200 impaired drivers. The facts are startling so please don't ignore them. Think about it.

The idea of this article was in no way suggesting that you don't attend the beerfest. I strongly recommend you do, it should be a great success! But I think I'll let my date drive because knowing me I'll overdrink and I don't want to kill or be killed!

CHECKING INSURANCE PAYS WITH KIDS IN COLLEGE

Fall is here and across the country students are packing up their stereos and heading for college dormitories. For parents looking to save some higher education dollars, a quick check on insurance can pay off, according to Leone Cardinal of Roy Henry Insurance in Edmonton.

"All too often parents end up paying more than they have to for their children's insurance," said Cardinal. "Most don't know that they probably have all the coverage they need. They may even save insurance dollars when the kids are away."

Many colleges include an application for property insurance for dorm rooms, and parents often buy it. "The unfortunate thing," said Cardinal, "is that many students don't need it."

"If your son or daughter's legal residence is still at your house, then the property in their dorm room will be covered under your homeowner's policy." she said. "The same coverage and deductibles apply. Just notify your insurance agent that the child is at school." Children who have established a permanent residence away from their parents would not be covered and should apply for insurance on their

Leone Cardinal also cautioned parents not to automatically jump into buying health coverage offered through the college.

'If you are covered under a group health and life plan through your company, your dependent children may be covered until age 23 if they remain students," Cardinal pointed out. Some plans cover them to age 25 and most plans are good across Canada and the U.S.

"Many people don't question insurance needs and end up spending more than they should," Cardinal said. "By looking into the coverage they've got, parents may find their kids are already covered."



THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY

The demand for qualified water-safety instruction increases each year as thousands of enthusiasts discover the thrill of aquatic.

"Whenever possible we want to help people receive that qualified instruction," says Gil Gilmet, Safety Services Director for the Canadian Red Cross Society.

To accomplish that goal Gilmet looks to increasing public safety awareness through individuals trained as instructors in registered Red Cross programs.

Instructor courses are offered, throughout the province, to persons over the age of 16 who have completed Red Cross Safety Services programs.

Through the first half of 1984 more than 725 individuals were certified in Water Safety Instructor courses. Another 718 participated in recertification courses. A further 120 participants were certified as Small Craft Safety Instructors with Standard First Aid Instructor certification going to 80 people.

Red Cross — trained instructors in either Water Safety, Small Craft Safety or First Aid are now present in 225 communities throughout Alberta.

Upon successful completion of an instructor course, a person is qualified to instruct anywhere in Canada. Becoming a Red Cross — trained Water Safety Instructor can be a positive step toward future career planning and advancement.

"When the course is completed the student will have gained values which will be beneficial throughout life," says Gilmet. "In addition, a qualified instructor can be eligible for future employment or volunteer opportunities at swimming pools, private clubs or recreational facilities and summer camps."

THEFT RATE AT ALL TIME HIGH

An inventory of the library's book collection this year revealed a sharp rise in the loss rate. 1586 books were recorded as missing since the last inventory taken 3 years ago. The highest loss rate occurred in the Electrical and Electronics area with 110 missing items, closely followed by the Earth Resources area with 64 missing items.

Replacement value of the missing books comes to approximately \$70,000. Since the normal budget for the circulating book collection has been around \$45,000/yr. for the last three years, effectively one and a half year's budgetary allottment has walked out the door. Needless to say Library management is concerned. A programme to increase security and limit losses has therefore been placed in

This programme will begin September 4, 1984 and includes the following components.

1. Hand baggage is now subject to inspection. Signage has been posted informing library patrons and random spot checks will be carried out daily at the circulation counter as people exit.

- 2. Signage indicating that theft is a criminal offense has also been posted in the library.
- 3. An improved security system will be installed on the fire
- 4. Commissionaires will patrol the premises daily.
- 5. A security system has been installed in the Plaza II library.

The intention of the above measures is to make it more difficult for theft to occur. Library management ask that all library patrons remember that theft is a crime. Your tuition fees and/or Departmental budgets pay for library materials. Library resources are there for everyone not for the private use of a selfish few. Please report observed incidences of either theft or mutilation to library staff immediately. Help us to help you. Be a concerned patron.

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


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

A TOUCH OF CLASS ADDED TO NAIT CAMPUS



NAIT has taken as a decidely "Ivy League" look since the acquisition of a new satellite campus this summer. The leasing of the stately old brick H. A. Gray Elementary-Junior High School on 103rd Street and 121st Avenue took place following the Edmonton Public School Board's closure of the facility.

Built in 1913, the school was named in honour of H. Allen Gray, the first Anglican Bishop of Edmonton, who later became a school board trustee and a provincial judge. When the school opened, there was only a handful of houses in the area and most of the students trekked many blocks over roads that were merely ungraded trails. Conditions at the school were a little primitive in the beginning. Although water and sewer services had been installed, an injunction prevented the use of the sewer system and outdoor biffies were the order of the day for the first few months.

The area grew rapidly over the ensuing years and a 1956 expansion increased the number of classrooms to 28 from the original 10. By 1958 the number of students had reached 775. In the last decade, however, enrollment steadily declined to the point where only 295 students attended the school, 100 of these being prevocational students bussed into the area. The decision to close the school was taken by the School Board in April of this year following an extensive review process which included open house information sessions, meetings with school staff, parents and the public, and numerous school board meetings.

NAIT's need for extra classroom space prompted the administration to consider leasing an existing school building, and when the decision was made to close H. A. Gray, the School Board was approached and negotiations resulted in a lease agreement in July. Since then, extensive renovations have been taking place. These include the installation of a new electrical service, minor mechanical improvements, some new plumbing, the creation of office banks from classroom space, and a major redecorating job. Work is still underway on the older part of the school; the newer section of the school has not yet been designated by NAIT for any specific function.

Last week, the Tailoring Technician program moved into the building, occupying the basement and half of the first floor. Administrative Secretarial Arts will relocate to the balance of the first floor and the second floor sometime in early December. The third floor will become a student lounge and multi-purpose classroom.

The new campus has been renamed Westwood to reflect its association with the surrounding area, and when the facelift is complete, a "handover" ceremony will be staged to mark the career-change of the 71-year-old structure.

TERRY FOX RUN

From coast to coast in Canada and in many other countries throughout the world, the fourth annual "Terry Fox Run" will be held on September 23rd, 1984.

The "Terry Fox Run" was inspired by Terry's "Marathon of Hope" to raise funds to help fight cancer. As of today, Terry's "Marathon of Hope" and the three previous "Terry Fox Runs", have raised over 33.9 million dollars for cancer

In Edmonton, this year's "Terry Fox Run" will be held in Rundle Park. The ten kilometer run, walk or jog will be starting at 1:00 p.m., but participants may begin the race as late as 2:30 p.m.

If you wish to participate in the run, you can pick up pledge Inn, at the Four Seasons Hotel, at fire halls and at the runners, you can join Terry in the fight against cancer. Y.M.C.A.

Participants may park free at the Northlands Coliseum parking lot and take Edmonton Transit to Rundle Park. Buses will run every hour on the half hour to Rundle Park, from 11:30 a.m. to about 2:30 p.m. Buses will run until 4:30 p.m. country, on a per person basis. to take runners back to the coliseum.

In the three previous "Terry Fox Runs", 3, 109, 932 dollars have been raised for cancer research by more than a quarter of a million runners around the world.

"Terry Fox Runs" have been held in the United States, Great Britain, West Germany, Brazil, Switzerland, China, Turkey, and the Soviet Union. Imagine the pride Terry would have had if he knew how far his run has gone, after the first that he took in St. Johns, Newfoundland in March, 1980.

When Terry started his fight to help stop cancer, he showed himself as someone who wants to help. In a letter that he wrote on October 15, 1979 to some of his sponsors, he said:

"Somewhere, the hurting must stop and I was determined to take myself to the limit for this cause ... I'm not a dreamer and I'm not saying that this will initiate any kind of definite cure to cancer, but I believe in miracles. I have to.'

Even if you do not plan to run, walk, or jog on September sheets at the Canadian Cancer Society, near the Edmonton 23rd, you can still participate. By pledging money to the



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

ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARIAL ARTS

Since the offices of today are undergoing dramatic changes in automated equipment, procedures and personnel roles, it is the goal of the Administrative Secretarial Arts Program to prepare and train graduates to meet these challenges.

The First Year of our program is aimed at training students to become stenographers, dicta—typists, clerk—typists, word processing operators and receptionists. After successful completion of the first year, a NAIT certificate is awarded. The Second Year of our program prepares the students for senior—level positions where there is more responsibility and challenge. We plan to further develop secretarial skills and secretarial knowledge for the future secretary. This will enable the student to explore a variety of specialties. After successful completion of the second year, a Administrative Secretarial Arts Diploma is awarded.

As in other technologies, the population of the Administrative Secretarial Arts program has increased rapidly in the 1980's. This year we have 208 students enrolled — 152 in the first year and 56 in the second year.


There are many interesting activities in the Administrative Secretarial Arts program. Some of these are:


Our most successful Cabaret for the past five years has been our Hawaiian. It seems to provide a little warmth in the cold winter months.

SCAAARY, KIDS!

THE ANGEL OF DEATH THEATRE NETWORK RUNS UNTIL SEPT. 30

So much of what constitutes horror in the movies today is simply a long parade of violence and gore. The viewer is shocked more than terrified as each director tries to outdo the others in the number of gallons of blood and buckets of pig intestines they can load into a movie screen.

All of which is but one reason why "The Angel of Death" is so refreshing; with only one blood packet, playwright Raymond Storey and Director Stephen Heatley have managed to create a deliciously frightening atmosphere.

Storey and Heatley have realized, as did the masters of horror like Hitchcock, that the simple and the implied are far more frightening and effective than the complex and the blatant. the play is full of moaning winds, creaking doors and closets that shut by themselves. (Much more is in store for you if you go see it, but I'm not about to give it all away!)

And the audience? Well, the one on the night I attended was jumping and shrieking at all the right moments.

The play gets off to a slow start, but quickly builds into a tight psychological thriller. There are good performances from all in the cast, with Barbara Reese doing an excellent job as the superstitious but amusingly lovable Mrs. Kessel. Christopher Youngren's beautiful portrayal of his character (again, a surprise) has the half-mad air of a man driven to the bounds of his sanity by an insane war.

Daniel Van Heyst's stage design is nicely composed, giving an ominous central focus to the attic door. I found my eyes wandering towards it, wondering what would happen there next

In brief, "Angel of Death" teaches us that after all, it is the unknown things - The ones that "Go Bump In The Night" - That are really the most frightening . . . and the most entertaining.





The Ooks have only five players returning from the Alberta Champion 1983 Ookpik team. The rebuilding task on hand will indeed be a challenge to the coaching staff.


