Student finances are one area that province wide student input is needed. Especially now since the Student Finance Board (the provincial body which issues the student loans) intends to move towards a flat rate of remissions.

Presently, remission payments are made to a student's credit of lending institution in order to reduce the principal amount of his/her outstanding loan(s) when he/she ceases to be a full-time student. Under current policy, the board may repay a maximum of:

-50 Percent of the amount borrowed in the student's first year of studies;

-40 percent of the amount borrowed in the second year of studies; and,

-25 percent of the amount borrowed in any subsequent year of study.

(One should realize that the amount of remission is not determined by the year one takes out the loan but by the year of study of a student's program).

#### REVISSIONS

At a meeting of the Student Finance Board in April, 1985, was suggested that moving to a flat rate was one of the directions that the Students Finance Board was contemplating. In light of the Student's Finance Boards's suggested direction, student's associations of Alberta's post seconday institutions met over the summer to put together a proposal for fair

put together a proposal for fair remissions on student loans. At these meetings a recommended 35 percent flat rate of remissions was proposed. The decision to submit this proposal

rests on two premises; First, that collectively, students of Alberta representing technical institutions, colleges and universities have a vested

interest in the present remission system and are in a unique position to collaborate, and Second, that if as suggested by the Student Finance Board in April, it is felt that a proactive recommendation would best serve the interests of students

throughout the province.

A simple calculation would indicate that neither a larger remission component nor a financial saving to the provin-

cial government is being requested. The recommended 35 percent rate calls for a redistribution of the remission dollar so that it is equally distributed across the board.

One of the "Most heard"

criticisms of the present remission system is the comment that students are penalized in terms of percentage of remission awarded if they choose not to take out a loan until their second or subsequent year of study. Another criticism is that with such a large remission component offered in the first and second years of study, students who may actually be able to finance their own educa-

tion these years may be tempted to request financial aid; Therefore leaving less money for those who could really use it.

If adopted, having a flat-rate remission of 35 percent would remove the penalty, since every student requiring financial assistance would now be eligible for the 35 percent remission rate regardless of the year that financial assistance is obtained. It would also create a

simplified system that will


assist not only students but all concerned.

NAITSA supports a flat rate of 35 percent remission on student loans, and is ready to endorse the proposal. If you have a student loan or are thinking about getting one and would like to know more about the future of the remission system, just come on down to the NAITSA offices and see Glenn Mason or myself. We'll be happy to talk with you in more detail on this most important issue.





AS you can imagine I keep quite busy handling NAITSA affairs. However, I really enjoy meeting new faces and always


have time to chat.


#### GRIPES





Intramurals are for the students and staff of NAIT so use them! Have fun and get into shape at the same time!


